

The dangers of carbon monoxide poisoning discussed

Carbon Monoxide (CO) poisoning 911. cannot be seen, cannot be smelled, but it can be stopped.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, there are more than 400 deaths and approximately 50,000 emergency room visits each year because of CO poisoning. The CO death rate is highest among people 65 years of age or older. Symptoms of CO poisoning can be easily mistaken for the flu and include headache, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, drowsiness, confusion, but also could cause loss of consciousness. CO is a gas produced when fuels

burn incompletely. Sources include: Furnaces

- ·Fireplaces and space heaters
- (both gas and wood burning)
- Water heaters
- ·Gas clothes dryers
- ·Stoves, grills, generators, and power tools
- •All vehicles that burn fossil fuel. The first step in treating a person with CO poisoning is to make sure they have fresh air. Further treatment in a healthcare facility may be necessary. The Poison Center's healthcare professionals are available to assist callers with the management of CO exposures. The poison center may advise you to call

The Nebraska Regional Poison Center offers the following tips for CO poisoning prevention:

·Install carbon monoxide detectors on every level of your home, replace batteries every six months.

 Recognize the early symptoms of CO poisoning. ·Have all fuel-burning applianc-

·Ventilate fuel and gas-burning

·Never use a charcoal grill or hi-

en for heating a room.

 Never leave a car running in an attached garage, even with the garage door open.

·Run generators at a safe distance from the home - never next to a window or a door.

·Have vehicle muffler and tailpipes checked regularly. ·Avoid sitting in a car with the

Bill introduction takes place for Nebraska State Legislature

This week found us finishing Day 12 of Session. It has been a busy 12 days. Bill introduction was completed on Wednesday and we adopted the Permanent Rules on Thursday. Now it is time to get ready for Committee Hearings and moving my bills forward.

I introduced 13 bills this session. Some of the bills I introduced I brought back from last session as I felt it was important to continue working to move them forward.

Now that bill introduction has taken place and permanent rules have been adopted, we are ready to move forward with the work we were elected to do. Until Permanent Rules were successfully advanced, we could not move forward to committee hearings.

There were 812 bills introduced and 30 Constitutional Amendments. Here is a list of the bills I intro-

At the January meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education the board passed a resolution calling for a bond election in an amount not to exceed \$27,945,000.00 to address necessary facility and program needs. The special election will be a mailin ballot due on March 14, 2023. Taxpayers of the Wayne Community School District will have the ballots mailed to them by the election commissioner on Feb. 21, 2023.

The reasons the board moved forward with a bond election are our enrollment growth and the need to provide appropriate classrooms and educational facilities for future enrollment projections. As Wayne grows in population, our school district enrollment will continue to increase. At this point, our facilities are all at capacity for enrollment, and we continue to enroll students even as the school year progresses.

Our school district has seen steady growth in enrollment numbers over the past decade. The 2012-13 school year was the first year of our two-building structure in which we consolidated our programs for a kindergarten through sixth grade facility and a seventh through 12th grade facility. At that time, our total school district enrollment was 865 students for K-12th grade. Combining grade levels into a K-6th and 7th-12th system provided more efficient operational capabilities and allowed increased course offerings to our junior and

senior high students. The previous elementary school that housed K-4th grade students and was located near the Kern Track was in dire need of expensive upgrades to code and life safety requirements, and it was no longer ADA accessible. It also had limited room for expansion of the facility; therefore, the district decided to eliminate the building and expend resources for the current elementary school and high school to support the programming and enrollment at that time. The new two-building system served the K-12th grade program well for the enrollment

Annual physical therapy exams can prevent problems, improve overall health

Annual physical therapy exams aren't as common as a yearly physical or a regular checkup with the dentist. However, research shows that moving well is important, so an annual check to find small changes in strength, balance, coordination, or range of motion makes

An annual PT exam is quick and easy. They usually include a history of your injuries, a complete health history, and a review of your movement goals - do you want to run a marathon or just get on and off the floor easier when you play with your grandkids?

There is strong evidence suggesting that movement is a valuable

First is gait velocity, which is simply how fast you walk. Studies have shown that if your typical walking speed is over 3.3 feet/second, you're likely able to complete typical daily activities independently. You're also less likely to be hospitalized and less likely to have adverse events like falls.

Another series of studies suggest that if you can go from standing to sitting on the floor and back to standing without using your hands, you're a lot less likely to die than someone who can't. It's called the sitting-rising test. You can find the instructions and examples with a quick internet search.

Notice that both gait velocity and the sitting-rising test aren't specific to any one thing. The risk of hospitalization in the gait velocity studies was hospitalization for any reason. Death in the sitting-rising

studies was death from anything. So science says that moving well is incredibly important to your overall health. It's also important for your quality of life. Considering that moving well impacts your quality of life both now and later, having a regular physical therapy check up to find problems early is one of the best things you can do for yourself this year.



Janssen tops all-time scoring list as Wildcats win two

Jordan Janssen became Wayne State's all-time leading scorer in men's basketball after a monumental evening Saturday.

The fifth-year senior poured in a career-high 32 points to break the previous mark of 1,942 set by Grady Hansen (1979-1983) to help the Wildcats roll to a 91-62 win over Minnesota Crookston at Rice Auditorium.

dementia to explain them.

As we age, some symptoms perceived as memory changes are probably within the spectrum of normal. The occasional forgetting or having a delay finding words is a great example of this. More difficulty recalling names is another. This can be normal at any age but tends to happen more frequently as our brains age. Sometimes patients are notic-

ing real and concerning issues, but through medical evaluation, we find non-dementia reasons for them. The most common reason would be - you guessed it - medications. While many medications can affect cognition especially in older patients, often we can blame drugs with anti-cholinergic properties (even over-the-counter diphenhydramine found in cold, allergy, and sleep medication) and benzoanxiety or sleep). Patients should review their medications, both pre-

concerns; of course, if a patient is showing early signs of dementia, we want to assess that and do our best to get to a diagnosis for them. What I have found, however, is that often when these concerns are raised, we find things that are not

concerns.

Other common mimics of cognitive change in older patients are depression, anxiety, and sleep disorders. These disorders can cause the brain to be unfocused and distracted which frequently manifests as forgetfulness. Treating the underlying condition effectively will usually improve one's cognition, so we should look for signs of those when evaluating memory concerns.

Numerous other medical causes can also impair one's cognition and memory. These include vitamin deficiencies, abnormal electrolytes, infections, or abnormalities in the brain like bleeding, tumors, or hydrocephalus. Further, there are numerous causes of dementia; Alzheimer's disease being just one. A thorough history, exam, and sometimes labs or imaging might be warranted if true cognitive impairment is present.

To be clear, if you are experiencing symptoms of change in memory, don't assume it is dementia. Talk with your medical provider; it may be normal or have any of a long list of other causes. Let's figure it out together.

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


What not to bring to worship

Most of us are familiar with the process of packing for a day trip or a vacation.

I make a list, sometimes mentally, other times written, of the things I'll need for the trip. The destination always requires consideration, going to Florida in January will require different clothing than coming to Nebraska in January. Sometimes, even being thoughtful, we get to our destination without something we intended to bring for me it's frequently a phone charger. Hotels often help out those of us who forget items with complimentary blow dryers, soaps, shampoo, and lotions, which can come in quite handy.

One might spend a significant amount of time packing for a trip, yet how much time and thought do we give to getting ready for the worship of our Triune God? Perhaps we don't think we have to prepare for worship, we just show up, the bell choir plays, we sing some hymns, the pastor shares a message, and we all go home.

Worship isn't to be an entertainment experience, it isn't about us, worship is about God. Presbyterians are in the Reformed tradition and believe that worship is not only about God, it is a direct response to God. As worshipers we must always remember that God is truly present, active, and involved in our worship, and that our worship is a response to what God has done, is doing, and is about to do in

Worship is a verb. Worship is something we do, not something done to us. Worship most often takes place in a beautiful sanctuary; however worship can take place in a in truth--the revealed truth of how variety of settings from the histori-

cal stained-glass church, the riverside, under a tree or even in prison. Whether in the best or the worst of circumstances, one can still worship God. Remember Paul and Silas in the Philippian prison, while their backs were still raw from the beating they'd received, they worshiped God (Acts 16:25).

Failure to worship cannot be blamed on the pastor, a temporary pastor or a layperson leading worship. Neither can failure to worship be blamed on poor singing, a boring sermon, or the noise from the chil-

dren in the next pew. Each individual is in charge of bringing the right attitude to worship. Jesus told the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well, "Those who worship God must worship in spirit and in truth" (John 4:24). Worship with one's inner being, their spirit, not just their lips or their bodies going through the motions, and

Forage information shared

Planning for spring annual forages By Jerry Volesky

While we are still early in the new year, it is time to start thinking about any spring annual forages that we might plant. Part of the process may be anticipating a need for extra feed or booking seed early for possible discounts.

For spring or cool-season annual forages, the planting period is typically late March to early April, or when soil temperatures are in the 42-to-45-degree range. Oats is probably the most common coolseason annual forage planted in Nebraska. However, spring triticale or spring barley are two other small grain options that have been found to perform similarly to oats in terms of forage yield and quality.

Also similar is the number of days until ready to begin grazing or at seed cost of the different species before making a decision. With the early spring planting date of the cool-season annuals, grazing can typically begin around the third or fourth week of May and last into early July. Haying usually take place around the third week of

If grazing is a primary goal, Italian ryegrass could be included in a mix with the cereal grains, and this will result in a longer grazing period. Field peas are another species that could be included to enhance forage quality and provide some nitrogen fixation. Remember to consider the herbi-

cides that may have been used on a field the previous year. Some herbicides may have long residuals that could hinder establishment even into this spring.

Deciphering A Hay Test - RFV & RFQ

Forage tests today contain two values summarizing feed quality. While similar, understanding the unique differences of each is important to accurately value a forage. Today we will look at Relative Feed Value or RFV and Relative Forage Quality or RFQ.

For many years we have used a forage testing system that measured two different types of fiber called NDF and ADF. We used hay; so, the different species could NDF to estimate how much hay be mixed if desired. One could look cows would eat and we used ADF to estimate how much energy they would get from that hay. Then we combined those values to give an overall estimate of forage quality that we called RFV, which stands for relative feed value.

> RFV did a fair job of estimating digestibility of legume hay, but its major flaw is assuming all fiber has the same digestibility. We know that is not true, and it especially misrepresents the forage quality of grasses. Grasses have more fiber than legumes but grass fiber usually is more digestible than legume

fiber. For many years, there was no other forage test available at an affordable cost that was any better.

Eventually, low-cost tests were developed that did a good job of measuring digestible fiber. Forage scientists and animal nutritionists have worked together with these tests to also revise the intake and energy estimates so results from these tests predict how animals will truly perform much more accurately. With these new tests, a new overall estimate of forage quality was developed, which is called RFQ, or relative forage quality.

While this new RFQ test is especially useful when testing grassy hays, it also has been proven to be better with alfalfa and other legumes. So when you test forages in the future, look for labs that offer relative forage quality. Your numbers will be more accurate.
