RUSSING BY NOBLE.

San Jacinto Lands Are Southern Pacific Property.

ADMIRAL PORTER IMPROVES.

A Conciliatory Stroke Chief's Speech and Constitution to Uncle Sam and Approves Ex-Secretary Manning of Appreciating the First-Maritime Conference.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The secretary of state has been notified that Japan will be represented at the maritime conference, which meets Oct. 16, by Tanihara, of the imperial department of communication, and Lieut. R. Boba, imperial navy, the legation at Washington. Several delegates to the conference have already arrived, and the office of the secretary of state department has begun to assume a business-like appearance. The report of Commander Chaddock, of the cruiser "Yorktown," on "fog signals," has been received, and will be read at the conference. The delegates will assemble at the Columbian university law school on Oct. 16 and effect an organization. The conference expires by limitation Dec. 31, but it is probable that it will have concluded its business by that time.

Important Ruling by Secretary Noble.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Secretary Noble, in the case of Childs vs. The Southern Pacific Railroad company, has rendered a very important opinion in which he reverses the former rulings of the interior department in all such cases. Childs filed an application for a homestead entry within the limits of the San Jacinto grant, in New Mexico. This grant was made within another grant, the Southern Pacific Railroad company claimed the land as within its granted limits and the secretary of the interior ruled to withdraw the land from the railroad grant. This decision of Secretary Noble follows the doctrine laid down by the supreme court in the McLaughlin and Doolan vs. Carr cases.

Admiral Porter's Illness.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Admiral Porter's son said today that his father was ill, but his illness was not serious. Commodore J. S. Skerrett, has been ordered to command the navy yard at Portsmouth, N. H.

Accused by a Thief.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Secretary Windom received a conciliatory contribution of \$200, in bills enclosed in an envelope postmarked St. Joseph, Mo. The sender had folded the notes and then dipped pieces from them. This mutilation was done, it is presumed, to prevent any trace of the government. The note accompanying the contribution, which is not yet received, is as follows:
About February, 1898, Secretary Manning received \$200,000,000 in money by New York draft, written on the back of the draft that it is to be put into the United States treasury, but as that never appeared in print it is believed by the writer that Manning appropriated it to his own use.

Mr. Coates' Grievances.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The state department has received no official information concerning the case of Mr. Coates of Baltimore, who, it is reported, was imprisoned and otherwise ill-treated while traveling in Switzerland. Though Mr. Coates has made no complaint, some officials of the state department have heard that he has received a letter from Minister Washburn, who is now in Paris, stating that the Swiss government had made a satisfactory explanation and an apology to him.

Soap as Freight.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The Andrew Soap company of Cincinnati has filed a complaint with the interstate commerce commission against the Pittsburg, Indianapolis and Leavenworth companies and others alleging unjust classification of American candle soap in the second class with soap of much higher value, while white soap known and advertised as toilet soaps are shipped as common soap of fourth class rate.

Messed the Mail.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Chief Postoffice Inspector Rathbone is informed of the arrest in Pueblo, Col., of W. A. Baldwin, for using the mails for advertising a lottery scheme; also that the Florence and Casa Grande, Ariz., stage coach had been robbed on the 2d inst., and two Mexican mail pouches stolen.

Assignment as Naturalist.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—W. Harvey Brown has received the assignment of naturalist to accompany the eclipse expedition to the west coast of Africa by the national museum. Mr. Brown is now making preparations for his trip and will join the party in New York on the 12th inst.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Commissioner McDonald will return to this city today from the fair, commission station at Woods Hole, Mass., where he has been for some time arranging the work for the winter of 1899-1900.

Americans All Right at Navassa.
HALLOW, N. S., Oct. 9.—The steamer Alpin, just arrived from the west, states, reports having called at Navassa on her way to this port at the request of the American consul at Kingston, to take off any American who might wish to leave the island on account of the recent disturbance there. Capt. Crowell laid out the island for some time, but as no signal were displayed from the shore and everything appeared quiet, proceeded on his course.
