## Interlocal agreement, insurance, negotiations on board agenda

New leadership was elected to start the Wayne Community School's Board of Education meeting on Monday.

Dr. Jodi Pulfer will now serve as board president. She replaces Dr. Jeryl Nelson, who held the position last year.

Also during the annual board organization portion of the meeting, Jaime Manz was elected vice president; Deb Daum was appointed recording secretary and Mary Jean Roberson was appointed treasurer.

Board members then listened to a presentation by Stuart Clark and Bill Heinemann with ESU #1. The local ESU works with 23 schools in this portion of the state and provides a number of services to the districts.

"We keep track of the costs of these services and ways to keep them down," Clark said.

Information was shared on the Special Education contract the school has with the ESU and how each year's projections are determined.

"We want to make sure we are doing what you (Wayne Community Schools) need," Heinemann said.

The board will take action on the contract at its February meeting.

In other action, the board voted to move forward with an interlocal agreement with the City of Wayne.

The agreement will allow the city to work toward putting a sales tax asking on the May primary election ballot. The tax would be used for the Wayne Community Activity Center Project and Improvement.

Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan explained the school's responsibilities with

the agreement. This would involve having a committee with three representatives from the school meet at least once per year during the 10 year agreement. There could possibly be some land shift from the school to the city and from the city to the school, but the exact details have not been finalized.

Board member Lynn Junck said "it is still open-ended on what it will look like and there needed to be some discussion on what it will look like. This is not going to be under our control."

Board member Justin Davis said he felt this "is an important partnership" and Dr. Pulfer said "it doesn't cost us (the school district) anything."

Board members voted to authorize the superintendent to execute the documents necessary for Wayne Community Schools to enroll in the Educator Health Alliance/Blue Cross Blue Shield Health and Dental Insurance (EHA/BCBS)

The district has been with ETNA (formerly Coventry) insurance for a number of years and insurance questions have been handled by Steve Muir with the Elkhorn Valley Agency.

However, due to rising costs with the company, the district reached out to EHA/BCBS and worked with a negotiation team to arrive at better rates for the district's health and dental insurance.

Prior to reaching this agreement with EHA/BCBS, Wayne Community Schools was one of only four schools in the state that did not have coverage with the company.

Superintendent Lenihan explained to the board some of the changes that will take place with the new coverage, along

with a number of similarities.

Board members also expressed their appreciation to Steve Muir for all the work he has done in regard to handling insurance questions over the years.

Approval was given for the negotiated agreement with the Wayne Education Association for the 2022-2023 school year.

Members of the board's Negotiations committee said the process went well. The agreement calls for a \$600 increase in the base salary, bringing it to \$38,000. With insurance coverage, the total compensation package includes a 2.715 percent increase.

The 2022-2023 School Calendar was approved.

Dr. Lenihan told the board that he had worked to make some changes to allow school to start one week later than originally projected. He said that the goal with developing each year's calendar is to have the semesters have a nearly equal number of days. Generally, the second semester is slightly longer than the first and this will be the case in 2022-2023 with eight extra days in the second semester.

The calendar calls for school to start for students on Aug. 17. Classes will dismiss for the Christmas holiday on Dec. 22 and resume on Jan. 4, 2023.

During Administrative reports, Dr. Lenihan presented an update on the Strategic Planning process. He said that the administration and board will have a chance to review a summary of the findings and a needs assessment will be the next step in the process.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, Feb. 14 at 5 p.m. in the junior-senior library.

## Wayne Public Library to host a 'Tech and Toys' Pop-Up event

Wayne Public Library recently applied for and received the 2022 ARPA Youth Grant for Excellence to expand their collection of educational toys and add more STEAM-specific toys for in-house use in the Children's Room.

STEAM is an educational approach to learning that uses Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts, and Mathemat-

ics as access points for guiding student inquiry, dialogue, and critical thinking.

The library was granted \$650 in funding and purchased a variety of new toys such as Snap Circuits, sorting games, Keva Brain Builders, and more.

"One of the most exciting additions to the toy collection is Cubetto: a friendly wooden robot that will teach your child the basics

of computer programming through adventure and hands-on play," said Sharon Carr, Adult Services Librarian.

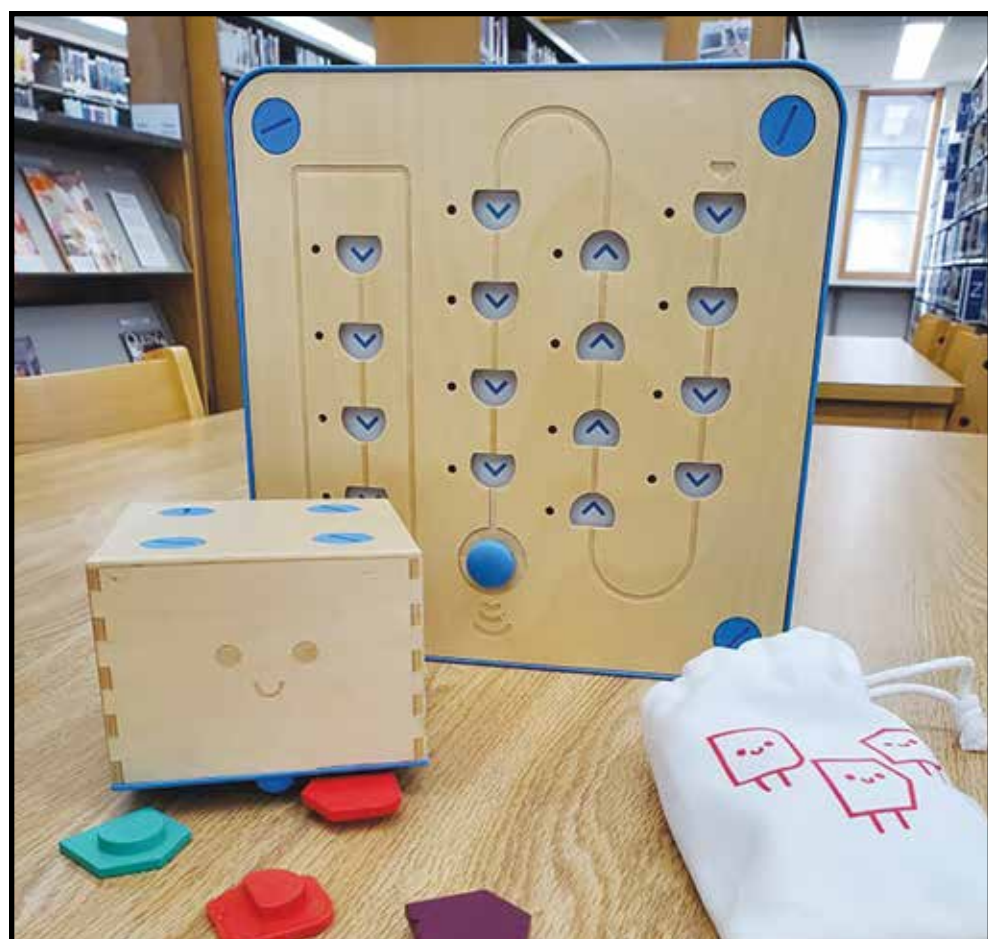
Through a competitive grant process, the Nebraska Library Commission made this funding available specifically for innovative projects for children and young adults in legally established public libraries, tribal libraries, and institutional libraries in Nebraska.

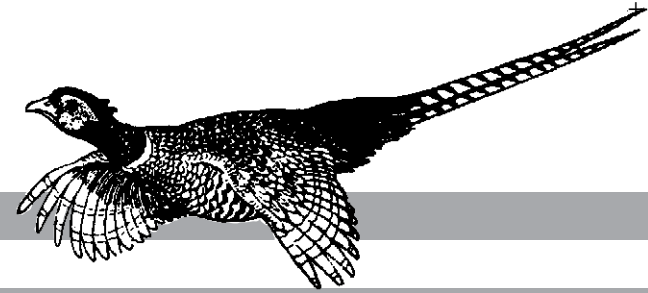

# Capitol View

## They're back with a lot on the table for a short session

Amid continuing Capitol remodeling and a lingering Covid-19 pandemic, lawmakers have returned to Lincoln for the Second Session of the 107th Legislature.

The so-called short session (60 days) will be long on workload, political intrigue and philosophical debate. There are 490 bills and 33 Legislative Resolutions carried over from the first session. Twelve of those resolutions call for proposed Constitutional Amendments, which could be on the November general election ballot. All of this is in addition to new proposals, which can be introduced during the first 10 days of the current session.

There are 12 senators who will be term-limited at the end of the session. Several of them are running for other offices including county attorney, county clerk, U.S. House of Representatives, University of Nebraska Regent and Governor. Expect the most vocal of that group to go out with a verbal bang while the candidates for other offices may be more measured in their remarks.

Governor Pete Ricketts is also term limited. While he's not an announced candidate for another job, expect some rhetoric that might make it seem he has higher aspirations. There's long been speculation that he wants to be President of the United States. Let that one sink in.

Term limited Sen. Brett Lindstrom of Omaha is one of six Republicans seeking the gubernatorial nomination. Sen. Carol Blood of Omaha, who is in her second term, is seeking the Democratic nod for that office. Former Sen. Theresa Thibodeaux of Omaha is also seeking the GOP nod.

Sen. Patty Pansing-Brooks of Lincoln, also term limited, is seeking the Democratic nomination for the Congressional seat currently held by Republican Jeff Fortenberry of Lincoln.

Tony Vargas of Omaha, in his second term, is seeking the Democratic Congressional nod in the Omaha District represented by Republican Don Bacon.

Term limited Sen. Matt Williams of Gothenburg is seeking the Regent's position being vacated by Bob Phares of North Platte. Williams is a Republican in the nonpartisan race. One of the GOP gubernatorial candidates, Jim Pillen of Columbus, is also a Regent.

Sen. Adam Morfield of Lincoln, a Democrat, is running for Lancaster County Attorney. Sen. Matt Hansen of Lincoln, also a Democrat, is running for Lancaster County Clerk. Both men are term limited.

Other state senators in their final year are: Curt Friesen of Henderson; Mike Groene of North Platte; Dan Hughes of Venango; Robert Hilkemann of Omaha; Mark Kolterman of Seward; John McCollister of Omaha and John Stinner of Gering.

Expect senators to air philosophical differences on the spending of pandemic relief funds, prisons and



an overhaul of the state's tax system. The governor has made it clear that he doesn't want new or unsustainable programs to use the anticipated \$10 billion in relief funds. Prison debate centers of building a new prison or reforming the system to better prepare inmates for successful release and provide alternatives to incarceration. Nebraska has now surpassed Alabama as the most crowded state prison system in the United States. Based on data at the end of 2020, Nebraska's prisons held 5,250 inmates or 48.5 percent more than the system was designed to hold. Alabama was 46 percent above capacity.

I favor an emphasis on sentencing policy, release policy and supervision and support after release.

Tax reform is the longshot. It's an issue that could clearly eat up a regular session and, in my opinion, would best be dealt with through statewide hearings during the interim and an independent committee to recommend specific proposals to the next Legislature. Recent sessions have spent considerable time just hammering out acceptable changes to the property tax part of the overall system.

Welcome back senators. We're watching!

## Ice safety information provided by Wayne Izaak Walton League

The Wayne Izaak Walton League chapter will be providing periodic Ice Depth information for this area, along with a tips on ice safety, ice fishing, and other winter-related items.

The ice depths vary at the Wayne Izaak Walton Lake, located northwest of Wayne, but is generally six inches or more.

Ice needs to be at least four inches thick to reliably support the weight of the average adult — if it's new, clear ice. Double that thickness is needed if the ice is old or white.

Those interested in getting started ice fishing will need 5-6 items to begin and "it can be a lot of fun on a sunny day in the winter."

Generally anglers will need some of these items:

- Ice Auger for drilling holes;
- Ice Suit or warm layered clothes;
- Portable fish hut if windy or cold;
- Riggings, whether it be a simple ice fishing rod or tip-ups;
- Bait: soft plastic bait, smaller is better for fishing in colder temps or Wax worms;
- Electronics: Optional but helpful.

# State colleges grow enrollment

The Chadron, Peru, and Wayne State Colleges increased their fall enrollments by seven percent since originally announcing the preliminary enrollment numbers in early

September.

The Nebraska State Colleges' overall student enrollment (8,774) is the largest headcount since 2016. The increase in enrollments at the

State Colleges is bucking the national trend of enrollment decreases. According to the National Student Clearinghouse release, undergraduate enrollment has declined 3.5 per-

cent so far for Fall 2021 and nearly eight percent since Fall 2019 across the country.

"Enrollment growth does not happen by chance, but is instead the result of the commitment of the staff at Chadron, Peru, and Wayne State Colleges," said Dr. Paul Turman, Chancellor of the Nebraska State College System (NSCS). "We are pleased with our progress but remain focused on the importance of continued growth and our mission of providing high-quality, affordable, and accessible four-year degree opportunities to all. The steady progress in enrollment growth made over the past three years will assist us in meeting the goal of serving 9,000 students by 2025."

The updated 2025 Strategic Plan, released at the beginning of the year, demonstrates the NSCS is making progress toward achieving its goals despite the challenges presented by the pandemic. Specific highlights from the update include:

The placement of State College students continues to be one of the highest in the region, especially for the Nebraska residents. This past year more than 85% of the Nebraska residents who graduated from Chadron, Peru, and Wayne State were employed in Nebraska one year after graduation.

Support from the Governor and Legislature allowed the Board of Trustees to freeze tuition for 2021-22, ensuring continued affordable access to high-quality educational opportunities for Nebraska residents. As the NSCS prepares for the upcoming Legislative Session, continued support of the State Colleges by the Governor and Legislature during the upcoming session will positively impact our students and enable Chadron, Peru, and Wayne State to continue to play a vital role in building Nebraska's future workforce.

The Fall Enrollment report provides an overall picture of student enrollment across the Nebraska State Colleges.

The report is based upon data as of Oct. 15 and is consistent with the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDs) submissions and definitions to the extent possible.

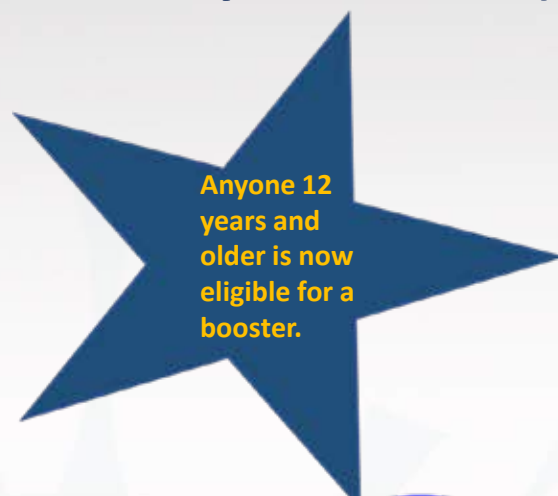

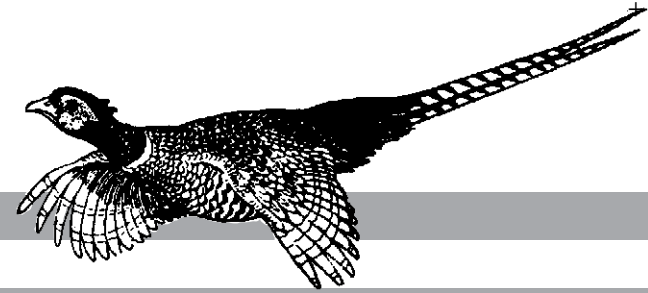

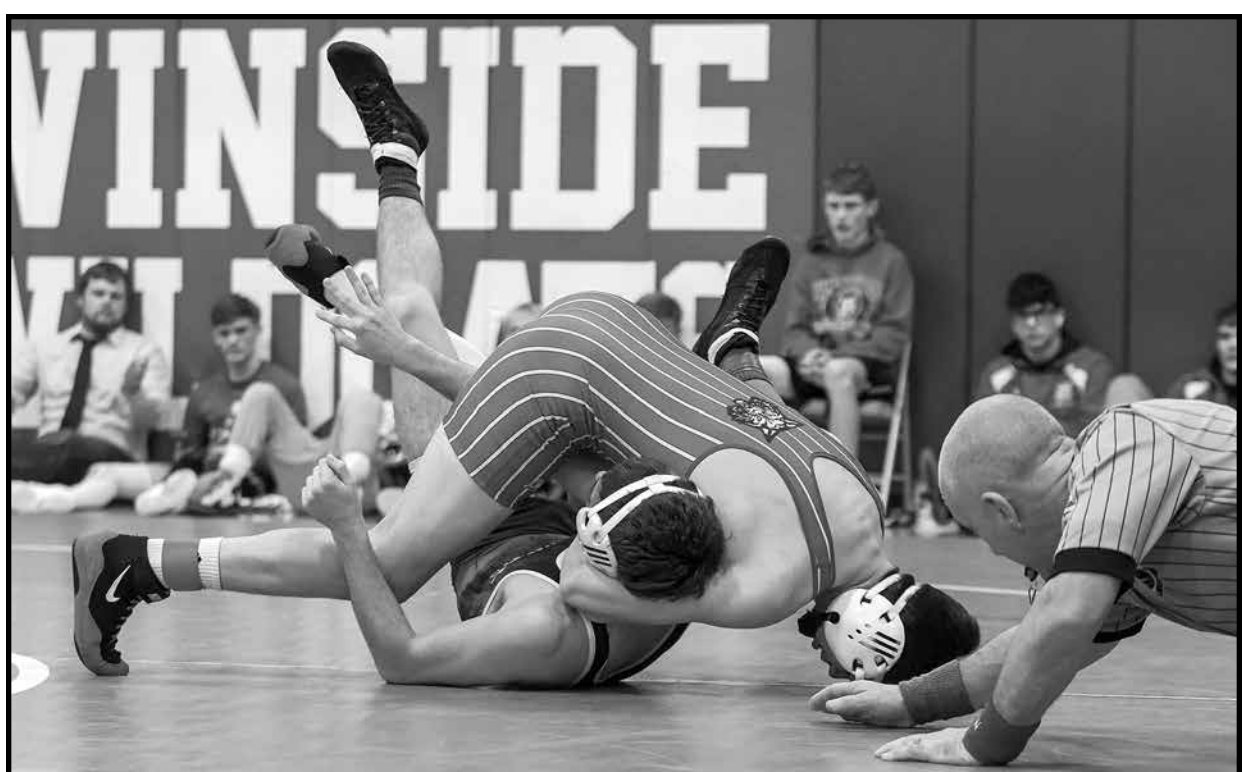

# Wildcat men handle Wolves, women fall short

Wayne State picked up a split with Northern State in NSIC basketball action Friday at Rice Auditorium.

In men's action, Wayne State used 20 points and seven rebounds from redshirt freshman guard Justin Eagins while holding Northern State to just 39 percent shooting to post a 69-53 win over the Wolves.



The first half was close early until a late scoring surge by WSC in the first half put the Wildcats in control. WSC opened with a 7-5 lead, but the visiting Wolves reeled off the next 10 points and took a 15-10 lead at the 11:14 mark of the first half.

Northern State was still in front 22-19 at the 4:40 mark when the Wildcats went on a 10-0 run over the next 2:42 and the 'Cats took a 29-22 lead on a Cody McCullough tip in with 1:58 left before halftime as WSC closed the half with a 33-24 advantage.

The Wildcats took their first double-digit lead of the second half at 37-27 following a Justin Eagins fast break layup and the 'Cats pushed the lead to 12 at 44-32 on an Alec Millender trey.

Northern State rallied and closed to within five at 48-43 with 10:27 to play, but WSC scored the next seven points and pushed the lead back to double digits at 55-43 with 7:51 left on a Sean Stokes 3-pointer.

The Wolves made one more run at the Wildcats and got as close as six at 55-49, but WSC used a pair of Eagins free throws and a Millender 3-pointer and went in front 60-49 and pulled away for the 69-53 victory.

Eagins led WSC in scoring with 20 points. Jordan Janssen added 12 and Millender finished with 11.

In women's play, the Wildcats dropped a 64-53 decision to Northern State.

The Wolves dominated the first quarter, jumping out to a five point advantage going into the first media timeout 10-5. Northern State ended the first period up 23-9.

Wayne State flipped the script in the second, cutting the deficit to

Kassidy Pingel used a pair of made free throws to cut Northern State's lead to just two before the Wolves answered with a couple buckets to push the lead back to seven, 37-30. Wayne State weathered the storm, and equaled the 13 points put up by Northern State in the period, heading into the final quarter trailing 45-41.

The Wolves pushed the lead to double digits heading into a timeout with 8:11 remaining in the contest. Northern State held off the Wildcats the rest of the way as Wayne was not able to get closer than six points the rest of the contest.

The 'Cats were led by Hughes who tied a career high with 20 points, making 4-8 3-pointers. Lauren Zacharias added 11 points and nine rebounds, while Pingel grabbed seven boards.

Saturday matchups with MSU Moorhead were called off due to COVID protocols with the Dragons. The Wildcat teams travel north to face University of Mary on Friday and Minot State on Saturday.

# Landscape tips, resolutions offered for your yard expectations

Did your yard meet your expectations last year? For most of us, and almost every year, not entirely. Did you enjoy being out in it? For most of us a big "yes," — we can hardly imagine not having a green landscape around us.

Still, if there's a way to work less and enjoy more, we're all in. Here's a few things some of us who have been gardening a very long time (i.e. we've killed more plants than you) are resolving to do this year.

Making sure trees and shrubs are mulched around the base, possibly in the form of the living mulch of lower-growing plants, eliminates or reduces damage from mowers and string trimmers, reduces competition with turf for water, stabilizes temperature extremes, inhibits weed germination, conserves moisture and usually looks better too.

Creating cleaner lines or edges to further define lawn or flower beds. Clean edges make the whole landscape look better. Whether that's a mown path or us-

ing logs to outline flower beds or pathways (they can be rolled aside to mow and they're quick, cheap and easily movable markers to make the landscape look a little more "planned").

Paying more attention to how much or little we're watering. Placing a rain gauge where the sprinkler is hitting can let us know exactly how much plants are being watered. It's especially helpful for trees and shrubs that give less immediate notice of too much or little moisture.

Saving and using organic matter whenever we're working the soil. It doesn't have to be a huge project, it can become part of normal activities to add a shovelful of leaves, clippings or kitchen waste when we're planting. Gradually, it will make the soil richer and easier to work. And composting doesn't have to be complicated. Just dig a hole out of sight, put in kitchen or other waste, add some water and cover it with soil. Moisture and worms will break it down within weeks.

Trench composting is much faster than dry, above-ground methods and it can be done almost year-round except when soil is frozen hard mid-winter.

Giving more thought to what we're planting. For trees and shrubs, natives and edibles, the longer-lived the plant the more care should go into selecting the right one for the right site.

Leaving some wild areas on the edges for a little less maintenance, more biodiversity and habitat for pollinators and other wildlife.

Figuring out which weeds are most problematic in our yards and relaxing about them more. There will always be weeds. Some are temporary while others are problematic and best controlled early on. If there's large areas of them, smothering them for a season with a layer of cardboard covered with mulch might be the easiest way to get them under control.

Spreading a tarp when we're weeding or doing other cleanup makes the mess easier to haul away; no rak-

ing or picking up when we're done. And for those of us who tend to lose small tools in the chaos of weeding or pruning, spraying bright handles on small tools makes them easier to find.

Thinking more about the visitors we want to invite in. If that's neighbors, plan a shady spot with seating and places to set the lemonade. If it's birds and butterflies, make sure there's food and varying heights for them to land on in both sun and shade.

Enjoying our yards more. In many parts of the world, having a yard is a rare and expensive luxury. Most of us in this generous and spacious state take it for granted; appreciating the landscapes we have right now is a resolution worth making.

Reappointed to the County Board of Health were Sheriff Don Weible, chairman; Dr. Roy Matson, county physician; and County Superintendent Fred Rickers.

The commissioners voted to allocate \$500, which will be matched by a grant from Ak-Sar-Ben, for use in building and repairs at the county fairgrounds. The board also voted \$100 for dues for membership in the Northeast Nebraska Association of County Officials during 1972.

The board voted to inform State Sen. LeRoy Pfister of its support for LB 786, which would lower the county's medical welfare costs.

The County Commissioners will meet again Jan. 18, and thereafter meet every first and third Tuesdays of the month. Jan. 18, a public hearing will be held in the Commissioners' room at 2 p.m. Purpose of the hearing will be to present and adopt a one and six-year road improvement program.

Matilda Nelson, born in Orsia, Sweden on Jan. 20, 1882, will observe her 100th birthday this weekend at the Wakefield Health Care Center where she has resided the past two years.

All friends and relatives are invited to attend the open house reception Sunday, Jan. 17, from 2 to 4 p.m.

Hosts are her children, Lloyd and Alice Surber of Ponca, Raymond and Marilyn Nelson and Robert and Eva Nelson, all of Wayne, Leonard and Peggy Nelson of Tucson, Ariz., and Gustave Nelson of Norfolk.

There are 21 grandchildren, 54 great grandchildren, and six great great grandchildren.

Matilda, one of 10 children, is the only surviving member of her family.

She came to the United States in April of 1908 and was united in marriage in May of 1908 to Carl (Charlie) Nelson.

The Nelsons resided in Wayne County until 1912 when they returned to Sweden. Matilda came back to the United States in 1916 and made her home with her husband and family in the Winside community.

Mr. Nelson died in 1953, and Matilda continued to make her home in Winside until two years ago when she moved to the Wakefield Health Care Center.

Matilda, who speaks in both English and Swedish, recalls the 10-day boat trip in 1916 which brought she and her four small children back to the United States.

She also recalls when she was struck by lightning while living in Wayne County.

Equine activities are used as a form of therapy to achieve physical, psychological, cognitive, behavioral and communication goals for people with physical, mental and psychological impairments as well as to provide the individual with skills in the sport chosen (such as riding, driving or vaulting). The horse is a strong motivator for accomplishing these goals.

Therapeutic riding may be used as a recreation and leisure experience for disabled riders. The emphasis is on an enjoyable and relaxing experience that provides additional therapeutic benefits in the areas of socialization, posture, mobility and an overall improved quality of life.

Rainbow Riders will begin its 11th year of operation this spring. Plans are currently underway for an annual fundraiser. Volunteers are needed for the program, fundraisers, and many other aspects of the program.

### Majestic featuring free civil rights movie Sunday

The Majestic Theater and the Baha'is of Northeast Nebraska will host a special Martin Luther King Jr. Day celebration with a unique showing of Daisy Bates: First Lady of Little Rock.

Daisy Bates was a complex, unconventional, and largely forgotten heroine fo the Civil Rights movement of the early 1950s and 60s. She most famously led the effort to desegregate all-white Central High School in Little Rock, Ark., in 1957.

Bates thought she was the daughter of Orle and Susie Smith, but some neighborhood kids taunting her, leaked the town secret and told her that her mother had been sexually assaulted and murdered by three local White men. The crime went uninvestigated and unpublished, and haunted Daisy all her life.

Daisy married L.C. Bates, a much older man, in 1947. They moved to Little Rock, where they acted on L.C.'s dream and started a Black newspaper, The Arkansas State Press. The paper started publishing stories about violations of the Supreme Court's desegregation rulings, and helped the Little Rock Nine as they attempted to enroll in Little Rock Central High School. It was Daisy's job to notify all the students and their families that they were delaying the enrollment a day, but was unable to contact one girl whose family did not have a phone. She was the only one who arrived that day - alone - to enroll. Daisy said she felt guilty about that her whole life.

This intriguing and little-known woman is the subject of the Majestic Theater's free Community Theater series of one-of-a-kind documentaries. It will play this Sunday, Jan. 15, at 7 p.m. Following will be refreshments and a short discussion led by the Baha'is of Northeast Nebraska.

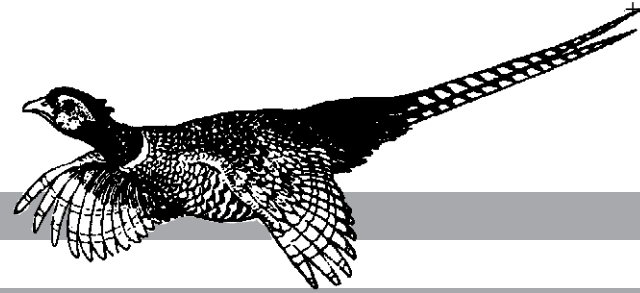

## Lupus — A wolf in sheep's clothing

Imagine a condition with symptoms that present differently in each person who has it and no currently approved lab test can definitively confirm the diagnosis.

Imagine that the symptoms can flare up and then mysteriously disappear, including fatigue, low grade fevers, joint pain, and mouth sores. All these symptoms overlap with multiple other conditions further complicating a diagnosis. Imagine that the best available method for diagnosing this ailment is a manual checklist of 11 criteria and if the patient suffers from at least four, they receive a diagnosis on a scale of definite, probable, or possible.

What if I told you this condition is caused by an attack on the body by its own immune system and the main way to treat this is by suppressing the immune system we each depend upon to help protect our bodies from infection. The course of this illness can range from mild to rapidly progressing to organ failure and death.

This condition is real and has a most appropriate name which means "the wolf" in Latin. The condition is systemic lupus erythematosus (SLE), a condition which evades diagnosis and is difficult to treat.

Lupus mainly affects women between the ages of 15 and 40, particularly women of color. For many busy young women with lupus, symptoms are often brushed off by family, friends, and unfortunately sometimes by health care providers who may view the patient as being "tired" or "over worked." Routine wellness lab tests, which serve as an alert system for other illnesses, provide no indication of lupus.

Patients who persist and find someone to further investigate their symptoms may be misdiagnosed with a myriad of other conditions sometimes resulting in unnecessary medications, treatments, and further suffering.

Work is underway to better understand lupus. The trigger that causes the immune system to start attacking itself is not known, but scientists suspect it involves a combination of genetic and environmental factors.

Research and awareness are making a difference. In the 1950s, the 5-year and 10-year survival of SLE patients was less than 50 percent. Since then, that number has improved to over 90 percent. This increase in survival rate stems from improvements in our ability to diagnosis lupus earlier and to provide better treatments once diagnosed.

But we must do better. Early diagnosis of lupus requires patients and health care providers working together to persist in finding this "wolf in sheep's clothing."

If you or a loved one has a concern about lupus or other autoimmune conditions, talk with your doctor and see if a consultation with a rheumatologist would be beneficial.
