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## Power costs, water issues highlight council agenda

How to pay for the costs of electricity from this winter's cold snap and what to do with the city's newly installed water transmission line were among the items debated at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Andrew Ross, Director of Retail Utility Services and Member Relations talked to the council about the situation that took place in mid-February when there was "unprecedented cold across the entire U.S. The scale, duration and severity of the cold was something that has not been seen in over 100 years. During this event, Wayne was able to generate its own electricity and this was a fantastic savings to the town."

However, even with the city's generation, the city has seen an \$800,000 impact on electric costs.

Ross shared with the council three possible ways to deal with the extra costs.

These include doing nothing and having the city absorb the costs from the electric department reserves, raising rates permanently or using a process known as a Power Cost Adjustment (PCA). The PCA allows the city to recover the costs from a specific event for a specific amount of time and sunsets.

Tim Sutton, head of Electric Production, told the council "we really don't want to dive into our reserves. We are planning some major projects down the road that we need the money for.'

Following discussion, council members voted to set a production cost adjustment at \$.0124/kWh at Ross's recommendation. This will take effect June 1.

Council received some good news in regard to the water transmission main that was installed last year.

Water/Wastewater Superintendent Casey Junck said that two negative tests have been received from a 2 1/2 mile portion of the line, meaning the water is not contaminated at that point. This was accomplished after the line was "super chlo-

comments from the survey was having the RTC open evenings.

Council discussion from Brown's presentation included how to monitor the RTC to make sure those using it were disposing of materials properly.

Brown said the RTC is a partnership between the city and Waste Connections and noted that education needs to continue to make sure the community needs are being addressed.

Water was also the topic of discussion when several members of the Wayne Agricultural Society came to the council asking the city to forgive a sewer bill of over \$6,000 due to a frozen water line that broke in early February.

Doug Temme, President of the Ag Society, said a water line broke and flooded the Commercial Building. He said that the Ag Society pays double for water and sewer because the fairgrounds are outside city lim-

He also said that when the line broke, the majority of the water did not go into the city's sewer system, but instead, went out the building.

Council members debated options for dealing with the situation, noting they did not want to set a precedent with their decision.

However, it was noted that the Ag Society is funded with tax payer dollars, just like the city.

Following discussion, council members voted unanimously to waive the entire sewer bill for that time frame, noting that the Ag Society had already paid double for the water used.

Resolution 2021-25 was approved. It allows for a community-wide blanket construction permit between the City of Wavne and Black Hills Nebraska Gas, LLC, doing business as Black Hills Energy. The permit would be for 2021 and the company will need to come back to the city for a permit for work planned for 2022.

Several representatives with Black Hills Energy were present to explain the work that is going to be done in the northeast portion of Wayne, near Wayne State College. They explained that having a blanket permit would allow the work to be completed in a more timely manner.

additional electrical costs from Winter Storm Uri, the polar vortex event that took place in mid-February. The City had just over \$819,000 in additional direct costs associated with the event. These costs included power prices as well as other costs passed on by the City's power provider. These costs will be reimbursed with the PCA. The City estimates that fuel costs and operational costs of the power plant during this event amounted to another \$177,000. That cost will be absorbed into the current City budget as an overrun and not recovered through the PCA. So what does this all mean? Starting with electric customers' June 1 billing, they will see an additional \$0.0124 per kWh charged on your electric bill (this is an extra \$12.40 for every 1000 kWh used). Look under the usage column on Administrator at 375-1733 or your most recent City utility bill wblecke@cityofwayne.org

for "electric" and you can calculate what this PCA will mean in dollars and cents. For example, my person-Power Cost Adjustment (PCA) al bill for May 1 (usage from 3/15 -4/14) was 615 kWh. The purpose of his project is to leverage existing tools and data to improve scientific understanding of nitrate contamination in the Lower Elkhorn NRD by focusing his research efforts on data digitization and incorporation of data into models, maps, and graphs.

LENRD Assistant Manager Brian Bruckner said, "We appreciate the research that Jordan is doing and look forward to working with him on this project. This report was the first of several updates that will be given by Jordan, with each update providing a view of the project as new information is integrated into the database.'



## **Capitol View** Lawmakers advance farm-to-school program



#### **Pender receives Rural** Workforce housing funds

Created by the Rural Workforce Housing Investment Act, which was signed into law by Gov. Ricketts in 2017, the RWHF is designed to help communities increase their supply of quality, affordable housing to accommodate a growing workforce.

"Our state's affordability makes Nebraska a great place to raise a family," said Gov. Ricketts. The Rural Workforce Housing Investment Act provides matching funds for our communities working to build high-quality, reasonably priced homes. The availability of affordable housing grows Nebraska by helping small towns and rural communities attract new businesses and residents."

RWHF grants are available to eligible non-profit development organizations, who-often in collaboration with local employers and financial institutions-supply a minimum of 1:1 matching dollars to generate Rural Workforce Housing Investment Funds for project financing. Among the recipients was Pender Community Development, Inc. with a local match of \$600,000 and a RWHF Award of \$600,000.

#### Governor signs budget into law

On Monday Governor Pete Ricketts signed the State of Nebraska's next two-year budget into law. The budget controls state spending and delivers significant property tax relief among other key priorities. "The budget I have signed controls state spending and significantly increases direct property tax relief for the people of Nebraska," said Gov. Ricketts. "As the Legislature continues their work, there are additional opportunities to deliver significant tax relief. I look forward to working with Senators to deliver even more relief for the people of Nebraska."

1. Controls State Spending: The budget signed into law by the encouraged Governor limits the State's annual

budget growth to 1.7 percent. This is about one-fourth of the yearly budget growth before Gov. Ricketts took office.

2. Property Tax Relief: The budget delivers about \$1.45 billion in property tax relief over the biennium. This includes \$613 million in direct property tax relief through the State's Property Tax Credit Relief Fund, and over \$627 million from the newly enacted LB 1107 refundable property tax credit. The budget also includes \$214 million to provide for property tax payments under the current homestead exemption program.

3. K-12 School Funding: The budget fully funds the state school aid formula, providing over \$1 billion annually in aid to K-12 public schools.

4. Educational Opportunities: The budget expands the Career Scholarships program to include private institutions and also includes additional resources for the state's textbook loan program for K-12 private schools.

5. Public Safety: The budget kicks off the process of replacing the decaying Nebraska State Penitentiary with a new, modern correctional facility. This investment will also increase the operational capacity of Nebraska's corrections system to meet forecasted needs.

#### Tax benefits impacting District 17

I supported LB682 coming out of the Revenue Committee and I wanted to explain how the New Markets Tax Credit Program has benefited District 17. Blue Ox Manufacturing is the largest employer in Pender, a rural town in my district with a population of 1,200. A few years ago, Blue Ox secured a \$10.4 million investment from the New Markets program that helped them create 20 new jobs in Pender, and keep their existing 160 jobs in Pender, where they have been for over 90 years. Keeping Blue Ox in Pender and helping them grow their business has been critical to the success of this small town in my district, and that was made possible by the New Markets investment. Blue Ox is one of several examples of New Markets investment in District 17.

Since the New Markets Tax Credit program began in Nebraska, 40% of all investment through the

#### Corporate tax cut and other revenue measures advance

After two days of discussion, law makers gave first-round approval to a bill that includes several taxrelated proposals, including a cut to Nebraska's top corporate income tax rate.

One amendment would cut the state's top corporate income tax rate to 6.84 percent — the same as the state's top individual income tax rate — beginning Jan. 1, 2022. Corporations currently pay a state income tax rate of 5.58 percent on the first \$100,000 of taxable income and 7.81 percent on income in excess of that amount.

A second component of the divided committee amendment contained provisions of LB299, any rural or suburban fire protection district, airport authority, city, village or nonprofit corporation could provide and maintain enhanced cancer benefits for paid and volunteer firefighters, the combined total of which would not exceed \$50,000 in the firefighter's lifetime. Beginning Jan. 1, 2022, an individual's federal adjusted gross income would be reduced by the amount received by or on behalf of a firefighter for cancer benefits under the act. This would ensure that the benefits are not subject to state income tax.

A third amendment, included my bill, LB597, designed to provide parents who have suffered a stillbirth of 20 weeks or more, a refundable tax credit of \$2000. Parents of stillborn babies often incur higher medical expenses than a healthy delivery, as well as burial expenses. This credit will help alleviate the financial burden of their loss.

A final amendment included the amended provisions of LB347, sponsored by Omaha Sen. Brett Lindstrom, which deal with a category of income earned by U.S. multinational corporations. The 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act created a provision to tax Global Intangible Low-Taxed Income, a certain type of income earned by foreign subsidiaries of U.S. corporations. The tax is meant to discourage multinational corporations from shifting profits to jurisdictions with tax rates lower

such income, to the extent that it is included in federal adjusted gross income, starting the exemption at 5 percent of AGI for tax year 2022, increasing to 20 percent in 2023 and rising 10 percent per year until reaching 100 percent in 2030. For individuals, the exemption would start at 20 percent for those with an AGI of less than \$60,000 in tax year 2022. The proposal would cap eligibility for married couples filing jointly at an AGI of \$95,000 and for individuals at \$80,000.





Volunteers are vitally important as they provide the capacity and resources to serve more children and families. They have 392 volunteers this year; 36 of them are new. In recent years they have provided holiday gifts for over 1200 children. Nebraska Children's Home Society provides adoption services, foster care, and family support; as well as individual support, pregnancy counseling, newborn care, parent education for both mothers and fathers, and grandparents, as well as early childhood education services for infants, toddlers, and pre-kindergarteners.







The report was given by Jordan Shields, PhD student in the University of Nebraska Earth and Atmospheric Sciences Department. The purpose of his project is to leverage existing tools and data to improve scientific understanding of nitrate contamination in the Lower Elkhorn NRD by focusing his research efforts on data digitization and incorporation of data into models, maps, and graphs.

LENRD Assistant Manager Brian Bruckner said, "We appreciate the research that Jordan is doing and look forward to working with him on this project. This report was the first of several updates that will be given by Jordan, with each update providing a view of the project as new information is integrated into the database."

# Water Law 101 - part 5 of a series

Part 5 of a series about basic water law in the United States, predominately in the western part of the country, and how it affects this finite resource.

Water law can be traced back to Roman times and also has roots in English common law. Across the United States, it varies from state to state, and from East to West. When conflicts arise, courts usually determine the outcome, unless there are state or federal laws or previous case studies to resolve the issue. Exceptions to the law can arise from differences in each state's water laws.

Part 5: Groundwater — Wells Nebraska has an estimated 2.15 billion acre-feet of groundwater in aquifers underlying the state, according to the Groundwater Atlas of Nebraska (1998 edition), published by the Nebraska Conservation and Survey Division (CSD) and the Groundwater Foundation.

It might be hard to visualize such a huge quantity of water. But if somehow all that water were to cover Nebraska's 49.5 million acres of surface area, it would be about 43 feet deep.

"Though some states may have greater precipitation, more water in lakes or greater streamflow, few can challenge Nebraska with respect

to the amount and general availability of water stored and moving underground in porous rocks," the Groundwater Atlas says. "In terms of total volume of good-quality groundwater available for use, Nebraska could be called The Groundwater State."

The largest of these aquifers is the High Plains Aquifer, which includes the Ogallala Aquifer. About half of Nebraska's groundwater is underneath the Sand Hills of Nebraska.

Wells, ranging from a few feet to thousands of feet deep, are the main means of transporting groundwater to the surface. Irrigation is the largest use of groundwater in Nebraska by far, according to the 2013 edition of CSD's Groundwater Atlas. About 94% of all groundwater withdrawals are for irrigation water; public water supply is a distant second at about 3%.

Regulating the use of groundwater wells and solving conflicts between well users can be complicated and difficult. Here are some

that come into play in the laws and regulations regulating wells in Nebraska:

Well spacing: In Nebraska, irrigation wells must be spaced at least 600 feet from neighboring registered irrigation wells, and at least 1,000 feet from neighboring registered industrial and municipal wells. There is no spacing protection for domestic or stock wells.

Well interference is where the pumping of one well interferes with the groundwater withdrawals from the other well. If the two wells are used for the same purpose, the wells share the available ground water or correlative rights. If the wells are used for different purposes, the lower-preference user may have to pay for the restoring the ground water supply of the higher preference user. The groundwater preferences in Nebraska are (in order of preference): domestic (including human needs related to health, fire control and sanitation, and also "domestic livestock as related to normal farm and ranch operations"), agricultural (including aquaculture), and manufacturing or industrial.

Reasonable pumping depths is a statute in some states to deal with well interference conflicts; in which the senior may be required to deepen his/her well to a "reasonable depth" in order to be protected from the deeper junior well. If the senior export ground water into another

"reasonable depth", the junior well can pump "out of priority" regardless of priority.

A dry-year plan is a management plan that has been developed by a governmental agency (or agencies) to be implemented in the event of a drought or dry year and scarce water supplies, so that all water users share correlatively in the reduction of water availability and use.

Quick response wells (In Nebraska) are irrigation wells that lie within 2.5 miles of a hydraulically connected stream or river that could be called on to reduce pumping (by 50%) under a dry-year plan.

Upland wells (In Nebraska) are the remaining irrigation wells (under a dry-year plan) that lie outside of the 2.5-mile boundary from the stream or river; that could be called on to reduce pumping (15%), but not as much as the quick-response wells.
