Peterson elected president of Press Association

Kevin Peterson, publisher of the Wayne Herald, was elected president of the Nebraska Press Association, at their 2022 annual convention April 29-30, in Kearney. He succeeds Amy Johnson, publisher/editor of the Springview Herald, who will serve as immediate past-president.

Peterson first came to the Wayne Herald in December of 1987 as sports editor following graduation from Kearney State College. In 1995 Peterson began working at the Central City Republican-Nonpareil and Huskerland Prep Report under the direction of Bob Jensen.

However, a year later, then publisher of the Wayne Herald, Jim Shanks, called

him and asked him to become the managing editor of the Wayne Herald. He later became the general manager and learned about print sales and other aspects of the newspaper business.

In 2003 Peterson left Wayne and took the publisher's position at the Plattsmouth Journal.

Two years later, Peterson was contacted by Smith Newspapers, which owns the Wayne Herald, and asked to come back to Wayne as the publisher.

He has been publisher in Wayne since March of 2005. He is involved in a number of clubs and organizations in the commu-

nity including Wayne Country Club, where he serves as secretary-treasurer; Investment Club as president; Wayne Community Schools Foundation; Wayne Booster Club; Wayne High School Hall of Fame committee and the Organization Committee with the Wayne Area Economic Development office.

Kevin and his wife of 34 years, Shannon, have two children, Brittney, 28, who resides in Kansas City, Missouri and Jared, 26, who resides in Omaha.

Other officers elected were Willis Mahannah, editor of the West Point News, as vice-president; and Rob Dump, co-publisher of the Hartington Cedar Co. News, as treasurer.

Continuing their terms as board of directors of NPA are: John Erickson, publisher of the Bridgeport News-Blade; and Cody Gerlach, publisher, Cambridge Valley Voice and the Curtis Frontier Co. Enterprise.

New to the board for a three-year term is Patrick Ethridge, publisher of the Beatrice Daily Sun.

Elected to the Nebraska Press Advertising Service/OnePress are: President, Vickie Hrabanek, advertising manager of the Norfolk Daily News; and Vice-President, Marcia Hora, publisher of the Stapleton Enterprise and the Theford Thomas Co. Herald.

Continuing their terms on the board of directors of NPAS/OnePress are: Dee Klein, publisher of the North Platte Telegraph; Lynell Morgan, co-editor of the Elgin Review; and Timothy Linscott, publisher of the Fairbury Journal-News. Randy Sadd, co-publisher of the Doniphan Herald will serve as immediate past-president.

New to the board for a three-year term is Carrie Pitzer, publisher of the Orchard/Neligh Antelope Co. News, Bloomfield/Creighton Knox Co. News, and the Stanton Register.

Dennis DeRossett is executive director of both organizations.

The Nebraska Press Association membership includes 156 weekly and daily newspapers. It was founded in 1873, and will celebrate its 150th Anniversary in 2023 as Nebraska's oldest trade association. NPAS includes all of the NPA membership and was founded in 1951.

Wayne State College update, lagoon project on city council agenda

An overview of the strategic plan and a recap of the facility master plan for Wayne State College highlighted Tuesday's Wayne City Council meeting.

Wayne State President Dr. Marysz Rames spoke to the council on the strategic plan which focuses on the words "Inspire, Strengthen and Serve." She noted that this is the first time in over 10 years the plan has been updated.

She shared information on the college's goals and core values, along with providing data in regard to students served by the college.

Her second point was the facility master plan.

She discussed possible ways to "refresh the campus" and looked at two different parts of the campus.

Among the items on the list for the south

portion of the campus is Berry Hall.

"Students want suite style living, not community bathrooms. Currently Berry Hall has 305 beds. Renovating the building into suite living would reduce that number to 125 beds. We are also working on the possibility of a new residence hall that would be financed with a public/private partnership," Dr. Rames said.

She also talked about other buildings on campus that would be a part of the master plan. These include Brandenburg, Connell and the Student Center in the south portion.

Work in several areas in the north portion of the campus has already begun, including upgrades at Rice Auditorium and other athletic facilities.

"We are also focusing on safety on campus and the traffic flow through the campus and working to create outdoor spaces for our students," Dr. Rames said.

She summarized her presentation by saying "we are excited about where we are going and these plans will drive us going forward."

Considerable time was also spent during the meeting on a proposal from Olsson to work with the Stool to Cool Task Force in regard to design work for the old lagoon area.

Council member Jason Karsky, who serves on the Stool to Cool Task Force, told the council the group has looked at other projects and said developing a Master Plan is the next step to keep the project moving forward.

The cost for the plan is \$28,650 and will include a 3-D plan rather than working off overhead maps. This is important, as there are significant grade changes in the area.

It is anticipated this process will take 8-10 weeks.

Council members also talked about a sec-

ond phase to the process, a grading plan.

Preliminary cost estimates for this phase are \$20,000. This item will be brought before the council at a future meeting.

Also on Tuesday's agenda was a public hearing and resolution in regard to an application for a Class Z (Micro Distiller) Liquor License for Johnnie Byrd Brewing Company.

Greg Ptacek, owner of Johnnie Byrd Brewing spoke to the council on the process the business has gone through in the five years the company has been in business. He explained that he had purchased a still and gone through the process of getting licensed by the state.

The license will allow for the production of vodka, gin, rum and whiskey.

Council members approved the resolution for the license.

Approval was also given for a liquor license manager application for Joshua C. Sievers for Wayne Hospitality Group, LLC, dba Cobblestone Hotel.

Sievers told the council he has been on the Cobblestone license in the past and has recently returned to the community.

A public hearing was also a Community Development Block Grant for owner-occupied rehab funds in the amount of \$315,000, which will go toward owner-occupied rehab of 10 units (\$250,000); general administration (\$20,000); housing management (\$30,000) and lead based paint abatement (\$1,500).

Following the hearing, the council voted unanimously to appoint the NED, Inc. board to evaluate applicants.

The grant funding will benefit low- to moderate-income persons in the community.

The Wayne City Council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, May 17 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

Possible art display discussed at recent meeting

At Tuesday's meeting, the Wayne County Commissioners took action on several proposals.

The Board of Equalization approved motor vehicle exemption applications for Grace Lutheran Church, Haven House, Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department, Our Savior Lutheran Church, and Wayne State Foundation before the Board of Commissioners meeting.

Luke Virgil, Executive Director of Wayne Area Economic Development, presented the possibility of displaying a piece of art on the courthouse property for the 2022-2023 Wayne Sculpture Walk. In 2020, the City of Wayne financed public art and started with a mural on the side of the Majestic Theatre. In 2021, an Art Sculpture Walk with 10 different art pieces placed down Main Street. Virgil explains that two new sculptures are going to be added to make up a total of 12 pieces. They are going to add a plaque and QR code to the sculptures so anyone can scan the code to learn more about the sculpture and artist themselves while being voiced by said artist. The Commissioners approved the proposal and will have a smaller concrete pad installed by the city crew to place the art on as long

as the piece does not interfere with the irrigation line of the area. The piece will be done by local artist Steven Elliot, Vice President for Academic Affairs at Wayne State College.

Next, Wayne County Emergency Manager Nic Kemnitz presented the Elkhorn Valley Local Emergency Planning Committee Hazardous Materials Emergency Response Plan. The Commissioners approved of the plan. Kemnitz also discussed the Wildland Fire training that he received recently and plans to complete an Introduction to Wildland Fire Behavior and Firefighter Training courses. He asked the Commissioners for permission to purchase an Anchor 'New Generation' Fire Shelter for \$625 through Danko Emergency Equipment with funds from the Emergency Management budget. This fire shelter is a one-time use piece of equipment that offers increased protection from radiant and convective heat in wildland firefighter entrapment situations.

The Commissioners approved a temporary two-week Class I Liquor License Application for Ben Hogans Heroes LLC for the Logan Valley Golf Course in Wakefield during the meeting.

Then, Commissioner Dean Burbach and the Safety Committee, along with Pat Brentlinger, custodian/maintenance

department, talked about Automated Extended Defibrillators for the courthouse, public safety building, county attorney office and three county shops. They are looking into purchasing six AEDs which are the same as the six in each of the sheriff department cruisers. Burbach also talked about putting storm shelters at the Carroll and Winside county shops. The shelters would be a 7-ton, portable concrete tornado shelter and will be above ground.

The Commissioners rediscussed the truck bids that were made at the previous meeting because they had to reject the bid from Cornhusker due to not meeting specs. They approved the next bid from Custom Body being a Kenworth for one truck at \$187,950 with a 'Fat Boy' kit and will rebid in June for a second truck.

Brentlinger came back to talk about the courthouse windows with the Commissioners. He stated there are currently 12 windows that are in need of replacement. The Commissioners will look to get in touch with an architect before pursuing further with the courthouse windows being updated.

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, May 17 at 9 a.m. in the Wayne County Courthouse.

This year's class has chosen "Started at the bottom, now we're here" as the class motto. Class colors are black, white and orange and the class flower is the orange tulip.

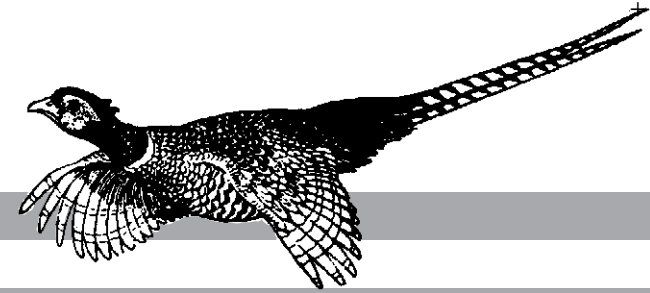
At Wayne Community Schools there are 73 students in the class of 2022.

Wayne's Advanced class car A22 competed in five events, earning points towards the overall award.

Maneuverability - 125' slalom course where the car makes a run through the cones, turns around and comes back through. Time from two runs are averaged, and the fastest time wins. 100 points possible

Braking - Braking efficiency is measured by how quickly the car can stop from 15MH. 100 points possible

Design and Construction - Cars are judged on a variety of design criteria and quality of construction. 100 points possible

Documentation - Students create a written journal about the car, the student's involvement in the project, and what they have learned. 300 points possible

Endurance - Cars race in a 90 minute rally to see which travels the furthest. 600 points possible

Overall - Points are added up from events to determine the winner, similar to a team score at a track meet.

Advanced class car A22 received the following awards: (Driven by Brett Johnson)

- First Place - Maneuverability
- First Place - Braking
- First Place - Design and Construction

- First Place - Documentation (created by Brett Johnson, Nina Hammer)
- First Place - Endurance
- Best Paint
- First Place - Overall - State Champion

A22 was the only car to finish the 90 minute rally, as all others had mechanical problems, or ran low on power.

Exhibition class cars compete only in the endurance event.

Wayne's Exhibition class car E39 received the following awards: (Driven by Matthew Kufner-Rodriguez)

- Highest Season Mileage - 133.16 miles completed with a 8.43 mile lead.

A total of nine awards were won at the Championships - all first places. Two State Championships were won, making the 10th and 11th State Championship in Blue Devil history.

Ground broken for Growing Together Career Scholars housing in Norfolk

Wayne State College, along with DEG Enterprises and DACO Construction, broke ground for the Norfolk Student Housing development for the Growing Together Career Scholars program in Norfolk.

The housing units will support Wayne State's career scholars, who will live in downtown Norfolk their senior year as they perform two semesters of cooperative education with an employer. WSC's first cohort of students will arrive in Norfolk in fall 2023.

Speakers at the event included Wayne State President Marysz Rames, State Senator Mike Flood, Dan and Connie Geary of DEG Enterprises and DACO Construction, and Norfolk Mayor Josh Moenning. The speakers were joined for the actual breaking of the ground by Aksarben Foundation President Sandra Reding, Michael Keibler, executive director of cooperative education at Wayne State, Steven Elliott, vice president for academic affairs at Wayne State, and Angie Stenger, executive director of Northeast Nebraska Growing Together.

Rames kicked off the event by expressing appreciation for Flood's leadership with the Growing To-

gether initiative and Sandra Reding's efforts with the Aksarben Foundation to secure funding for scholarships for the first 30 students in the program.

"This effort has also involved a wide variety of stakeholders from the committee that worked with the RFP process to the city leadership that assisted with securing the TIF and of course the Geary family, Connie and Dan, who have stepped up to the plate to serve as the developer," Rames said. "Without their leadership, vision, and passion for Norfolk this project would not be moving forward. On behalf of the Wildcat family, we thank you for taking a leap of faith and being our partner on this housing project, which is a central piece of the coop program. I am thrilled that Wayne State is able to deliver the cooperative education program to Norfolk."

Flood celebrated the Growing Together Career Scholars students who were at the event, Dan and Connie Geary for their work supporting the project and the city's vision for redevelopment, Mayor Moenning, Aksarben for the organization's financial support of the students, and the Norfolk City Council.

"This really is a community project," Flood said. "People are now looking to leadership in Norfolk to help grow their own cities. This project could not be in better hands than with the Gearys. If every community had a couple like this, it would be amazing."

The student housing for Wayne State students will be built in the new Block One River Addition in Norfolk, with anticipated move-in ready date of July 2023. Dan and Connie Geary, owners of the property, are planning to develop the property in three phases.

The student housing, with an anticipated cost of \$3.6 million, is part of phase one and will be the focus for their first buildout on the property, portions of infrastructure will be built shortly thereafter, followed by other units for food, retail shops, and housing. The student housing units will be built by their property management company, Geary In-

vestment Company. General Contractor for the project will be DACO Construction Company, Inc.

"We believe in this project and the Career Scholars program," Dan Geary said. "We have chosen a Mid Century Modern look for the student buildings. Senator Flood has referred to the look as West Coast, which, yes, that description fits the look very well. However, much of our design inspiration is drawn from our local downtown architecture. We are so very excited to get started on these new homes for the Wayne State Growing Together students, who will soon be part of our community."

"I have walked this area frequently and long imagined what could be done with this space," Mayor Moenning said of the area to be developed for the student housing. "Now, with this project, we are going back to the history of Norfolk along the river."

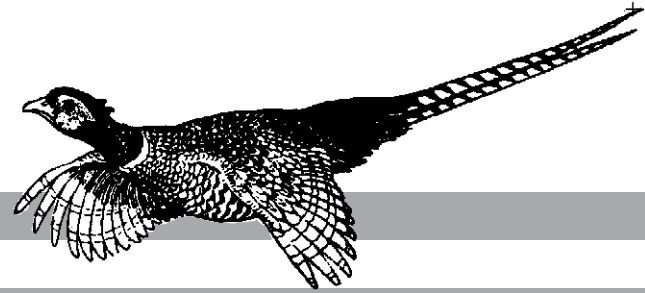

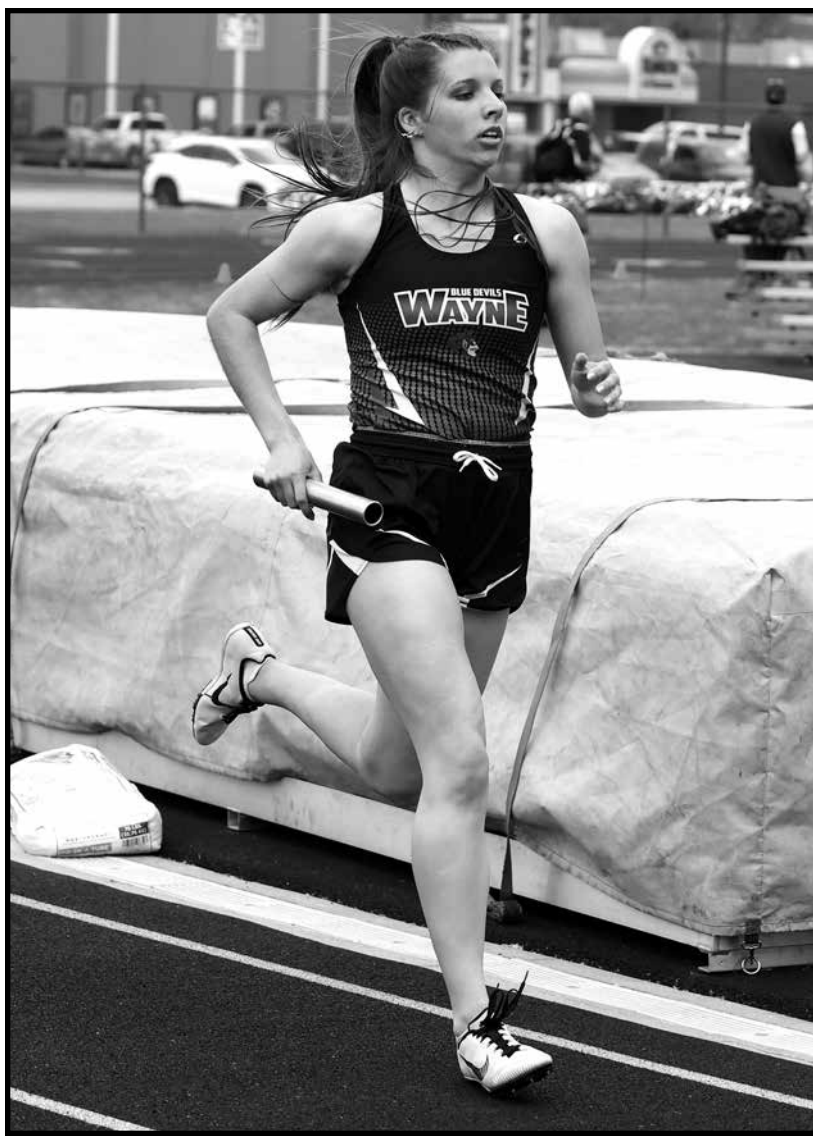

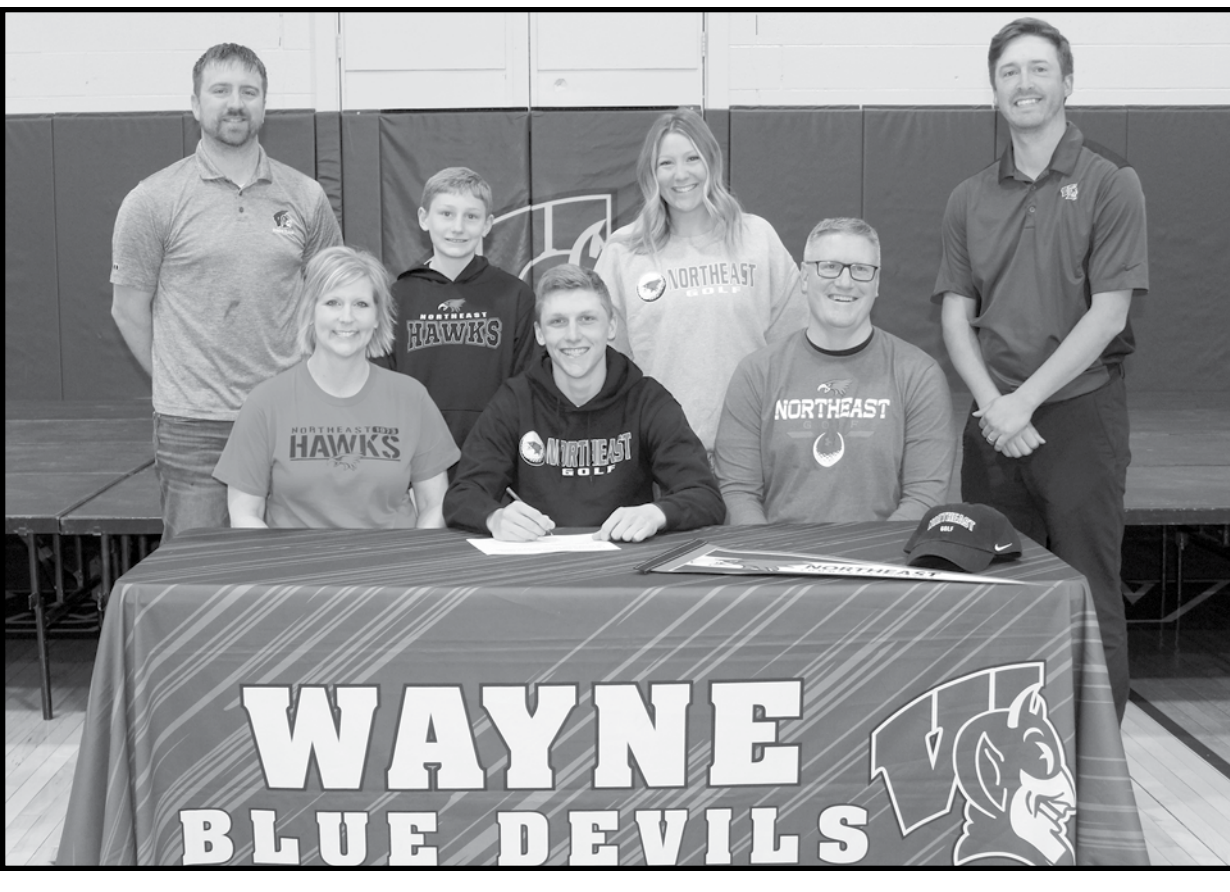

Wildcat softball drops final doubleheaders

The Wayne State softball team ended the regular season with losses in their final two doubleheaders of the season, but did qualify for the Northern Sun Conference tournament by finishing 10th in the 16-team league.

The Wayne State Wildcat softball team fell in both games of an NSIC doubleheader on Senior Day to St. Cloud State 11-0 and 6-5 at the Pete Chapman Softball Complex in Wayne Sunday afternoon.

The Huskies started off the first game strong, scoring three runs on three hits in the first inning, holding a 3-0 lead after one inning.

Wayne State used a two-out single from junior Paiton Tornberg and an error from the Huskies to put runners at first and second before coming up empty.

Wayne State again had runners at first and second in the bottom of the third, but failed to score. Junior Riley Holmberg hit a single before senior Kim Vidlak was hit by a pitch, but a fly out ended the Wildcat scoring opportunity.

Senior Kortney Buresh hit a two-out single in the bottom of the fifth, but came up empty as St. Cloud State took the first game in five innings.

All three of Wayne State's hits in

the game came with two outs, with Buresh, Holmberg and Tornberg recording hits in the contest. Sophomore starting pitcher Callie Carraher (4-5) got tagged with the loss for the Wildcats, throwing three innings allowing seven runs (six earned) with four strikeouts.

The second game saw St. Cloud State rally with five runs in the final two innings, then hold off a Wildcat rally in the bottom of the seventh to complete the sweep.

Buresh led off the Wildcats first inning with a walk before a Holmberg single put runners at first and second with nobody out. A passed ball moved the runners to second and third. Vidlak reached on a fielder's choice by the shortstop, who decided to try to make the out at home. Buresh was able to slide in under the tag and Wayne State opened the scoring taking a 1-0 lead through the first.

In the top of the fourth, a couple of hits and a Wildcat error allowed St. Cloud State to knot the score at 1-1, but Wayne State answered in the bottom of the frame when Tornberg led off the inning with a single with sophomore Abby Husing coming in to pinch run for the 'Cats. Sophomore Mary Krystofiak hit a single to put runners at first and second with no outs. Wayne State used a double steal to move both runners into scoring position. An RBI groundout from freshman Alle Perea broke the tie, retaking the lead for WSC. Emily Hale added another run for the 'Cats, forcing the Huskies to settle for an out at first that scored Krystofiak making the score 3-1 in favor of Wayne State after four innings.

St. Cloud State responded with three runs on three hits in the top of the sixth, to take the lead 4-3 heading into the final frame. The Huskies added two more runs in the top of the seventh, moving their lead to 6-3.

Holmberg reached on a Husky error and advanced to third on a Vidlak double. Holmberg and Vidlak would both come around to score on a pair or groundouts, but the WSC rally fell just short. St. Cloud State took the second game.

Krystofiak went 2-for-3 in the game with five different 'Cats getting RBI. Freshman Samantha Felt (8-9) got the loss for the Wildcats, throwing a complete game, allowing six runs (five earned) with three strikeouts and a pair of walks.

On Sunday, the Wildcats fell to Minnesota Duluth 4-3 in the first game and 8-4 in the second.

The Bulldogs opened up the scoring with a home run from the first batter of the game, giving Minnesota Duluth a 1-0 lead. Wayne State junior Madison Gomez hit a double with one out in the second, but was left stranded after a pair of groundouts to keep the score 1-0.

After giving up a two-run homer in the third, Wildcat starter Hadley

Chvatal settled in by posting scoreless frames in the fourth, fifth, and sixth. WSC would get on the scoreboard, plating three in the sixth to tie the game at 3-3.

Wayne State got on the board in the bottom of the sixth when senior Kortney Buresh reached on a Bulldog error. Junior Riley Holmberg drew a walk to put runners on first and second before senior Kim Vidlak hit a double that would score Buresh. The 'Cats weren't done there as sophomore Jenna Etmans hit a single to score Holmberg and Vidlak to tie the game.

The Wildcats had a throwing error in the top of the seventh, allowing UMD to retake the lead and go on to post the first-game win.

Junior Hadley Chvatal (2-17) threw a complete game for WSC, allowing four runs (three earned) with four strikeouts. Vidlak went 1 for 3 in the game with an RBI and a run scored to lead the 'Cats. Freshman Alle Perea, Holmberg, Etmans and Gomez each added a hit.

Wayne State started the scoring in the second game with Buresh leading off the game by getting on base as the result of a UMD fielding error. Vidlak moved Buresh over with a groundout. Etmans came through with a two-out double to score Buresh, giving WSC their first lead of the day 1-0 through one.

With two outs in the bottom of the second, junior Paiton Tornberg reached on a fielding error. Tornberg advanced on a single from graduate student Emily Hale before a Buresh single loaded the bases for Holmberg. Holmberg hit a single to push Wayne State's lead to 2-0 after two.

Minnesota Duluth answered quickly in the third plating four runs in the third on four hits to take the lead for good at 4-2 through three frames.

Wayne State used singles from Buresh and Holmberg and a walk from Vidlak to load the bases with one out in the bottom of the fourth. Gomez hit an RBI single to score Buresh, cutting the UMD lead to 8-3 through four.

With two outs in the bottom of the sixth Vidlak hit her fourth homer of the year making it an 8-4 game, but the Wildcats would get no closer.

Starting pitcher Samantha Felt (8-10) got tagged with the loss, pitching four innings, allowing eight earned runs with a strikeout. Grace Luka threw three innings of relief for the Wildcats allowing no runs with four strikeouts. Buresh, Holmberg and Etmans all went 2-for-4 in the game, with Buresh scoring two runs. Holmberg, Etmans, Vidlak and Gomez each had an RBI for the 'Cats.

The 15-36 (12-18 NSIC) Wildcats are the No. 10 seed for the Northern Sun Conference softball tournament that begins on Saturday in Sioux Falls, S.D. The Wildcats face Upper Iowa in a 10 a.m. matchup.

Heikes and Redden combined on a one-hitter. Heikes got the win, allowing five walks and one hits in 5 2/3 innings while Redden pitched a perfect 1 1/3 innings, striking out three.

The final three games on the schedule were all rained out. Wayne will take a 13-6 record into the B-6 district tournament at Ashland. They will face GACC in the first round Thursday at 2:30 p.m., with the winner facing Beatrice in a 2:30 p.m. matchup Friday. The championship game is Saturday at 2:30 p.m.

Student-athletes honored at WSC banquet

For the first time in three years due to COVID, Wayne State College honored its top student athletes for the 2021-22 school year Monday evening at the annual Ameritas Honors Banquet, held in the Kanter Student Center.

Six major awards and Most Valuable Player Awards were announced for sports that have been completed this season.

Senior baseball player Andrew Hanson and senior women's basketball player Kylie Hammer were named Athletes of the Year while redshirt freshmen Maggie Brahmer (volleyball) and Nick Bohn in football were voted as Freshmen Athletes of the Year. Hammer and Brock Hegarty (cross country/track and field) were selected as the Cunningham Scholar Athletes of the Year.

Hanson, a 6-foot-1, 185-pound senior from Burnsville, Minn., leads the Wildcat baseball team in batting this season with a .338 average. He also leads the team in RBI (33), stolen bases (34) and triples (6). Hanson leads the NSIC in stolen bases and is tied for third in stolen bases per game (0.97) while also leading the league in triples. He is a five-year starter for the Wildcats and has a career .315 average and needs just six hits to become the 10th player in school history to post 200 career hits.

Hammer, a 5-foot-6 senior guard

from Wayne, was named NSIC South Division Player of the Year, All-NSIC First Team and D2CCA All-Central Region First Team after averaging 20.1 points per game for the Wildcats this season. She is only the third player in school history to record more than 20 points a contest in a season. Hammer scored double figures in 21 of 23 games this season and had 20 or more points in 12 games. She also became the 23rd player in school history to reach 1,000 points in a Wildcat uniform.

Academically, Hammer was named the Cunningham Female Scholar Athlete of the Year after earning CoSIDA Academic All-American Third Team honors with a 3.916 grade point average majoring in elementary education. Other academic honors include NSIC Myles Brand All-Academic With Distinction and Presidential Scholar Athlete. She also served on the Student Athlete Advisory Committee for three years.

Bohn, a 6-foot-2, 195-pound redshirt freshman quarterback from Bennington, was named Male Freshman Athlete of the Year after leading the Wildcats to a 7-4 record this season. He was named NSIC Newcomer of the Year and All-NSIC Second Team after throwing for 1,921 yards completing 142 of 237 passes with 14 TD's and five interceptions. He also rushed for

another 583 yards and 10 TD's and ranked sixth in the NSIC in total offense per game (250.4), seventh in passing yards per game (192.1) and 13th in rushing yards per game (58.3).

Brahmer, a 6-foot-1 redshirt freshman middle hitter from Pierce, was selected Female Freshman Athlete of the Year after earning All-NSIC First Team honors this season averaging 2.65 kills and 0.88 blocks per set. She led the NSIC and ranked third in NCAA Division II with a .461 hitting percentage. Brahmer was named to the Colorado Premier All-Tournament Team and named NSIC Offensive Player of the Week after hitting a perfect 1.000 (10 kills on 10 attacks) at Minot State (10/2/21).

Hegarty, a graduate student from Fremont, was named the Cunningham Male Scholar Athlete of the Year. He is a five-year letter winner in track and field and four in cross country, earning the NSIC Elite 18 Award as the top scholar athlete at an NSIC Championship twice - the 2022 NSIC Indoor Track and Field Championships and the 2019 NSIC Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Hegarty maintains a 4.0 grade point average majoring in computer science. Last fall in cross country, he was the top WSC runner at two meets and had two top 10 finishes.

Conference on their Academic All-Conference list announced recently. Students were selected based on their excellence in the classroom and in all extracurricular activities sponsored by the Mid State Conference.

The Wayne State Wildcats lost a pair of one-run games, 4-3 and 8-7, to Concordia-St. Paul in NSIC action on Senior Day at the Pete Chapman Baseball Complex in Wayne.

Wayne State opened up the scoring in the first game in the second inning. Senior Chris Cornish led off the frame with a single through the left side. With one out, sophomore designated hitter Nick Barnett hit his third home run of the season, giving WSC a 2-0 lead after two.

The Golden Bears answered right away in the top of the third, scoring four runs on five hits, taking the lead 4-2.

Senior catcher Connor Fiene got on base with a single. Noah Roberts, a senior first baseman, moved Fiene to second with a single, before senior outfielder Alex Logelin hit a two out double to cut the deficit to one after five innings, but that was as close as the Wildcats would get.

Both starting pitchers threw compete games with junior Andrew Staebell (4-1) getting tagged with the loss. Staebell threw seven innings, allowing four earned runs while recording seven strikeouts. Roberts went 2-for-3 in the game while Barnett went 1-for-3 with two RBI.

In the nightcap, WSC again got on the scoreboard first with Roberts hitting a leadoff single in the bottom of the first. Logelin grounded out, but moved Roberts to second before a CSP balk put Roberts on third. Senior Andrew Hanson hit an RBI single into left field to score Roberts. Hanson would steal second and third, but got stranded at third after a strikeout and a line out ended the inning.

The Golden Bears used a solo homer in the top of the fourth to knot the score 1-1. In the bottom of the fourth, Hanson led off with a single before stealing second. A groundout moved Hanson to third and after a walk from Barnett, junior Nate Sailors broke the tie with a two-out single up the middle. Through four innings of play, WSC led 2-1.

In the top of the fifth inning, Concordia-St. Paul scored three runs on three hits and two Wayne State errors to take the lead 4-2. The Wildcats got one run back in the bottom of the frame with Roberts drawing a leadoff walk. Hanson drew a one-out walk and the pair moved to second and third respectively on a wild pitch. Roberts was able to come in to score on a sacrifice fly by junior Colin Lynam. After five WSC trailed 4-3.

In the sixth, the Wildcats got on base with a walk from junior Cade Lynam. With two outs Lynam stole second and scored on a single from Logelin, tying the score 4-4 after six. Cornish had a single with one out before moving to second on a single from Colin Lynam. Barnett hit a single into right field to score Cornish from second, retaking the lead for the Wildcats. Wayne State would tack on another run on a throwing error from Concordia-St. Paul, making the score 6-4 in favor

of Wayne State through seven innings.

In the eighth, WSC added another run. Cade Lynam walked to lead off the inning before a sacrifice bunt from Roberts moved Lynam to second. A fly out from Logelin put Lynam on third then an RBI single from Hanson would make the score 7-4 heading into the ninth.

In the top of the ninth CSP scored four runs on three hits, taking the lead 8-7. Colin Lynam hit a lead-off single, putting the game tying run on base. Freshman Cam Madsen pinch ran for the 'Cats, moving to second on a sacrifice bunt from junior Garrett Svobda. Madsen went to third on a passed ball, but a pair

of strikeouts stranded the game-tying run at third.

Senior Ryan Petersen (0-2) got the loss for the Wildcats, allowing two earned runs in 2/3 innings of work with a strikeout. Sophomore starting pitcher Keanan Allen had a no-decision, tossing five innings, allowing four runs (two earned) with a strikeout. Hanson went 3-for-4 with two RBI and four stolen bases, moving his NSIC-leading total stolen bases to 34.

The Wildcats (17-23, 11-15) played their final home games of the season on Tuesday against Minnesota State. They close the regular season with a three-game series this weekend at Upper Iowa.

Several members of the Wayne State men's track and field team competed Friday and Saturday at the Drake Relays in Des Moines.

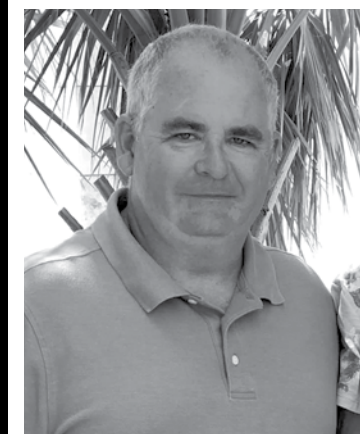

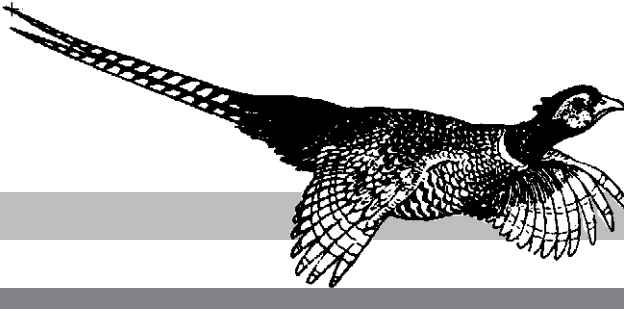

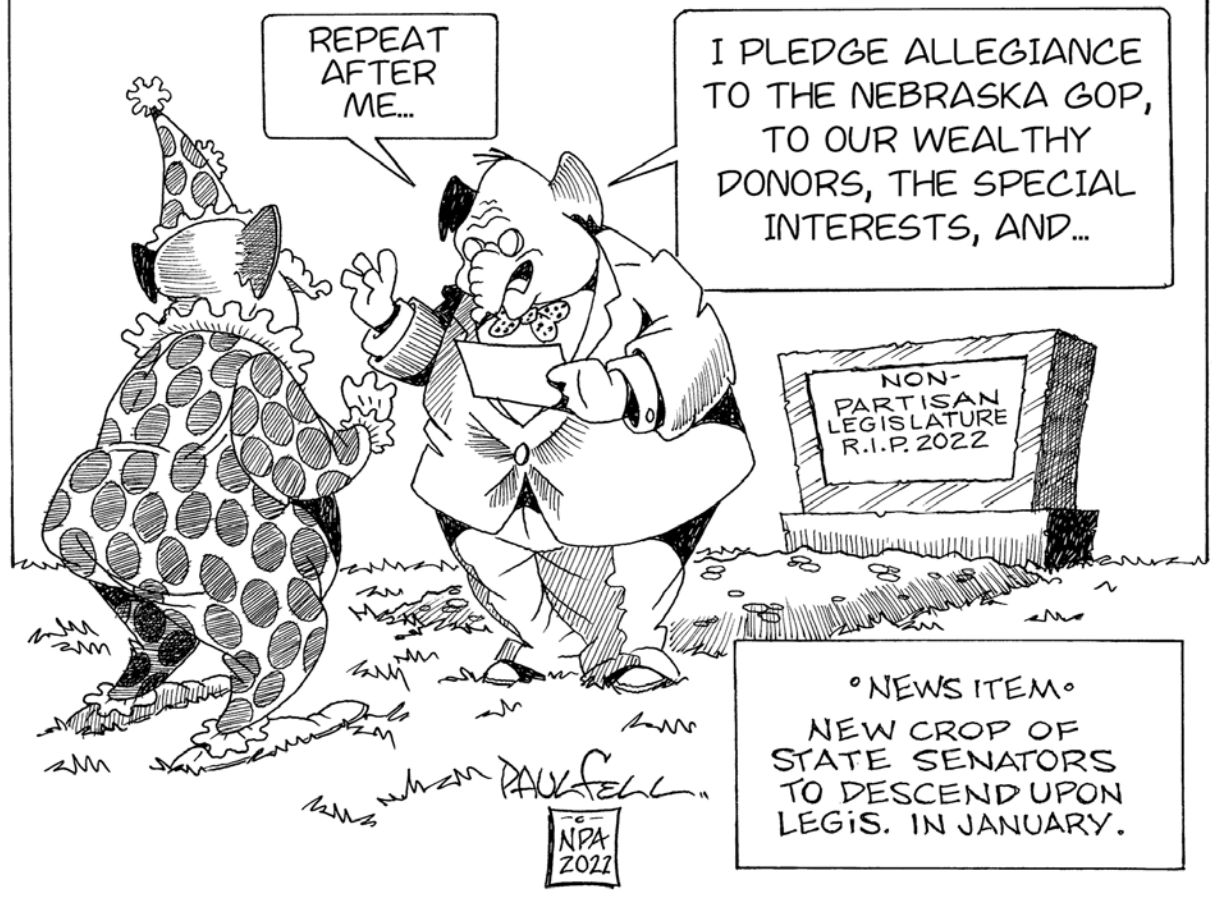
Bob Dylan's song lyrics set the perfect tone for what lies ahead for the 2023 Nebraska Legislature. If you thought this year's session was one of the strangest ... filibuster? Did somebody say filibuster? Just wait.

The potential for change next year focuses on the loss of influential, independent and moderate Republicans who often made the difference on major issues in the officially non-partisan Unicameral. John McCollister, Mark Kolterman, John Stinner, and Matt Williams fit that description. After this year, all gone.

McCollister, the Republican son of a former U.S. Congressman from Omaha, proved to be a diplomat and mediator between the two sides when party politics reared its head. Kolterman, from Seward, ran the Retirement Committee, which dealt with some pretty heady teacher retirement issues, but also proved to be an asset in debates about economic development.

Stinner, a retired banker from Gering, steered the Appropriations Committee through some choppy fiscal waters and managed to keep the ship of state afloat with cash reserves that satisfied the Constitutional mandate. When the seas smoothed out with a glut of pandemic cash, he kept the crew on task instead of relaxing in the deck chairs.

Williams, chair of the Banking, Commerce and Insurance Committee, was another Republican who played well with others. A



Gothenburg resident, he was gracious enough to give up his west-central Nebraska District 36 so it could be moved to accommodate population growth in far eastern Sarpy County.

Curt Friesen, Matt Hansen, Robert Hilkemann, Dan Hughes, Adam Morfeld. Gone.

Brett Lindstrom, term-limited but running for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, Gone. Term-limited Patty Pansing Brooks, running for Congress, Gone.

Sen. Williams is running for University of Nebraska Regent. Sen. Hansen is running for Lancaster County Clerk and Sen. Morfeld is running for Lancaster County Attorney.

The big loss, Sen. Steve Lathrop of Omaha, a Democrat finishing

his third term after a term-limited four-year hiatus, has chosen not to run for a fourth term. As the oft outspoken advocate for prison reform, he said he's worn out. He has been an excellent chair of the Judiciary Committee but admitted that it's time to do something else with his life.

That's 12 guaranteed new faces next year.

Now add in the possibility that Gov. Pete Ricketts might be positioned to appoint as many as three new senators before he leaves office in January -- and you could bet that he would choose dependable conservative Republicans.

Republican Sen. Mike Flood of Norfolk, who is running against Pansing Brooks, is only part way through a term. Sen. Mike

Hilgers of Lincoln, a Republican, may be elected attorney general in November at the halfway point of his current four-year legislative term. Sen. Rich Pahls of Omaha, also a Republican who is halfway through a four-year term, has been absent from the Legislature recently due to health challenges. Status unknown.

The biggest change will come with a new face in the Governor's Office. But I'm not going there, the primary is next week. Be sure to vote!

Public urged to leave wildlife babies alone

It is natural for some people who see a young wild animal apparently abandoned by its mother to want to rescue it. The correct course of action is to leave it alone.

Here are some rules of thumb from the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission regarding wildlife babies:

A lone fawn, or other young bird or mammal, may appear to be abandoned or injured, but the mother frequently is off feeding or drinking. Do not move it. The longer the fawn is separated from its mother, the slimmer the chance that it will be reunited with her. In some cases, other deer will adopt an orphaned fawn.

It is normal for a doe to leave its fawn to keep it from being detected by predators. Predators can see the doe as it feeds, so she leaves the fawn hidden and leaves the area to draw attention away from the fawn's location.

Do not try to raise wildlife babies as pets. As animals mature, they become more independent and follow natural instincts to leave and establish their own territories. Rescued animals are poorly prepared for life in the wild.

Most wildlife babies are protected by state or federal law and it is illegal to possess them.

Notice to All Voters:

Pursuant to §32-811(1), several races for nonpartisan offices, such as Natural Resources Districts, Public Power Districts, and Community Colleges, as well as local nonpartisan races, will not appear on the Primary ballot as the number of candidates does not exceed twice the number of vacancies. Those candidates are declared nominated, and the race shall appear on the General Election ballot.

Voters will also see the auto-advancement of partisan county official races in which a candidate is unopposed for their party's nomination.


Notice to Nonpartisan Voters:

A registered voter who is not affiliated with a political party and who desires to vote in the primary election for the office of United State Senator and United States House of Representatives may request a partisan ballot for any one of the three state-recognized political parties per §32-912(3).

In addition, this year, the Nebraska Democratic and Libertarian parties have opened their primary elections per §32-912(2) to allow nonpartisan voters to vote in any race where their party is nominating a candidate for partisan office.



Helping a child during tough times

Helping children affected by the wildfire is an important part of the parents and caregivers' role.

Parents and caregivers can help by keeping children informed by explaining what is happening. You can explain how a wildfire, tornado, drought, storm or flood happens, and how these are unusual by natural patterns of weather.

Children do not need to know all the details, but they will feel safer if they have some answers. Keep explanations simple. They do not need


graphic details and it is helpful to limit media coverage. This helps children have some understand and sense of control.

Children also respond to disaster in different ways. They may become upset or cry easily, get angry or act out, become restless or have difficulty paying attention. Some children may be quiet and withdrawn, while others can't stop talking about the experience. Parents and caregivers can help children by acknowledging their child's feelings and experi-

ence. Let your child know that it is okay to cry.

Suggestions to help children feel safe and in control during disasters include listening to them and providing reassurance that many caring adults, parents, teachers, and community members are together to keep them safe. For older children, ask them what they know and what questions they may have.

All children and youth react differently to disasters and emergencies.

Nebraska Extension has excellent resources before, during, and after a stressful event. Visit child.unl.edu/disaster for more disaster, emergency, and crisis resources that are helpful to children, families, and communities.

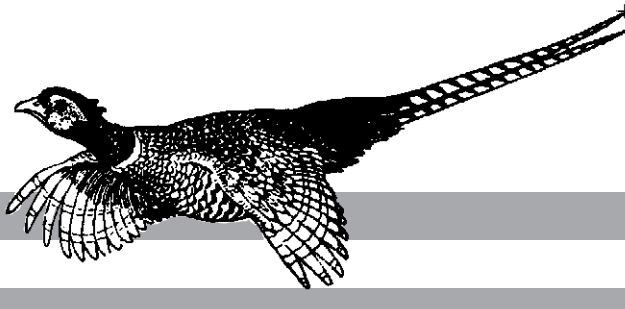

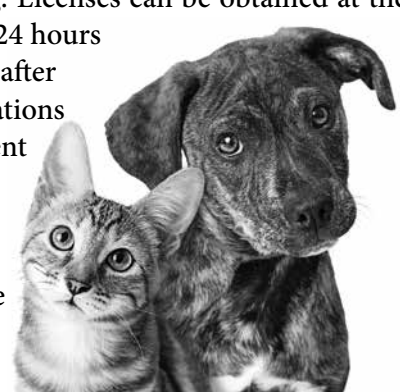

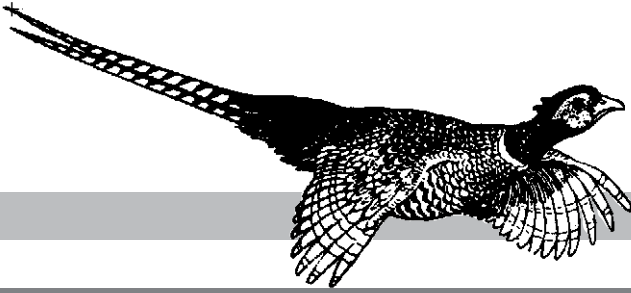

Advice offered for use of pastures, alfalfa

Grazing Preparation
By Ben Beckman

Dry and cool weather has caused spring green-up to lag. With warmer temperatures in the forecast, many cool season species may come on fast as they make up for lost time. Are you prepared to capture this flush of spring growth?

Cool season species statewide are ready to grow as soon as temperatures and moisture allows. This includes perennial species like smooth brome as well as planted annuals like rye, barley, or oats. While this flush of growth is needed for animals that will be turned out to pasture to have something to graze on, maturing too fast can cause some issues.

Grasses lose quality as they begin to develop seedheads and mature. The trade-off to this is the additional yield being produced. As grazing managers, we are constantly walking the line between quality and quantity, trying to find the optimum level for both. The danger with fast spring growth is the grass maturing faster than we can graze it, resulting in low quality forage and lower grazing efficiency.

So, what can we do? Try flash grazing to quickly graze pastures



initially. This allows animals to utilize more forage in the vegetative state, while at the same time setting the plants back a bit and delaying maturity. The trick is setting back plant growth enough that we can come around for a second grazing period to a vegetative plant while not apply so much pressure the plant's health suffers. After an initial quick rotation, we can slow things down again and graze normally as pasture growth slows later this spring.

Post-Emergent Herbicides
To Control Weeds In Alfalfa

Spring drought can provide an advantage for weeds in alfalfa especially in newly seeded fields. Usually, glyphosate applications sprayed on Roundup Ready® alfalfa variety fields can be effective overcoming these emerged weed issues; but Roundup® isn't the only good weed control option for alfalfa.

When weeds grow faster than stressed alfalfa, seedlings are robbed of moisture, nutrients, and light. Left uncontrolled; weeds can then thin stands, weaken plants, and lower yields. For broadleaf weeds, mowing may be an option while the alfalfa is growing slowly. Adjust mowing height so several leaves remain on the alfalfa seedlings after clipping to aid in alfalfa regrowth. However, if mower clippings may smother young alfalfa seedlings; then alternative herbicide may still be your best weed control options if Roundup® is not an option.

Nebraska Extension 2022 "Guide for Weeds, Disease and Insect" publication EC-130 Provides comparison of response ratings for many labelled herbicides. Alfalfa seedling post-emergent herbicides may include: AIM®; Moxly 2E®; Poast®; Buctril®; Raptor®; Select Max®; Prowl H2O®; Warrant®; Pursuit®; Arrow® and Butyrac 200®. For established alfalfa, labelled broadleaf or grassy weed herbicides include: Aim®; Moxly 2E®; Butyrac®; Chateau®; Gramoxone®; Karmex®; Metribuzin®; Prowl H2O®; MCPA Amine®; Arrow®; Warrant®; and Velpar®. These products are most effective when applied before weeds reach 4 inches tall.

As always, read and follow label directions for application rates and conditions.

Managing Alfalfa Weevil

Be sure to get out and check your alfalfa fields as alfalfa weevils have been recently confirmed in southeastern Nebraska. Scouting alfalfa fields now to monitor larval and adult weevil counts prior to the first cutting is important to determine if management strategies such as harvesting your field early or an insecticide application is needed. Remember alfalfa weevils cause alfalfa plants to wilt and turn brown, symptoms also seen with drought and cold injury. Weevil larvae can rapidly deteriorate hay quality as they spend nearly all their time feeding on the fresh leaf tissue of the plants.

Once alfalfa reaches eight inches tall a sweep net can be used to see if alfalfa weevil larvae are present. If larvae are found with the sweep net, move to the hand sampling method. For hand sampling, collect 10 alfalfa stems cut at ground level from five locations across your alfalfa field. Next, shake the larvae off the cut stems into a deep-sided bucket. Then, count the larvae in the bucket and calculate the average larvae per stem. Weevil larvae are small (1/16 to 3/8 inch long) pale yellow to dark green insects that curl into a C-shape when disturbed.

Next calculate your economic thresholds for determining if an insecticide application or early harvest might be beneficial. The final treatment decision is based on the economic threshold which varies by plant growth stage, treatment costs, projected forage value and average larvae found per stem.

You can find the full economic threshold chart by visiting <https://cropwatch.unl.edu>. For example, an insecticide treatment and/or harvesting early maybe recommended if you count 2 or more weevil larvae per stem at the early bud stage of developing alfalfa valued at \$100 per ton.

USDA Farm Service Agency, Natural Resources Conservation Service to present on drought assistance programs

Nebraska USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will provide an overview of USDA drought assistance programs during a webinar scheduled for Thursday, May 12.

The webinar is part of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Center for Agricultural Profitability webinar series devoted to topics for farm and ranch management, profitability, economics and farm survival. It will begin at 12 p.m. CT, and those interested in participating can register at <http://cap.unl.edu/webinars>.

Nebraska FSA Price Support, Conservation and Environmental Programs Chief Pat Lechner and Nebraska NRCS Outreach Coordinator Brach Johnson will provide an overview of USDA drought assistance programs. The webinar will be moderated by Brad Lubben, UNL associate professor and Extension policy specialist. Randy Saner, UNL beef systems Extension educator, also will present during the webinar.

"FSA county offices already are busy implementing drought assistance programs such as the Livestock Forage Disaster Program," said Nebraska FSA State Executive Director John Berge. "This and other programs available through both FSA and NRCS are designed to help producers mitigate some of the impact of extreme, adverse weather."
