A Cessna 140 plane crashed in a field just east of the Wayne Airport on Friday evening, May 20. The pilot, Tom Dafoe, died at the scene. The cause of the accident is under investigation.

Fatality accident causes cancellation of STOL activities

An accident on Friday evening at the Wayne Municipal Airport caused the cancellation of the events scheduled for the weekend.

According to information from MayDay STOL organizers, "around 6:45 p.m., (Friday, May 20) a pilot crashed on final approach at the Wayne Airport... and had what appeared to be a stall spin accident. The plane was solely occupied by its pilot who perished as a result of the crash.

"The NTSB and FAA are currently investigating the incident and our event staff and officials will provide full cooperation to the authorities investigating the incident. More details will be provided."

The accident did not occur during any type of competition or racing. Instead, pilots wanting to fly were invited to do so when no competition was taking place.

Members of the Pierce Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department, along with Wayne and Cuming County Emergency Managers and the Providence Medical Center ambulance were at the airport when the incident occurred.

The Wayne Volunteer Fire Department and the Wayne County Sheriff's Department were also among those responding to the incident.

Information released this week from Aircraft Owners & Pilots Association (AOPA) stated, "a Cessna 140 flown by California pilot Tom Dafoe rolled and dove during or soon after the base-to-final turn, and struck the gound.'

Grief resources are being provided to anyone who witnessed this event. In addition, anyone who is suffering through the grief, there are resources available through the AO-PA Pilot Information center https://pic.aopa.org/home and Aircraft Casualty Emotional Support Services through http://accesshelp.org.

Additional details will be released as they become available.

Information shared on 'stall spins'

The Air Safety Foundation in a study from 1993 to 2001, found 80 percent of stall spin accidents occur at an altitude of less than 1,000 feet above ground level, which acts as the traffic pattern altitude at most airports.

The estimated loss in altitude for General Aviation aircrafts during a stall recovery, according to an article by Colin Cutler for the BoldMethod, sits at around 100-350 feet.

In many cases, the aircraft has enough altitude to recover, however, lower altitudes make this extremely difficult.

According to the ASF study, General Aviation pilots, both private and commercial, are the most susceptible to stall spin accidents.

Airline Transportation and student pilots have the lowest risk of experiencing stall spins, students especially, due to constant supervision and cautious attention to detail.

The Federal Aviation Agency has recently updated their Airman Certification Standards (ACS) for slow flight to combat these accidents.

According to the ACS for slow flight, you now need to "establish and maintain an airspeed at which any further increase in angle of attack, increase in load factor, or reduction in power, would result in a stall warning (e.g., aircraft buffet, stall horn, etc.)."

The ACS includes a detailed report on how pilots should set up the recovery maneuver.

This report explains that the stall warning horn should be extremely loud to grab the attention of the pilot when approaching a stall.

It also reminds pilots to stay alert, especially at low altitudes, and to practice stalls and slow flight at regular intervals. Pilots should even ask instructors to give them pointers during these practices.



Pilots from across the country came together this past weekend to from Texas, noted his appreciation compete in a shared appreciation for aviation sports.

Wayne's MayDay STOL took off May 20-22.

On Thursday, May 19, the pilots took advantage of practice time and received specialized training from Kevin Quinn, creator of STOL Drag.



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Nebraska's Indian Wars history subject of library presentation at Winside

More than three centuries of Nebraska's history during the Plains Indian Wars is the subject of a Winside Public Library presentation by Nebraska author Jeff Barnes on Tuesday, June 2, at 7 p.m.

The talk is free and open to the public, although donations are welcome.

"Contact and Conflict: The Monumental Story of Nebraska and the Indian Wars" by historian Jeff Barnes is a chronological telling of the meetings of Native American and European Americans in Nebraska, from peace through war, as commemorated in historical monuments and markers. These memos from the past mark councils, trading and military posts, treaty sites, battles and massacres originating with the differing cultures on the Plains.

"The interest and pride of Nebraskans in their history is shown

through scores of these markers and monuments across the state, which we continue to place today," said Barnes.

The presentation is in conjunction with Barnes's newest book, Cut in Stone, Cast in Bronze: Nebraska's Historical Markers and Monuments. Sponsored by the Nebraska State Historical Society Foundation, the book is a full-color, comprehensive guide to the nearly 300 monuments, statues, markers, and plaques erected and placed across the state from Territorihood to the 1967 Centennial in commemoration of historical events, places, and people. In addition to the photographs of the markers and the history behind them, Barnes has included the locations and GPS coordinates to allow for site visits.

"The points of these contacts are marked throughout Nebraska, in some places familiar to many but in other places remote and seldom seen," said Barnes. "I think with the 'social distancing' that we're encouraged to adopt, seeing these monuments in natural settings that haven't changed greatly is a great Nebraska weekend adventure."

Barnes is also the author of Forts of the Northern Plains, The Great Plains Guide to Custer, The Great Plains Guide to Buffalo Bill, Extra Innings: The Story of Modisett Ball Park and 150 @ 150: Nebraska's Landmark Buildings at the State's Sesquicentennial.

A fifth-generation Nebraskan and former newspaper reporter and editor, Barnes writes and lives in Omaha. He is a past trustee of the Nebraska State Historical Society, former chairman of the Nebraska Hall of Fame Commission, and former marketing director of the Durham Museum.





tips to increase your effectiveness. Be there for others.

This may be a physical presence, or it may be in the form of a phone call, video chat, or text message. Invite others to share with you about their day or experience. A text, of "How are you doing?" can send the message I care about you, and I am interested to know what is happening with you.

Listen and watch.

A good listener asks open-ended questions like, "How are you feeling?" or "Tell me more about your experience." Good listeners allow the person to talk. Asking follow-up questions that encourage the other person to speak shows that you are interested and are attentive to what the other is saying. "Tell me more" is a comment that you can make to enable a person to continue to share.

Sharpen your communication skills.

Does your body language say you care or are paying attention? Maintaining appropriate eye contact and physical touch can communicate your interest in what the other person is saying. Being comfortable with silence in the conversation can also show respect to the other person. It can allow them the time and space they need to process thoughts and feelings. Resist the urge to offer quick advice or pass judgment. Often this type of communication is not helpful or productive. It can lead to negative feelings.

Normalizing feelings and behaviors

A person who experiences trauma from a disaster can often feel a vast range of emotions in an hour, day, or week. There is no "right" way to feel after an intense experience. As a listener you can acknowledge the feelings of the person by saying, "It sounds like you are feeling..... or "That must have been difficult/ frustrating/frightening" or "That sounds like a common reaction to..." Take care of yourself.



Activities like self-reflection, mediation, exercise, or participating in a hobby are examples of self-care. Taking time for yourself will help you be able to give of yourself more fully.

In the next couple of months more storms will be on the horizon. Engaging in listening to those impacted by the latest storms will be just one way to assist with recovery, practice kindness, and build community.





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Take time this Memorial weekend to remember your brothers and sisters in Christ who have given their lives

Many of us visit the graves of family members on Memorial Day. However, that is not how "Decoration Day" had its beginning.

The Civil War was the deadliest war in American history. For nearly a century, it was believed that 620,000 soldiers were killed from 1861 to 1865. However recent research, studying census data, suggests it is likely that at least 750,000 soldiers died.1

Following the Civil War, people in many different communities put flowers on the graves of the soldiers – which has resulted in numerous versions about when and where the first Decoration Day celebration took place. On April 25, 1866, a group of women went to the "Friendship" Cemetery, near Columbus, Mississippi, where those who died in the battle of Shiloh were buried.

As they laid flowers on the 2100 graves of the Confederate soldiers, some of the women noticed that the 40+ graves of the Union soldiers were empty.

Thinking of their mothers, they decided to leave a flower on those graves as well. Horace Greely lifted up their act of "generosity and reconciliation" in an editorial printed in the New York Tribune.

This led to other communities around the nation remembering those who had been killed in action, regardless of which side they had served on. It helped, in a small way, to bring healing to the nation that had been torn apart by the war.2


According to the Library of Congress, "The first national celebration of the holiday took place May 30, 1868, at Arlington National Cemetery, where both Confederate and Union soldiers were buried. Originally known as Decoration Day, at the turn of the century it was designated as Memorial Day."3 The name was changed from Dec-

oration Day to Memorial Day to put the emphasis on those who died in service to our nation, not just their graves.

While the holiday originated to remember those who died during the Civil War, after WWI Memorial Day was designated to remember all men and women killed or missing in action in all wars and conflicts while serving with the United States

President John F. Kennedy is most remembered for saying, "Think not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country." This is an inspirational quote for us at all times.

But in a speech given at Amherst College, Kennedy shared words of wisdom that are even more fitting for Memorial Day. "A nation reveals itself not only by the men

it produces, but also by the men it honors [and] the men it remembers."4 Who do we remember and honor?

This is especially appropriate to consider as we are getting ready to commemorate Memorial Day. Who are the people that inspire you? Who are the people you wish to emulate?

I suspect that some of you have lost loved ones or perhaps members of your family that you were never able to get to know.

For me, it is my Uncle Willis "Bill" Markey, who gave his life for his country during World War II.

He was on the LSM-20 when a Kamikaze attack sank his ship on December 5, 1944. According to ship mates, he went below deck and died trying to rescue others. He was only 21 years old. There were 54 enlisted men and five officers on board.

Sadly, Bill was one of the eight enlisted men who died, while two officers and seven men were wounded. I never had the opportunity to get to know my uncle.

President Ronald Reagan said, "It is, in a way, an odd thing to honor those who died in defense of our country in wars far away. The imagination plays a trick. We see these soldiers in our mind as old and wise. We see them as something like the Founding Fathers, grave and gray-haired. But most of them were boys when they died, they gave up two lives - the one they were living and the one they would have lived. When they died, they gave up their chance to be husbands and fathers and grandfathers. They gave up their chance to be revered old men. They gave up everything for their country, for us. All we can do is remember."5

On the night before he died, Jesus gave important instructions to the twelve disciples. He knew that his death was imminent, and he wanted to encourage them and strengthen them for the days ahead.

After they had eaten what we call The Last Supper, Jesus said,

"As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments,

USDA to Provide relief payments to commodity, specialty crop producers impacted by natural disasters

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced that commodity and specialty crop producers impacted by natural disaster events in 2020 and 2021 will soon begin receiving emergency relief payments totaling approximately \$6 billion through the Farm Service Agency's (FSA) new Emergency Relief Program (ERP) to offset crop yield and value losses.

"For over two years, farmers and ranchers across the country have been hard hit by an ongoing pandemic coupled with more frequent and catastrophic natural disasters," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "As the agriculture industry deals with new challenges and stressors, we at USDA look for opportunities to inject financial support back into the rural economy through direct payments to producers who bear the brunt of circumstances beyond their control. These emergency relief payments will help offset the significant crop losses due to major weather events in 2020 and 2021 and help ensure farming operations are viable this crop year, into the next growing season and beyond.'

Background

On Sept. 30, 2021, President Biden signed into law the Extending Government Funding and Delivering Emergency Assistance Act (P.L. 117-43), which includes \$10 billion in assistance to agricultural producers impacted by wildfires, droughts, hurricanes, winter storms, and other eligible disasters experienced during calendar years 2020 and 2021. FSA recently made payments to ranchers impacted by drought and wildfire through the first phase of the Emergency Livestock Relief Program (ELRP). ERP is another relief component of the

For impacted producers, existing Federal Crop Insurance or Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) data is the basis for calculating initial payments. USDA estimates that phase one ERP benefits will reach more than 220,000 producers who received indemnities for losses covered by federal crop insurance and more than 4,000 producers who obtained NAP coverage for 2020 and 2021 crop

ERP Eligibility – Phase One ERP covers losses to crops, trees, bushes, and vines due to a qualifying natural disaster event in calendar years 2020 and 2021. Eligible crops include all crops for which crop insurance or NAP coverage was available, except for crops intended for grazing. Qualifying natural disaster events include wild-

on file. This form includes eligibility requirements, outlines the application process and provides ERP payment calculations. Producers will receive a separate application form for each program year in which an eligible loss occurred. Receipt of a pre-filled application is not confirmation that a producer is eligible to receive an ERP phase one payment.

Additionally, producers must have the following forms on file with FSA within 60 days of the ERP phase one deadline, which will later be announced by FSA's Deputy Administrator for Farm Programs:

•Form AD-2047, Customer Data Worksheet.

•Form CCC-902, Farm Operating Plan for an individual or legal entity

•Form CCC-901, Member Information for Legal Entities (if applicable).

•Form FSA-510, Request for an Exception to the \$125,000 Payment Limitation for Certain Programs (if applicable).

•Form CCC-860, Socially Disadvantaged, Limited Resource, Beginning and Veteran Farmer or Rancher Certification, if applicable, for the 2021 program year.

·A highly erodible land conservation (sometimes referred to as HELC) and wetland conservation certification (Form AD-1026 Highly Erodible Land Conservation (HELC) and Wetland Conservation (WC) Certification) for the ERP producer and applicable affiliates.

Most producers, especially those who have previously participated in FSA programs, will likely have these required forms on file. However, those who are uncertain or want to confirm the status of their forms can contact their local FSA county office.

ERP Payment Calculations -Phase One

For crops covered by crop insurance, the ERP phase one payment calculation for a crop and unit will depend on the type and level of coverage obtained by the producer. Each calculation will use an ERP factor based on the producer's level of crop insurance or NAP coverage.

• Crop Insurance – the ERP factor is 75% to 95% depending on the level of coverage ranging from catastrophic to at least 80% coverage.

 \cdot NAP – the ERP factor is 75% to 95% depending on the level of coverage ranging from catastrophic to 65% coverage.

Full ERP payment calculation factor tables are available on the emergency relief website and in the program fact sheet.

Because the amount of loss due to a qualifying disaster event in calendar years 2020 and 2021 cannot be separated from the amount of loss caused by other eligible causes of loss as defined by the applicable crop insurance or NAP policy, the ERP phase one payment will be calculated based on the producer's loss due to all eligible causes of loss.

Future Insurance Coverage Requirements

All producers who receive ERP phase one payments, including those receiving a payment based on crop, tree, bush, or vine insurance policies, are statutorily required to purchase crop insurance. or NAP coverage where crop insurance is not available, for the next two available crop years, as determined by the Secretary. Participants must obtain crop insurance or NAP, as may be applicable:

•At a coverage level equal to or greater than 60% for insurable crops; or

•At the catastrophic level or higher for NAP crops.

Coverage requirements will be determined from the date a producer receives an ERP payment and may vary depending on the timing and availability of crop insurance or NAP for a producer's particular crops. The final crop year to purchase crop insurance or NAP coverage to meet the second year of coverage for this requirement is the 2026 crop year.

Emergency Relief - Phase Two (Crop and Livestock Producers)

Today's announcement is only phase one of relief for commodity and specialty crop producers. Making the initial payments using existing safety net and risk management data will both speed implementation and further encourage participation in these permanent programs, such as Federal crop insurance, as Congress intended

The second phase of both ERF and ELRP programs will fill gaps and cover producers who did not participate in or receive payments through the existing programs that are being leveraged for phase one implementation. When phase one payment processing is complete, the remaining funds will be used to cover gaps identified under phase

Through proactive communication and outreach, USDA will keep producers and stakeholders informed as program details are made available. More information on ERP can be found in the Notice of Funding Availability.

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fires, hurricanes, floods, derechos, that payments to producers do not exceed available funding and that excessive heat, winter storms, freeze (including a polar vortex), cumulative payments do not exceed 90% of losses for all producers as smoke exposure, excessive moisture, qualifying drought, and relatrequired by the Act.

Also, there will be certain payment calculation considerations for area plans under crop insurance policies.

The ERP payment percentage for historically underserved producers, including beginning, limited resource, socially disadvantaged, and veteran farmers and ranchers will be increased by 15% of the calculated payment for crops having insurance coverage or NAP.

To qualify for the higher payment percentage, eligible producers must have a CCC-860, Socially Disadvantaged, Limited Resource, Beginning and Veteran Farmer or Rancher Certification, form on file with FSA for the 2021 program



harvest, forage options discussed Assessing Freeze Damage pense of harvest, which is unlikely observation and quick responses to

By Bruce Anderson (circa 2019) Was your alfalfa damaged by a freeze or frost last week? Frozen alfalfa usually needs some time to

recover before damage can be estimated.

To assess the extent of the damage, don't just look for frozen or wilting leaves. You need to determine if the growing point was killed. This growing point, also called the apical meristem, is where all new leaves, stems, and branches initially develop on alfalfa. It is located inside the dense cluster of unfolded leaves at the top of the main stem.

Because it is inside a cluster of leaves, the growing point is somewhat protected from cold injury. Exposed leaves and stems all around it can be frozen, wilted, and dying while the growing point cluster survives, waiting for warm weather before continuing to grow. If the growing points in your alfalfa survived the freeze, just wait for growth to begin again.

If the growing point was killed, however, growth will cease on that forecast for dry weather to wilt for from new crown shoots or from important. lower branches. While the existing plant remains intact, regrowth often is delayed. But you don't have to harvest this damaged growth; plants will begin to grow again on their own although it might take a little longer. Cutting off damaged plants often hastens development of regrowth from good, healthy fields. But cutting also adds extra stress to the plants so if you do cut the damaged plants, before you take your next cutting, wait until plants get a little more mature. I suggest cutting now only if there is enough growth to justify the time and ex-

for most fields.

Check your alfalfa plants to truly see if the tops and growing point are dead or if recovery has begun. Then decide whether to harvest or just wait for growth to renew naturally.

Quickly Maturing Cool Season Forages

Cool season annuals like cereal rye, triticale, barley, and oats as well as perennial forages like brome, timothy, and various wheatgrass species are quickly maturing with recent warm temperatures and the return of precipitation. Are you prepared?

As grasses mature, quality declines. This means harvesting at the right time can be the difference between feed that meets nutrient you plan to use it. requirements later in the year or one that needs additional supplementation. As our cool season species rapidly grow, check on them often and be ready to pull the trigger for harvest based on stage of maturity. Selecting Summer Annual Forages By Jerry Volesky

It is close to the ideal time to plant a summer annual grass, maybe to build hay supply or have some extra grazing. Which one will you plant?

Choosing a summer forage can be confusing because there are six different types of major summer annual forage grasses. These include: sudangrass, sorghum-sudan hybrids, forage sorghum (which we often call cane or sorgo), foxtail millet, pearl millet, and teff. Each one has its own strengths and weaknesses. So, base your choice primarily on how

What if you want hay or green chop? Then select sorghum-sudan stem. While there are several choices of summer annual forages, simply select the one that is best adapted to the way you plan to use it. And, of course, hope for rain since even these grasses won't grow without some moisture.

First Cutting Alfalfa By Brad Schick

Corn and soybeans are still getting planted due to a cool start to the year. Alfalfa too has been behind compared to most years, and first cutting may need to happen sooner than expected or than preferred.

The lack of soil moisture last fall and through the winter, slow start to spring rains, and cool temperatures slowed alfalfa growth this spring. With recent precipitation and warm weather, alfalfa has resumed growth quickly. Those needing dairy quality hay may need to cut very soon. The quality of first cutting hay declines rapidly with growth much more than the second, third, or forth cuttings.

Those wanting to maximize quantity to replenish hay reserves,



may want to wait just a little longer until almost full bloom to produce higher yields. Alfalfa will be more efficient with what soil moisture is available if cutting waits until bloom, but this doesn't always match the plans for an operation. If an operation needs a roughage source, this higher yield and lower quality is better. However, if an operation needs a protein source, cutting earlier to produce a higher quality hay will need to be done.

Whatever quality and quantity of alfalfa an operation needs, cut-
