## Wayne County Fair gets underway next week

The Wayne County Fair officially returns Thursday, July 22 and ends Sunday, July 25. It is being held at the Fairgrounds at 301 Pheasant Run.

Throughout the day on Thursday and Friday, there will be multiple 4-H and FFA livestock sites going on. The presentation of colors and opening ceremonies will start at 7 p.m. The main event of the ultimate bullriding tour begins at 7:30 p.m. with live entertainment in the Beer Garden by Dave Merkel following at 9 p.m.

On Friday, the presentation of colors will start at 6 p.m. and the 58th annual barbeque will immediately follow. The Lucas Oil PPL/Nebraska Bush Pullers Tractor Pull is at 6:30 p.m. at the Grandstand. The night ends with live entertainment from Jetley Park in the Beer Garden at 9 p.m.

There will be a couple of 4-H shows along with the awards presentations during the day on Saturday. Musical entertainment will begin at 7 p.m. and will have Dylan Bloom, Larry Fleet and finally Josh Turner. Dylan Bloom will also be in the Beer Garden at 10:30 p.m. for live enter-

tainment.

Blue-collar, Tennessee-native Larry Fleet grew up with a love of music sparked by an eclectic mix of influences spanning from Merle Haggard to Marvin Gaye. To make ends meet, Fleet spent tireless hours of working construction jobs - never losing his dream of making music. A chance encounter with Jake Owen in 2017 led to a collaborative friendship and an opening slot on the road with Owen.

The hard-working family man (and father of one-year-old son, Waylon) is now turning heads with his debut single "Where I Find God" - a powerful ode to finding peace in the higher power's presence, garnering Fleet praise for his "Emotive Vocals" (Billboard). The song's official music video continues to resonate with fans, amassing 6 Million+ Youtube Views.

MCA Nashville recording artist Josh Turner, while a multi-platinum-selling star himself, is a country music fan first and foremost.

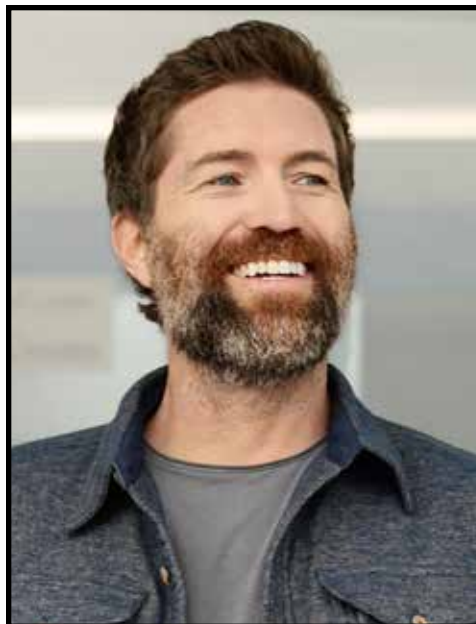
He's even concocted his own version of Mount Rushmore, conceived solely of

country music legends. Turner's "Mount Rushmore of Country Music" boasts five faces rather than four - Randy Travis, John Anderson, Johnny Cash, Vern Gosdin, and Hank Williams.

"I've always said that any song you hear coming from my voice, you're going to hear bits and pieces of those five guys," he says. "They taught me how to be Josh Turner."

The dozen songs on Country State of Mind, including songs from those five legends among others, span more than half a century of classic country music, encompassing both well-known standards and deep-catalog cuts. The album shows a singer in dialogue with the songs and the artists that shaped his vision. It's a conversation - relayed in the distinctive, resonant baritone that brought Turner #1 hits and five gold and platinum albums - between the past and present of country music. And on half the tracks, Turner invites other voices - some heroes, some contemporaries - to join him in the conversation.

"I knew the artists I wanted to represent," explains Turner, "and I chose songs

## Board of Education discusses WAED membership

Among the items on the agenda when the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education met on Monday was membership in Wayne Area Economic Development (WAED).

WAED Executive Director Luke Virgil presented information on the history and work of WAED and discussed funding sources for the organization. These include membership fees, funding from the city of Wayne and programming offered by the organization. Funds are also generated by the Wayne Chicken Show, the annual banquet and Vendor Golf Tournament.

Virgil explained the benefits to the school as a member of the organization. These include getting the school's message

out to the community on social media and working on projects such as the job shadow event held in the past.

Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan, who serves on the WAED board, said one of the benefits is the ability to work with other members of that board.

Board member Lynn Junck said "the school is a service, not a business. It is not comparable to other businesses that are members."

During the action item portion of the meeting, the board voted to join WAED at the bronze level with a \$400 membership fee.

The annual hearing for several policies was held with no one from the public commenting on them.

These included policies on bullying, student fees, homeless students and parent

involvement.

Several policies received second reading approval during the meeting. These included items such as bulletin boards, anti-harassment, employee anti-discrimination, professional boundaries, standing committees (board president) and standing committees on negotiations.

Board members voted to not accept a change in the Early Learning Center Handbook which would have granted a 10 percent discount for families with two children in preschool at the same time.

Superintendent Lenihan updated the board on the current renovation project involving the restrooms at the high school. He said the project is going well and is on schedule.

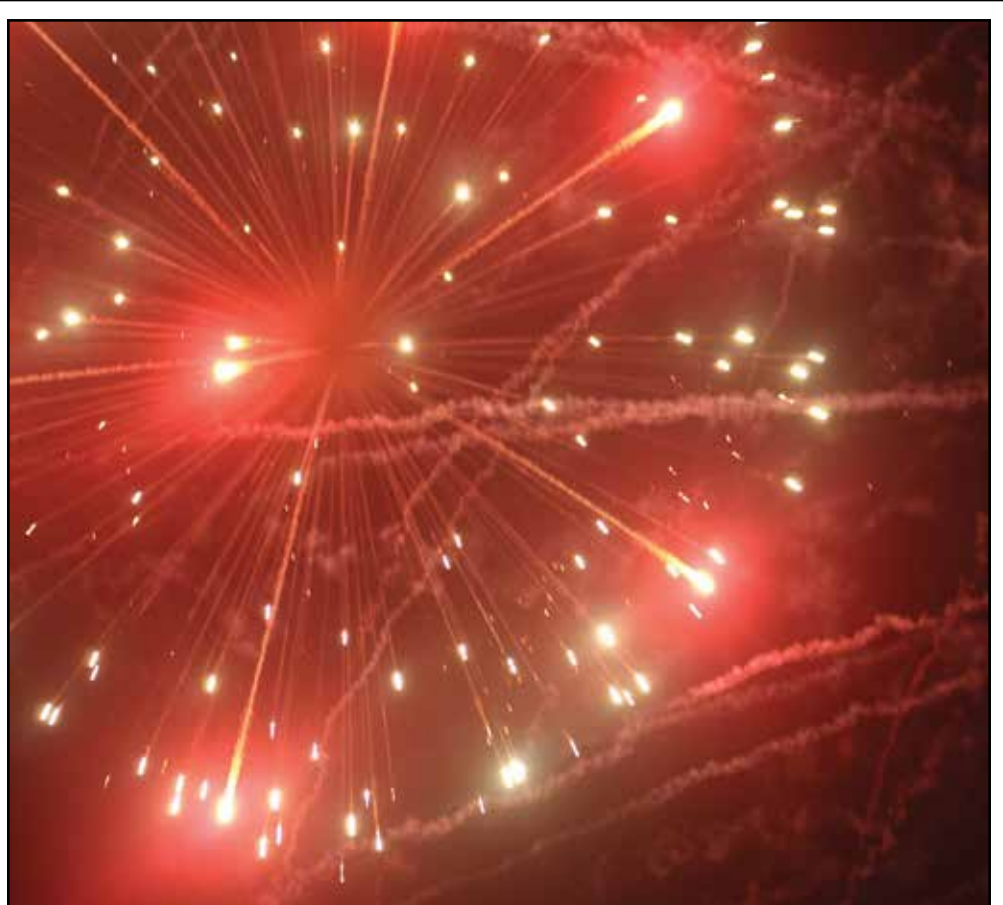

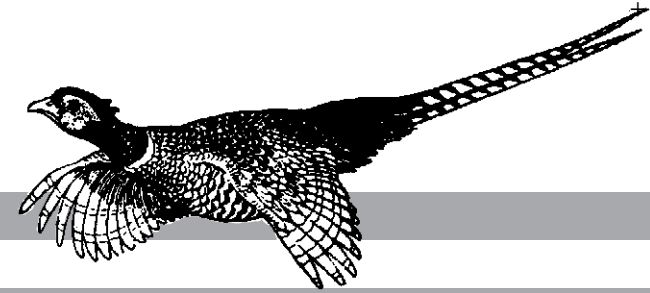

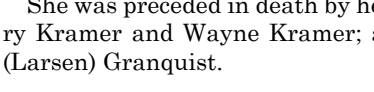

## Logan Miller, Brooklyn Kruse organize scholarship blood drive

Logan Miller and Brooklyn Kruse are two high school students who stand out - not just in the classroom or within their chosen sports, but in making a difference in their community.

On July 7 these two girls brought people together during busy summer months for their second Biannual Blood Drive in hopes of growing support for the local blood bank and earning money to put toward furthering their education.

Blood donation during summer and winter months is specifically

important because high schools and colleges, which account for over 20 percent of our area's blood supply, are usually on break. Logan and Brooklyn saw this statistic as an opportunity to get people involved during more difficult months and encourage people, especially high school peers, to remain vigilant in helping to keep the blood supply safe.

In recent weeks, the girls experienced the hard reality that blood centers across America are feeling as people have returned to normal

summer activities and are uninterested in blood donation, but this didn't stop them. They quickly took to the streets to inform Wayne community members, students, and various businessmen and women about the importance of blood donation.

This week, the girls exceeded their goal of 40 donors with 54 people stepping up to save lives that resulted in 51 units of blood donated. These units have the ability to save over 150 local lives. Eighteen of these people were introduced to blood donation for the very first time.

# Northeast Community College graduate aspires to be an ESL instructor and translator

Adriana Vargas-Reyna has a strong work ethic and has always strived to demonstrate to her siblings that hard work pays off in the end.

Vargas-Reyna, of Wayne, graduated from Wayne High School in May 2019 and obtained an associate of science degree two years later from Northeast Community College, making her the first member of her family to obtain a college degree. It was during her time at Northeast she worked to help support her family and serve as a role model to her younger sisters.

One area at Northeast that allowed Vargas-Reyna to thrive in her education and life's journey is TRIO, a federally-funded academic program that serves and assists income-eligible individuals, first-generation college students and those with disabilities to progress through the academic pipeline from middle school to post-baccalaureate programs. Prior to entering her freshman year, she participated

in TRIO's summer Bootcamp attending numerous events and later served as a leader for younger TRIO students.

"If it wasn't for the TRIO program, I wouldn't have made it," Vargas-Reyna said. "Although I had some rough patches along the way, TRIO helped me bounce back and get refocused on my goals."

Vargas-Reyna was named a Susan Thompson Buffett Scholar while attending Northeast and was diligent in maintaining her good grades and eligibility. Scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis to first-time freshmen entering college. As a first-generation college student, Vargas-Reyna had to learn how to navigate college on her own, and with the help of TRIO she succeeded.

TRIO Student Support Services Advisor Brandi Rossman praised Vargas-Reyna's determination and perseverance.

"Adriana always recognized the value of finishing her degree and

what that could mean for her family. Even during times when the workload and her responsibilities at home overwhelmed her, she stayed focused and worked very hard to finish," Rossman said. "She is defi-

nately a role model for not only her younger siblings, but for other new TRIO students just starting out. She met new friends and is now one of our success stories. I am extremely proud of her."

Vargas-Reyna is now preparing to attend Wayne State College to pursue a Bachelor of Arts degree in Secondary Education with a minor in Spanish. She has a desire to become an English as a Second Language instructor and also serve as a translator. In addition, she is employed by egg processor Michael Foods In Wakefield where she is in Quality Assurance, confirming that protocols are followed to ensure that eggs are of good quality.

For her efforts in pursuing her education and assisting others, Vargas-Reyna was named TRIO's Student of the Month at Northeast Community College during the final month of the 2020-21 academic year. The award recognizes outstanding students who excel both in and out of the classroom.

Each month, a participating TRIO student is selected for the award based upon their work in the program and in other activities on campus or in the community. Award recipients receive a plaque from the TRIO program and have their photo placed on the "TRIO Program Student of the Month" Achievement Recognition board.

The board, located in the TRIO office, features the theme True Leaders. TRIO staff members define true leaders as those who are first to strive and who give their all for the success of the team. True leaders are first to see the need, envision the plan, and empower the team for action.

"Adriana has been a joy to work with since the day she stepped on campus. She has gained so much confidence and direction in her life since she first joined TRIO, and the credit to this belongs to her," said Josh Becker, TRIO director. "Through her active and engaging participation in our First-Year Experience course and other TRIO events, activities, and workshops, all of the TRIO staff were lucky enough to get to know her well and greatly enjoyed her personality and presence. I am so proud of Adriana's accomplishments and growth, and wish her the best of luck in her future ambitions."

# Little Red Hen Theatre to present SHREK THE MUSICAL

The Little Red Hen Theatre has been busy bringing the magic, music and mayhem of SHREK, THE MUSICAL to the stage for the residents of northeast Nebraska.

The Tony-Award winning musical is a re-telling of the classic film, featuring all the characters that audiences love with an amazing score and magical storytelling that is sure

to please the entire family. The Little Red Hen Theatre's production features over 40 performers and will be presented for live audiences over four performances Thursday through Sunday, July 15 – 18.

Wayne State has received the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Behavioral Health Workforce Education and Training (BHWET) for Professionals grant for \$1,067,689 for a four-year period to strengthen the capacity and bonds between the College and the experiential training sites in Northeast Nebraska.

More than \$660,000 of the funds has been earmarked for scholarships for students in Wayne State's graduate program in clinical mental health.

The project, titled Addressing Rural Behavioral Health Needs Through Clinical Placements and Supervision, aims to increase access to behavioral health care for rural and other high-demand populations, including the 40 counties without a mental health provider. Graduates of Wayne State's clinical

mental health counseling program will be encouraged to practice in underserved communities and serve as supervisors at experiential training sites for future clinical mental health counseling students.

"Just speaking about how important this is at the institutional level, this grant marks a change in the aggressiveness of Wayne State to seek opportunities to help us better serve our region," said Dr. Nicholas Shudak, Dean of the School of Education and Behavioral Science at Wayne State. "I am thankful and grateful for the team that helped me put this together, and especially, for our regional partners. I am hopeful this grant has a powerful and sustaining impact on behavioral health for years to come."

Wayne State will initially partner with eight experiential training sites in the three-county target

market of Holt, Madison, and Platte counties. Each site has the capacity to train at least one WSC clinical mental health counseling student, and four sites can train up to two counseling students at a time.

"The HRSA grant allows WSC to be a leader in rural investment," said Dr. Alison Boughn, department chair and assistant professor in the School of Education and Behavioral Science. "We recognize the difficulties our neighboring communities are facing in their efforts to access and maintain quality clinical mental health providers. With the implementation of the HRSA grant, we can start the conversations for adequate wages for our clinical providers to remain in rural communities as they provide accessible mental health care. This also ensures WSC can develop a stable model of support and consultation for our local providers to expand their network of care across our underserved region."

The key goals of the project for Wayne State:

- Prepare 60 BHWET-funded clinical mental health counseling students to practice in rural Northeast Nebraska upon graduation.

- Recruit, retain, and graduate a diverse cadre of trainees reflective of the populations to be served.

- Increase the number of Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP)-qualified clinical training supervisors by 40.

- Improve interdisciplinary care knowledge and skills for students, faculty, and experiential training site supervisors.

- Improve telehealth skills for students, faculty, and experiential training site supervisors.

- Provide funding for \$10,000 stipends to 66 clinical mental health counseling graduate students in their final experiential training.

In other board action, first reading approval was given to the 2021-2022 Classified Staff Handbook.

Dr. Lenihan told the board that he would like to allow benefit-eligible staff the ability to accumulate sick days up to a maximum of 25 days.

"We don't offer health insurance to these employees and I feel that this would be a gesture that would show that we appreciate what they do."

Board members agreed to this change in the handbook.

Dr. Lenihan was appointed treasurer for the district. The search is underway for a full-time Business

Manager who would have this responsibility and the action taken at Monday's meeting will allow Dr. Lenihan to serve in this capacity.

First reading approval was also given to Policy 6600, which involves Special Education for all students in the district from birth to 21 years of age. Updates to the document were presented and discussed.

A contract with First Student Bus for bus parking on school property was presented but no action taken. The item will be brought back to the board after some changes are made to allow the district the opportunity to terminate the agreement on a month-to-month basis.

The Wayne Community Schools

Safe Return to Learn Survey was discussed. There were 103 responses from the public and "most were positive" according to Dr. Lenihan.

The district's safe return to school plan was presented and while it is not mandatory, Dr. Lenihan said he felt "it is still good to have levels." (green, yellow and red).

The Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, Aug. 9 at 7 p.m. The time of the meeting as been moved back to accommodate the Open House planned for that evening. The meeting will be held at the junior-senior high school.

## The Sculpture Walk continues on

The sixth installment in the Sculpture Walk series is called "Sunnyside C" and was created by Sunghee Min.

Whether these forms are simple or complex, the blueprint of their cyclic process is clear and self-explanatory.

Her process embraces the way life in nature forms. Min builds her objects by multiplying elements systemically and most of them are self-supporting structures.

Metal, especially steel has been her primary medium. Min appreciates the inherent strength and permanence. She fabricates manufactured sheets, bars and other shaped products.

Working with metal can be challenging because the process relies heavily on proper tools and equipment and Min's process has been evolving around this aspect to find ways that are sustainable and enjoyable.

Her work is intended to draw attention. If Min's work were a person, she or he is someone who greets, waves and engages.

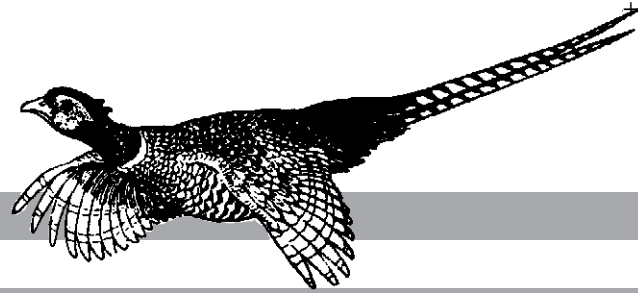

## Pierce puts the final nail in Wayne's coffin, Juniors end season at area tourney

The Wayne Juniors fought valiantly, but they ultimately fell just short of a trip to the Class B Area 5 Tournament final following a 1-0 loss to Pierce in an extra-inning elimination game Monday night in Albion. The Blue Devils end their season with a final record of 11-9.

Monday night's loss was Wayne's third to Pierce this season, with the last one coming by the same score exactly two weeks prior in the Ralph Bishop League Tournament semifinals.

James Dorcey and Devin Anderson accounted for the local Juniors' only hits in the game. Dorcey also started the game pitching for Wayne, sitting four batters and allowing four hits over eight innings where he threw 110 pitches. Unfortunately for Wyatt Heikes (14 pitches), he was on the mound when Pierce scored the winning run in the bottom of the ninth inning.

Post 43 stayed alive in the area tourney with a big 13-3 win over St. Paul on Sunday afternoon.

After scoring three runs in the bottom of the opening inning, the Wayne boys added eight in an emphatic second inning and followed that up with two more in the third to separate themselves from the opposing Post 119 Juniors.

Wayne batters contributing to the big second inning scoring fest in-

cluded Zack McManigal, Jase Dean, Aiden Liston, Dorcey and Anderson, as they all drove in runs. Ryan Karsky was the high scorer for the day, as he crossed home plate on three occasions throughout the course of the game.

Three different Wayne pitchers spent time on the mound in the contest, with Heikes getting the start and lasting two innings before Cooper Zara took over for a couple of innings to strike out two St. Paul batters. Dean came in at the end and sat three St. Paulers to close out the game.

With severe weather threatening the area on Saturday night, Wayne's showdown with top-seeded Albion became a two-parter, starting on Saturday and concluding Sunday morning. Consistent scoring on the part of Albion was the difference, as the host squad scored at least one run in all but the fourth and fifth innings to get past Wayne in an 8-2 decision.

McManigal (two RBIs), Dorcey, Heikes and Zara were responsible for the Blue Devils' four hits. Zara and Anderson accounted for the two runs.

Liston got the start on the hill, throwing 109 pitches over the course of five innings where he registered seven K's and walked five batters while surrendering six runs

(four earned) on five hits.

Wayne had the hot bats in the team's opening round victory over Plainview. After a somewhat slow start, the Devils posted six and five runs in the top of the fourth and fifth innings, respectively, to cruise into the next round with a 13-2 victory on Friday afternoon.

Wayne's Juniors got on the board in the first inning when Liston singled on a 3-2 count to score two runs. The locals tallied six more in the fourth inning with McManigal, Heikes, Dorcey and Dean all bringing in runs in the top of the side.

Post 43 outhit Plainview, 10-6, with Dorcey (double, single), Dean, Liston and Heikes leading the way with two hits apiece.

Dorcey toed the rubber for four and two-thirds innings where he allowed two runs off five hits while walking one. Heikes pitched the final third of an inning and struck out one of the two Plainview batters he faced to pick up the save.

Prior to the area tourney, Wayne played one final regular season game at home against Wisner-Pilger/Howells-Dodge last Wednesday,

July 7. After falling behind early, the Blue Devils took the lead late in the game to claim the "W," 10-4, in their final game at Hank Overin Field this year.

The game was tied at four with Wayne batting in the bottom of the sixth when an error (W-P/H-D had nine in the contest) scored one run. That seemed to open the floodgates, as the boys in blue put up six more runs in the decisive final inning.

Wayne's offensive firepower was led by McManigal, Heikes, Karsky, Liston, Dean and Anderson, who all drove in runs in the bottom of the sixth. Dorcey and Anderson each managed two hits in the matchup - both recorded a double and a single - to lead their team.

Heikes started the game pitching for Wayne. He surrendered four runs on four hits over two innings where he struck out three and walked one batter. Anderson secured the win for the home club with one K, one walk and no hits or runs allowed in his one inning of hurling the baseball. Liston also threw three innings of relief out of the bullpen.

# Tomato viruses difficult to control

As difficult as blights are to manage in tomatoes, viral diseases are far worse. This is because there are no effective products to stop their spread.

Viral diseases have a range of symptoms, each specific to the type of virus—ringspots on leaves and fruit, yellowing curled leaves, purplish leaf veins, and bright yellow irregular leaf blotches. All viruses reduce plant vigor and tomato production.

Viral diseases that affect foliage and fruit include alfalfa mosaic and tomato spotted wilt. Infection of alfalfa mosaic results in patchy brown lesions and splitting of tomatoes. With tomato spotted wilt, ringspots appear on fruit and the flavor will be off-tasting.

For instance, the designation "TMV" after the tomato variety's name indicates it is resistant to tobacco mosaic virus. Since some virus transmission is from contact with infected plants, be sure to clean up last year's tomato debris before planting and rotate crops to decrease disease carryover. Reflective mylar or aluminum foil placed beneath plants will repel insects, at least until plants get so large that they shade the reflective benefits of the mylar/aluminum foil.

To make matters even more challenging, virus infection is most often the work of sap sucking insects, such as aphids, thrips, and leafhoppers, that vector diseases. Insecticides to stop these insects provide limited results, often after insect feeding has already enabled virus spread to plants.

Some viral diseases, like curly top and tobacco mosaic, primarily affect tomato foliage. With less leaves to photosynthesize, however, reduced yields should be expected. An infection of curly top results in thickened and twisted yellow leaves while tobacco mosaic produces yellow patterned leaves on stunted plants.

Rogue out tomato plants that are afflicted with viruses. Infected plants are a source of inoculum that can be spread to healthy plants by insect vectors. Choose tomato varieties noted for their resistance to viral problems.

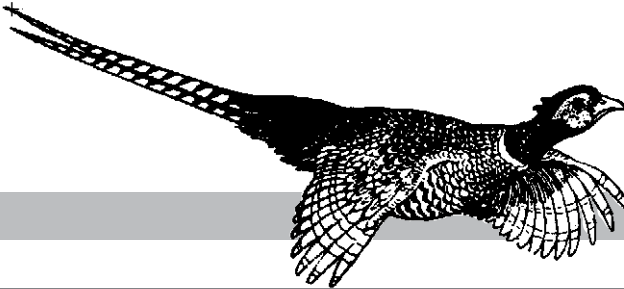

## When to cut hay for best quality

Bromegrass is headed out and native meadows are beginning to grow rapidly with warmer temperatures the past couple weeks. Is now the time to make grass hay? Sometimes a simple date on the calendar is the reason hay is cut. Some will cut when it works in their operation; after corn is fertilized or sprayed, after branding or turning out to summer grass, maybe after kids' baseball and softball seasons are over. Tradition and schedules play a key role in management de-

isions, but should we consider another factor? An important, yet often overlooked way to determine when to cut, is what quality of hay is needed on the operation. Is a protein source needed to minimize supplementation? Is simple roughage needed? Will it be sold? Can it be sold at a premium for being higher quality? Each operation is different and has different needs. Right now the quality of bromegrass and other cool-season grasses are rapidly declining. As these plants mature and become stemmy, their protein, energy content,

and digestibility decrease. Studies have shown that grass hay cut at early heading could result in a daily gain of one pound for bred heifers whereas the same mature hay may not even meet the requirements of a dry cow. When deciding when to cut or what field to cut, first determine what livestock will consume the hay and plan accordingly. A little change to the timing of haying might better meet livestock nutrient requirements and reduce supplementation costs.

## Ag land management workshop scheduled in Norfolk

Nebraska Extension and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Center for Agricultural Profitability will host a land management workshop in Norfolk from 9 a.m. to noon Wednesday, Aug. 25 at the office of Nebraska Extension in Madison County, 1305 S. 13th Street. It will offer updated leasing information relevant to landlords and

tenants, including tips for communication and negotiating. It will address topics such as equitable rental rates, managing and adjusting farmland leases, landlord-tenant issues, pasture leasing and other management considerations. The presentations will be led by Jim Jansen, an extension educator and agricultural economist, and Al-

lan Vyhnalek, an extension educator specializing in farm and ranch transition and succession. The meeting is free to attend, but registration is required with Nebraska Extension in Madison County at (402) 370-4040. 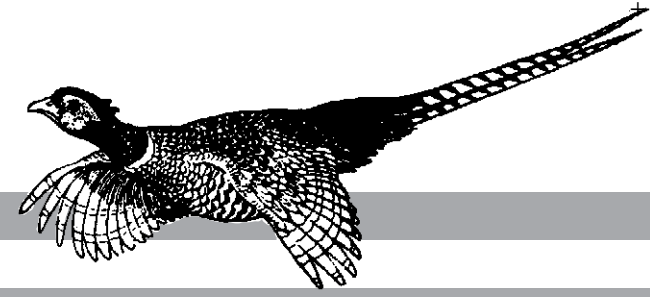

### The butterfly effect discussed

My daughter recently brought home a monarch caterpillar. We cared for it in a container making sure it had a supply of fresh milkweed leaves and kept its cage clean. It seemed perfectly content to munch on leaves all day. After a few days it hung upside-down from the lid of the cage and we waited for it to form a chrysalis, and eventually convert to a butterfly.

We used the time lapse video capability of our cell phone to capture the transformation. Watching the video, the change seems easy, quick, and effortless. There does not appear to be any major effort or pain involved for the caterpillar. However, after researching the subject, we came to appreciate the significant process the caterpillar undergoes which is not apparent to the naked eye of the observer.

Unless we take time to learn about the butterfly's makeover, we may tend to minimize it as an uncomplicated process. Literally everything about the caterpillar changes. Its old body is completely broken down for the new one to form. Enzymes are released to break down the caterpillar skin and hormones allow new body parts to be formed. To the spectator, it looks easy, to the caterpillar, it is a monumental task.

This got me thinking about how change is difficult for people, and how important it is for us to support each other as we attempt it. Many changes in life are painful and complicated, especially those we make to improve our health, or our physical, emotional, or spiritual wellbeing.

Breaking old habits and creating new, healthier behaviors involves a transformation. It requires that we learn new ways of thinking and practice positive self-talk which is sometimes uncomfortable and chal-

lenging work. Quitting smoking, walking every day, choosing different healthier foods, and avoiding junk food are changes that offer long-term benefits. The work may not seem worth it in the short-term. You may want to give up, especially when others do not seem to notice your struggles or understand how you are feeling inside. You may miss the way things were before you embarked upon your journey.

Look to the butterfly for encouragement to continue your transformation. Change may feel like a struggle, but when your wings emerge and you take flight thanks to your healthier habits, the change will be its own reward.

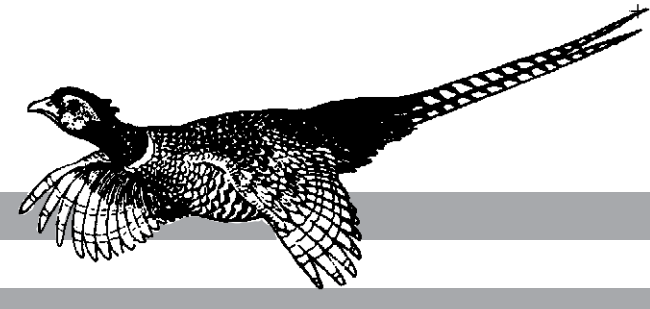

# Recognizing the Holy Spirit's nudge

Do you ever have someone come on your heart? Do you suddenly start thinking about someone even if you haven't seen them for a long time?

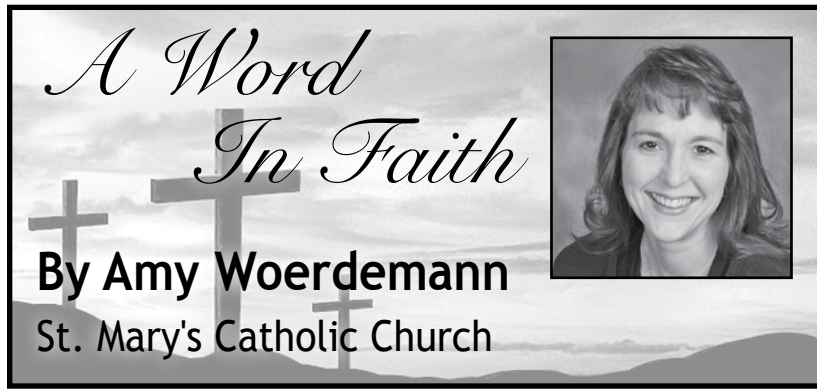
I have this happen to me all of the time. Sometimes I reach out to them. Other times I pray for them. Too often I have to admit that I am wrapped up in my own problems that I do nothing. I believe that the Holy Spirit is always sending us messages about people and events. I have gotten better about listening to the Holy Spirit but I still have a lot of work to do.

I wonder how many times the invisible, yet very real and tangible Holy Spirit, comes alongside each of us, nudging us to pay attention to something - or more importantly to someone. How many times do we either fail to hear that small still voice or ignore it altogether? It's so easy to think these types of nudges are just passing thoughts so we become too busy without ever taking action. I wonder how many people miss out on that special blessing that God has designed to come from us to them? A sobering thought.

I know I'm certainly guilty of ignoring the voice of the Holy Spirit on too many occasions, letting the noise around me drown it out. But think about it... throughout the day the God of the universe is inviting us to join Him in His redemptive work and He's trying to get our attention with the holy nudge. Webster's defines nudge as "to push gently with the elbow especially to get someone's attention." You might call it a prompting or a leading, but it clearly is "not from you." It's God speaking to us through His Spirit. This kind of nudge eventually grows as time goes on and there is often a sense of intense spiritual heaviness that God is pushing you to do something.

The nudge often comes ever so gently. Something is pricking your spirit. It's God's way of elbowing you to get your attention. It's Him saying, "Hey, I want you to do something for me; I want you to join me in working in a mighty way." Someone needs to be contacted. The phone call needs to be made, a card needs to be sent, or you need to stop and pray for a certain person - simple reminders that can all-too-easily be dismissed.

We need only pay attention to the Holy Spirit's nudge and as we act on it, God's business is performed through us and because of us. But the choice is ours - will we respond or will we ignore it and go about our day? It's so easy to shrug off the nudge, isn't it? When you think about it, isn't it



wonderful that the Christian life is full of holy nudges? Nudges that provide amazing opportunities for us to work together with Christ to change the lives He places in our paths. 1 John 4:13 reminds us, "This is how we know that we remain in him and he in us, that he has given us of his Spirit."

Think about it - the God, the Creator of the universe, lives in us! And the Holy Spirit is so much more in tune than what we see or know or understand. I love that He comes alongside us and enables us to

see and hear and pay attention to things we might never pay attention to - His world and His people.

What would happen if we said "yes" to just one of the Holy Spirit's nudges this week - how might the week and our world change? Saying yes to the holy nudge is the start and just might not only change the world, but someone's life forever!

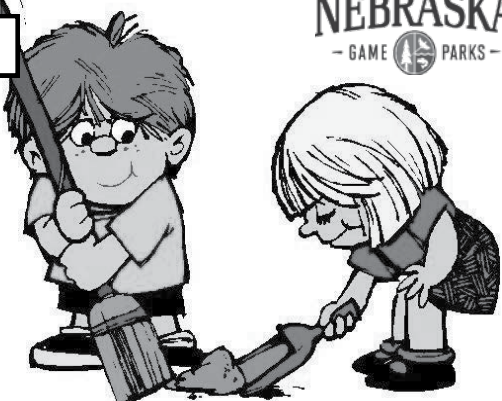

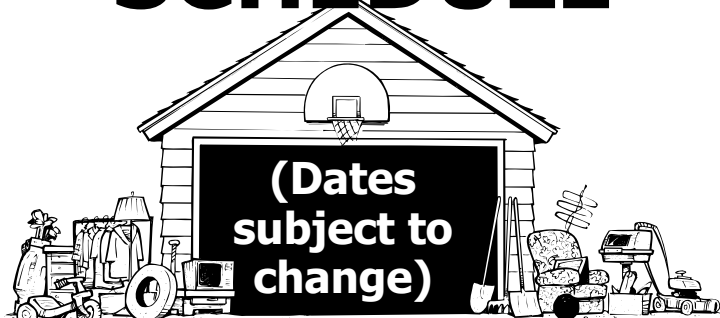
