## How He Does It.

He is on the verge of desperation before he attempts it. He has tried all the expedients known to civilized man, and has failed, but the melancholy fact is forced home upon his soul that he must sew on a button, or lie abed for the remainder of his life.

He mortally tries to undertake it. He looks down at among his belongings for a needle, and, after a long and vigorous search, he finds one rusted in the pin cushion, with the point broken off. He holds the needle's eye so the light will shine through it. He draws in his breath, shuts his teeth hard, draws his nose round toward his left ear, and makes a mighty effort. The thing is done! The needle is threaded.

He lays on the button, puts the needle through, and lays out so much strength that he stabs the broken point through the top of his thumb, and the broken point is two, and the needle breaks in the eye and the man winces. The legislature is still in session but will probably adjourn this week.

President Harrison refuses to make any pledges regarding appointments and is therewith saying himself much trouble.

There is a report in railroad circles to the effect that all the Northwestern company's lines will be consolidated into one system.

The American base ballists, after a triumphant tour of the world, are returning home covered with glory, and laden with wealth.

The President has at last issued the long expected proclamation opening the Oklahoma country to settlement, April 2nd being the day fixed for it to take effect.

Senator Manning last week filed a complaint with the state board of transportation, charging the C. St. P. M. & O. with exorbitant freight rates between Wayne and Omaha.

Justice Stanley Matthews, of the supreme court, died at Washington last Friday. He was appointed to the supreme bench in 1881, and has since been regarded as one of its ablest jurists.

For the first time Boss Slout's efforts to get a bill through a Nebraska legislature has failed. He wanted thirty thousand dollars from the state for interest on state warrants, but this time his smooth tongue failed to get the measure through.

The president is rigorously carrying out the policy of making appointments to offices in the territories from the residents of the territories. The latest is the appointment of F. E. Warren, a prominent business man of Cheyenne, to be governor of Wyoming.

"So far as heard from," says the Lincoln Journal, "the republican state press is overhwhelmingly in favor of the state printing bill." Which shows that the Journal has not heard from any portion of the republican state press except the part represented by the Lincoln Journal.

The southern papers are using the memorial sent to congress some time ago by the Nebraska state alliance, as a immigration document. They draw a distressing picture of the condition of the farmers of the northwest and cite the official declaration of the alliance to prove that the picture is not overdrawn.

The passage of the bill granting a bounty on all sugar produced in the state is expected to give a great impetus to the raising of sugar beets and possibly sorghum. If the culture is as great a success as the promoters of the scheme predict, Nebraska will soon be producing her own sugar.

Thievish trust overlooked one little matter last year. While they were selling twine at fourteen and fifteen cents, the rope made of the same material they sold at several cents less, and the twine they had left over at the end of the season was made into rope and sold at the reduced price. This is sufficient proof, if proof were needed, that the twine trust is a twine steal.

The town of Oskaloosa, Kansas, gained a great deal of advertising by electing a mayor and council entirely by women. They made such an improvement in the moral and material condition of the town that the experiment begun last year as a joke is to be repeated this year because it is believed that the women will administer the city government better than any men that could be elected.

This is about the course a saloon order takes in Omaha. The mayor sends forth an edict that the law must be obeyed, and all saloons heretofore sealed on Sunday. A week later it is understood that no objection will be made to a side door business. Another week goes, and the entry restricts that the places must be kept quiet and orderly. One week more and the band plays and they go on just the same as before the mayor had his span of rapture.

John Rosenbarger, a farmer living near Creighton, shot and killed a neighbor named Cataline, Tuesday, in a quarrel over some cattle. Rosenbarger then went home, dug a hole in the cellar, and arranged a quantity of shavings so that they would fire the building. He then got into the hole, set fire to the shavings, and shot himself through the head. The building burned to the ground, and Rosenbarger's remains were found by the neighbors buried to a crisp.

John Bright, the famous English orator and statesman, died yesterday. His course during the civil war, when his sympathies were strongly enlisted on the side of the Union at a time when it was the popular thing in England to side with the confederacy, gave him a warm place in the regard of the people of the North.

The Thurston county bill passed the house yesterday, and now if the courts decide that the matter was one over which the legislature had control, the part of Wayne county known as the reservation is gone from us forever. We are sorry to lose it, but if it must go the rest of the county will try to get along somehow.

The Omaha Northern is again galvanized into temporary life by the report from Huron, Dakota, that the Missouri Pacific will probably build from Omaha to Huron this summer.

The name of Robert T. Lincoln to be minister to Great Britain, has been sent to the senate. The nomination is one which will meet with the approval of the country.

The row of the Kilkenny cats was a tame affair compared to the fight over the location of the new government building in Omaha.

WAKEFIELD REPUBLICAN. Misses Mary Singer, Bertha Hunter and Luella Alexander, advanced pupils of the Wakefield school, visited Wayne on Saturday and appeared before Superintendent Howard for examination for teaching certificates. It is needless to say the young ladies passed creditable examination and all received second grade certificates, or statements certifying them to the same at this time. Miss Singer, we understand, had the school known as the "Bloody One," in Wayne County.

There is talk of instituting a lodge of Knights of Pythias here. Charley Harrington and Col. Hammond are taking the initiative in the matter.

Emerson Era.—The well-trail is about 420 feet. The last 140 feet is about 20 feet deep. The water from the top is necessary, the surface water being excluded by the iron curb.

Twenty-five cars of emigrants' movables have been unloaded at this place this spring. It is impossible to ascertain the number of families that have arrived by wagon, but it is certain that more people are coming here than ever before in any one year. They are mostly from Iowa.
