Skokan also noted that because the fire happened on a holiday weekend, and the fact that firefighters were basically on the scene from 3:05 a.m. until 12:49 p.m. in the heat and humidity, mutual aid was requested from Carroll, Wayne, Wakefiled, Randolph, Pierce, Hoskins and Stanton. Area farmers provided water to fight the fire and many residents of Winside responded by providing water and food to those fighting the fire.

Also on scene were the Red Cross and Wayne Sheriff's Department.



#### Wayne unified bowlers punch ticket to state

The Wayne Unified Bowling team has been the bridesmaid in

the first few seasons of the sport's existence. Now they're the one walking down the aisle toward a date at the

state tournament.

Wayne was the top team out of six in the B-5 district tournament held Tuesday morning at Wildcat Lanes in Wayne, easily distancing themselves from runner-up West Point-Beemer to win

the title by 124 pins in the six-game Baker format. During the first few seasons, unified bowling has been a singleclass sport, putting Wayne in a district with bigger schools like Norfolk and South Sioux City.

But with the sport growing to almost 60 schools in the past year, the Nebraska School Activities Association added a second class to give smaller-enrollment schools an opportunity to compete for state, and Wayne was able to get the job done on their home lanes.

"It's great," coach Kayla Varley said. "We've come close in the past and it's nice not to be district runner-up for a change. It's exciting to see the sport is growing enough to where we now have two classes, and we were able to compete with schools more our size and it's great to be able to go to state."

Unified bowling is a sport that allows high school students with special needs the opportunity to compete alongside their ablebodied classmates in a sport. Each team must have at least two special-needs athletes on the team competing with three other

The Wayne team, including Araceley Suarez, Corey Rogers, Brianna Nissen, Brooks Kneifl and Jamie Janke, bowled a six-game series of 841, finishing well ahead of runner-up West Point-Beemer's 717 series.

"The kids bowled really well," Varley said. "They came in and

did the job and got it done." By winning Tuesday's district, the team qualifies for the Class B division of the Nebraska State Unified Bowling Championships that will be held Monday, Dec. 6 at Sun Valley Lanes in Lincoln.

Varley said she's looking forward to seeing how the team fares

among the state's best next week. "There's good competition down there, but we've got a good solid team and it's been awesome to watch them grow and I'm excited

to see how we do down in Lincoln," she said.

complete a community health survey. This survey is a way for NNPHD to hear from those in the community about their life experiences and how these experiences have affected the health of those taking the





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

### So, how's your 2021 been? Compared to what?

If you thought 2021 was going to be better than 2020, the year of the Pandemic, let me know how that worked out for you.

Coronavirus has turned out to be a cruel mistress. Just when it looked like masking and vaccinating was going to win the day, along came the Delta Variant. And some others the names of which I can't remember because I don't spend my days glued to the television set or wading in the muck and mire

of social media. But I've heard they are out there, just in time for booster shots and flu shots.

I've lost friends over this thing, people I haven't seen since March of 2020. Simply because I'm vaccinated, and they believe that vaccinated people give off some kind of hideous protein residue that will harm them. Really? You can't make this stuff up.

Then there are a few who still claim that the government wanted these vaccines to inject nanobots into our bodies. Whatever they are. Some claim that it amounts to planting tracking devices in us.

Seriously, do you believe the government needs something else to track us with as we walk around every day with cellphones clutched in our hands or our pockets or our

The government has been tracking my boring life ever since I received high Secret Service clearance to cover national political campaigns back in the late 70s. Just in case you wondered, no, I don't care.

So, just when it looked like the world was open for business again, things changed. Movie theaters, arenas, stadiums, schools and restaurants were available for at least limited use as we learned the nuances of social distancing, or not.

Aside from the surges in positive Covid cases, which extended mask mandates in some areas, some unexpected things happened. When the government offered stimulus checks to individuals, many employees quit their jobs. Others showed up for work when and if they felt like it. Restaurants were forced to close or restrict menus and hours of operation because of a lack of workers. Some very popular and longtime restaurants closed their doors, for good.

Is the end in sight anytime soon? Again, let's listen to reputable local health authorities and not depend on the talking heads or the "experts" on social media. I'd say the odds of things getting back to normal are as good as the odds of the University of Nebraska Cornhusker football team winning a national championship next year. Or the Nebraska Legislature truly reforming the state's flawed tax structure.

Band-Aids aren't going to work in any of this. We can't cobble together an end to the Pandemic. Just like football and taxes, it's

going to take a Herculean effort by those in control. The football players and coaches, the elected lawmakers, the scientists and the politicians listening to - and respecting – one another.

Maybe that's a lesson we can learn from this never-ending, controversial, frustrating public health event. Let's listen and respect.

root growth and tree establishment. **Instigating Decay** 

The tree trunk has evolved to be in sunlight and air, not in the humid environment of a mulch pile. Mulch volcanoes promote decay of tree bark, the protective layer of the tree. Eventually, the decay extends beyond the bark to the tree's conductive tissues, interfering with water transport and tree stability.

It's easy to properly mulch trees. A 2-4-inch layer of wood chips or shredded bark should extend to the tree's dripline. No mulch should come in direct contact of the tree trunk itself, instead giving 2-3-inches of mulch-free breathing space for the trunk. These materials will decay over time, necessitating the application of more mulch to maintain the 2-4-inch depth. This keeps down weeds and promotes a good root-growing environment for tree establishment and health.

The just completed fall season was a glorious one with an extended rainbow explosion of vibrant colors. It's one of nature's displays that is hard to miss and very easy to enjoy. It's no wonder we might feel a bit let down when the dramatic show is over and "gloomy"

Yet a skilled observer with a keen eye and appreciation for subtle beauty knows nature's wondrous show continues after that last colorful leaf has fallen. Although the ongoing show may be elusive, faint, or fleeting, it can also be quite profound. Developing the skill to look deeper, longer, or more closely, to see and appreciate this type of beauty is very rewarding; best of all it pulls the curtain back on a whole new world of

Where can it be found? It's actually all around us and very accessible. Here are just a few examples:

Plants-beyond flowers and fall color. Plants offer a wide range of attractive and interesting characteristics beyond their relatively brief show of flowers or fall color. The picturesque structure of an old bur oak or Kentucky coffeetree, the unique bark of the river birch or the sycamore, the persistent fruit of a crabapple or viburnum, or the lingering and interesting seed heads of many ornamental grasses and perennials can be quite appealing and are best viewed in the winter months. These are just a few examples of the underappreciated beauty offered by plants. It seems the deeper and more closely one looks the more appealing and amazing plants become.

Birds. There may be fewer birds who spend their winters with us, but because leaves have fallen, our feathered friends are much easier to see and appreciate. Of course, flashy cardinals and blue jays clearly and sparrows are more visible and attractive against a backdrop of snow. Whether in the wild, your neighborhood, or at the birdfeeder outside your window, birds are always available to be noticed and admired. Other animals are also easier to spot and enjoy after leaf drop. And after a light snow it's fun to check for tracks to discover which wildlife visitors secretly visited and

Weather. I know, many of us in the Midwest "hate" winter weather, but if we are open and looking for beauty, there is a lot to see. It's hard to dispute the magical appeal of a fresh blanket of snow or a thick coat of hoarfrost. And if you get a chance to closely examine individual snowflakes or the patterns of frost on a window, the geometric intricacy is amazing to behold. Taking a moment to notice and be grateful for these natural wonders lifts the spirits and just might make it easier to handle the scooping or travel hassless that may follow.

Photography. Great photographers have a tremendous ability to find subtle beauty in nature, and Nebraska is lucky to have two of the best nature photographers in Joel Sartore and Michael Forsberg. Some of their most appealing images are of everyday things or scenes, simply from a different perspective. Their photos are clearly wonderful to enjoy by themselves, but they can also be a great source of inspiration of how to look for nature's charm in less obvious places.

Growing the skills of perception and awareness to find and appreciate subtle beauty may take a bit of effort, but the payoff is well worth it. Instead of only enjoying a glorious show a few times a year, you can savor something from nature almost every time and everywhere you look.

Grazing corn residue benefits both cattle and crop producers. Corn residue should be viewed as an economical source of winter roughage for cattle that can provide an extra source of income from corn production that does not affect next year's crop production.

### approves variance applications

Landowners within the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) boundaries recently had an opportunity to apply for new irrigated acres. The LENRD board has the responsibility to develop, manage, and conserve our groundwater. Each year they look at ways to assist landowners in protecting the resource for their livelihood and that of future generations.

At their November meeting, the LENRD board voted to allow up to 292 acre-feet of new peak season streamflow depletions for the LENRD's hydrologically connected (10/50 Area), which calculates to approximately 2,782.10 new groundwater irrigated acres. The board also voted to allow for the development of 2,542.15 new irrigated acres in the LENRD's non-hydrologically connected (Non 10/50 Area). An approved variance from the district is required to expand groundwater irrigated acres either from an existing well, or a newly constructed well.

LENRD Assistant Manager Brian Bruckner said, "The variance applications are evaluated using the district's scoring and ranking process which evaluates several factors, and provides a transparent process from which approvals are determined. The LENRD is committed to working with producers to expand acres while continuing to protect our groundwater for the fu-

Staff will be contacting the landowners in writing, for both approved and non-approved applications. After the landowners have been properly notified, the approved list will be made available by submitting a public records request to the district.

In other action, the board approved eight Community Forestry Incentive Program applications for a total cost of \$31,795.13. The com-

munities receiving grants to remove and plant trees this year are Beemer, Norfolk, Oakland, Randolph, Wausa, West Point, West Point Schools, and Wisner.

LENRD Natural Resources Conservation Technician Todd Stewart said, "If you need trees for your community, your acreage, or your backyard, give me a call, I'd be happy to come out and help design your project." Conservation tree order forms are now available at the LENRD office, your local NRCS office, and online at lenrd org.

The LENRD board and staff meet each month to develop and implement programs to protect our natural resources.

#### Producers should test before feeding corn stalk bales

By Ben Beckman, Extension Educator

Corn stalk bales will provide

much needed feed this winter for many producers. If you're one of them, be sure to feed them effec-Baled corn stalks are a great feed

option to consider, especially with the current high price of hay. However, before you feed those bales, find out what they have to offer nutritionally. Sample and test your bales as soon as possible so when snow gets deep or other feeds run out you will already know how to best feed your corn stalk bales.

Begin by testing the bales for protein and energy. You may be surprised at how variable the protein and energy content can be in corn stalk bales. I've seen protein as low as 3 percent and as high as 7 percent. Dry pregnant cows need 7 to 8 percent protein in their diet so high protein bales will need only

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care for the cows. But those 3 percent bales will need quite a bit of supplement to keep cows in good

Use a protein supplement that is nearly all natural and has sufficient rumen degradable protein. Maintenance-level forage diets need degradable protein for the rumen microbes, but remember that urea and other non-protein nitrogen sources aren't used as well.

Many bales have pretty good TDN (total digestible nutrients) levels, nearly 60 percent. Cows fed these bales should do very well up until calving with just corn stalk bales and adequate protein supplement. However, stalks that were weathered before baling can be
