# Housing discussion part of council retreat

Housing discussion preceded the Wayne City Council's mini retreat on Tuesday.

Wayne Area Economic Development Director Luke Virgil, along with representatives from the Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation, shared information with the council on the housing needs and availability of housing within the community

Virgil told the council that there are currently 28 lots available to build houses on in the city of Wayne and "there is a dire need to get more lots on line."

He shared four options for increasing available single family houses.

These include participation loans in which would involve working with banks and some type of interest buy-downs with money provided by the city. This could involve a larger scale project, including a new subdivision.

A second option brought forth was another Western Ridge type development. The project would create new property taxes, increased utility revenue and additional sales tax for the city.

The third option would be a buy-back guarantee on single family dwellings.

Rod Tompkins with Heritage Homes spoke to the council on a similar type project taking place in the city of Holdredge. He said Heritage Homes is currently build-

ing six homes in the \$300,000 price range in Holdredge and the city has guaranteed the homes would sell within 30 days of being completed or the city would buy them.

The final option, which was favored by the Wayne Business & Industry committee. would be to use a process similar to what is being used in Wisner. It would involve sales tax revenue on TIF-eligible property.

Council members felt it would be possible to combine some of these options to create much needed housing, in several price ranges for the city.

It was noted that building all types of housing would allow for some other types of housing to become available for homeowners.

Council agreed to move forward with the necessary paperwork for an intent to applv for a Rural Workforce Housing Development Grant for up to \$1 million. The city would be responsible for providing matching funds.

Topics ranging from city park equipment to a new city well and from the city's investment policies to electricity were on the agenda during the mini retreat.

Mayor Cale Giese gave an update on items that will be coming before the council in the near future.

He said that with changes in interest rates, how the city invests its funds will need to be discussed.

park equipment for East Park that the Parks and Recreation Department would like to purchase in this fiscal year.

Casey Junck, Water/Wastewater Super-He also showed pictures of proposed intendent, told the council the city should

consider putting in a new well to provide water to the city.

"We had to shut Well 7 down again and with the town growing, we need to have another well," Junck said.

Additional information on the city's electricity needs will be presented to the council with direction for moving forward presented by a newly hired consultant.

Also part of the Tuesday's retreat was discussion on parking on city streets.

Mayor Giese shared information that the city of Holdredge has no regulations in regard to parking. It was noted that Holdredge does have three large city-owned parking lots in the downtown area. The final item on the retreat agenda was

discussion on the Ameritas property. The city was provided renovation estimates by Otte Construction, but wants to get actual numbers based on a walk-through of the building to determine what would actually need to be done.

Suggestions for moving forwarded included getting a contractor's estimate from an outside source. The cost for this service is estimated at \$5,000 but council members felt that amount would be worth it to determine whether or not the city moves forward with the purchase of the property.

The Wayne City Council will next meet in regular session Tuesday, Dec. 6 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

## NDA reports additional case of HPAI in Nebraska

ture (NDA) in conjunction with the United States Department of Agriculture's (US-DA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) is announcing another confirmed case of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI). This brings the total number of cases of HPAI in Nebraska this year to 13.

The 13th farm is a commercial flock of laying birds in Dixon County.

According to NDA State Veterinarian Dr. Roger Dudley, the affected flock will be depopulated and will be disposed of in an approved manner. NDA will establish a 6.2-mile control zone, as is USDA policy, around the affected premises. Poultry producers should know the signs and symptoms of HPAI and notify NDA immediately of sick or dying birds.

HPAI is a highly contagious virus that spreads easily among birds through nasal and eve secretions, as well as manure. The virus can be spread in various ways from flock to flock, including by wild birds, through contact with infected poultry, by equipment, and on the clothing and shoes of caretakers. Wild birds can carry the virus without becoming sick, while domesticated birds can become very sick.

Symptoms of HPAI in poultry include: a decrease in water consumption; lack of en-

The Nebraska Department of Agricul- ergy and appetite; decreased egg production or soft-shelled, misshapen eggs; nasal discharge, coughing, sneezing; incoordination; and diarrhea. HPAI can also cause sudden death in birds even if they aren't showing any other symptoms. HPAI can survive for weeks in contaminated environments.

> NDA is encouraging bird owners to prevent contact between their birds and wildlife and to practice strict biosecurity measures. If producers suspect signs of HPAI in their flock, they should report it to NDA immediately at 402-471-2351. More information for producers can be found at https://nda.nebraska.gov/animal/avian/index.html or http://healthybirds.aphis.usda.

> Enhanced biosecurity helps prevent the introduction and spread of viruses and diseases including HPAI. NDA and USDA have resources available to help poultry owners step up their biosecurity efforts.

> •Know the warning signs of infectious bird diseases like HPAI. Be on the lookout for unusual signs of behavior, severe illness and/or sudden deaths.

·Restrict access to your property and poultry.

• Keep it clean. Wear clean clothes, scrub boots/shoes with disinfectant and wash hands thoroughly before and after contact with your flock.

· If you, your employees, or family have been on other farms, or other places where there is livestock and/or poultry, clean and disinfect vour vehicle tires and equipment before returning home.

•Don't share equipment, tools, or other supplies with other livestock or poultry owners

·In addition to practicing good biosecurity, all bird owners should prevent contact between their birds and wild birds, making sure wild birds cannot access domestic poultry's feed and water sources.

• Report sick birds immediately to: NDA at 402-471-2351; the USDA at 866-536-7593; or your veterinarian.

Early detection is important to prevent the spread of disease. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the risk to people getting HPAI infections from birds is low.

All poultry entering Nebraska must be accompanied by a VS form 9-3 or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI, or health certificate). If you are considering moving an animal into Nebraska from an affected state, please call 402- 471-2351 to learn more. Nebraska poultry owners wanting to ship poultry out of state should consult the state veterinarians of the destination states for import requirements.

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

An advocate for agriculture in Nebraska has been recognized for her contributions to the industry.

Anita Keys of Elsmere was named the 2022 AgCeptional Woman of the Year during Northeast Community College's AgCeptional Women's Conference recently on the Northeast campus in Norfolk.

The announcement was made as part of a video tribute that was played during the opening session of the 14th annual conference. The video was sponsored by Farm Credit Services of America and produced by the Northeast Agriculture Department and District 25 Productions LLC.

A special selection committee made up of professionals from agricultural businesses and operations is assembled each year to select the winner from a competitive group of nominees.

"I am humbled and honored to get this award, and to receive it from your peers is something extra special," Keys said in accepting the award. "It's one thing to get an award for best yield or best whatever, but this is very special."

Keys, a daughter of the late Neil and Bonnie Sandahl, was raised on a farm near Wakefield in Wayne County. After graduating from high school, she attended the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) where she met her future husband, Kerry Keys. The couple, who operate a ranch near Elsmere in southeast Cherry County, has two adult daughters who have become successful in their own careers. Stacey Keys is a 4-H extension assistant for Nebraska Extension in Burt County while Amanda Keys is employed as an accountant in Broken Bow.

Keys was nominated for the Ag-Ceptional Woman award by Karen Grant of Meadow Grove, who was bestowed the honor in 2015. She said Keys is deserving of the recognition. "Elsmere may be a tiny town out west, but Anita is big on educating about life as a farmer or rancher from her own home to all parts of the United States and the world," Grant said. "She has connections and is willing to go above and beyond to spread the word of agriculture."

Keys was a member of the Leadership Education/Action Development (LEAD) 17 program with content focused on economics, government, human relations, communications, international trade, sociology, education, the arts, social-cultural understandings, as well as agriculture. She has utilized the knowledge she gained from her experiences with LEAD with others.



The efforts of these women has been featured in the November issue of "Quilt World."


An interview with the quilters was done several years ago by Maureen Battistella and includes a history of the group and several photos from as early as the 1970s.

## WSC's Grosz earns award

Wayne State rallied from a 46-22 deficit early in the third quarter and stormed back to shock host Colorado Mesa 62-59 Saturday evening at the Holiday Inn-Airport Thanksgiving Women's Basketball Classic in Grand Junction, Colo.

The win gave Wildcat coach Brent Pollari his 100th career win and capped a successful weekend for the 4-1 Wildcats women.

Wayne State trailed 18-14 after one quarter and still trailed by four early in the second when the Mavericks went on a 14-0 run and led by as many as 22 before going into halftime with a 43-22 advantage.

That's when things turned the Wildcats' way.

Wayne State used a 13-0 run in the third quarter and were able to close the gap to 12 at 50-38 going into the final period.

Kassidy Pingel drained a 3-pointer from the right wing to shave the Maverick lead to nine at 50-41 early in the fourth, and the Wildcats finally erased the lead with a Kylah vanDonkersgoed basket and backto-back buckets by Annie Guntzel to tie the score at 55-55 with 2:29

to play.

After the Mavericks made a pair of free throws to go up two, Pingel had consecutive baskets and WSC took a 59-57 lead with 1:07 to play. A pair of Lauren Zacharias free throws gave the 'Cats a 61-57 cushion, but the Mavericks cut the lead to two with :08 left to make the score 61-59. Zacharias was fouled on the inbounds pass and sank one of two free throws, and a desperation 3-pointer fell short, sealing the Wildcat comeback win.

Zacharias scored 17 points to lead Wayne State followed by Pingel with 15 and Guentzel 12. Zacharias and Maya Fitzpatrick each had four rebounds. Zacharias had five assists and six steals to lead the 'Cats in both categories.

On Friday, Zacharias scorched the nets for 37 points in just 22 minutes and Wayne State made 14 3-pointers while shooting over 52 percent from the field to earn a 90-60 blowout win over Fort Lewis College.

Zacharias scored the first nine points of the game for WSC in the first 2:01, draining a 3-pointer fol-

lowed by an old-fashioned threepoint play and another 3-pointer to give the 'Cats an early 9-2 lead.

The Skyhawks closed the deficit to 17-12 after one guarter, but Wayne State went 6-of-12 from 3-point range in the second quarter to build a 20-point halftime lead, and Fort Lewis never got closer than nine the rest of the way.

Zacharias' career-high 37 points were the most scored by a Wildcat player since Amy Brodersen's 37 points against Briar Cliff in 1995. She was 12-of-18 from the field and 7-for-10 behind the arc to go with a perfect 6-of-6 at the stripe. The seven 3-pointers are the most in a game for WSC since Jennifer Yee sank seven against Mary on Dec. 7, 2007 and is tied for the fifth most treys in a single game. Sophomore Delaney Clark also hit double digits with 14 points going 5-for-8 from the field and 4-of-7 from 3-point range.

Abby Kopecky grabbed eight boards for WSC. Clark and Kopecky each had five assists while Zacharias and Fitzpatrick each had three steals

In last week's NSIC opener, Augustana shot nearly 55 percent for the game and cruised past Wayne State College 93-74 in Sioux Falls, S.D.

Fitzpatrick scored the first basket of the game for the Wildcats and that was the lone WSC lead of the contest. Augustana produced better than 50 percent shooting in the opening two quarters and never looked back

With the Vikings leading 13-12 at the 3:26 mark of the first quarter, Augustana scored the next nine points for a double-digit lead at 22-12 and finished the opening quarter with a 22-15 lead. They built the lead to 10 at the half and pulled away in the second half, leading by as many as 25 before settling on the 19-point win.

Zacharias was the lone Wildcat in double figures with 12 points. Fitzpatrick added nine while Logan Hughes, Kopecky and Clark each had eight.

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
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
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# **One starter back for** Bear boys hoops



Patent's report set Nebraska's cash reserve at \$2.3 billion, which is roughly \$1.3 billion higher than the maximum reserve level based on state revenues. That's about 35 percent of total revenues, well

They will continue to offer support while the baby remains hospitalized and growing, and after he comes home, because that is what grandparents do, if they are able.

Grandparenting can be an awesome stage in life, benefitting the grandchildren, the parents, and of course the grandparents in significant ways. Grandparents are known to influence values and behaviors and provide valuable life experiences. A child who has a connection with grandparents may have increased self-esteem, with better emotional and social skills. A relationship with a grandparent can give a child strength and comfort into adulthood.

In an article titled "Why Grandparents are VIPs," social researcher, educator and author, Susan V. Bosak writes, "The special kind of love you get from a grandparent is a love you can't get anywhere else. It is an important kind of love – in fact, a very important kind of love. Parents have to worry about who children will become in the future: their role is to be providers and disciplinarians. Grandparents can just enjoy children for who they are in the moment. The love of a grandparent is often freer, more unconditional, and far less psychologically complex than a parent's love. The love of a parent and the love of a grandparent are different, second in emotional importance only to the parent/child relationship."

In a world of many dual-career families, the benefits of active grandparents can be lifesaving for most Thursdays at 7 p.m. central.

"He decided to choose nursing (for his benevolence) because he worked in the medical field for over 30 years and because of the people. In the last few years, they were really good to Jack and to my mom, so they wanted to give back to that community.

Furthermore, annual scholarships are awarded to students on a yearly basis. A minimum amount is required to establish a scholarship in the donor's name(s)

## Hay usage, Ag workshop discussed

#### Saving Hay By Ben Beckman

Making, transporting, and feeding hay is a large investment in time, equipment, and money. At current prices, even reducing waste a small amount can mean big savings. Can you be doing more to save hav?

While there will always be some loss during storage, keeping hay out of the elements and packed tightly is critical. Hay stored in a barn can expect 6-9% losses, while hay outside, directly on the ground, and loosely wrapped can have up to 40% loss. Visually, loss is easy to underestimate. In a 5.5 ft. round bale, 1/3 of the bale's mass is found in the outer 6 inches

When it comes time to feed, losses can add up as well. If hay is fed unrestricted, cattle can waste 45% of the hay they are provided. While this "waste" can be beneficial as bedding or a soil amendment, it's an awfully expensive way to put cover on the ground. Limit feeding hay so only daily requirements are provided will significantly reduce waste right away. Studies show that cattle fed daily versus fed every four days needed 25% less hay. This can be as labor intensive as a daily feeding, or something as simple as limiting access to hay in a feeder for a few hours each day. Limiting access by physical barriers is another way to decrease hay loss. Bale rings, racks, fences, or another form of limited access can all decrease waste. The most effective physical barriers have solid side bottoms. This prevents the hay being pulled out onto the ground. Studies by the University of Missouri. Oklahoma State. and Michigan State on feed loss from bale feeders all found open bottom ring feeders resulting in 20% losses, closed bottom ring feeders had 13% loss, and cone feeders with only 5% loss. While these methods are effective, they require the purchase of additional equipment that can add significant time and money for large herds or changing feeding location. Between storage and feed losses, it's easy to lose half of every bale purchased or produced. To give value to even a 25% improvement, take your current hay bill and subtract 25%. At the current \$180/ton, that's \$45/ton. Reducing hay losses means better returns on your hay investment.

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



These numbers indicate which classification the district will be placed in either Class A,B,C1, C2,D1,or D2. This classification can change from year to year.
