Pit bulls, pond discussion highlight council agenda

Whether or not to allow a pit bull in the city limits of Wayne and a resolution authorizing a "Pond Feasibility Study" were the two topics that were debated at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council. Juan Zazveta and his brother, Fernand Lopez, spoke to the council on a request to have a pit bull at their residence.

The city currently has an ordinance in place that prohibits pit bulls from being in city limits.

Zazveta told the council he had gotten the dog shortly after he got out of the military a year ago. He uses the dog as an "emotional support animal" and had sent documentation of this to Wayne City Attornev Amy Miller.

He said he had recently moved to Wayne to be closer to family and said he hasn't had any issues with the dog and no one has complained about it. He and his brother also have another dog in the house. The two plan to be in Wayne for another year.

The two said they have been trying to find a place to live outside of city limits but have not been able to find something. They also said if their request to have the pit bull in Wayne was denied, they would look to find housing in Norfolk, which allows pit bulls as long as they are not vicious.

Council member Matt Eischeid asked the two several questions and noted "we have ordinances for a reason."

City Attorney Miller said that if any other type of dog bites someone in the city limits of Wayne, it can be declared vicious and impounded. An appeal process is also available to them.

Following discussion, the council voted unanimously to deny the request.

The issue of authorizing a "Pond Feasibility Study" was tabled at the council's last meeting.

Since that time, Wayne Mayor Cale Giese sent council members information he had received from a Lexington survey in regard to establishing a pond.

Originally, the cost to have Olsson Engineering firm conduct the study was \$11,800. However, additional testing would be required, raising the cost to \$19,750.

Council member Jason Karsky, a member of the 'Stool to Cool' committee said the mayor had asked the committee to make a recommendation to the council and "if you (Mayor Giese) already had your mind made up, why have the committee? I feel we need the study to make an informed decision."

Mayor Giese said developing the lagoon area "is a large project and I would like to see it look neat with minimal changes. I know I can save the city \$20,000 by not having the study done."

Council member Eischeid said that he felt "if we don't do something to look into the possibilities, we are providing a dis-service to the community. This is something that will affect the city for generations to come."

Following the debate, council members voted 7-1 to move forward with the feasibility study. Council member Chris Woehler cast a vote against the study.

Also on Tuesday's agenda was a request from the Wayne Green Team to close westbound traffic on Third Street between Pearl and Lincoln Streets was approved. The request was for Saturday, Sept. 18 from 8 to 10 a.m. for an electronics recycling event.

Sandy Brown, representing the Green Team, told the council that this will be the eighth annual event and the group is budgeting for 30,000 lbs. of electronics to be recycled. A grant has been received from the Nebraska Department of Environment and

The Nebraska Court of Appeals will be in by judges of the Court of Appeals, is insession on the campus of Wayne State College on Sept. 16. The Court of Appeals will divide into its customary two panels with three judges each, to hold arguments at 9:30 a.m. and again at 1:30 p.m. in the Student Center on the Wayne State campus.

"The Court of Appeals is looking forward to holding oral arguments on the Wayne State campus. We greatly appreciate this invitation, and we look forward to meeting the students, faculty, and administration of the college and area high schools, and any local citizens who are in attendance," noted Chief Judge Michael Pirtle.

The Court of Appeals will hear several cases during the morning and afternoon sessions, followed by an open question and answer session with the judges. Students will be given detailed case descriptions of each case in order to help them follow the legal arguments.



Emerald ash borer confirmed in Columbus

The Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA), in partnership with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), confirmed the presence of emerald ash borer (EAB) in Columbus.

The insects were discovered in an NDA trap used to monitor the spread of EAB across the state. This is the first detection of EAB in Platte County. EAB, an invasive beetle that attacks and kills ash trees, was first discovered in Nebraska in 2016. Since that time, EAB has been confirmed in Cass, Buffalo, Dodge, Douglas, Hall, Lancaster, Sarpy, Seward, and Washington counties.

continue trying "Nebraskans to slow the spread of this destructive pest, but it's difficult to stop its progress entirely," said NDA Director Steve Wellman. "Monitoring for the pest as it moves within the state gives people more time to prepare for its arrival in their community and develop plans for managing for EAB and disposing of infested ash trees. Since August is National Tree Check month, it's a good time to check your trees for invasive pests like emerald ash borer."

EAB is a small, metallic-green beetle that is about 1/2 inch long. The larvae of this wood-boring insect tunnel under the bark of ash trees, disrupting the flow of water and nutrients, ultimately causing the tree to die. EAB-infested ash trees will exhibit thinning or dying branches in the top of the tree, Sshaped larval galleries under bark, D-shaped exit holes and suckers (along the trunk and main branch-

The Nebraska EAB Working Group, offers the following suggestions to help prevent the human-assisted spread of the insect:

Use locally-sourced firewood, burning it in the same county where you purchased it, as EAB can easily be moved in firewood.

Consider treating healthy, highvalue ash trees located within a 15-mile radius of a known infestation. Treatment will need to be continually reapplied and will only prolong the tree's life, not save it. Trees that are experiencing declining health should be considered for removal.

If you are in a non-infested county and think you have located an EAB infestation, please report it to the Nebraska Department of Agriculture at 402-471-2351, the Nebraska Forest Service at 402-472-2944 or your local USDA office at 402-434-2345. Nebraskans are encouraged to contact a certified arborist to assist with EAB treatment and tree removal. Find local certified arborists through the Nebraska Arborists Association at https://nearborists.org/ search-for-an-arborist/. 



Discussion of projects around the community dominated the Wakefield City Council meeting on Aug.

A community development block grant (CDBG) application was approved, discussion about downtown parking was held and the council heard a request from Wakefield Community School among other agenda items.

The meeting began with a report from members of the Community Re-development Authority (CRA). The CRA told the council that they were working on assisting downtown businesses with both façade and roofing repair. They were also supporting a CDBG grant application which was the subject of a public hearing during the meeting.

The application will be for a \$434,700 project that would improve street lights downtown. In the grant application, the CRA agreed to contribute roughly \$108,000 in matching funds. No one spoke during the open hearing. The council voted unanimously to approve the application.

Discussion was held about possible options to ease traffic around Lazy Acres Décor and Floral. Owner Sarah Ekberg also operates the Amazon Hub Locker and told the council that her delivery drivers are busy enough delivering packages that they often load vehicles multiple times a day. Ekberg told the council she wasn't sure if a loading zone would be appropriate, but was



Opinion Capitol View Gearing up for the next wave, proceed with caution

Just when you thought it was over, here we go again with a new Covid variant that means the pandemic continues.

Dr. James Lawler, co-executive director of the University of Nebraska Medical Center's Global Center for Health Security in Omaha, said he is concerned this is going to be the worst phase of the pandemic for much of the United States, "particularly states like ours that have low vaccination rates."

At the same time, he said he's encouraged by data showing that more people are getting vaccinated. "If we can build on that momentum and get enough of the community vaccinated, we really would have a very mild experience with this delta wave," he said.

A legitimate vaccination target for the United States is at least 70 percent of the population, he said. Getting to 75 percent to 80 percent would produce dramatic reductions in transmission. But in states such as Florida, Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri and Mississippi, hospital and intensive care unit admissions are going up at the same rate or higher than they were last fall. Already busy hospitals could become overwhelmed.

Lawler also cautions that opening schools without masks and other staff, and visitors.



measures that reduce transmission, such as spacing kids out and providing good ventilation, would be "throwing gasoline on the fire."

Omaha's Westside Community Schools, Ralston Public Schools and Lincoln Public Schools have announced plans to require masks for elementary school students,

Disease Control and Prevention health departments from imposing and the American Academy of Pediatrics have recommended that all students, teachers, and staff wear masks in schools, regardless of their vaccination status. Hear, hear!

Both the federal Centers for dates and last year blocked local mask mandates, a rule that the Lincoln-Lancaster County Health Department was not required to follow. As a result, the county risk dial dropped significantly over time because of a mask mandate.

The Governor has vowed to fight

the coronavirus pandemic. Ricketts' spokesman Taylor Gage said, "One year, just like we did last year." reason for this is there is not a onesize-fits-all strategy that works for every state. The president needs to support the states and respect our rights."

Nebraska has seen six straight weeks of increases in virus cases. Hospitalizations, primarily involving unvaccinated people, are also up. The state has recorded more than 231,000 cases with 2,553 deaths. More than half of the cases and half of the deaths have come from five counties: Douglas, Lancaster, Sarpy, Hall and Scotts Bluff.

Debate about mask use and vaccine mandates has increased, along with the number of COVID-19 cases across the nation. Cases in Nebraska have escalated faster than they have nationally.

A statewide group of mothers who are also doctors has called on the Governor to change his mind and enforce masking for schools. Dr. Christine Mitchell, an Omahaarea internal medicine specialist, said critics have expressed frustration over the shifting guidance, but it is important for policies to adapt to the situation based on the information available.

Lawler said serious infections and hospitalizations are still occurring primarily among those not vaccinated. Vaccines remain effective in preventing serious illness, hospitalization, and death, even against the variants because they produce much higher levels of neutralizing antibodies than natural infections with the virus.



While many factors affect weight gain, the basic cause comes down to math - more calories taken in, through food and beverages, than calories being burned by our bodies. It's not just that we eat more than we burn through physical activity. Instead, it has a lot to do with the size of what we choose to eat and drink. "Portion size" refers to the amount of food appropriate for a person to eat or drink, depending on their daily calorie and nutrient needs. Portions of most commonly eaten foods in the U.S. have increased steadily since the 1970s, and parallel our nation's rising obesity rates. Research shows that we typically are not aware we are eating more. One study found that men and women (both overweight and normal weight) ate 30% more food and calories when they were served a large portion versus a regular-sized portion. We serve ourselves bigger portions and eat more of what we take when we use bigger dishes, spoons or glasses. Eating less is one key to weight-control success.

So how do we eat less? One way is to think about what we are eating. What about those foods that don't even make it to our plate? Snack foods and packaged products confuse consumers, because we are likely to eat an entire package, bag, bottle or can - even if it contains multiple servings! One way to cut those calories is to share with a friend, or save some for later. You'll save money as well as calories, and if you save part of your portion, keep it out of your sight. You will be less likely to "finish it off" before you are hungry again.

Try to avoid tasks that distract you during meals and snacks when we divide our attention, we mindlessly finish what's in front of us, often without realizing how much we're eating. Extra calories go in without our taking the opportunity to really think about what, and how much, we are eating and how hungry or satisfied we might be. Taking time to simply eat may seem a real challenge, but it can be an effective weight loss technique. Another avenue is to choose small. If splitting a meal can't work for you this time, here's another tip: order your meal from the appetizer list or the children's menu - ask vour server to see what is possible. A child's portion is typically smaller and provides fewer calories, with no leftovers.

er plate to help lose weight! It sounds too simple to work, but research shows it is effective. By using a smaller plate, bowl, cup or glass, we eat or drink less than we would if our dishes were larger, and save calories as a result. Try this step at your next picnic or cookout, holiday meal or party. You and your guests can go back for more if desired, but studies show we typically stop with one serving - even if it is smaller than usual! Over time, practicing these simple steps can form healthy habits, and tip the scales toward a healthy weight.



When it was my mother's turn to host the neighborhood Birthday Club my siblings and I were put to work.

The house had to be cleaned from top to bottom; we would vacuum, wash windows, clean bathrooms, dust and plump the pillows on the sofa. The silverware would be polished; the best china would come out of the hutch. The serving table would be adorned with a tablecloth and centerpiece, which in summer was often, flowers from the garden. Birthday Club usually meant a fancy dessert of some kind as well as nuts and mints which were not standard fare at our house.


All this preparation was a hallmark of hospitality in those days; no doubt similar preparations were made at each member's home when it was her turn to host the group.

The dictionary defines hospitality as "....the friendly and generous reception and entertainment of guests, visitors, or strangers." Our farm neighborhood didn't have many young children and my siblings and I were always warmly welcomed at neighborhood club gatherings often getting extra attention and dessert. Do you remember a time when you were blessed by the hospitality of others, graciously welcomed, made to feel like an honored guest? It makes one feel so welcomed to know that your host or hostess made special preparations for your visit, preparing your favorite meal or hosting you on a special occasion like an anniversary or birthday.

Christ practiced hospitality, gracious welcome, with his disciples, with guests and strangers. As Christians we are called to mirror the hospitality that Jesus practiced, welcoming the expected, as well as the unexpected guest. The gospel of John records Jesus' words; "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:34-35 NIV). Practicing Christian hospitality isn't about glamorous table settings or platters of picture-perfect food; it's about loving others as Christ taught, offering a welcome from the heart.

We may often think of hospitality as entertaining people in our home, but we can offer hospitality in a variety of contexts, in church, in our neighborhood, in the community and even special events. Recently I spent a week at a Presbyterian Church sponsored event; it's an annual event on my calendar. If I say the event is a combination of a family reunion and Sunday worship perhaps you can get the idea.







Corn silage harvest considerations discussed

By Ben Beckman, Extension Educator

Corn silage harvest is just around the corner and timing harvest right is critical to silage harvest success. Two factors to pay close attention to are whole plant moisture and milk line.

Accurately assessing whole plant moisture is key to proper fermentation of the silage pile and getting a good pack. Too dry and packing is difficult, oxygen gets into the pile. Overheating, mold/yeast/bad mi-

crobe growth, and spoilage follow. If we harvest too wet the pile weeps and energy and nutrients are lost. Also of danger here are the growth

of clostridia bacteria colonies, which we really want to avoid. Ideally, we want to harvest at 65-70% moisture.

The other factor we have to consider when chopping is milk line. This is a visual indicator of how much starch the corn plant has set down in the kernel and how much is still wet "milk". Starch is one of the most energy dense feed components we have, so silage that contains higher amounts of starch will be higher energy overall. The further down the kernel the milk line is, the

more starch we end up having.

The trouble is that plant moisture and milk line aren't directly correlated and may vary among hybrids. While they do tend to trend in the same direction, you might have a year where corn that is 55% moisture and 1/4 milk may be 65% moisture at the same 1/4 milk the next field over. Both variables need to be watched. Exactly when to pull the trigger is dependent on each operation's resources and needs, but can be a very short window for an optimal product.

Corn silage is a great feed resource that can benefit greatly from some extra care and planning at harvest. Keep an eye on total plant moisture (65-70% for best results), and milk line (closer to the cob means more starch and higher energy silage) to find your ideal harvest window.
