## Fatality accident causes cancellation of STOL activities

An accident on Friday evening at the Wayne Municipal Airport caused the cancellation of the events scheduled for the weekend.

According to information from MayDay STOL organizers, "around 6:45 p.m., (Friday, May 20) a pilot crashed on final approach at the Wayne Airport... and had what appeared to be a stall spin accident. The plane was solely occupied by its pilot who perished as a result of the crash.

"The NTSB and FAA are currently investigating the incident and our event staff and officials will provide full cooperation to the authorities investigating the incident. More details will be provided."

The accident did not occur during any type of competition or racing. Instead, pilots wanting to fly were invited to do so when no competition was taking place.

Members of the Pierce Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department, along with Wayne and Cuming County Emergency Managers and the Providence Medical Center ambulance were at the airport when the incident occurred.

The Wayne Volunteer Fire Department and the Wayne County Sheriff's Department were also among those responding to the incident.

Information released this week from Aircraft Owners & Pilots Association (AOPA) stated, "a Cessna 140 flown by California pilot Tom Dafoe rolled and dove during or soon after the base-to-final turn, and struck the ground."

Grief resources are being provided to anyone who witnessed this event. In addition, anyone who is suffering through the grief, there are resources available through the AOPA Pilot Information center <https://pic.aopa.org/home> and Aircraft Casualty Emotional Support Services through <http://accesshelp.org>.

Additional details will be released as they become available.

## Memorial Day programs to honor those who served

Those attending should plan on arriving by 2:15 p.m. so that the program may start on time and should bring lawn chairs.

The Laurel Veteran's group will assist with the ceremony.

In case of significant rain or high winds at the time of the ceremony, the event will be moved to St. Anne's parish hall.

In case of severe weather warnings, the event will be canceled.

The Concord-Dixon Cemetery Association will hold its Annual Memorial Service on Sunday, May 29, at 2:30 p.m., at Concordia Lutheran Church in Concord.

Veterans are invited as special guests and are asked to enter together at the beginning of the program. At 3:15 p.m., the Laurel Vets Post will present colors, with Taps, at the Concord Cemetery.

In Wayne, flags will be put up at Greenwood Cemetery on Thursday, May 26, beginning at 6 p.m. Local Boy Scouts are planning to assist with the project and the public is welcome to join as well.

This year's Memorial Day Program will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Monday, May 30 in Veteran's Memorial Cemetery. It is being

organized by the Wayne Consolidated Veterans organization.

Speaking at the program will be Kevin Newman, a military veteran. Music will be provided by the Wayne Community band, under the direction of Alex Wieland.

In case of inclement weather, the program will be held in the Wayne High School gym.

In Carroll, the Memorial Day observance will take place Monday, May 30. Those involved will travel to Bethany Cemetery west of Carroll for a short program at 9:30 a.m.

The program will take place at 10 a.m. at the Carroll City Auditorium. Speakers for this year's event will be Pete and Shelli Keiser.

Following the ceremony, attendees will travel to Elmwood Cemetery for the final portion of the program.

### Information shared on 'stall spins'

The Air Safety Foundation in a study from 1993 to 2001, found 80 percent of stall spin accidents occur at an altitude of less than 1,000 feet above ground level, which acts as the traffic pattern altitude at most airports.

The estimated loss in altitude for General Aviation aircrafts during a stall recovery, according to an article by Colin Cutler for the BoldMethod, sits at around 100-350 feet.

In many cases, the aircraft has enough altitude to recover, however, lower altitudes make this extremely difficult.

According to the ASF study, General Aviation pilots, both private and commercial, are the most susceptible to stall spin accidents.

Airline Transportation and student pilots have the lowest risk of experiencing stall spins, students especially, due to constant supervision and cautious attention to detail.

The Federal Aviation Agency has recently updated their Airman Certification Standards (ACS) for slow flight to combat these accidents.

According to the ACS for slow flight, you now need to "establish and maintain an airspeed at which any further increase in angle of attack, increase in load factor, or reduction in power, would result in a stall warning (e.g., aircraft buffet, stall horn, etc.)."

The ACS includes a detailed report on how pilots should set up the recovery maneuver.

This report explains that the stall warning horn should be extremely loud to grab the attention of the pilot when approaching a stall.

It also reminds pilots to stay alert, especially at low altitudes, and to practice stalls and slow flight at regular intervals. Pilots should even ask instructors to give them pointers during these practices.

"I was like 'I have no idea what I want to do still but what's one thing that I like?' and I said music," Baker said. "I thought I could teach music and I've stuck with it for three years."

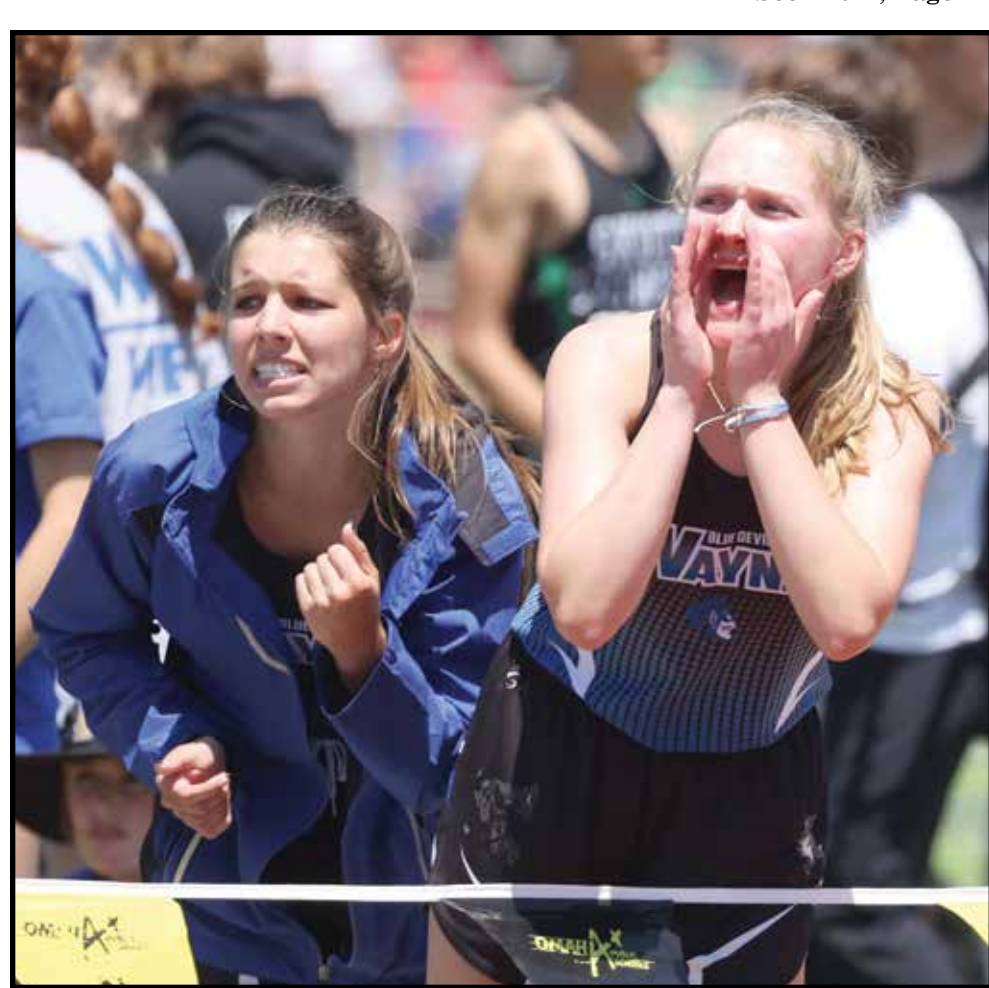
Baker mainly plays the euphonium and is the current drum major for the Wayne State marching band. He also plays the

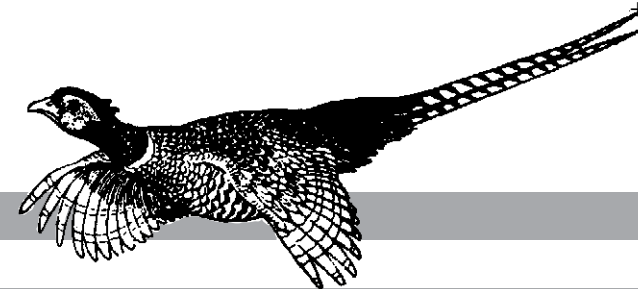

## MayDay STOL participants share love of sport

Pilots from across the country came together this past weekend to compete in a shared appreciation for aviation sports.

Wayne's MayDay STOL took off May 20-22.

Attendees of the event experienced firsthand the dedication of the pilots, who showcased their skills and love for the sport in a series of events.

STOL (Short Take-Off and Landing) Drag Racing has become the fastest growing event in aviation. A large majority of these events take place in the west, in states such as California, Utah and Arizona.

This year marks the second year that Wayne has held this event. Since its start last year, Wayne's STOL Drag Race doubled the number of competitors, from 16 to 34, according to Collin Caneva, who played a large role in planning the event and flew in the "Old Green Plane."

These pilots came all the way from states such as Texas, Utah, Minnesota, Florida and more.

On Thursday, May 19, the pilots took advantage of practice time and received specialized training from Kevin Quinn, creator of STOL Drag.

Brandon Corn, a new competitor from Texas, noted his appreciation for the attention to detail during the training session. He has flown in other STOL events but has never taken on a drag race.

Corn and other pilots not only expressed great enthusiasm for the race and other events, but also for the community aviation races have brought to them.

"It's lots of fun and a good group of people," Corn said. "We see them all over the country at different events, just friends that become better friends over time."

To any pilot who wants to start in STOL events, Rick Boardman from Henderson, Nebraska says they should give it a try. Boardman has only competed for a year but has flown for over 48 years. During this year of racing, he has learned an abundance of new skills, increased his community and gained new experiences he would not have had during his regular job of crop dusting.

competitive events that make up the annual Drum Corps International Tour. Baker is part of the Colts, which is one of the participating organizations in the DCI and has been around since 1963. They are located in Dubuque, Iowa. "The Colts were the closest group," Baker said. "I could tell immediately that this special and a place that I could really see myself thriving at. Luckily I was selected after two audition camps."

At the audition camps, everyone is usually split up into different sections depending on their instrument. Participants mainly learn the technique that the corps does, the drills that they do and the show music. The show music is given to the ones the corps believes they can trust.

"It's a good little look into what the summer is like because it's basically just what we do for 30 days in the spring training," Baker said. "Just keep doing it over and over again until it's near perfect."

Baker marched that same summer that he joined the group and was meant to march in 2020 but couldn't due to COVID-19 shutting everything down. He originally decided against marching in 2021 for his mental health and COVID-19 but halfway through July there was a hole in the tuba line that needed to be filled. Baker filled in and marched for 25 days due to the short summer and no competitions. He plans to march this summer and will leave May 27 to move in.

The Colts will be doing their spring training somewhere in the area of Dubuque. All of June will be spent learning the show, drill, etc. and will start their tour in July. "We'll start locally and then spread out to the Midwest," Baker said. "Then we'll go down to Texas, across to Georgia and then back up the east coast and finish in Indianapolis."

There is an age out rule for the Colts that stops at 21 unless someone turns 21 after June 1 when the season starts. Baker's birthday is June 26 so he will have a bonus year to still participate if his body allows him to do so. Baker said he might teach it after he is done or volunteer to help so that he is still involved in some way.

"I definitely feel like I'm a different person than I was coming into drum corp," Baker said. "That could just be the shift from high school to college but it really teaches yourself how to make sure you're okay before you try and take care of oth-

ers. Just make sure that you are thriving where you are at. I've also gotten really good at just traveling lightly since we're bouncing from

Wisconsin and then just followed us until we got to Texas," Baker said. "It was just kind of cool to have him follow and to just see how much

"You do have to pay money to do this which is the one downside for drum corps I would say," Baker said. "It's a fair thing because of how much you have to travel and how much gas for buses is right now so it makes sense that you would have to pay to participate."

Baker said he has a very strong support system with his parents. They understand his love of music and the opportunities that Baker can have in his music educator career from this. During his first summer in the Colts, his mom drove him the 12 hours to camp while being a teacher.

"My dad actually bought an RV in the 2019 summer and followed us around in the Midwest so I think he just showed up at a show in

Some of Baker's favorite moments in the Colts is the final performance they do.

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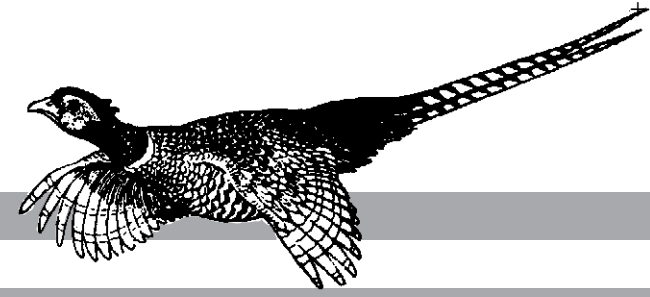

The Wayne boys had three golfers finished in the top 10, but needed two playoff holes to make it a team trip to state.

The Blue Devils tied Bennington for the third and final team spot in B-2 district golf action Wednesday at Wayne Country Club, but outlast-

ed the Badgers in a two-hole playoff to earn the third and final team bid to this week's Class B State Golf Championships in Scottsbluff.

 OMAHA — Winning a state title on the track is tough.

Defending the title? Even tougher.

Laurel-Concord-Coleridge senior Deagan Puppe faced a serious challenge from Bishop Neumann's Kamdyn Swartz, but the lanky Bears hurdler had just enough of a reach at the end to defend his title Saturday in the Class C 110-meter hurdles at the Nebraska State Track and Field Championships.

Puppe crossed the finish line in 14.66 seconds, less than a tenth of a second ahead of Swartz, to take the gold medal in Class C.

"It was a lot of work to get that, so it feels great," an exhausted Puppe said after winning his second state title in a row. "(Swartz) really gave me a run for my money last year and I knew it was going to be a tough time to go up against. It was a little slower than I thought, but he really tested me with that kick he had."

Puppe was one of five area athletes to earn medals in Class C and Class D competition held Friday and Saturday at Burke Stadium, and was joined by younger brother Dan Puppe on the medal stand, as

the junior Puppe finished eighth in the finals.

get PR's for their times and it was great to see them come back and get eighth, and they'll all be back next year so we're already looking forward to it."

Kruse didn't have her best day in the discus on Wednesday, finishing 12th in that event, but came back and finished seventh in a very tough shot put competition to earn her first state medal.

Kruse came within a whisker of cracking the 40-foot mark for the first time. Her final throw in the preliminaries was 39 feet, 11 1/2 inches, a half-inch ahead of her personal best.

"The funny thing is, if we were in Class A that mark would have been good for fourth place, which shows how tough the competition was that she competed against," Hochstein said. "She's thrown right at her best and you can't ask for better than that. You take care of what you can control and that was good to see from her."

Kyla Krusemark was also a two-event participant for the Wayne girls. She ran the 3,200-meter run on Wednesday and finished 15th in the 24-runner field with a time of 12:42.81.

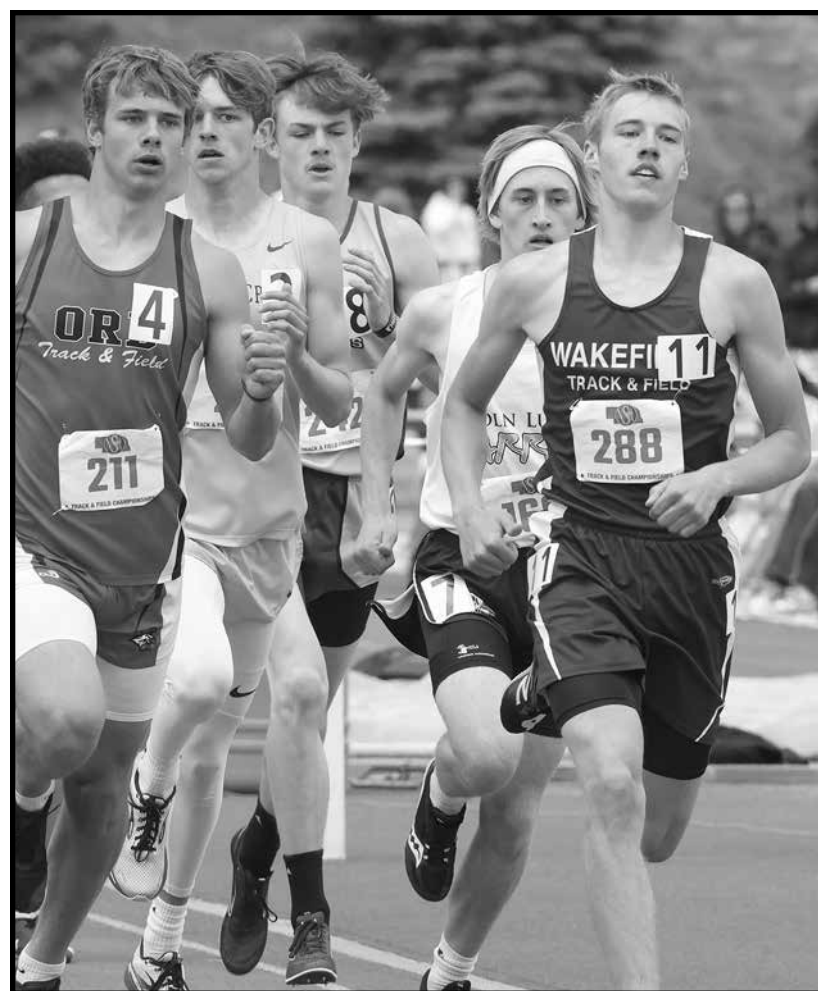

## Nebraska's Indian Wars history subject of library presentation at Winside

More than three centuries of Nebraska's history during the Plains Indian Wars is the subject of a Winside Public Library presentation by Nebraska author Jeff Barnes on Tuesday, June 2, at 7 p.m.

The talk is free and open to the public, although donations are welcome.

"Contact and Conflict: The Monumental Story of Nebraska and the Indian Wars" by historian Jeff Barnes is a chronological telling of the meetings of Native American and European Americans in Nebraska, from peace through war, as commemorated in historical monuments and markers. These memos from the past mark councils, trading and military posts, treaty sites, battles and massacres originating with the differing cultures on the Plains.

"The interest and pride of Nebraskans in their history is shown

through scores of these markers and monuments across the state, which we continue to place today," said Barnes.

The presentation is in conjunction with Barnes's newest book, *Cut in Stone, Cast in Bronze: Nebraska's Historical Markers and Monuments*. Sponsored by the Nebraska State Historical Society Foundation, the book is a full-color, comprehensive guide to the nearly 300 monuments, statues, markers, and plaques erected and placed across the state from Territorhood to the 1967 Centennial in commemoration of historical events, places, and people. In addition to the photographs of the markers and the history behind them, Barnes has included the locations and GPS coordinates to allow for site visits.

"The points of these contacts are marked throughout Nebraska, in some places familiar to many but

in other places remote and seldom seen," said Barnes. "I think with the 'social distancing' that we're encouraged to adopt, seeing these monuments in natural settings that haven't changed greatly is a great Nebraska weekend adventure."

Barnes is also the author of *Forts of the Northern Plains*, *The Great Plains Guide to Custer*, *The Great Plains Guide to Buffalo Bill*, *Extra Innings: The Story of Modisett Ball Park* and *150 @ 150: Nebraska's Landmark Buildings at the State's Sesquicentennial*.

A fifth-generation Nebraskan and former newspaper reporter and editor, Barnes writes and lives in Omaha. He is a past trustee of the Nebraska State Historical Society, former chairman of the Nebraska Hall of Fame Commission, and former marketing director of the Durham Museum.

## Taking time to listen

Springtime in Nebraska can be a roller coaster. 70 degrees and sunny one day to high winds and 40 degrees another day. Mother Nature appears to either be angry or simply confused.

The weather extremes this year include drought, intense winds, and temperature swings. Recently, parts of the state have experienced uncontrolled fires which have left some Nebraskans with destroyed property, loss of potential income,

and even loss of life. The most recent natural disaster in Nebraska reminds us of the uncertainties of daily living.

Nebraskans pride themselves on taking care of one another when they are faced with loss and adversity. This generosity has been witnessed by people who donate money, their time, or work to bring awareness about a specific issue or event. The COVID-19 pandemic and the 2019 flood are two examples of how individuals have come together to aid and care for their neighbors, friends, and communities.

People coming together to help each other is critical in taking the beginning steps of recovery from a disaster. Specifically, having someone to talk to is a key component of recovery from trauma. There are times when you are in the role as the listener and at other times you may be the person needing the listening ear. If you are the person in the role of a listener here are some

tips to increase your effectiveness.

Be there for others.

This may be a physical presence, or it may be in the form of a phone call, video chat, or text message. Invite others to share with you about their day or experience. A text, of "How are you doing?" can send the message I care about you, and I am interested to know what is happening with you.

Listen and watch.

A good listener asks open-ended questions like, "How are you feeling?" or "Tell me more about your experience." Good listeners allow the person to talk. Asking follow-up questions that encourage the other person to speak shows that you are interested and are attentive to what the other is saying. "Tell me more" is a comment that you can make to enable a person to continue to share.

Sharpen your communication skills.

Does your body language say you care or are paying attention? Maintaining appropriate eye contact and physical touch can communicate your interest in what the other person is saying. Being comfortable with silence in the conversation can also show respect to the other person. It can allow them the time and space they need to process thoughts and feelings. Resist the urge to offer quick advice or pass judgment. Often this type of communication is not helpful or productive. It can lead to negative feelings.

Normalizing feelings and behaviors.

A person who experiences trauma from a disaster can often feel a vast range of emotions in an hour, day, or week. There is no "right" way to feel after an intense experience. As a listener you can acknowledge the feelings of the person by saying, "It sounds like you are feeling...." or "That must have been difficult/frustrating/frightening" or "That sounds like a common reaction to..."

Take care of yourself.

Being a good friend, neighbor, or community member can be tiring. Listening to someone's story or trauma can be upsetting, disturbing, and simply hard. These thoughts and feelings are common. When one is empathic it is easy to take on the feelings of others which can lead to your own feelings of being overwhelmed. Self-care is important when engaging in listening. Activities like self-reflection, meditation, exercise, or participating in a hobby are examples of self-care. Taking time for yourself will help you be able to give of yourself more fully.

In the next couple of months more storms will be on the horizon. Engaging in listening to those impacted by the latest storms will be just one way to assist with recovery, practice kindness, and build community.

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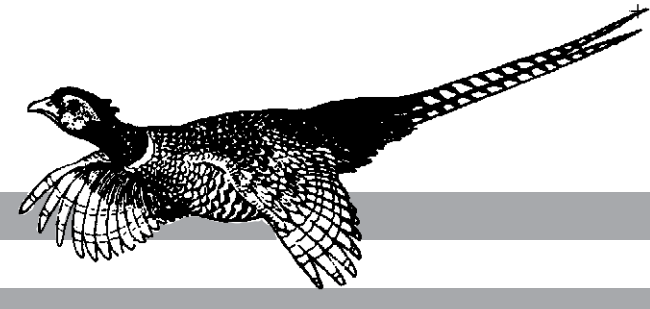

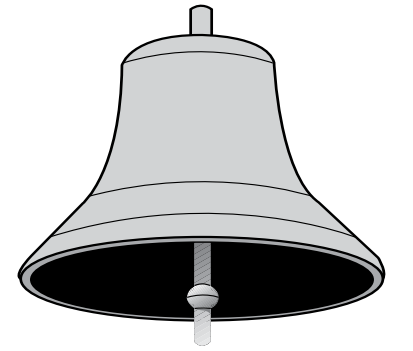

# USDA to Provide relief payments to commodity, specialty crop producers impacted by natural disasters

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced that commodity and specialty crop producers impacted by natural disaster events in 2020 and 2021 will soon begin receiving emergency relief payments totaling approximately \$6 billion through the Farm Service Agency's (FSA) new Emergency Relief Program (ERP) to offset crop yield and value losses.

"For over two years, farmers and ranchers across the country have been hard hit by an ongoing pandemic coupled with more frequent and catastrophic natural disasters," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "As the agriculture industry deals with new challenges and stressors, we at USDA look for opportunities to inject financial support back into the rural economy through direct payments to producers who bear the brunt of circumstances beyond their control. These emergency relief payments will help offset the significant crop losses due to major weather events in 2020 and 2021 and help ensure farming operations are viable this crop year, into the next growing season and beyond."

On Sept. 30, 2021, President Biden signed into law the Extending Government Funding and Delivering Emergency Assistance Act (P.L. 117-43), which includes \$10 billion in assistance to agricultural producers impacted by wildfires, droughts, hurricanes, winter storms, and other eligible disasters experienced during calendar years 2020 and 2021. FSA recently made payments to ranchers impacted by drought and wildfire through the first phase of the Emergency Livestock Relief Program (ELRP). ERP is another relief component of the Act.

For impacted producers, existing Federal Crop Insurance or Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) data is the basis for calculating initial payments. USDA estimates that phase one ERP benefits will reach more than 220,000 producers who received indemnities for losses covered by federal crop insurance and more than 4,000 producers who obtained NAP coverage for 2020 and 2021 crop losses.

ERP Eligibility – Phase One ERP covers losses to crops, trees, bushes, and vines due to a qualifying natural disaster event in calendar years 2020 and 2021. Eligible crops include all crops for which crop insurance or NAP coverage was available, except for crops intended for grazing. Qualifying natural disaster events include wildfires, hurricanes, floods, derechos, excessive heat, winter storms, freeze (including a polar vortex), smoke exposure, excessive moisture, qualifying drought, and related conditions.

For drought, ERP assistance is available if any area within the county in which the loss occurred was rated by the U.S. Drought Monitor as having a:

- D2 (severe drought) for eight consecutive weeks; or
- D3 (extreme drought) or higher level of drought intensity.

Lists of 2020 and 2021 drought counties eligible for ERP is available on the emergency relief website.

To streamline and simplify the delivery of ERP phase one benefits, FSA will send pre-filled application forms to producers where crop insurance and NAP data are already

on file. This form includes eligibility requirements, outlines the application process and provides ERP payment calculations. Producers will receive a separate application form for each program year in which an eligible loss occurred. Receipt of a pre-filled application is not confirmation that a producer is eligible to receive an ERP phase one payment.

Additionally, producers must have the following forms on file with FSA within 60 days of the ERP phase one deadline, which will later be announced by FSA's Deputy Administrator for Farm Programs:

- Form AD-2047, Customer Data Worksheet.
- Form CCC-902, Farm Operating Plan for an individual or legal entity.
- Form CCC-901, Member Information for Legal Entities (if applicable).
- Form FSA-510, Request for an Exception to the \$125,000 Payment Limitation for Certain Programs (if applicable).
- Form CCC-860, Socially Disadvantaged, Limited Resource, Beginning and Veteran Farmer or Rancher Certification, if applicable, for the 2021 program year.

A highly erodible land conservation (sometimes referred to as HELC) and wetland conservation certification (Form AD-1026 Highly Erodible Land Conservation (HELCO) and Wetland Conservation (WC) Certification) for the ERP producer and applicable affiliates.

Most producers, especially those who have previously participated in FSA programs, will likely have these required forms on file. However, those who are uncertain or want to confirm the status of their forms can contact their local FSA county office.

### ERP Payment Calculations – Phase One

For crops covered by crop insurance, the ERP phase one payment calculation for a crop and unit will depend on the type and level of coverage obtained by the producer. Each calculation will use an ERP factor based on the producer's level of crop insurance or NAP coverage.

• Crop Insurance – the ERP factor is 75% to 95% depending on the level of coverage ranging from catastrophic to at least 80% coverage.

• NAP – the ERP factor is 75% to 95% depending on the level of coverage ranging from catastrophic to 65% coverage.

Full ERP payment calculation factor tables are available on the emergency relief website and in the program fact sheet.

Applying ERP factors ensures that payments to producers do not exceed available funding and that cumulative payments do not exceed 90% of losses for all producers as required by the Act.

Also, there will be certain payment calculation considerations for area plans under crop insurance policies.

The ERP payment percentage for historically underserved producers, including beginning, limited resource, socially disadvantaged, and veteran farmers and ranchers will be increased by 15% of the calculated payment for crops having insurance coverage or NAP.

To qualify for the higher payment percentage, eligible producers must have a CCC-860, Socially Disadvantaged, Limited Resource, Beginning and Veteran Farmer or Rancher Certification, form on file with FSA for the 2021 program

year. Because the amount of loss due to a qualifying disaster event in calendar years 2020 and 2021 cannot be separated from the amount of loss caused by other eligible causes of loss as defined by the applicable crop insurance or NAP policy, the ERP phase one payment will be calculated based on the producer's loss due to all eligible causes of loss.

### Future Insurance Coverage Requirements

All producers who receive ERP phase one payments, including those receiving a payment based on crop, tree, bush, or vine insurance policies, are statutorily required to purchase crop insurance, or NAP coverage where crop insurance is not available, for the next two available crop years, as determined by the Secretary. Participants must obtain crop insurance or NAP, as may be applicable.

• At a coverage level equal to or greater than 60% for insurable crops; or

• At the catastrophic level or higher for NAP crops.

Coverage requirements will be determined from the date a producer receives an ERP payment and may vary depending on the timing and availability of crop insurance or NAP for a producer's particular crops. The final crop year to purchase crop insurance or NAP coverage to meet the second year of coverage for this requirement is the 2026 crop year.

### Emergency Relief – Phase Two (Crop and Livestock Producers)

Today's announcement is only phase one of relief for commodity and specialty crop producers. Making the initial payments using existing safety net and risk management data will both speed implementation and further encourage participation in these permanent programs, such as Federal crop insurance, as Congress intended.

The second phase of both ERP and ELRP programs will fill gaps and cover producers who did not participate in or receive payments through the existing programs that are being leveraged for phase one implementation. When phase one payment processing is complete, the remaining funds will be used to cover gaps identified under phase two.

Through proactive communication and outreach, USDA will keep producers and stakeholders informed as program details are made available. More information on ERP can be found in the Notice of Funding Availability.

### Additional Commodity Loss Assistance

The Milk Loss Program and On-Farm Stored Commodity Loss Program are also funded through the Extending Government Funding and Delivering Emergency Assistance Act and will be announced in a future rule in the Federal Register.

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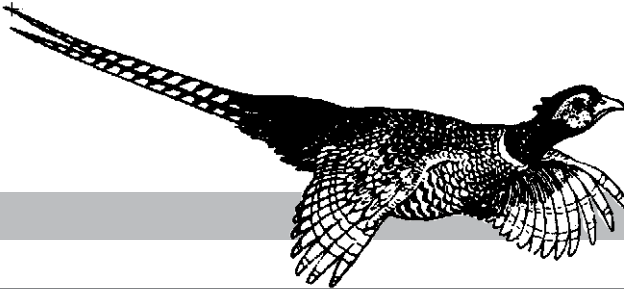
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## Book on John Adams is inspiring

I know you are going to think all I do is read, and some days, you would be right.

But at the risk of sounding repetitive, I do have to tell you about the book I read this week. It's John Adams, by David McCullough, and it's 600 pages of small print. The major thing I take away from it is the fact it was a miracle we won the Revolutionary War!

When you read History books, about Bunker Hill, Lexington, and Concord, you do not stop to think how far apart each of these are; nor how far away the Continental Congress in Philadelphia was, or how they communicated, without telegrams, cell phones, or short wave radios! Often, Congress had no idea where a battle was, let alone whether it was won or lost, until a letter arrived on horseback.

And these were not Pony Express riders. And General Washington was constantly asking for more food, ammunition, and clothes for his men!

Plus, I knew Ben Franklin spent most of that time in France, but I did not know John Adams did, too. It was up to them to keep the loans

coming, and to keep the French knowing we were grateful for their help.

They did not exactly fly over in Air Force One, of course. Ships took up to three months to cross the Atlantic, IF the storms did not cause it to sink, and IF a British ship did not intercept it. Also, of course, communication was not by

underground cable at the bottom of the ocean; the same letter writing took place and the writer hoped it got back to the mainland.

I had known John and Abigail were apart for much of their marriage, and thankfully, their letters were saved; at least, the ones that arrived. Much of the research for the book came from those letters. I had read a book about Abigail some time ago and knew much of this; she was a good manager and stayed on the farm in Massachusetts and took care of things. I had not stopped to think about what life in France was like for John.. And where their children ended up!

Abigail joined him after the war, and they went on to London as ambassadors there; where, of course, they were not appreciated. In all, John was away from home for TEN years! And the children were back and forth, sometimes with a parent, sometimes with an aunt, sometimes in a school. It's made me appreciate again what it took to become these United States.

Something that struck me again was how learned these men were; they not only read Shakespeare,

## Alfalfa harvest, forage options discussed

Assessing Freeze Damage

Was your alfalfa damaged by a freeze or frost last week? Frozen alfalfa usually needs some time to recover before damage can be estimated.

To assess the extent of the damage, don't just look for frozen or wilting leaves. You need to determine if the growing point was killed. This growing point, also called the apical meristem, is where all new leaves, stems, and branches initially develop on alfalfa. It is located inside the dense cluster of unfolded leaves at the top of the main stem.

Because it is inside a cluster of leaves, the growing point is somewhat protected from cold injury. Exposed leaves and stems all around it can be frozen, wilted, and dying while the growing point cluster survives, waiting for warm weather before continuing to grow. If the growing points in your alfalfa survived the freeze, just wait for growth to begin again.

If the growing point was killed, however, growth will cease on that stem. Any new growth must come from new crown shoots or from lower branches. While the existing plant remains intact, regrowth often is delayed. But you don't have to harvest this damaged growth; plants will begin to grow again on their own although it might take a little longer. Cutting off damaged plants often hastens development of regrowth from good, healthy fields. But cutting also adds extra stress to the plants so if you do cut the damaged plants, before you take your next cutting, wait until plants get a little more mature. I suggest cutting now only if there is enough growth to justify the time and ex-

pense of harvest, which is unlikely for most fields.

Check your alfalfa plants to truly see if the tops and growing point are dead or if recovery has begun. Then decide whether to harvest or just wait for growth to renew naturally.

Quickly Maturing Cool Season Forages

Cool season annuals like cereal rye, triticale, barley, and oats as well as perennial forages like brome, timothy, and various wheatgrass species are quickly maturing with recent warm temperatures and the return of precipitation. Are you prepared?

As grasses mature, quality declines. This means harvesting at the right time can be the difference between feed that meets nutrient requirements later in the year or one that needs additional supplementation. As our cool season species rapidly grow, check on them often and be ready to pull the trigger for harvest based on stage of maturity. A close eye on the weather forecast for dry weather to wilt for silage or dry down a hay crop is also important.

Grazed forages also can benefit from utilization prior to maturity by keeping the plant in a vegetative state longer, again maintaining higher quality. If pastures begin to get ahead of us, flash grazing where animals move rapidly through pastures, can slow down growth and keep plants in a vegetative state longer. The goal is to quickly set the plant back a bit without too much stress, so grazing should only take 50% or less of the available forage before moving on.

Managing rapidly maturing cool season grasses requires continual

observation and quick responses to current conditions. In doing so we ensure this forage will be utilized in the best possible way.

Selecting Summer Annual Forages

It is close to the ideal time to plant a summer annual grass, maybe to build hay supply or have some extra grazing. Which one will you plant?

Choosing a summer forage can be confusing because there are six different types of major summer annual forage grasses. These include: sudangrass, sorghum-sudan hybrids, forage sorghum (which we often call cane or sorgo), foxtail millet, pearl millet, and teff. Each one has its own strengths and weaknesses. So, base your choice primarily on how you plan to use it.

For example, do you want pasture? Then use sudanongrass or pearl millet. Both are leafy, they regrow rapidly, and they contain less danger from prussic acid poisoning than other annual grasses.

What if you want hay or green chop? Then select sorghum-sudan hybrids or pearl millet because they yield well and they have good feed value when cut two or three times. On sandy soils, or when conditions are dry, foxtail millet may be a better choice for summer hay. It dries fast, doesn't regrow after cutting, and handles dry soils well. Cane hay is grown in many areas and produces high tonnage, but it's lower in feed value and dries more slowly after cutting than the hybrids or millets. Or you could choose teff for a really soft, leafy, high quality horse hay.

Maybe you plan to chop silage. Then choose the forage sorghums, especially hybrids with high grain

production. They can't be beat for tonnage or for feed value.

While there are several choices of summer annual forages, simply select the one that is best adapted to the way you plan to use it. And, of course, hope for rain since even these grasses won't grow without some moisture.

First Cutting Alfalfa

Corn and soybeans are still getting planted due to a cool start to the year. Alfalfa too has been behind compared to most years, and first cutting may need to happen sooner than expected or than preferred.

The lack of soil moisture last fall and through the winter, slow start to spring rains, and cool temperatures slowed alfalfa growth this spring. With recent precipitation and warm weather, alfalfa has resumed growth quickly. Those needing dairy quality hay may need to cut very soon. The quality of first cutting hay declines rapidly with growth much more than the second, third, or fourth cuttings.

Those wanting to maximize quantity to replenish hay reserves, may want to wait just a little longer until almost full bloom to produce higher yields. Alfalfa will be more efficient with what soil moisture is available if cutting waits until bloom, but this doesn't always match the plans for an operation. If an operation needs a roughage source, this higher yield and lower quality is better. However, if an operation needs a protein source, cutting earlier to produce a higher quality hay will need to be done.

Whatever quality and quantity of alfalfa an operation needs, cutting timing is critical.

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**Assistance available for Nebraska farmers and ranchers impacted by wildfire**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has funding available to assist agricultural producers whose land was impacted by recent wildfires. Landowners have until June 30 to apply.

Through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) funding is available to help producers plan and implement conservation practices on farms and ranches impacted by natural disasters. EQIP funding is available to assist in this wildfire recovery effort by planting cover crops on impacted cropland and to defer grazing on rangeland.

"Numerous fires have impacted farmers and ranchers across Nebraska over the past several weeks leaving ground vulnerable to erosion," said Rob Lawson, state conservationist for NRCS. "We can assist landowners with installing conservation practices to help pre-

vent any further damage to their agricultural land and aid in the recovery of rangeland productivity and soil health."

"NRCS can help with recovery efforts," Lawson said. "Our staff works one-on-one with landowners to assess the damage and develop approaches that lead to an effective recovery of the land."

The application sign-up for this wildfire assistance is happening now and will run through June 30, 2022. Applications will be assessed, and even though some lands may be eligible for assistance, it is not guaranteed that all acres will receive financial assistance due to limited funding.

Interested landowners and operators should contact their local NRCS office in the USDA Service Center for applications and more information.
