New member sworn in during council retreat

Brittany Webber was sworn in as the newest member of Wayne City Council dur-

ing a council retreat on Tuesday. Webber will represent Ward 3, the northwest quadrant of the city and fill the term of Dallas Dorey who has moved out of the

Also during the retreat, a public hearing of both streets are outside city limits. was held and council members received information from Finance Director Beth Porter on the 2022-2023 budget. Final numbers and the city's tax asking will be presented at a future public hearing.

Topics discussed during the retreat included housing, work on Fourth Street, 21st Street and Centennial Road.

Council members talked about what types of housing are needed in the city, and whether or not the city should be more active in helping developers with certain areas.

Possible options included paying for the water and sewer. The properties discussed are not eligible for TIF financing.

Council members said that properties that are developed would generate more property tax revenue.

It it estimated that at the present time there are under 35 lots available to build

on and the recent housing study indicated a need for available lots in all price ranges.

Discussion was held on where funding would come from if these incentives were to be put in place.

Additional discussion was held on the need to complete work on Fourth Street and 21st Street.

Both of these projects would require cooperation with the county officials as portions

It was noted that not having these streets paved is "really limiting growth in the city." Also on the retreat agenda was future

funding for the CRA. Mayor Cale Giese said "we have to rethink how we fund the CRA. They are work-

ing on projects we asked them to and getting further and further in debt." One option discussed was having a tax levy for the group, similar to that of the

Wayne Airport Authority. It could bring in approximately \$86,000 per year. A skate park somewhere in the city was

discussed.

Information was shared on the impact on the city's insurance and council members were told a skate park is treated in the same way as other parks and there would be no additional costs.

cussed building a new city hall that would be more accessible to the public or renovating the current building. Arguments on both sides were shared,

including comments from Wayne Area Economic Development Director Luke Virgil that if the city were to purchase the building, the city would lose "some excellent commercial frontage and lose property taxes on the property."

He also told the council that there has been lots of interest in the property since it

Council members Matt Eischied, Brent Pick and Jill Brodersen, who are part of the facilities group, will inspect the building and make a recommendation to the council.

Bid accepted for security system at Wayne schools

In a meeting to approve end-of-year claims, the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education met Tuesday.

In addition to approving the claims, Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan told the board that the district ended the fiscal year with approximately \$125,000 more in cash reserves than in the last fiscal year.

Following approval of the claims the board voted to transfer \$50,000 from the General Fund to the Depreciation Fund, earmarked for technology.

A bid of \$11,498.30 was accepted from ECS Technology Solutions for 11 security cameras for the elementary school.

Dr. Lenihan told the board that the new

system will allow for cloud-based storage of information. An electrician will be needed to assist with the installation.

The purchase will be paid for with ES-SER III funds and the cameras could be installed fairly soon.

The Construction Manager at Risk (CM@R) agreement was approved with Hausmann Construction for the proposed Early Childhood and High School Improvements Project.

A series of four meetings will be held prior to mid-November as the process moves forward. The district will also be working with attorneys from the Perry Law Firm throughout the entire project.

Our state was settled by hardy homesteaders who ventured across windswept prairies in search of opportunity. While we often celebrate the grit and determination of these early Nebraskans, they deserve equal credit for their ingenuity. Their inventiveness helped transform the Great Plains into some of the most productive agricultural land in the world.

This spirit of innovation remains a driving force behind our state's global leadership in agriculture. Nebraskans are continuously coming up with new and improved ways



of caring for their land and animals. They're designing machines, creating software, and applying technology to optimize the use of natural resources. They're pioneering new techniques to address labor shortages and safety issues.

State agencies are working to encourage this innovation in agriculture. The Nebraska Department of Economic Development (DED), in partnership with Invest Nebraska, launched the Combine incubator at Innovation Campus in October 2019. The Combine supports highgrowth entrepreneurs in food and agriculture. The Combine received a \$600,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce in September 2020 to help businesses test out and commercialize their ideas. In May 2021, the Combine won a competitive \$50,000 award from the U.S. Department of Energy for its demonstrated impact as an innovation center.

Startups at the Combine incubator have earned national recognition. In January, the American Farm Bureau Federation announced the winners of its Ag Innovation Challenge, a competition open to entrepreneurs across the country. Nebraska startups in the Combine incubator program took home three of the top four spots.

Grain Weevil won the top prize. The Aurora-based company is tackling the problem of grain bin safety. It has developed an agile robot resembling a weevil—that can walk across the surface of a grain bin to perform tasks that would otherwise require a farmer to physically crawl inside the bin. This makes grain bin management more efficient and keeps farmers out of harm's way.

Birds Eye Robotics in Waterloo was named the runner-up. The company has engineered a robotics system to provide upkeep and maintenance in chicken barns, performing time-consuming tasks that would otherwise require a farmer to walk through a broiler house.

Marble Technologies received recognition as a finalist of the Ag Innovation Challenge. It has designed technologies to automate many of the labor-intensive, repetitive tasks in beef and pork processing facilities. Its products are helping to address the labor shortages that sometimes serve as a bottleneck in meat processing.

Herbs and spices have been used for centuries to season and flavor

In prehistoric times, people discovered that certain parts of plants bark, or root. (For example: cinmade food taste better. Herbs were the flavoring of the common people, often grown in kitchen gardens or gathered in the woods. 

of America was not a quest for new lands, but a journey to find a new and shorter path to bring spices back from Asia to the merchants in Spain. Modern consumers use both

herbs and spices to enhance the flavor and healthfulness of foods. Spices from all over the world are widely available. Herbs can be grown in the home garden, or purchased from a farmers market or grocery store. Seasonings are sold whole, crushed, powdered, dry, or fresh to provide a variety of flavors.

Herbs and spices can be a great addition to your diet. By reducing sugar, you can save calories. Eating 100 fewer calories than needed a day can lead to a 10-pound weight. loss in a year. Adding spices such as allspice, anise, cardamom, or cinnamon will add flavor and allow you

to reduce the amount of sugar in some preparations. (Note: Sugar also plays a part in browning, tenderness, and leavening of some baked products, so the finished product may be different in taste and appearance. Experiment with gradual changes.) Try sweetening oatmeal, sweet potatoes, or squash with a mixture of cinnamon and sugar. Another benefit of using herbs

and spices is reducing the salt and sodium vou use. Replace salt in savory preparations with black pepper, garlic powder, curry powder, cumin, dill seeds, basil, ginger, coriander, or onion powder. Be sure to check the ingredient label of seasoning mixes to ensure that salt is not the first ingredient. To reduce sodium, buy powdered garlic or onion instead of garlic salt or onion salt. Eating lower-fat preparations

can reduce calories and decrease the risks of heart disease and some cancers. Using herbs and spices for flavoring - instead of breading, batters, gravies, or sauces is a healthier preparation method. Grilling foods seasoned with herbs and spices, instead of frying, is another way to reduce fat.



He served as pastor of St. Petri Lutheran Church in Story City, Iowa, from 2012 to 2019; as campus pastor at University Lutheran Center at Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa from 2008 to 2012; and as pastor of Peace Lutheran Church in Barrett, Minnesota from 2003 to 2007.

Johnson earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in classics and religious studies from University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 1998 and his Master of Divinity degree from Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minn., in 2003. Luther is one of seven ELCA seminaries.

Johnson take office Sept. 1, and his installation is scheduled for Sept. 24

at First Lutheran Church in Kearney.

The Rev. Brian D. Maas has served as bishop of the Nebraska Synod since 2012.

We should not be 'quiet quitters'


Lately I have been seeing several references to something called "qui-

et quitting.' It is a relatively new term for clocking in and doing the bare minimum at work. You still keep your job but no longer go above and beyond working long hours and volunteering for demanding projects. The attitudes reflected in the phenomenon are nothing new. For as long as there have been workers and employers, there have been tensions between work life and family life. Quiet quitting seems to be a way that some have tried to address the pressures that lead to burn out.

The Bible does not speak of quiet quitting, but it does address a related topic to those who are weary of doing good. Paul wrote to the Galatians, "And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up" (Gal 6:9). Paul wrote about those who are doing good, but their problem is that they are getting tired. Perhaps because of the resistance of those who are wicked or the laziness of those who are idle, Paul understands that they are becoming weary.

They are still doing good. They are still going in the right direction, but they are getting tired. They are growing discouraged. They are worn out. When we are weary, it generally means that we are tired from doing something repeatedly. I think that we are most susceptible to the kind of weariness that Paul was speaking of in the long middle stages of life. You may know the feeling, year upon year we go through the same routine. Maybe it is the same routine around the house of meals, dishes, laundry and cleaning. After a while it just wears on us.

This is particularly true when it comes to trying to do good. In many activities in the secular world, we can measure our success in tangible

It is only God who can strengthen us when we are weary. Only He can renew our strength. And so we are encouraged to pray. We need to pray for ourselves that our strength may be renewed, and we need to pray for those who are doing good, that they do not grow tired or discouraged. Heaven knows that there are enough critics and complainers out there.

Paul particularly encourages prayers that "the word of the Lord may speed ahead and be honored." This prayer is key because it is through the word of the Lord that God brings his equipping. The word encourages us to direct

our hearts to the love of God and to the steadfastness of Christ. The author to the book of Hebrews put it this way, "[look] to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who But we may wonder, how can we for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted" (Heb 12:2-3).

If we look to our strength, we cannot help but grow weary. But we are instead to look to Jesus. In our weariness listen to the one who said, "Come to me all you who are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest" (Mt 11:28). Jesus is the one who promised to be with us, he is the one who said, "I will never leave you or forsake you." He is the one who equips us for our labor. He is the one for whom we work. Rather than quietly quitting when it comes to doing good, may we hearken to God's Word of encouragement.







Alfalfa, forage, grasshoppers discussed

Alfalfa Evaluation And Renovation

Bv Ben Beckman

Were you expecting more from your alfalfa yields this year or had a disappointing spring seeding? Is it time to renovate or move on?

Before we make any decisions, measuring our stand to accurately determine health is our first step. We can either measure plants or stems per square foot, but stem count will more accurately predict yield. To assess, take a 17 x 17-inch square or a 19-inch diameter circle and set it down in a field. Count the plants or stems that would be harvested, then divide those by two to get stems or plants per square foot. Do this in several spots around the field for accurate assessment.

For established stands having 4 to 5 healthy plants per square foot or 55 stems per square foot warrants a productive and healthy stand Stem counts below 55 see a significant decrease in dry matter production. For spring established stands, 10-15 plants per square foot is a perfectly healthy stand as the alfalfa begins to age. Plants will continue to branch out, so 35-55 stems per square foot is the goal at this point.

If our stand does appear to be lacking, we have a few options. In fields established this spring, alfalfa autotoxicity has not yet set in, so interseeding thin patches is an option. For older fields, interseeding with a high-quality forage grass may be a way to maintain productivity for a few more years. Orchard grass is a tried-and-true option to consider but remember grass/alfalfa mixtures are very limited for weed control options. For either alfalfa or a grass, plan on drilling seeds rather than broadcasting for proper establishment.

Soybeans For Forage By Brad Schick



With drought plaguing Nebraska and surrounding states this year, producers may want to salvage soybeans as forage instead of for grain. Many can remember when soybeans were only used for forage many decades ago, so it can definitely

Grazing, haying, or ensiling can all be done with soybean plants. Grazing is very simple and has a relatively low risk of bloat, however, if there are many bean seeds themselves, high oil consumption can cause issues in cattle, especially calves. Young calves should not be allowed access to beans. For mature cattle, providing some grass hay can help reduce this risk. Use strip grazing to force the use of the entire plant.

Hay from soybeans will have a similar quality to that of alfalfa. However, drying and rolling up hay is difficult with soybeans. The leaves become very fragile while the stems can take a long time to dry. Crimp the stem heavily and resist the urge to rake the windrow unless done only one day after cutting to limit leaf shatter.

Soybean silage is easier than hay-

ing. The moisture content needs to being crushed under their wheels. be between 60 and 70%. In the past, while corn silage is being packed at a ratio of one ton soybean silage to 3 or 4 tons corn silage. This improves fermentation and will make the overall silage pile have higher development. crude protein. If doing only soybean silage in a pile, wait until the leaves begin to turn yellow and be sure to use an inoculant. Adding a bushel of rolled corn per ton of silage can help fermentation and as always, be sure to get a very good pack.

By conducting visual counts or using a sweep net, you can determine if the threshold of 15-20 nymphs or 8-10 adults per square yard has been reached in your field.
