Wayne community gathers for annual banquet

After a nearly four-month delay to ensure the safety of those attending, the Wayne Area Economic Development 2021 Annual Banquet was held May 23. More than 300 tickets were sold to this year's event which included a silent auction of donated items a dessert auction and the presentation of numerous awards. Chosen as the 2020 Most Valuable Patron for the city of Wayne was the Wayne Public Library.

Sales tax receipts continue to be strong, despite pandemic

Wayne City Administrator Wes Blecke and Finance Director Beth Porter said that when the COVID-19 pandemic hit, they were fearful of what it would do to the city's finances.

However, sales tax figures indicate that revenues from city sales tax increased more than \$66,000 from fiscal year 2018-2019 (Oct. 1, 2018 to Sept. 30, 2019) to fiscal year 2019-2020 (Oct. 1, 2019 to Sept. 30, 2020).

Sales tax numbers released this month (which reflect the amount collected in March of 2021) were \$124,108.68. This is the highest amount ever received in one month for the city.

Since the start of fiscal year 2020-2021, sales tax receipts have exceeded those of the previous year in six of the eight months.

Currently, the city collects seven percent on all taxable purchases. Of this amount, 5.5 cents per \$1.00 purchase is sent to the state of Nebraska. The remaining 1.5 cents is split three ways — .5 cents goes toward paying off the swimming pool, .6 cents is designated to capital projects and the remaining .4 cents goes to LB840 projects.

The sales tax allocated to the swimming pool project will sunset when the bonds are paid off and the portion of the sales tax allocated to LB840 will end when a total of \$3.2 million is collected. At that time, the tax money collected will roll into the funds available for use on capital projects.

The city has not yet spent all of the funds available for capitol improvement projects.

Blecke notes that due in part to COVID-19, on-line shopping has increased and the city is receiving the sales tax from these purchases.

City sales tax money can be used to pay for a variety of things, such as the mural on the north side of the Majestic Theatre that was completed in 2020 and the public art project that is taking place this year in downtown Wayne. Larger projects that have benefited from sales tax revenue in the last fiscal year include the Library/Senior Center upgrades, contributions to the trail project and the recent playground equipment project at Sunnyview Park.

In response to the impact COVID-19 had on local businesses, the Wayne City Council voted to defer LB840 payments up to 30 months for those who requested such a deferment. Several business owners have taken advantage of this deferment as they work to bring business back to pre-pandemic levels.

The city of Wayne has also received COVID-19 relief funds in the amount of \$223,000 for fiscal year 2019-2020. This money can be used for police and dispatch costs.

Additionally, the city may be awarded money from the American Rescue Plan. However, the amount to be received and the details on how the money needs to be spent have not been announced at this time.

"When the pandemic hit, we were concerned about the economic impact to the city of Wayne. There were predications that there could be a 30-40 percent decrease in revenues. However, for the city of Wayne, that did not happen. I believe that because people were not traveling, they were buying what they needed here in town," Blecke said. "The community has always been very supportive of local businesses and this support has continued during the last year and a half."

Changes made to Nebraska Directed Health Measures, Executive Orders

On May 24 Nebraska Governor Pete Ricketts announced that effective at midnight on May 25, all Nebraska Directed Health Measures (DHMs) were repealed.

Additionally, Governor Ricketts set an expiration date for several of the Executive Orders that had been implemented to help businesses through the pandemic. The expiration of the Executive Orders is effective on Tuesday, June 1.

These included:

- Executive Orders 20-06 & 20-09 provided relief for Bar & Restaurant Operations.
- Executive Order 20-13 accelerated Online Notary Access & Financial Institution Regulations.
- Executive Orders 20-14, 20-19, & 20-22 dealt with Emergency Unemployment Insurance.
- Executive Order 20-21 provided waivers for Motor Carrier Safety Regulations.

In addition, Nebraska will no longer participate in federal pandemic unemployment programs effective June 19. The State has notified the US Department of Labor of its intent to withdraw from the following:

- Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC), which provides an additional \$300 weekly payment to all recipients of state or federal unemployment benefits.
- Pandemic Unemployment Assistance

(PUA), which provides benefits for those who would not usually qualify, such as the self-employed and gig workers.

- Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC), which provides for an extension of benefits once regular benefits have been exhausted
- Mixed Earner Unemployment Com-

pensation (MEUC), which provides an additional \$100 benefit to certain people with earnings from both self-employment and wages.

Wayne Senior Center announces changes

During a press conference on May 24, Governor Pete Ricketts announced that the state of Nebraska is discontinuing its Directed Health Measures. This was effective at midnight on May 24.

In addition, he rescinded several executive orders that he had issued during the coronavirus pandemic. These changes will go into effect June 1, 2021.

Beginning on Tuesday, June 1 the Wayne Senior Center can go back to pre-COVID-19 standards with all activities and congregate meal services being offered as was the case prior to the Center's closing in March of 2020.

According to Senior Center Director Di-

ane Bertrand, "we will start with the activities of pool and quilting on Tuesday, June 1. Starting on Monday, June 7, we will begin with cards and other table games. This will give us a week to work through any problems with the re-starting of in-house meal service, along with offering both drive-through and Meals on Wheels."

Meal times are as follows: Meals on Wheels will go out with volunteers at 11 a.m.; Drive-through will be between 11:15 and 11:30 a.m. on the west side of the building and in-house congregate meals will be served at 11:45 a.m.

Additional information has been provided to the Wayne Herald in regard to Memorial Day observances since the original story was published in the May 20 edition of the paper.

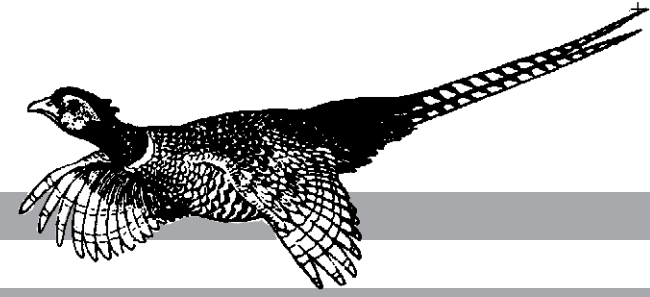

The Wayne County Museum will once again open its doors for Sunday afternoon tours beginning May 30, from 2 to 4 p.m. and continuing through the Sunday of Labor Day weekend, Sept. 5. The Museum will be closed on the 4th of July. It will be open from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., the Saturday of Chicken Show, July 10.

Wayne County Museum located at 702 Lincoln Street has been a focal point for viewing Wayne County and City memorabilia since 1976, when the Ley family donated the house and property to the Wayne County Historical Society.

The house was built in 1900 and purchased by Rollie Ley in 1912. It is currently furnished to display a home around the turn of the last century. The beautiful parquet floors and woodwork are a highlight of the first floor which includes a front parlor, sitting and dining room, and kitchen. The second floor showcases the master bedroom, nursery, lady's boudoir, office, back sleeping room, and military display area.

Along with period furniture, guests will see dishes, household items, musical instruments, books, toys, office equipment, children's clothing, bridal dresses, jewelry, hats and purses as well as farm implements and tools, military uniforms and antique guns. The

museum's newest display includes medical equipment, an examination table and wheel chair. Several picture scrapbooks of businesses, churches, people, community events, and houses from the early years of the community have been

added to the collection.

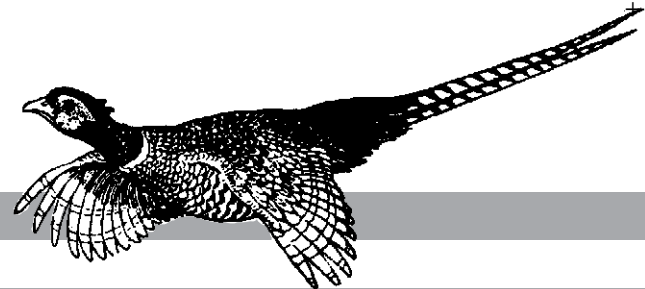
During the month of June, there will be no specified snack time in the afternoon but coffee and water will be available throughout the day.

Evans comes back home, takes second at state

OMAHA — It's your last race of your senior year in high school — why not go out running your best?

That was Layne Evans' mentality as he came out of the blocks for the finals of the Class B 300-meter hurdles Saturday at the Nebraska State Track and Field Championships, and he came through with his best-ever time, hitting the finish in 40.17 seconds.

Evans already had broken a 40-year old school record earlier in the year with his best time of 40.71 seconds, but decided he needed to do one just a little bit better to close out his high school career.

"It was the state meet, final race of my senior, I can't finish better than with a PR," the exhausted Evans said after the race.

Evans was running stride-for-stride with Boone Central's Ryan Kramer, and even after stutter-stepping before a hurdle on the curve, was still within striking distance until the end.

"I messed up coming around the curve, or else my time could have been down a little more," Evans said. "I just had to have that next-hurdle mentality and I knew I was still in the race. I just had to keep going and do the best that I could."

Evans had a hand in all of Wayne's nine team points at the state meet, running the anchor leg of the 1,600-meter relay team with Alex Phelps, Sedjro Agoumba and Reece Jaqua that came home with an eighth-place medal.

Evans returned to Wayne for his senior year after moving to Wilber-Clatonia a year ago, and he was happy to have finished his career in a Blue Devil uniform.

"It feels good and I'm glad I got to do it at Wayne," he said. "It was good to come back to my home town and get a silver medal for them."

Jesus Zavala ran in both distance events and improved his seeding in both races. In the 3,200, he was seeded at the bottom of the 24-runner field but came home in 18th place. In the 1,600, he was seeded 23rd and finished 20th.

Wayne's girls did not score in this year's meet. Andi Belt recorded a personal best in the triple jump at 34 feet, 1 3/4 inches, but did not qualify for the finals. The 3,200-meter relay team of Kiara Krusemark, Laura Hasemann, Kierah Haase and Faith Powicki finished 16th with a time of 10:34.56.

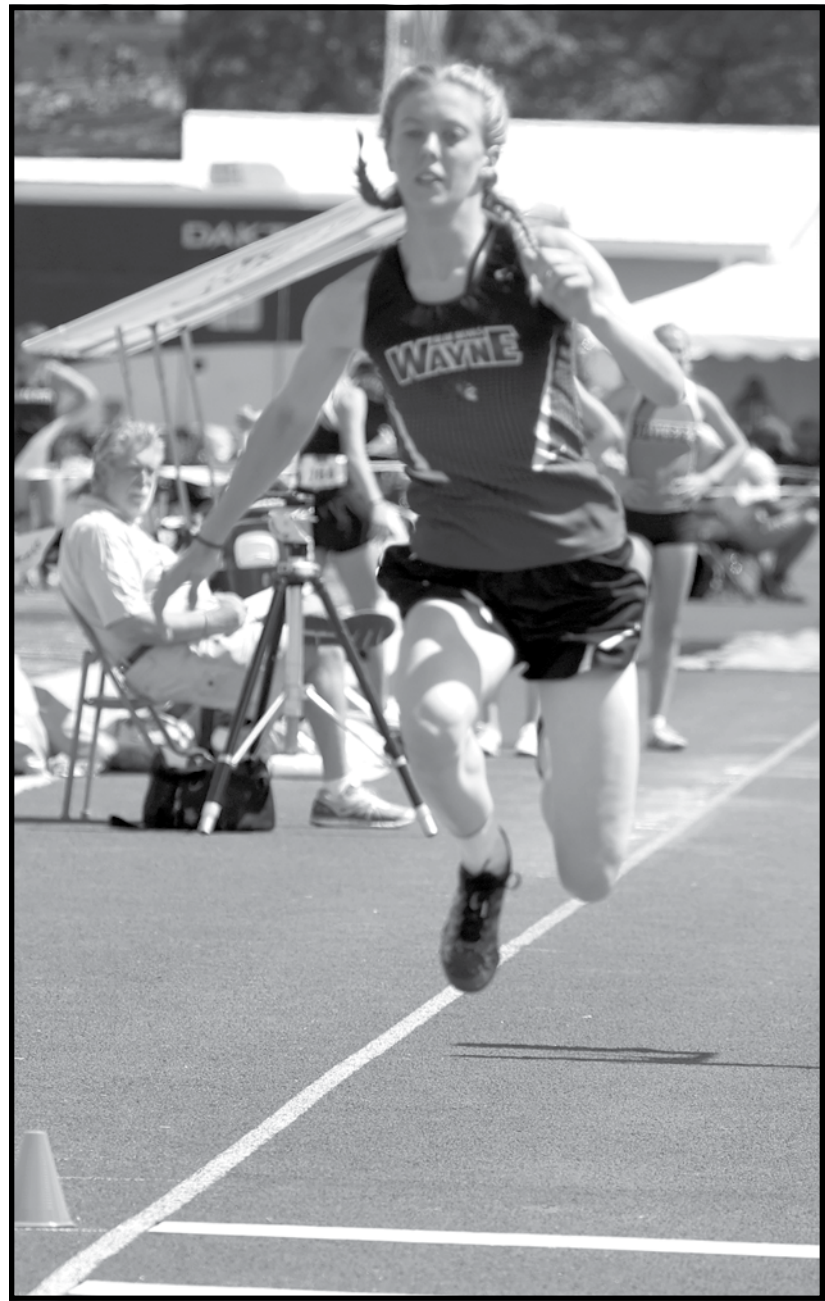

Three Wildcat throwers earn trip to Div. II Nationals

Mckenzie Scheil, Jadin Wagner and Cade Kalkowski were announced Tuesday evening as qualifiers for the NCAA Div. II Outdoor Track and Field Championships, scheduled for May 27-29 in Allendale, Mich.

Scheil is a national qualifier in the hammer throw for the second time in her Wildcat career after earning All-American honors with a seventh-place finish in 2019. She won the hammer throw at last weekend's NSIC Championships with a mark of 195 feet, 6 1/2 inches and enters the NCAA national championships ranked third in Div. II with a season-best throw of 198-1 at the Sioux City Relays April 16. Scheil will compete in the hammer

throw on Thursday at 5:10 p.m.

Scheil is also a national qualifier in the shot put and will compete on Saturday at 5 p.m. She is ranked 15th in NCAA Div. II with a top mark of 48-11 at last weekend's NSIC Championships. It's the first time Scheil has qualified for outdoor nationals in the shot put.

Wagner is a national qualifier in the hammer throw for the first time as a Wildcat. She ranks 13th in NCAA Div. II with a season-best throw of 186-4 at the WSC Challenge May 1 and will compete at nationals on Thursday at 5:10 p.m. Wagner is now a three-time NCAA national qualifier after making the 2018 outdoor nationals as a freshman in the shot put and the 2019

indoor nationals in the shot put as a sophomore.

Kalkowski is a national qualifier in the hammer throw. It's the third time that Kalkowski has qualified for the NCAA Outdoor Championships in the hammer throw.

Last weekend, Kalkowski claimed

a third straight NSIC championship in the event with a top mark of 206-10. Kalkowski currently ranks eighth in NCAA Div. II this season with a season-best throw of 215-0 at the Sioux City Relays April 16. He will compete on Thursday at 2 p.m.

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Area schools bring home medals from state

OMAHA — Deagan Puppe reached for the finish line, then looked up toward the scoreboard at the north end of Burke Stadium to await the result.

"I was like, 'Please, let it be me,'" he said as the seconds passed before the final results of the photo-finish flashed on the big screen.

Finally, it came — he won the Class C 110-meter hurdles title by just two-hundredths of a second.

"When I saw it, I had a really big smile on my face," the LCC junior said after winning the area's only state title at the Nebraska State Track and Field Championships at Burke Stadium.

"It's something I've dreamed about since I started running hurdles in seventh grade," he told reporters after receiving his gold medal. "I really wanted to get that done today, and I did."

It wasn't easy for him, even after posting his personal best time of 15.05 seconds in Friday's preliminaries.

"That second race was hard," he said. "I hit the first and second hurdles and also hit the last two,

so it really came down to that last 10-meter sprint. I really had to dig for it."

Puppe missed out on a second finals spot after failing to qualify in the 300-meter hurdles. Puppe's brother, Dan, ran in the 110-meter hurdles but did not qualify for the finals.

LCC had two girls competing in field events. Berneice McCorkindale (shot put) and Erica Wolfgram (high jump) failed to make it into the top eight in their respective events.

Both Wakefield teams had a strong showing in the Class C team race. The boys, buoyed by impressive efforts in two relays, finished 10th overall while Jordan Metzler and Anna Lundahl scored enough to put the Trojan girls in 13th place at the end of the meet.

Sixteen of the Trojans' 20 points came as a result of runner-up finishes in the 400 and 1,600-meter relays.

The foursome of Logan Bokemper, Blake Brown, Sam Nuno and Justin Erb probably had the most impressive outcome in the 400-meter relay. They ran out of Lane 7 in the slow heat and finished just a hair behind Norfolk Catholic, who

claimed the state title with a time of 44.16 seconds to Wakefield's 44.30.

In the final event of the day, the 1,600-meter group of Bokemper, Brown, Nuno and Gabe Lamprecht came out of Lane 7 in the fast heat and finished in 3:25.49, trailing only Wilber-Clatonia's mark of 3:25.30 in a race that came down to Brown's anchor leg, where he stayed toe-to-toe with Wilber-Clatonia's final runner until the final 20 meters.

"That last 100 meters, all I could think about was finishing and I just went hard and gave it my all," he said. "It wasn't enough, but I was proud of our effort."

All four runners in the mile relay felt good about the team's finish.

"I felt like I ran a good leg and got the baton to Logan in a good time," said Erb, the runner for the opening leg of the race.

"I felt pretty strong about (the team's chances)," added Bokemper. I just wanted to keep a close pace with the other guys."

"I thought if I could run a strong leg and get it to Blake in second place, we'd have a good chance to win," Lamprecht said.

The Trojan boys also scored on the track in the 100 and 400. Bokemper

brought home an eighth-place medal in the 100 in 11.22 seconds, while Erb was sixth in the 400 with a time of 50.94 seconds.

In girls action, freshman Jordan Metzler had a great debut with two medals in four events. She won her heat in the 400-meter dash on Friday and came back Saturday for a runner-up effort in 58.59 seconds, then ended the day with a fourth-place mark of 46.36 seconds in the 300-meter hurdles, ending both events with personal bests.

"It was super-fun coming down as a freshman," she said. "It's definitely a culture shock because everyone here is going to be good so you have to come down and just compete against yourself and be the best runner you can be."

Metzler said she was nervous before running her winning heat in the 400, but a little pre-race prayer relaxed her and helped her run well enough to qualify for the finals.

"There were a lot of nerves, but I just calmed myself down and just told myself that I was going to compete for God and whatever happens, just give Him the glory and He'll be happy with it," she said.

Metzler was joined on the medal stand by Anna Lundahl, who came through with a solid performance in the discus with a best toss of 125 feet, 7 inches, good for third place overall.

Also competing for Wakefield were Cade Johnson (1,600, triple jump), Brown (100, 200), Erb (200) and Lamprecht (long jump).

The Tri County Northeast girls track team had a good showing in the Class C team race, tying for 20th with 10 points on the strength of medal-winning efforts by Jordyn Carr, Alli Jackson and the 1,600-meter relay of Carr, Jackson, Brianna Bousquet and Brynn Schock.

Carr was in contention for the long jump title on Saturday, settling for a third-place finish with her best mark of 16 feet, 11 1/2 inches. She just missed out on a spot in the 100-meter finals, missing the final eight by three-hundredths of a second.

Northern State recruit Alli Jackson ran well in the 400-meter dash. She had a personal-best mark of 59.66 seconds in the preliminaries to qualify for the finals, then finished the final in seventh with a time of 1:01.29. She also just missed out on a second individual medal, missing the top eight in the 800 by four-tenths of a second.

Carr and Jackson teamed up with Bousquet and Schock for a seventh-place finish in the 1,600-meter relay, coming home with a season-best time of 4:12.46.

"The girls competed at a high level this weekend. We were not disappointed with any of their efforts, and they gave it their all," coach Dave Uldrich said.

Rhyanne Mackling just missed out on a medal in the girls 3,200-meter run, finishing 10th.

Logelin earns All-NSIC honors

Wayne State College junior outfielder Alex Logelin was named to the 2021 NSIC All-Conference Baseball Team, receiving Second Team honors for the second time in three seasons.

Logelin led Wayne State in numerous offensive categories by posting a .381 batting average with four home runs and 21 RBI despite missing seven games due to COVID-19 testing protocols this season. He ranked seventh in the NSIC this season in batting average, eighth in on-base percentage (.465) and tied for third in the league with a team-high 13 doubles.

Logelin had 10 multi-hit games this season and had the longest hitting streak (eight games) and the longest reached base safely streak (11 games) for the Wildcats this season. He ranked second on the team in hits (37), second in stolen bases (11-14) and tied for second in

RBI (21).

Top games for Logelin this season include going 4-for-4 with two homers, a double and three RBI in a 8-2 win over Northern State and 3-for-6 with a homer, double and three RBI in a 22-10 win at Newman.

In a doubleheader against Minot State, Logelin was 6-for-9 with a homer, two doubles and seven RBI that included a 4-for-5 game in a 15-

14 loss.

Logelin was the lone Wildcat selected to the All-NSIC teams.

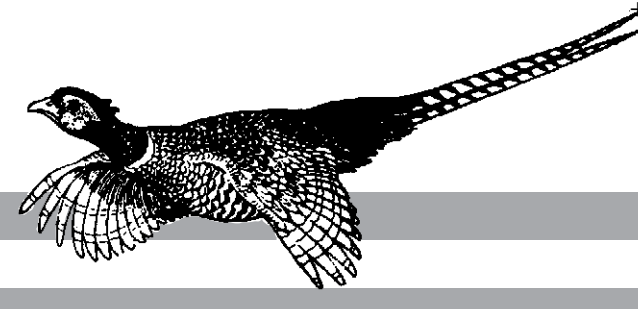

Lots of 'What Ifs' in Nebraska's tax future

Back in 1966, the last time Nebraska voters took the state's tax system in their own hands, I was an eager college sophomore journalism major.

I was astonished at how voters went to the polls and repealed the state property tax system, essentially leaving state government with no real means of support while reserving property taxes for local government. Thankfully they elected Wausa banker Norbert Tiemann as the first governor to serve a four-year term.

Little did we know how pivotal and self-destructive his one term would be, but while it cost him his political career, it created a tax system that has served Nebraska well for more than 50 years. Plans to disassemble that tax system now are troubling.

Case in point, Sen. Steve Erdman's LR11CA - the "consumption tax." It failed to advance from first-round consideration on a 23-19-5 vote. Erdman hinted that it could reappear as a voter-driven initiative through a petition for the 2022 ballot. Let the red flags wave. As introduced by the senator from Bayard who said it was revolutionary, the measure would create a new section in the Nebraska Constitution prohibiting all political subdivisions from imposing a tax on personal income, corporate income, personal and real property, inheritance tax, and sales tax. Bottom line, not unlike 1966, the state's tax system would be wiped out.

Erdman's plan - introduced decades ago as the "transaction tax" - would require the Legislature to enact a consumption tax. It would apply to the purchases of services and new goods, except for fuel. The consumption tax would begin no later than January 1, 2024. The transaction tax failed to advance from committee all those years ago. The consumption tax should have seen the same fate, but this year's version of the Revenue Committee obviously wanted to test the waters. That eager young reporter is now a seasoned observer of the

Legislature nearing end of session

In the past 48 hours we have passed many bills this week for the State of Nebraska, but several that are monumental. LB 387, (Brewer, at the request of the Governor) the un-taxing of military retired pay with a vote of 47-0. LB 64B (Lindstrom) which will phase out the taxing of Social Security over the next 10 years with a vote of 41-0. LB 388e (Friesen, also at the request of the Governor) Adopt Nebraska Broadband Bridge Act.

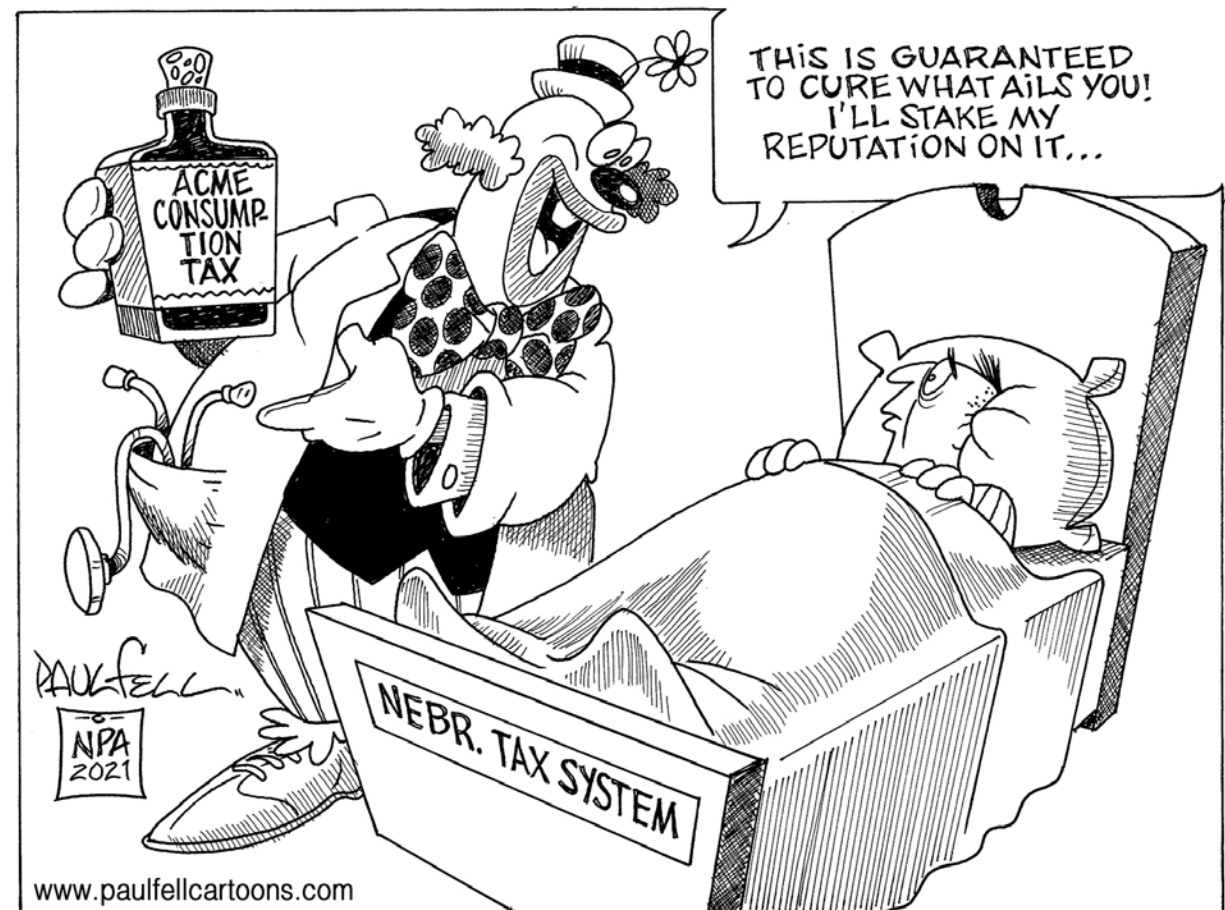
BILLS ON THE WAY TO THE GOVERNOR'S DESK
There are many bills that have advanced to Final Reading this week, but I have picked out a few that I believe are especially relevant to District 17: LB 432A (Revenue Committee) Adopt the Firefighter Cancer Benefits Act, provide a tax credit for parents of stillborn children and an income tax exemption, change the corporate income tax rate, adopt the Nebraska Educational Savings Plan Trust.

LB 387 (Brewer, at the request of the Governor) Eliminating taxation of military retirement benefits. LB 2 (Briese) Change the valuation of agricultural land and horticultural land for certain school district taxes.

LB 595 (Albrecht) Provide and change sales and use tax exemptions for certain products and agricultural machinery and equipment, exclude certain income from gross receipts, and change funding for and require reports regarding the Game and Parks Commission Capital Maintenance Fund.

LB 561 (Briese) Rename and change powers and duties of the State Racing Commission and provide regulation and enforcement regarding sports wagering and other gambling activities at licensed racetrack enclosures.

LB 572 (Halloran) Change provisions of the Livestock Brand Act.



Legislature and I'm here to suggest what could possibly go wrong with a single source of revenue. Nebraska's current tax system, which I have said numerous times needs an overhaul, works because it is a three-legged stool. Sales tax, personal and corporate income tax and miscellaneous taxes. What happens if you cut one of the legs shorter than the others? You get a wobbly stool. What happens if you cut all three legs off? You no longer have a stool.

Consider how a 10 percent consumption tax would work. Given that it operates on services and the purchase of new goods, think about buying used cars and equipment. What about food? Think about crossing the border into surrounding states for those services and purchases. The sponsor of the measure and the 17 proponents who spoke at the Revenue Committee hearing said the new tax would have people flocking to Nebraska to live and work.

If that's the case, why hasn't

it been adopted in other states? Perhaps because they have seen the value of a multi-level tax system where the revenue streams balance each other over time. Perhaps they have seen the consequences.

Nebraskans want property tax relief. They also want the amenities that make life comfortable. They want good schools, safe streets, opportunity. That's an awful lot to come from one pot.

Tiemann, a Republican, had to be creative. It didn't take long for him to realize that doing the right thing would cost him his political career. But he persevered. He knew that a sales tax only, despite its essentially regressive nature, not only had the political appeal of avoiding a state income tax, but it also was attractive to conservative elements because it would sharply limit the state's revenue stream and thereby apply reins to state government. He also knew it would be unfair to lower-income people.

Creation of a sales and income tax system provided a substantial

and steady revenue stream that was reasonably fair in terms of balance and impact. The new tax system "had the effect of removing glaring inequities and redistributing the tax burden among all areas and classes of the state," said historian Frederick Luebke.

The state income tax was the sticking point because it represented a huge change for Nebraska, and it was politically toxic. Most of the conservative Republican base in Nebraska, along with some influential corporate voices, strenuously argued for a sales tax only.

Tiemann took the risk and paid the price. His political career lasted one term. Years later he admitted he knew it would cost him his reelection, but added that he wouldn't do anything differently.

The transaction/consumption tax is not the answer. We can do better.

This bill carried with it too many unanswered questions for me to give it a green vote. LB. 376 would only temporarily address the current wait list. The general fund impact - estimated at \$3.8 million in fiscal year 2021-22. Senator Arch has introduced a Legislative Resolution to study the specific needs of the developmentally disabled in Nebraska and most effective ways to help these children and their families for the long term.

I will certainly be signing to the LR and look forward to the discussion. I anticipate that a similar bill will be brought back next year.

USDA EXPANSION FOR RURAL BUSINESSES

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) recently announced that it has implemented a series of actions to make it easier for very small rural businesses to get access to capital. The Department published a final rule outlining changes to the Rural Microentrepreneur Assistance Program (RMAP).

The program provides loans and grants to microenterprise development organizations to help them establish revolving loan programs to assist microenterprises, businesses with 10 or fewer full-time employees.

It also provides annual funding to development organizations to conduct training and provide technical assistance to micro-loan borrowers. Program applications are accepted on a continuous basis at any local Rural Development office.

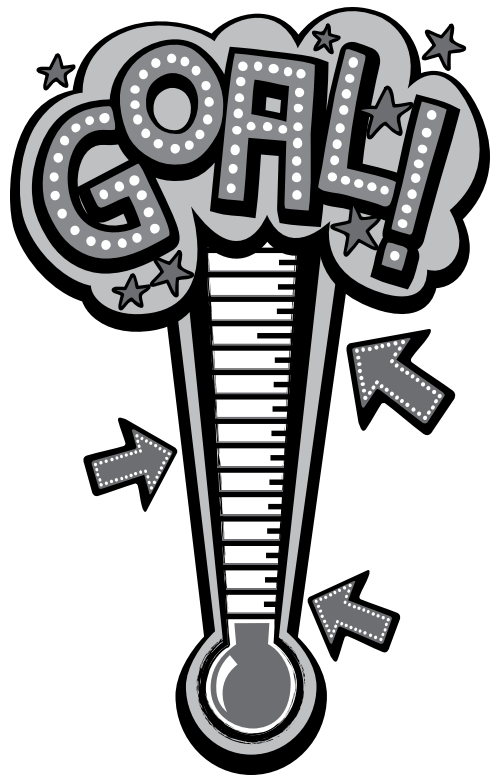
Patron of the Year

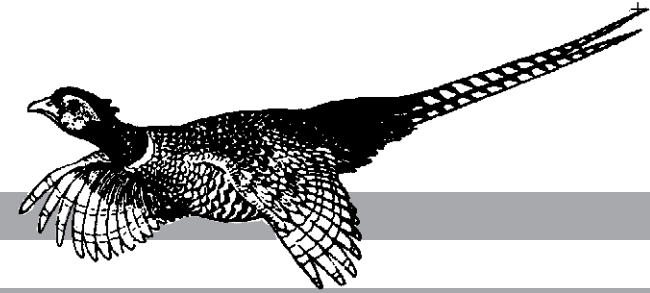

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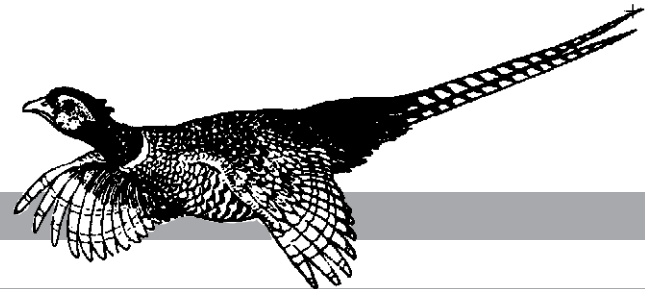

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Chemigation permits due June 1

Farmers planning to chemigate during the 2021 growing season must renew chemigation permits by June 1 to meet state deadline requirements, according to Josh Schnitzler, Water Resources Coordinator for the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD).
 Chemigation is the application of any chemical, fertilizer or pesticide through an irrigation system. To legally chemigate in Nebraska, an operator must be certified to apply chemicals and obtain a chemigation permit from their local NRD.
 "Farmers holding chemigation permits, even if they are uncertain whether they will chemigate later this year, should consider renewing their permits by June 1," Schnitzler said. Schnitzler is encouraging area producers to reapply by the state-required deadline to avoid the

increased cost and possible delays of an inspection.
 An irrigation system that has not been renewed prior to the June 1 deadline cannot apply chemicals through the system until a new permit is obtained. Chemigation renewal permits cost \$20. New chemigation permits cost \$50, and the applicant cannot use the system until it passes a mandatory inspection. All permits must be submitted to the LENRD office at 1508 Square Turn Boulevard in Norfolk.
 By renewing a permit by June 1, a producer may proceed with chemigation. An inspection does not have to be performed prior to chemigation for a renewal application, Schnitzler said. However, a random chemigation inspection may be necessary later in the season as part of the LENRD's routine

summer inspections as required by state law.
 Applicants must have the signature of a certified applicator on their application form. Schnitzler stated, "In order to be certified, a person must complete a chemigation safety course and pass an exam once every four years."
 If chemigating is necessary, on short notice, emergency permits can be obtained at a cost of \$250. Irrigation systems meeting chemigation law standards will then be allowed to operate within 72 hours.
 Approximately 1,963 chemigation permits were approved by the LENRD in 2020. For more information on renewing or obtaining chemigation permits, call the LENRD office in Norfolk at 402-371-7313.

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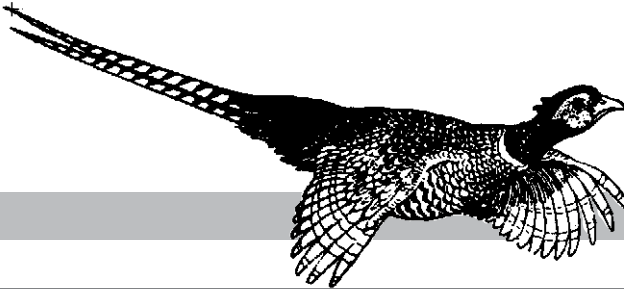
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Remembering confirmation services from the past

Sometimes, when I run out of things to read, I go to my book cases and look for something to reread. That's how I ended up with Growing Up Lutheran again. And, how I ended up chuckling all over again.

This book was the precursor to the enjoyable Church Basement Ladies musicals we all have laughed at in the past. Because you did not have to be Lutheran to remember how all non-worship church functions took place in the basement: Mother-Daughter banquet, Sunday School (and sometimes, the kitchen was used for one of these classes), Ladies Aid, Voter's meetings (all men, still in some Lutheran congregations), and funeral lunches, or "Dead Spread" as the ladies in the book calls them.

Are you ready for first cutting of alfalfa?

Working on getting corn and beans planted? Don't look now, but alfalfa harvest is approaching fast.

With a late start this spring, we've been busy planting and turning animals out to grass. It isn't time to relax just yet because your alfalfa may soon be ready to cut.

As we look at alfalfa conditions across the state, first cutting of alfalfa should be happening soon. Folks needing high quality alfalfa for dairy cows or for a cash crop may be looking for the next available good weather period and planning their harvest.

Being aggressive on the first cutting is critical if high forage quality is needed. Alfalfa's forage quality changes faster during the first spring growth than at any other time of the year. Plants are maturing and temperatures are increasing; both causing quality to decline. So don't delay your first cutting if high quality is needed.

But what about alfalfa for beef cows? That might be a little different story, especially if you need to rebuild hay supplies. Normally we get our highest total yield by waiting until alfalfa is near full bloom. Not only is yield highest, this also uses available soil moisture most efficiently for alfalfa growth. Despite some recent rain, some dryland fields may need a bit more rain for good summer and fall harvests since most deep subsoil moisture was depleted last year. Even if we end up with a dry summer, with a good first cut you will at least have some hay of decent enough quality to feed your beef cows next winter.



potential hay quality.

Scouting can be completed either using a sweep net or collecting random samples. For hand sampling, it is recommended to gather 10 alfalfa stems cut at ground level from at least five sample locations within each alfalfa field. Next, shake the larvae off the collected stems into a deep-sided bucket. Count the larvae in the bucket and calculate average larvae per stem. Weevil larva are small (1/16 to 3/8 inch long) pale yellow to dark green insects that curl into a C-shape when disturbed.

Next calculate your economic thresholds for determining if an insecticide application or early alfalfa cutting harvest might be beneficial. Economic threshold charts are available at <https://cropwatch.unl.edu>.

Final treatment decisions are based on average weevil larvae per stem counts; plant growth stage; treatment costs and projected for-

age value. For example, insecticide treatment and/or early cutting may be recommended if you count more than 2 weevil per stem at the early bud stage of developing alfalfa valued at \$100 per ton.

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USDA Announces Cooperative Agreements for Community Compost and Food Waste Reduction

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced the availability of up to \$2 million for local governments to host Community Compost and Food Waste Reduction (CCFWR) pilot projects for fiscal year 2021. The cooperative agreements support projects that develop and test strategies for planning and implementing municipal compost plans and food waste reduction plans, and they are part of USDA's broader efforts to support urban agriculture.

USDA's Office of Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production (Office) will accept applications on Grants.gov until 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time on July 16, 2021. Projects should span two years with a start date of Sept. 25, 2021, and completion date of Sept. 25, 2023.

"Finding ways to turn food waste into nutrient rich compost is a win-win for farmers, communities and the environment," said Tim Divis, Acting Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director in Nebraska.

Cooperative agreements support projects led by local governments that:
•Generate compost.
•Increase access to compost for agricul-

tural producers.
•Reduce reliance on and limit the use of fertilizer.
•Improve soil quality.
•Encourage waste management and permaculture business development.

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will provide assistance for conservation related activities.

Priority will be given to projects that anticipate or demonstrate economic benefits, incorporate plans to make compost easily accessible to farmers, including community gardeners, integrate other food waste strategies, including food recovery efforts and collaborate with multiple partners.

This is the second year the Office of Urban Agriculture and Innovation Production offered this grant opportunity.
