New member sworn in at council meeting

Brent Pick was sworn in as the newest member of the Wayne City Council during

Tuesday's meeting. Pick will represent Ward 2, the northeast portion of Wayne. He is replacing Yasuko Taoka. Work commitments prevent Taoka

from serving in the position. A vacancy on the council still exists in Ward 3 and Mayor Cale Giese will bring forth a name to fill that position at the

council's next meeting. On Tuesday, Mayor Giese asked the council to consider having council representatives be elected at-large rather than by wards or the possibility of having one council member from each ward and the remainder of the Council elected at-large. Discussion will take place at future meetings.

A public hearing was held in regard to the Community Development Block Grant for the Pine Heights Road & Utility Improvements Project. The hearing was required to gain input from the community and express any concerns with the project.

The city received \$435,000 in grant funding for the project and Jan Merrill with the Northeast Nebraska Economic Development Office spoke to the council on details of the grant.

No one from the public spoke during the hearing.

Also related to the project, council members voted to request an extension on the completion date. This will allow time for completion of minor portions of the project. It was noted that the concrete work on the project, including streets and sidewalks is nearly complete.

Council members also approved two resolutions in regard to Community Development Block Grant 21-PW-022, involving College Hill Park and the renovation of the bath house at the old swimming pool location.

The first resolution approves a general administration contract with the Northeast

Nebraska Development District for the general administration of the grant funds.

The second resolution approves the contract between the city of Wayne and the Nebraska Department of Economic Development for \$303,000 in grant funding for the project. Estimated cost of the project is \$383,400 and local matching funds of \$80,400 will be used.

City Administrator Wes Blecke told the council that the city was notified on Oct. 18 that Wayne was awarded this grant. He also said that Wayne was the only 'city' to receive funding, as other grants were awarded to smaller communities.

Council members voted unanimously in favor of a recommendation by the LB840 committee on a Revolving Loan Fund application.

The application came from Sanctuary Apartments, LLC and was for \$400,000.

The money will be used for the renovation and re-purposing of the former First Baptist Church on the corner of Fourth and Main Streets. It will be converted into a six-unit apartment complex.

Matt Ley, managing member of Sanctuary Apartments, LLC, was present at Tuesday's meeting and discussed the plans for the building.

He said the building was originally built in 1909 and he and several like-minded people have gotten together to discuss what we could do to save the building.'

Commissioners approve different proposals

At Tuesday's meeting, the Wayne County Commissioners received updates and approved some proposals.

Greenwood Cemetery representative JoAnn McKenzie gave updates and discussed an exchange of pauper grave sites. She first notified the Commissioners of the recent board member changes that have happened.

McKenzie is currently going through software updates and upgrading with GIS mapping. She found that there are 33 unoccupied graves that Wayne County owns. In 1885, Wayne County purchased 18 lots for \$250.

Next the Clerk of District Court, Deb Allemann-Dannelly, asked the Commissioners if they could buy a new desk for the District Judge office along with painting the room. The reasoning behind the need of a new desk is that the State gave the judges a two-screen computer making the current desk too crowded and providing little vision of the rest of the room for the judges.

She offered an L-shaped table that they have found that would fix the problems that they are facing. The Commissioners

agreed to this change as long as the money was coming out of the judge's budget of \$1,700.

County Attorney Amy Miller brought forth the Settlement Agreement and Release between Herbst Construction Inc. Funds were through federal grants and the Nebraska Department of Transportation as the county just had to sign-off on the document and Wayne County will not lose any funds or have to pay anything.

Emergency Manager Nic Kemnitz told the Commissioners that Nov. 4 through Nov. 7 will be the Eastern Nebraska Wildland Fire Academy taking place at Ponca State Park and he will be attending this event.

There will be a communications exercise at 10 a.m. on Thursday before the Northeast Planning, Exercise and Training Region will be conducting their Communications Exercise from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Friday. Next Wednesday, Nov. 10, Kemnitz will also be working with the Plum Creek Windfarm to observe their Emergency Response Exercise. There will also be a Traffic Incident Management Training event from the Pilger Fire Hall

RHOP expands at Wayne State College

Wayne State College's Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) was recently expanded to include a path to a Doctor of Occupational Therapy degree in partnership with University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC). The occupational therapy (OT) pathway joins nine other medical fields eligible for WSC's marquee pre-professional partnership with UNMC.

"Occupational therapy is an exciting and diverse field for students seeking a career helping others," said Dr. Ron Loggins, dean of the School of Science, Health, and Criminal Justice at WSC. "Occupational therapists might assist a person recovering from a stroke regain movement and activity or they might work with children with sensory issues. Adding OT to the RHOP offerings is going to help recruit and keep these professionals here in rural Nebraska."

The OT program requires four years of study at WSC, then three years at UNMC. Upon successful completion of the four-year undergraduate program in biology or applied human and sport physiology at Wayne State, students will enter UNMC's occupational therapy education program in Omaha or Kearney.

"Wayne State is excited to partner with the University of Nebraska Medical Center to offer occupational therapy as a new

career track for the Rural Health Opportunities Program," said Dr. Todd Young, professor of physics and astronomy and coordinator of the Rural Health Opportunities Program at WSC. "This new career track increases our ability to help students from rural Nebraska achieve their health professional goals and return to rural Nebraska to provide needed health care."

"UNMC Division of Occupational Therapy Education is elated to partner with Wayne State to bring outstanding students to our new OTD program in order to produce competent, entry level practitioners passionate about rural health," said Dr. Leah Stade, Academic Fieldwork Coordinator and Assistant Professor of Occupational Therapy.

The program consists of fieldwork education, which provides a broad exposure to practice in a variety of settings and geographic locations including hospitals and medical centers, schools, home health care, private clinics, and community settings and a doctoral capstone experience and project to provide an in-depth exposure to one or more of the following: clinical practice skills, research skills, administration, leadership, program and policy development, advocacy, education, and theory development. Upon successful completion of the three-year program at UNMC, stu-

dents will receive a Doctor of Occupational Therapy (OTD) degree and be eligible to take the national certification examination.

Wayne State's RHOP has been a fixture in health care education for more than 30 years. The program serves rural Nebraska by recruiting rural students for health professions education, who then return to rural Nebraska to practice, supplying critically needed medical professionals for areas of the state that often face shortages of qualified practitioners. The program provides a full tuition scholarship at WSC and guaranteed admission to UNMC to those students who successfully maintain and complete the program requirements.

Eligible fields of study for RHOP at Wayne State include dental hygiene, dentistry, medical lab science, medicine, nursing, occupational therapy, pharmacy, physical therapy, physician assistant, and radiography. All students, K-12, as well as those from St. Mary's Elementary School, will be in attendance.

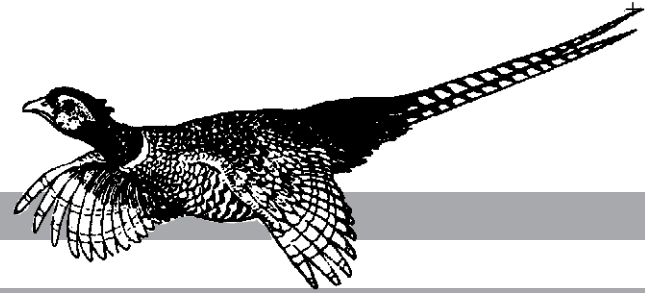
The speaker for this year's program will be Sandra Hansen. A Quilts or Valor presentation will also be part of the program.

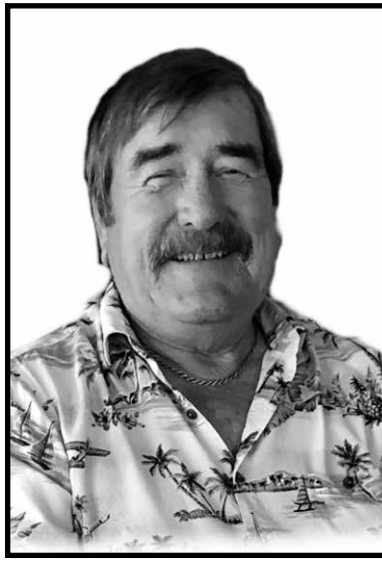

Do woolly bear caterpillars predict weather?

Does the woolly bear caterpillar forecast the weather?

Stories on websites, podcasts, blogs, newsfeeds, television, and radio like to add to the speculation, but could it be possible this furry caterpillar that rolls up into a ball when disturbed is just that—a furry caterpillar that rolls up into a ball when disturbed?

These cute fuzzy black and brown banded caterpillars (Pyrrharctica isabella) are the immature stage of

the Isabella tiger moth. There are two generations per year, but their fall appearance garners the most chat about their prediction capabilities. The size of the black bands, located at the head and rear end, is really indicative of their stage of development and the moisture levels of where they live, not their ability to predict coming weather. Likewise, the density of their fur is dependent on whether they overwinter in a cold part of the country or a

milder one.

The woolly bear feeds primarily on grasses and weeds. Despite speculation, their direction of travel is not a predictor of winter weather either. When fall feeding is discontinued, the direction of travel to an overwintering site is random, with some woolly bears passing each other in their travels.

The really amazing thing about woolly bears is they produce a biological antifreeze known as glycerol. Working like the antifreeze in your car, glycerol lowers the freezing point of the woolly bear caterpillar's blood, making it possible to overwinter underneath bark and logs or under fallen leaf and twig debris. The glycerol keeps the center of their cells from freezing and is essential to their survival.

The woolly bear caterpillar is beloved by children, being the subject



of much examination and petting. The fuzzy coat the caterpillar wears is not fur at all but setae and helps them to control the rate at which they freeze. The end of each flexible bristle does not contain a toxin, unlike other bristled insects that do.

While not as predictive as some hope to believe, the woolly bear is still a fun animal. Not to be outdone by the groundhog's claim to fame, woolly bear festivals are celebrated in towns in North Carolina, Ohio, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, New York, and Ontario. Caterpillar races, parades, and "official" analyses of the coming winter are just some of the fun!

Northeast Nebraska Career Day WSC Planetarium celebrates James Webb space telescope

Wayne State College invites the public to the Fred G. Dale Planetarium located in the Carhart Science Building on campus to celebrate space, science, and the launch of the James Webb Space Telescope.

The event will be held Saturday, Nov. 20, from 1 to 4 p.m. Everyone is welcome for kids' activities, short planetarium shows, a space and science trivia contest, and a talk from Dr. Alexandra Tetarenko, an expert on black holes and the Webb telescope.

The James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) is NASA's next generation space telescope. This project is one of the most ambitious and complex astronomical space observatories ever built, and its unparalleled capabilities to detect faint infrared light will revolutionize our understanding of the universe. After numerous years in development, the Webb telescope will be finally launching in mid-December 2021.

Dr. Tetarenko will introduce this incredible new telescope and provide insights to explore its history to the Nov. 20 audience. She will discuss how it gathers data and why it needs to be in space. She will highlight facts about some of the amazing science feats this telescope will deliver, focusing on how JWST will allow dissection and understanding of some of the most enigmatic objects in the universe -- black holes.

The James Webb Space Telescope will be 100 times as powerful as the Hubble Telescope. Experts believe it will change how we see the universe as the world's largest and most complex space science observatory.

The mission is an international collaboration led by NASA, in partnership with the European and Canadian space agencies.

It will take an ultimate journey by rocket one million miles from Earth to capture stunning images of the first galaxies in the early universe.

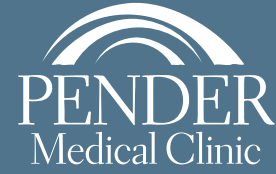

Ley also told the council that while he is not generally in favor of using city money for projects he has been involved in, "this project really can't be done without city help."
He shared a basic budget and timeline for the project and his desire to "make things better and provide downtown living."
Following discussion, council members voted to approve the re-

quest, citing historic preservation as one of the reasons for approval.
The money will be dispersed when the project gets underway (spring 2022) and will have an interest rate one-half of the rate set by the primary lender.
The final item on Tuesday's agenda involved the adopting of the official City of Wayne Ward Map.
This is done every 10 years, following the census. The city of

Blue Devils' season comes to an end in 42-35 loss

ALBION — All season long, the Wayne High football team has faced the football equivalent of the famed New York Yankees' "Murderers' Row."

Seven of Wayne's 10 games this season saw them facing teams that are part of the postseason playoff picture in Nebraska, and they went toe-to-toe with one of the state's best for a second time Friday night.

The Blue Devils took a 28-20 lead into the fourth quarter, but third-seeded Boone Central/Newman Grove scored three times in the fourth quarter, including a pick-six that sealed a 42-35 win and ended the Blue Devils' hopes for a state title in the opening round of the Class C-1 playoffs.

Three weeks ago, the Cardinals pulled away with a 35-13 win over Wayne on the same artificial turf in Albion, but Friday's outcome was nothing short of the Blue Devils' best effort against one of the top teams in the state.

"We had our chances to win the ball game, no doubt," coach Russ Plager said after the game. "I'm just proud of these kids, they played hard against one of the top teams in the state. We could have won it but we didn't finish it and didn't make a few plays when we needed to."

It was almost a disastrous start for the Blue Devils as the Cardinals returned the opening kickoff for a touchdown, but the score was negated on an illegal block penalty.

Not to be deterred, the Cardinals needed just two plays to put the ball in the end zone as Parker Borer took off down the left side for a 69-yard touchdown to give the Cardinals a quick 7-0 lead.

"We just needed to play really clean football when you get to the state playoffs, but the kids just played their butt off the whole night," Plager said of how his team responded to the early score.

Wayne's special teams buried BC/NG deep in their own territory and forced a punt on the next drive, and the Blue Devil offense made good on the outstanding field position when Tanner Walling snuck over from a yard out to make it 7-7 late in the first period.

The Cardinals regained the lead early in the second quarter on a 21-yard run by Braden Benes, but Wayne answered with a Walling-to-Daniel Judd connection from nine yards away — set up by a 59-yard run by Brandon Bartos — then took advantage of a Gavin Redden interception to take their first lead of the night. After getting stuffed on two goal-line sneaks, Walling rolled right on fourth down and scored his

second touchdown of the night. The point-after kick by Yair Alcantara sailed left to leave the score at 20-14.

The Cardinals regained the lead before halftime on a 20-yard pass from Alex Christo to Carsten Bird, but Wayne responded out of the halftime gate with a fantastic drive that ended with a gutsy call by the Wayne coaches.

Facing fourth-and-one at the Cardinal 38, Walling found Alex Phelps, who slipped away from his defender and raced 38 yards to the end zone. Walling ran in the two-point conversion to give the Blue Devils a 28-20 lead with :42 to go in the third.

The game's momentum swung the Cardinals' way in the final 12 minutes, starting with a 49-yard run by Cody Maricle on the first play of the final period to tie the game at 28-28.

With 4:17 to go in the fourth, Wayne's defense broke down the Cardinal attack, but Braden Benes was somehow able to find Brant Benes in the end zone for the go-ahead score. On Wayne's ensuing possession, Brant Benes picked off a Walling pass and took it to the house for a 60-yard score that gave the Cardinals a two-score edge with time running out.

Wayne was able to score in the game's final minute on an eight-

yard pass from Walling to Alcantara, but the Cardinals recovered the ensuing outside kick and ran out the clock to advance to a second-round matchup with Columbus Lakeview, while Wayne's season came to an end with a 5-5 record.

After the game, Plager predicted that every playoff team Wayne played won their opening-round games, a prediction that held true as Ashland-Greenwood, Pierce, Columbus Lakeview and Battle Creek won in the C-1 bracket and Norfolk Catholic won in C-2 action, proving how tough a schedule Wayne played this season.

"These kids had a schedule that I couldn't believe," he said. "It was extremely difficult. We played the best of the best every week and we competed every week and had plenty of chances to win against some of these teams."

Bartos finished the night with 110 yards on 21 carries, with Walling adding 58 yards on 11 attempts. Walling was 17-of-29 passing for 203 yards with three touchdowns and two interceptions. Phelps had a big night in the receiving department with 118 yards on 10 catches, Alcantara caught two passes for 64 yards and Judd had 21 yards on

three receptions.

Defensively, Walling and Redden both had nine tackles, James Dorcsey had six and Phelps, Alcantara, Judd and Eli Barner each had four.

Friday's loss was the end of the road for a very talented senior class, one that won more games in a four-year span (23) than any in Wayne history and was part of three playoff-qualifying teams.

"Most of these (seniors) contributed their sophomore, junior and senior years and won more than 20 games the last three years, so to average almost six wins a season, when you compare that with the history of this program, they're the most successful group to come through here," Plager said.

As for next year, Plager said it will be up to the younger players to step up and keep the team's success going in 2022.

"It's the same thing every year," he said. "We'll need people to step up and play and hopefully these kids will do that again next year."

WSC falls in overtime at Upper Iowa

FAYETTE, Iowa — Four turnovers and two blocked kicks turned into 14 Upper Iowa points and the Peacocks used a blocked PAT kick in overtime to shock Wayne State 42-41 Saturday in Northern Sun Conference football at Harms-Eischeid Stadium.

Wayne State took the opening drive and marched 60 yards on nine plays, with redshirt freshman quarterback Nick Bohn finding the end zone on a one-yard run for an early 7-0 Wildcat lead.

Upper Iowa wasted little time in responding as freshman quarterback Marcus Orr fired a 69-yard scoring strike to DJ Emsweller to tie the score at 7-7 with 9:56 to play first quarter.

Early in the second quarter, the Peacocks took advantage of a Wildcat turnover as sophomore running back Desean Phillips produced a two-yard TD run, giving Upper Iowa a 14-7 lead at the 13:13 mark of the second quarter.

Later in the quarter following a WSC punt, Upper Iowa marched 64 yards on eight plays with Orr throwing a 22-yard pass to Phillips for a touchdown putting the Peacocks in front 21-7 with 5:27 to go before halftime.

WSC came back with a score on their next drive as senior running back Anthony Watkins scored on a five-yard run, capping a 63-yard drive that cut the Peacock advan-

tage to 21-14.

But Upper Iowa stormed down the field right before halftime and drove 75 yards on just seven plays and used a three-yard pass from Orr to Jeremy Waymire with 25 seconds left before halftime to take a 28-14 lead into the locker room.

Upper Iowa opened the second half scoring by forcing a Wildcat interception at the WSC 20. Desean Phillips scored his third touchdown of the day on a two-yard run putting the Peacocks ahead 35-14.

On the next offensive play from scrimmage, Wayne State used a 79-yard scoring pass from Bohn to Taurean Grady and the Wildcats trailed 35-21 with 9:22 to go in the third quarter.

The Wildcats used another big play later in the third quarter to get within one score as Watkins broke loose for a 73-yard touchdown run to cut the Upper Iowa lead to 35-28 at the 4:03 mark of the third quarter.

Early in the fourth quarter WSC was driving inside UIU territory when Bohn was hit and fumbled at the UIU 40. The Peacocks returned the ball to the WSC 35 and moved to the nine. But WSC stopped the drive and the Peacocks missed a 26-yard field goal.

Wayne State then drove down the field from their own 20-yard line and got a four-yard TD pass from Bohn to tight end Gage Den-

Men picked second in NSIC, Janssen preseason POY

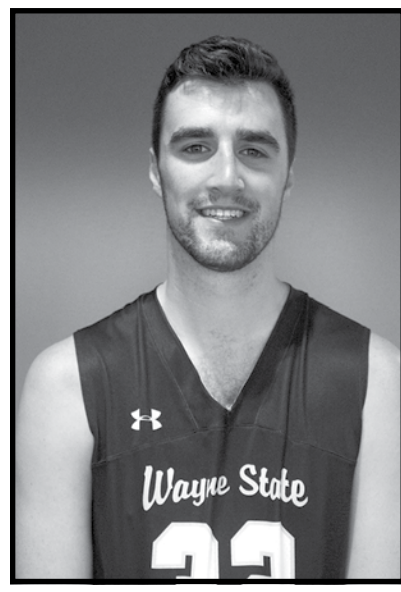
Wayne State was picked second overall and tied for first in the NSIC South Division in the 2021-22 Preseason NSIC Men's Basketball Coaches Poll.

Wildcat junior forward Jordan Janssen was voted by league coaches as the Preseason South Division Player of the Year and Wildcat to Watch this season.

Wayne State returns all five starters from last year's club that was 11-7 overall and captured the NSIC South Division for the second time in three seasons with a 10-4 league mark. The Wildcats also qualified for the NCAA Div. II National Tournament for the first time in 21 years.

MSU Moorhead was voted the team to beat this season with Wayne State second, Minnesota State a close third and Augustana and Upper Iowa rounding out the top five.

Janssen, a 6-foot-7 junior forward, was voted this year's Preseason NSIC South Division Player of the Year after averaging 16 points and 9.8 rebounds per game last season. He was named first-team All-NSIC South Division, South Division Player of the Year and first-team NABC All-Central Region. Last season, Janssen ranked fourth in NCAA Div. II with 10 double-doubles while shooting 52.3 percent from the field and 64 percent at the free throw line while being named NSIC South Division Player of the Week three times.

Wildcat netters earn conference split

The 11th-ranked Wayne State volleyball team handed Augustana at home, but were upended by No. 13 Southwest Minnesota State on the road over the weekend.

On Thursday, freshman outside hitter Jaz DeHaan produced a career-high 22 kills to power the Wildcats in a 25-16, 25-18, 20-25, 25-17 win over Augustana at Rice Auditorium.

Wayne State never trailed in the opening set while hitting .462 as a team. The Wildcats jumped out to an 8-3 lead and were never threatened by the Vikings as DeHaan had six kills in the opening set.

Augustana stayed close with the Wildcats early in the second set but could not overcome eight kills by DeHaan as Wayne State pulled away. WSC trailed 10-9, but scored three straight points on kills from Taya Beller and Jaz DeHaan along with an Augustana attack error for a 12-10 lead that WSC would never relinquish.

The Vikings rallied in the third set and hit .417 with 18 kills as Augustana stayed alive in the match. Augustana took an early 7-3 lead and pushed the advantage to 11-6 forcing a Wildcat timeout. WSC never got closer than four points in the set despite four kills each from DeHaan and Brahmer and two service aces by junior Lauren Jacobson.

Wayne State wasted little time regaining the momentum in the

fourth set as the Wildcats scored the first five points. After Augustana closed within one at 7-6, WSC scored six of the next seven points to take control at 13-7 and the 'Cats forced eight Viking errors in the set to win the match. DeHaan, Kelsie Cada and Brahmer each had four kills while Cada had 10 digs in the set for the Wildcats.

The Wildcats finished the match with a .299 hitting percentage while holding Augustana to a .159 clip. WSC held a 56-51 edge in kills over the Vikings and had four more digs 73-69. Wayne State also had a 9-5 advantage in blocks and 6-3 in service aces.

DeHaan's career-high 22 kills paced Wayne State on the night. She had just three attack errors and hit .365 for the match. Brahmer followed with 13 kills and a .480 attack percentage while Cada recorded her seventh double-double with 10 kills and a career-best 24 digs.

Brahmer and Beller each recorded four blocks while setter Rachel Walker had 48 set assists. Jacobson had half of Wayne State's six service aces, a career-best night serving for the Wisner junior.

In Saturday action, Southwest Minnesota State rallied from a first-set deficit and came back to defeat Wayne State 18-25, 25-20, 25-15, 25-18 at Marshall, Minn.

The opening set saw Wayne State force 10 SMSU attack errors

that included three Wildcat blocks as Wayne State registered the first-set win.

Southwest Minnesota State rallied in the second set to tie the match despite WSC forcing nine more attack errors on the Mustangs. The 'Cats were held to just seven kills in the set.

The Mustangs came back from an early 6-3 deficit in the third set by scoring six straight points to take the lead for good and take a 2-1 advantage. The Mustangs continued their hot hitting and serving and thwarted any possible Wildcat rally in the fourth set as SMSU had four service aces and hit .414 with 15 kills to finish off the fourth set win.

SMSU outit WSC in the contest .226 to .145 and held a 60-39 advantage in kills over the Wildcats. WSC held a 12-10 edge in blocks over the Mustangs but SMSU had 11 service aces to five by the Wildcats.

Taya Beller led WSC with 11 kills followed by Maggie Brahmer with nine. Brahmer notched a career-best nine blocks in the match while Kelsie Cada had 14 digs with Alaina Wolff adding 12. Setter Rachel Walker had 27 set assists while Cada had three service aces.

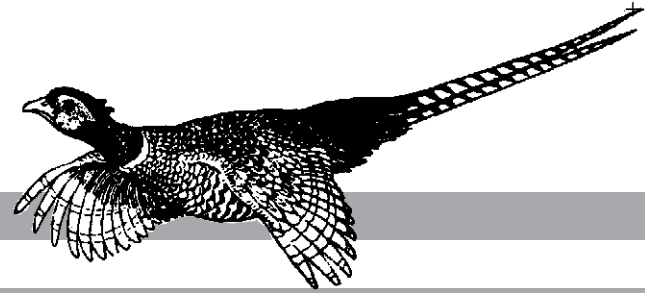

Nightshade in corn residue, stalk quality discussed

Have you noticed any black nightshade in your corn stalks that you are grazing or plan to graze? If these fields have too much black nightshade, be careful, it might be toxic.

Black nightshade is common in many corn fields in the fall, especially those that had hail damage in the summer or any situation where the corn canopy became thin or open. It usually isn't a problem, but if the density of nightshade is very high, there is the potential that it could poison livestock. Almost all livestock, including cattle, sheep, swine, horses, and poultry are susceptible.

Black nightshade plants average about 2 feet in height and have simple alternating leaves. In the fall, berries are green and become black as the plant matures. All plant parts contain some of the toxin and the concentration increases as plants mature, except in the berries. Freezing temperatures will not reduce the toxicity.



It is very difficult to determine exactly how much black nightshade is risky. Guidelines say that a cow would need to consume 3 to 4 pounds of fresh black nightshade to be at risk of being poisoned. These guidelines, though, are considered conservative since there is little data on the actual toxicity of nightshade plants. Also encouraging is that reports of nightshade poisoning have been very scarce in the past.

Fortunately, even though nightshade plants remain green fairly late into the fall, cattle usually don't appear to seek out nightshade plants to graze. However, green plants of nightshade might become tempting toward the end of a field's

grazing period, when there is less grain, husks, or leaves to consume.

So common sense and good observation must be your guide. Scouting fields to estimate the general density of nightshade plants will help you determine any potential risk. Secondly, and particularly near the end of a field's grazing period, closely observe what the cattle are eating to see if animals might be selecting nightshade plants.

Corn stalk quality after weathering

Fall rain and snow are good for wheat and next year's crops, but it does have its drawbacks. One challenge is its impact on corn stalk feed quality.

While this fall has been relatively dry, there has and will continue to be areas that receive some rain or snow events. Rain reduces corn stalk quality several ways. Most easily noticed is how fast stalks can get soiled or trampled into the ground if the fields become muddy.

Less noticeable are nutritional changes. Rain or melting snow soaks into dry corn stalk residue and leaches out some of the soluble

nutrients. Most serious is the loss of sugars and other energy-dense nutrients, which lowers the TDN or energy value of the stalks. These same nutrients also disappear if stalks begin to mold or rot in the field or especially in the bale. Then palatability and intake also decline.

Another factor that affects corn-stalk grazing is wind. Throughout the fall, there always seems to be those days where excessively high winds will easily blow corn leaves and husks off the field. This of course, can impact the amount of feed, and after grain, those leaves and husks contain the highest nutritional quality.

There is little you can do to prevent these losses. What you can do, though, is to closely monitor cow and field conditions while adjusting your supplementation program accordingly. Since weathering by rain reduces TDN more than it reduces protein, consider the energy value of your supplements as well as its protein content.

Weathered corn stalks still are economical feeds. Just supplement them accordingly.

More efficient nitrogen use is the goal of LENRD's new cost-share program

The protection of our groundwater is one of the main responsibilities given to Nebraska's NRDs. The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) board and staff work diligently to come up with ways to develop, manage, and conserve our water now and for future generations.

LENRD Projects Manager Curt Becker said, "We are always striving to find programs that fit our mission and to encourage citizens to stop and think about how they can take the next steps to reach their management goals."

At their October meeting, the LENRD board of directors approved a chemigation equipment cost-share program. This program

is intended to introduce landowners to, and provide a one-time cost assistance for, equipment needed for application of fertilizer through irrigation systems. This program is designed to spoon-feed fertilizer to the crop at the optimum time, reduce fertilizer losses, and reduce the risk of nitrogen leaching into the groundwater.

Becker continued, "Our goal with this program is to provide a tool for producers to apply their nitrogen more efficiently. One of the requirements of the program is that the applicant has not previously done chemigation."

The eligible components would include LENRD approved chemigation equipment needed on irri-

gation systems for applying liquid nitrogen fertilizers, including the mainline check valve and the fertilizer injection pump and/or chemical injection valve.

"The cost-share will be 50% of the total cost of the equipment, not to exceed \$1,500, and is a one-time use program," said Becker.

In other action, the board accepted a bid to complete concrete work at the shop and shower house at Maskenthine Lake, and the sidewalk project at the Maple Creek Recreation Area. The board also accepted a three-year lease contract for a skid steer loader and approved the trade-in of the Chevy Tahoe.

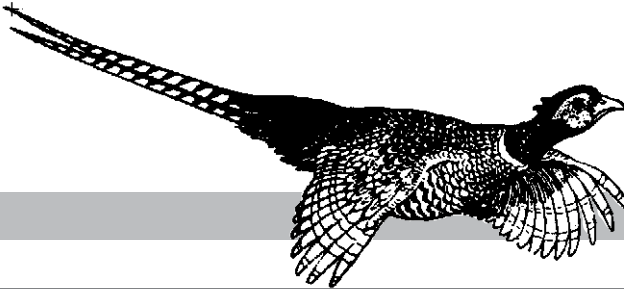

Honoring and supporting our veterans

"A nation reveals itself not only by the men it produces but also by the men it honors, the men it remembers." — President John F. Kennedy

America is the greatest country in the world because our Constitution recognizes God-given human rights and protects individual liberties. Our Republic has endured for nearly two-and-a-half centuries due to the blood, sweat, and sacrifice of our military veterans. Veterans Day is an opportunity for Nebraskans to thank the veterans who've heeded the call of duty to protect our way of life. There are around 127,000 veterans living in Nebraska. They've served America in every corner of the globe.

Our goal is to make Nebraska the best state in America for our veterans and military families. Just this year, we've made major strides toward this goal. On May 25, I signed Legislative Bill (LB) 387 into law. It exempts 100% of military retirement benefits from state income taxation. This bill is a big deal for our workforce. Veterans can retire as early as age 38. At this age, they're looking to contribute the skills they've gained in a second career or through volunteer work. We want to create a tax-friendly environment so these veterans choose Nebraska as their home.

While we've created a more competitive tax structure to recruit and retain veterans, the State has also launched the SkillBridge program to smooth the transition from military service to civilian employment. Overseen by the Nebraska Department of Economic Development, SkillBridge connects servicemembers in their last 180 days of military service with Nebraska businesses. This allows veterans to explore post-military career opportunities and gives Nebraska employers the inside track to hiring great leaders.

The State has also stepped up to help military spouses find job opportunities. Military families make tremendous sacrifices in service to our country, including having to move 2-3 times more often than civilian families. This year, I worked with the Unicameral to pass legislation making it quicker and easier for military spouses to gain certification to teach after moving to Nebraska. This adds to the previous work we've done to help them gain licenses/permits to work in Nebraska as realtors, nurses, or in occupations regulated by the Uniform Credentialing Act.

Additionally, the Nebraska Department of Administrative Services launched the Military Spouse Transition Program in April as part of the State's ongoing effort to become a leading employer for military families. The initiative helps military spouses moving to Nebraska find jobs in state government. The program delivers career services, such as resume building, and helps military spouses network with State agencies.

State Senators also took action in 2020 and 2021 to increase the educational benefits available to our soldiers and airmen. LB 450,

which took effect Jan.1, expands the tuition assistance available to members of the National Guard. The bill increases the tuition credit for a baccalaureate degree from 75% of resident tuition to 100% of resident tuition. The bill also creates a tuition credit of 50% of resident tuition for graduate and professional degrees. LB 4, which I signed into law this March, raises the undergraduate tuition credit from 50% to 75% for Reservists serving in units based in Nebraska.

The Nebraska Department of Veterans' Affairs (NDVA) is continuously looking to enhance veterans' benefits and make it easier to access them. In 2020, NDVA upgraded the veterans.nebraska.gov website. It now has a Nebraska Veterans' Gateway to Employment to assist veterans searching for a job or starting a business. The redesigned website also features a Benefits Expert tool to help users quickly determine exactly which benefits they need and are eligible to receive.

Additionally, veterans can use the website's live chat to talk to an accredited state service officer. The chat provides the same assistance available during an in-person visit. The live chat helped protect veterans during the pandemic, allowing them to get assistance without having to risk exposure to the virus. This August, the Association of Marketing and Communication Professionals honored NDVA with a dotCOMM Gold Award in recognition of its website enhancements.

Winning a dotCOMM award signifies that NDVA's digital work ranks among the best of any state government. In 2020, Nebraska had the lowest unemployment rate in the nation among veterans. Last November, SmartAsset ranked us #7 in the nation for veterans. While that's a strong ranking, we're determined to climb all the way to the top spot!

Statewide elections a year away, here's a prediction

The statewide election is a year away, but it appears former Governor Dave Heineman could win that office again. If he decides to run.

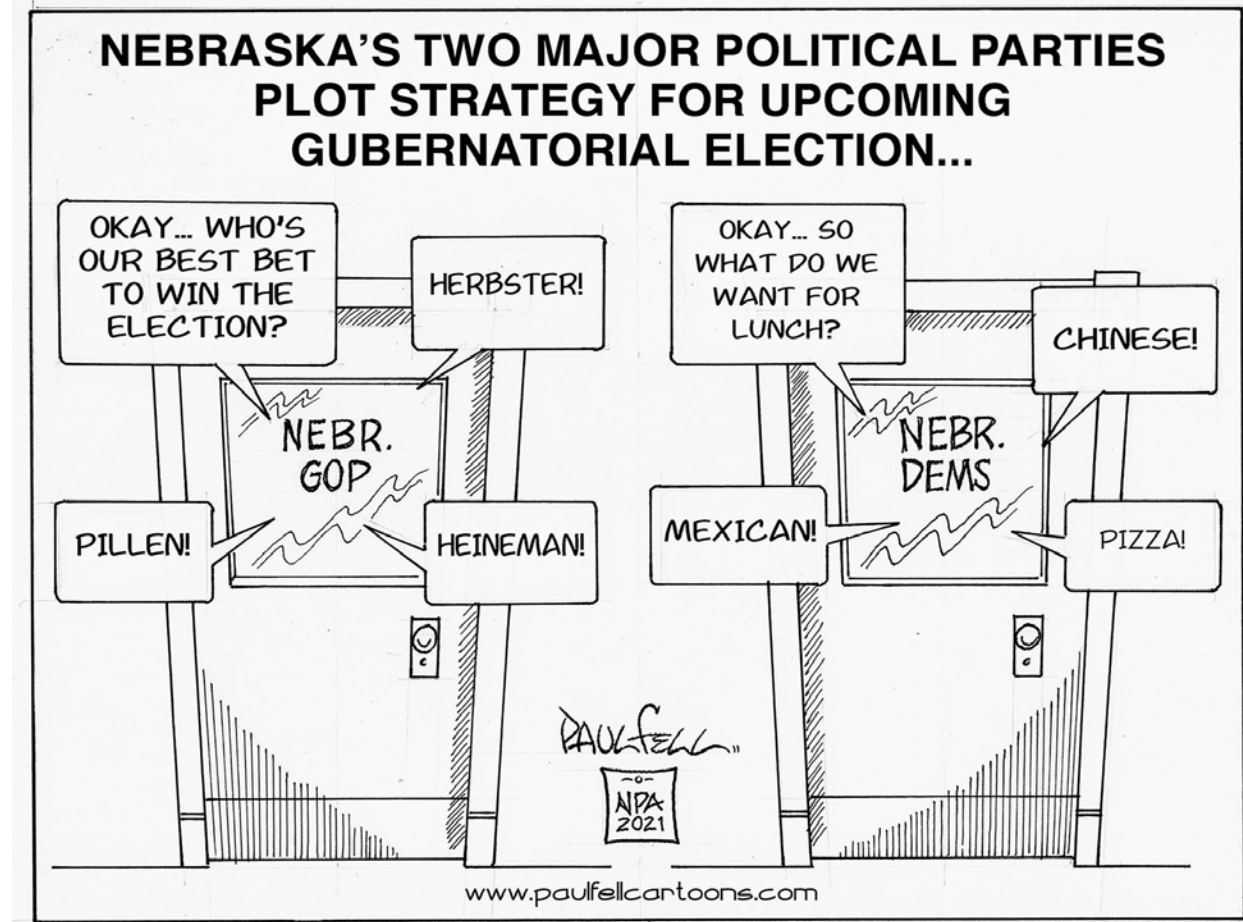
Predicting something that major this soon is risky, but I have consulted several colleagues who agree that the current candidate pool makes such a win possible. There's always the Republican primary in May, but Heineman knows how to win primaries.

Heineman, who had also previously served as state treasurer and lieutenant governor, has said he is still meeting with constituents statewide. But he would bring considerable name recognition to the race, as well as a keen knowledge of how to win. In 2006, he defeated Nebraska football coach and U.S. Rep. Tom Osborne to win the GOP primary for governor in what some considered to be a political upset.

The Fremont resident had assumed the governorship in 2005 after then-Gov. Mike Johanns left to become U.S. secretary of agriculture. Heineman had been Johanns' lieutenant governor. Heineman, elected twice, was Nebraska's longest serving governor, 10 years from 2005 to 2015. Democrat Governor Frank Morrison was elected three times, but the terms were only two years.

I first met Heineman in 1990 when the state Republican Party hired him to figure out why the wheels were coming off the wagon of Nebraska's only female governor, Kay Orr. Mrs. Orr, who served from 1987 through 1991, had defeated another woman, former Lincoln Mayor Helen Boosalis, a Democrat. That 1986 campaign and election had drawn national attention.

I didn't agree with him on everything, but I was amazed at how he built a following with lawmakers and managed to get many of his



major ideas passed into law.

But his experience and success rate aren't the only positives in his possible candidacy. The strength of the opposition is, at best, lukewarm. Falls City businessman Charles Herbster, University of Nebraska Regent Jim Pillen, state Sen. Brett Lindstrom of Omaha and Breland Ridenour, an IT Manager for Skarda Equipment Company in Omaha, have declared they are in the race.

Herbster claims to have the endorsement of former President Donald Trump. I'll let you folks decide if that's an asset or a liability. Pillen of Columbus, a former University of Nebraska football player, has several major endorsements including that of Osborne. Lindstrom, a former NU quarterback, has been a vocal mem-

ber of the Legislature's Revenue Committee. Ridenour is running much of his campaign on social media for now.

Former state Sen. Theresa Thibodeau of Omaha has recently surfaced as another potential GOP candidate. The former chair of the Douglas County Republican Party had been announced months ago as Herbster's choice for Lieutenant Governor. But a family issue caused her to step down. While she said she is still exploring her potential candidacy, the issue has been resolved and she has freed up time by selling her day care business.

Thibodeau said she plans to announce her decision within the next three to five weeks. She said she does not believe it is too late to jump into the race, even if she would be taking on two candidates

with deep pockets.

Ricketts appointed Thibodeau to the Legislature in 2017 and backed her campaign to keep the seat in 2018. However, she was defeated by Sen. Machaela Cavanaugh, who now holds the central Omaha seat.

State Sen. Carol Blood of Omaha has declared as the sole Democrat for the Governor's race. Given the struggle that Democrats have had fielding viable candidates for the job since the two terms of Ben Nelson, it's unlikely that Blood will have a primary battle.

As I said, it's early, but I like Heineman's chances.

Senator explains the State Board of Education

LR 136- Senator Brewer introduced an interim study to examine and evaluate the causes, costs, and impacts of rolling electrical power outages during the extreme weather events of February 2021.

LR225 - The Government and Veterans Affairs Committee held an interim study to review occupational regulation of truth and deception examiners pursuant to the Occupational Board Reform Act.

Role of the State Board of Education

As I prepare for the Session to begin in January I am looking at a few new bills I feel are vital to bring forward. One is in direct response to the controversy around the Health Education Standards draft created by the Nebraska Department of Education this year. I am looking at legislation that will go back to the drawing board and clearly define the original role of the State Board of Education regarding Education Standards.

To give you a little history, in 2000 the Nebraska Legislature passed Statute 79-760.01 which requires the Nebraska State Board of Education to adopt measurable academic content standards for at least the grade levels required for statewide assessment. Those standards shall cover the subject areas of reading, writing, mathematics, science, and social studies, and the State Board of Education shall develop a plan to review and update standards for those subject areas every seven years.

Though the State Board of Education has created standards in other areas, they were only mandated to create standards for the five core subjects. The Legislature has heard many bills in the past regarding additional mandatory standards to be taught to our children. In fact, legislation has passed to mandate being able to read by 3rd Grade, Civic Education, Financial Literacy Education and a version of Health Education Standards.

The Health Standards in that bill are defined in statute 79-712 Public school; health education; requirements. Provisions shall be made by the proper local school authorities for instructing the pupils in all public schools in a comprehensive health education program which shall include instruction (1) as to the physiological, psychological, and sociological aspects of drug use, misuse, and abuse and (2) on intellectual disability and other develop-

current State Statutes and introduced Health Education Standards with extremely controversial content, they stepped outside of their lane. I am currently working with key stakeholders to take a hard look at getting those parameters defined to prevent similar chaos from happening in the future.

Vaccine Mandates

I receive numerous emails every week with personal stories of Nebraskans from all ages, races, and socioeconomic realities in the state. For some, the threat of a mandatory vaccine has jeopardized their health, their freedom, their place of employment and life as they've known it.

I have added my signature, with many of my colleagues, requesting a Special Session to take a hard look at how vaccine mandates are impacting the individual lives of Nebraskans. There is a chance that a special session may not be granted. That is why I am so thankful Nebraska's Attorney General Peterson also signed on to an Amicus Brief with 19 other Attorney Generals across the country to stand for the individual freedoms of all Americans.

Attorney General also jointly led with Missouri's Attorney General a ten-state coalition in filing a lawsuit against the Biden Administration for imposing a vaccine mandate on federal contractors and employees.

Governor Ricketts also announced that he had signed an executive order barring state agencies from enforcing coronavirus vaccine mandates on state teammates. I will continue to keep you informed as things progress.

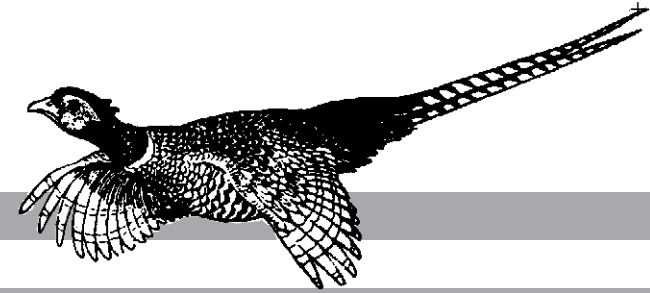

Youth-Adult partnerships essential for positive youth development

Service learning activities through community organizations are great avenues to get youth and adults involved in community, especially through 4-H and other youth development programs.

As adults are working with youth in their community, we may say "We listen to youth," but do we really do this?

According to a study done by the Search Institute, 25 percent of youth feel that their community's adults value them, and 28 percent of youth feel that they have useful roles in their community. These are

alarming low numbers considering the youth of our communities are the future of our communities.

Youth-Adult Partnerships (YAPs) refer to collaborative relationships in which youth and adult equally share decision-making power. Other benefits to youth in these partnerships, as identified by the Innovation Center for Community Youth Development, include increased civic awareness and commitment to their communities as well as a desire to help positively improve the lives of others.

One resource that is helpful for communities to examine as they build YAPs is called the Ladder of Participation from Roger Hart's research. He examines the eight levels of youth voice that youth programs can access their level of YAP from manipulation of youth to youth and adults sharing decision-making skills.


Here are some helpful ideas for communities to include in their projects:

Adults provide enthusiastic support and encourage youth to take risks. Youth feel empowered to

take advantage of opportunities to use their voice. If the young person feels the group values their opinion, they'll share much more information. Think back to childhood. You know that adult who listened to you, who believed in you. What did they do? Mimic that!

Youth want to feel component in their roles. Adults can prepare young people for leadership. This could be a training before having them lead a group activity or personal coaching before they speak to a political figure. Many boards have a young person or two as board members.

Allow youth to make real choices about their program or goals. This moves beyond setting the meeting time or selecting the next activity. Introduce the youth to programming planning and goal setting.

With youth at the table, you will find the depth of programming so much greater. And so much more fun to do!

View success from the eyes of the young person. This doesn't mean saving them from your perception of failure. It involves supporting them as they plan, take risks, and understand how to solve a problem. Their success may look different than your definition of success. Reflect on the goals of the program.

A key component of youth voice is valuing peers and their contributions. Create an environment where all young people can have their voices heard. This is where facilitation skills can shine. As an adult, build in ways to hear everyone - this could be allowing small group time or pair-and-share time. For those who prefer to write, throw up some white space for youth to express themselves.

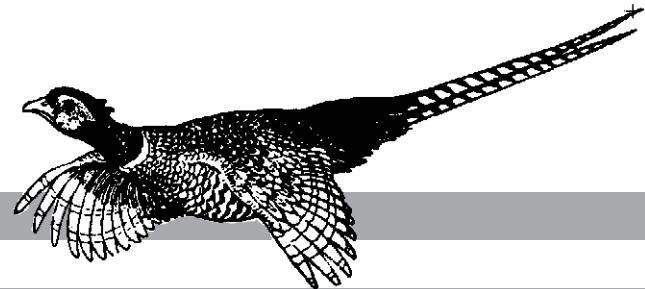

In defense of kindness

The Apostle Paul wrote in his letter to the Galatians that Christians should display the fruits of the Spirit which are love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (5:22-23).

Each of these characteristics are sorely needed in these tumultuous days. It can be hard to imagine how to make a difference in a culture which is so polarized about so many things. The culture of anger and divisiveness is pervasive and there is a dismissiveness of others' ideas, thoughts, and opinions. Divisiveness, dismissiveness and seeing others as enemies can begin to reshape the ways we see ourselves and others and not in a good way.

How might we change direction? Author Bruce Reyes-Chow says start with kindness. Reyes-Chow wrote the book "In Defense of Kindness: Why It Matters, How It Changes Our Lives, and How It can Save the World." Reyes-Chow was inspired for his book by Rev. Fred Rogers, yes, the same Mr. Rogers of tv fame, whose deep faith remind-

ed Reyes-Chow that love and being kind are immensely powerful in response to injustice and pain in the world.

Reyes-Chow writes, "There is a difference between being kind and being nice. To be kind is to accept that each person is a created and complex human being and to treat them as if you believe this to be true." We should be kind not for what we can get out of the action but because we are enacting how human beings should treat each other.

Kindness practices such as opening a door, offering a seat on public

transportation to another, offering a helping hand, respectful listening and thoughtful conversation are often exceptions rather than regular practice in today's world. Acts of kindness rather than being limited to an occasional U-Tube video, should be an expectation of how we treat each other. Kindness isn't about getting just what we want but seeing to the best interest of others.

Jesus also shared words about kindness in the Gospel of Luke chapter 6:27-42 where he talks about how to deal with those who don't agree with you. We are also reminded in that chapter of the Golden Rule "Do to others as you would have them do to you."

In his short book Reyes-Chow speaks to a variety of settings where kindness can make a difference from our relationships with friends and family, the workplace, the public square, even the internet. The author has woven a number of personal stories into the book discussing kindness from a variety of vantage points such as how to be kind to those with whom we don't agree and still stand up for what we believe. Throughout the book the author offers questions which challenge the reader to think about kindness extended or withheld, given or received which helps the reader focus on the depth and breadth of kindness.

Kindness should not be used to bend people to our will and change their perspective. Kindness isn't a commodity to barter for goods or position but as a natural and normative way to treat people around us, who are beloved by God. Kindness can and should hold people accountable for their words and actions, for example the use of destructive rhetoric or rude behavior. Kindness according to Reyes-Chow has passion, backbone, strength, vulnerability, courage and relentless grace whether dealing with others or caring for ourselves.

We must remember to be kind to ourselves as well. There may be times we must disengage from things that cause our body, mind and spirit pain and walk away from those situations. This could mean walking away from a relationship, a volunteer role, a job, or other situations. Don't forget to be kind to yourself.

In the last chapter entitled "Won't You Choose Kindness" Reyes-Chow writes, "Kindness is not a journey for the meek and mild. For those of us who have been steeped in ways of being that are not kind, it takes tremendous energy to purge ourselves of patterns and behaviors that are not kind. Every day we have to choose to commit to live out kindness that day."

How might the world be different if each of us would commit to extending kindness to others starting with one or two acts each week and working to make kindness a daily practice? Can you infuse kindness in your interactions around the dinner table, the grocery store, at the gas station, at the public meeting or on the highway? Choosing kindness isn't easy it requires we be thoughtful and attentive to our words and our actions. I agree with Reyes-Chow in his assessment that choosing kindness is a very good place to start to change the world, I hope you will join us.

Check stations back in use for nine-day firearm deer hunters this year

Deer hunters are reminded that in-person check stations will be used during the nine-day firearm season this year.

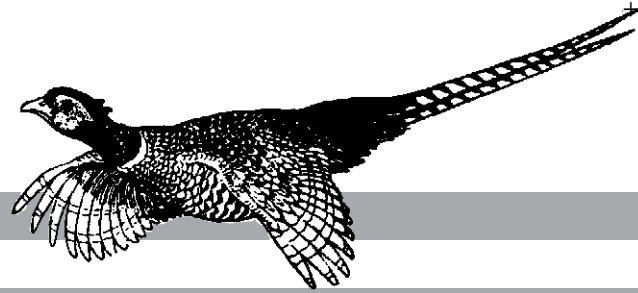
All deer harvested during the Nov. 13-21 season must be accompanied by the hunter and taken to a check station no later than 1 p.m. on the day following the close of the season.

Check stations change from year to year, so hunters are urged to find their locations before they hunt. A list may be found on the 2021 deer regulations sheet, which, along with maps and information, is available at outdoornebraska.gov/deer and outdoornebraska.gov/huntingseasons. An interactive map of check stations can be found at outdoornebraska.gov/maps.

Game and Parks staff will collect lymph nodes from select harvested deer to sample for chronic wasting disease at check stations in the Wahoo, Blue Southeast and Blue Northwest units. They will take samples for CWD and meningeal brain worm in the Buffalo, Platte and Republican units.

When checking in a deer, the permit and check station seal number or check station verification number must be retained when transporting all or a portion of the carcass to a point of permanent storage or processing.

Deer harvested during the Nov. 6-8 Special Landowner season must be checked via Telecheck; the website and phone number to contact are printed on the permit.
