## Resignations accepted at special board meeting

Board discussion in regard to the resignations included which of these positions will be filled for the next school year. The possibility of combining duties moving forward in an effort to save the district money was listed as an option.

Board President Dr. Jeryl Nelson said the district has been spending money out of the reserve fund and that fund is much lower than he is comfortable with at this time.

Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan explained some of the areas in which the district is working to save money, including not purchasing new textbooks in some areas. Instead, on-line versions of the needed materials are being used.

Dr. Lenihan said work has already been done to cut approximately \$300,000 from the budget and depending on the experience/education of the new hires, that number could be even higher.

Following debate, board approval was given to allow Dr. Lenihan to advertise for an elementary teacher and Library/Media

> Herring first talked about her background, including 12 years on the school board in Waverly and more than 20 years with the NASB.

"Developing a strategic plan to drive the long-term vision and mission of the district involves engaging all the stakeholders in the district," Herring told the board.

She listed all the groups included as stakeholders - board members, administrators, teachers, classified staff, students, parents, community members and business leaders and said these would all be engaged in some type of survey to determine the needs and priorities they see for the district. This data would then be analyzed and eventually developed into a three to fiveyear goal document for the district.

Board member Lynn Junck questioned the process for creating a strategic plan and wanted to have the opportunity to talk as a board to determine the board members' thoughts on long-term goals.

The plan moving forward with developing a strategic plan for the district will be discussed further at the board's next meeting.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, April 12 at 5 p.m. in the conference room at the junior-senior high school.

## Wide variety of topics discussed during council's mini retreat

From daycare shortages to LB840 activity and from the future of the lagoon to

housing needs, Wayne City Council members spent time discussing these and other topics during a Mini Retreat on March 30. Council members heard several reports

from Wayne Area Economic Development Executive Director Luke Virgil including LB840 activity, daycare needs in the community and downtown business activity. Virgil said there have been no changes

in the original LB840 loans and there are currently three loans in which the city is collecting payments. Additionally, a request will be coming to the council in April. He noted that there is currently \$324,000

available in the revolving loan fund. Virgil's presentation prompted council members to discuss the sales tax that has been collected to fund LB840 activities. It is scheduled to sunset in 2024 and possible options were discussed. These would re-

quire the issue to be put on the ballot. He shared information on businesses that have opened, moved or closed in recent

These included the move of IKT to the former Mineshaft Mall, the opening of Boutique Black Label in the former 1912 Emporium, Wayne Dance Studio moving into be included and how to keep the lake filled the former IKT location and ALLO Com-

munications opening an office in the Col-

lege Plaza Mall. Daycare services in the community were determined to "be a huge need" by all those in attendance.

It was noted that there are a number of barriers to having adequate daycare available, including staffing, wages, benefits and the hours of operation

The capacity of Rainbow World Childcare was discussed, along with possible changes in state regulations that would require smaller class sizes and additional space. Among options for additional daycare

was having some type of community-based after school program or have some type of school district facility. Conversation included having the city

be a partner in funding additional daycare within the community.

In addition, council members spent considerable time discussing the future of the

Several two-dimensional drawings were shared with possible plans for the area. These include having a lake on the south

end of the area, adjacent to Logan Creek. Council members said they felt there were many issues that needed to be discussed before moving forward, including also adding softball/baseball fields in the area, whether or not camping spots would

It was noted that a more concrete design for the entire area needs to be made available to the public. After that, funding for the improvements could be brought to the voters in the form of an additional city sales

Housing was discussed at length during

Virgil told the council members that there are approximately 60 lots available to build on in the city and that there is a shortage of rental properties available. He said that builders are willing to buy lots, but not be developers of entire subdivisions.

While the need for smaller homes is among the priorities, there is a demand for homes in every price range. It was noted that the need for some type of housing for the aging population also needs to be addressed.

Council members listed a number of areas in the community, specifically in the northeast section of the city and the western portion of the city that could potentially

be developed. Council members also heard information on the topic of electric costs to the city from Winter Storm Uri. Final costs have not yet been determined as there may be some type

of federal mitigation on the situation. The Wayne City Council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, April 6 at 5:30 p.m. at the Wayne Community Activity Center.



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

Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD), giving the public the opportunity to address the issue, one-on-one, with the Board of Directors and staff. After engaging in the educational portion of the Open House, the public was invited to either leave written or oral comments for the Board.

LENRD Assistant Manager Brian Bruckner, said, "We were very pleased with the turnout. We hope everyone took advantage of the time to meet with us and get their questions answered as we work together towards a solution that will improve and protect groundwater quality."

The next step will be to compile the written and oral testimony and present all comments to the board for review. The proposed changes to the Groundwater Management Plan will then be placed on the agenda for discussion at an upcoming board meeting.

LENRD General Manager Mike Sousek said, "It was a successful event and I hope the public left with a better understanding of the challenges the district is facing. We appreciate the feedback and the sharing of local ideas as we develop plans for local solutions."

Use inspection holes or grain level markers to understand what is happening inside the bin. Use a pole from outside the bin to break up grain bridges. You should enter a grain bin only

if absolutely necessary. If you must get into the bin, use a body harness secured to the outside of the bin. Have at least two people watching over you as you enter and work inside the bin. Use hand signals to communi-

## USDA extends application deadline for Conservation Stewardship Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced it is ardship Program (CSP) renewal application through April 7.

CSP is USDA's largest working lands conservation program with more than 90 million acres enrolled.

"In fiscal year 2020, NRCS helped enhance over 495,000 acres of land enrolled in CSP in Nebraska," said Jeff Vander Wilt, USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) acting state conservationist. "CSP continues to prove its worth by helping farmers and ranchers advance their business sustain the natural resources that improve productivity and their bottom lines."

Participants with existing CSP contracts that close on Dec. 31, 2021, can benefit from recent program changes by renewing their contracts for an additional five years if they agree to adopt additional conservation practices on their land. Applications to renew expiring contracts are due by April 7.

CSP is for working lands, includextending the Conservation Stew- ing cropland, pastureland, rangeland, non-industrial forestland as well as tribal lands. The program helps producers build on existing conservation efforts while strengthening their operations. CSP provides many benefits, including increased crop yields, decreased inputs, wildlife habitat improvements and resiliency to weather extremes. It also encourages the adoption of new technologies and innovative

management techniques. Through CSP, agricultural prooperations through conservation ducers and forest landowners earn enhancements on their land that payments for actively managing maintaining, and expanding conservation activities like cover crops buffer strips, pollinator and beneficial insect habitat, and soil health activities while maintaining active agricultural production on their

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

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## Naturally occurring elements in 800.235.5331 Nebraska's Groundwater discussed

Part 1 of a Series -Calcium and Magnesium

There are naturally occurring elements and minerals within Nebraska's geology, and with that, it is not uncommon to find them in Nebraska's groundwater. Calcium, magnesium, iron, manganese, fluoride, arsenic, and uranium are among the elements found in Nebraska.

Over the coming months, I will spotlight each of these elements. While every day should be "Groundwater Day" in Nebraska, March 7–13, is National Groundwater Week this year. To kick off the celebration, this month's featured elements are calcium and magnesium.

Calcium and Magnesium Calcium and magnesium are el-

ements that make a water considered "hard." They are common metallic elements found within the soils and rock formations throughout Nebraska's geology. Neither have a health risk affiliated with them. They are generally each considered more of a nuisance element because of their potential to cause mineral build-up/scale layer within hot water heaters, water pipes, boilers and other plumbing fixtures. These minerals also cause poor performance of soap and detergents.

Treating hard water Hard water is most often treated

with an ion exchange water softener that has sodium chloride or potassium chloride added to make the water less hard. People who have to watch their salt intake will want to avoid consuming water softened with sodium and either use a potassium chloride product or drink the hard water instead.

Most hard water contributes a small amount to the total calcium and magnesium required in one's diet, but in some instances, it can be a major contributor. An ion exchange treatment system is considered point of entry (POE) treatment equipment, meaning that it treats all of the water coming into the home or building.

When looking to install a water softener, one should make sure that the unit meets NSF/ANSI 44 tech-

nical requirements. This approval means the unit has been rigorously tested and meets the public health compliance standards for residential water softeners that use ion exchange resin, regenerated with a sodium or potassium chloride product to reduce the hardness of water from a private well or public water supply. One can contact a reputable water quality professional in their area for water softening needs as
