UNCLE SAM'S DEBT OLD PEOPLE DUMPT

The Decrease for August Less than a Million.

A MONTH'S TREASURY DEALINGS.

An Income Tax Bill introduced in the Senate—A Congressional Committee to Gather Statistics Looking to the Adulteration of New Mexico, Arizona, Utah.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—The public debt statement, issued from the treasury department, shows a decrease in the debt during the past month amounting to \$393,072. The interest bearing debt, exclusive of bonds issued to Pacific railroads, is \$95,878,929, or \$19,312,540 less than a month ago; while on the other hand the net cash balance or surplus in the treasury during the past month has decreased from \$104,473,400 to \$85,938,809; \$18,534,591 silver treasury notes were issued under the new law and are now outstanding for which the treasury holds an equivalent in \$1,550,000 standard dollars and \$2,000,000 million. National bank deposits held \$81,973,834 or government funds or about \$800,000 less than on Aug. 1 a month ago. Receipts from customs during the past month aggregated \$4,812,209. Exports \$33,432,000. August, 1890. Customs receipts in August were \$2,918,578, against \$2,605,115 in August, 1889. Treasury revenue receipts were \$12,557,832, or about \$600,000 more than in August 1889. On the other hand, expenditures for August past were \$20,800,249, against \$9,369,349 in August a year ago. Finance payment for the year in August were \$1,883,627, or about \$1,000,000 less than in August a year ago. Finance payment on bonds purchased last month amounted to \$17,289,349, against \$3,392,900 in August, 1889. Of this amount of the month during the past month of August of all kinds of money aggregated in value \$2,350,000. Of this amount \$2,554,000 was in standard silver dollars and \$24,400 in gold.

CONGRESSIONAL PROCEEDINGS.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—In the house Mr. Cooper of Indiana offered a resolution discharging Representative Smyrnich of Ohio from duty on the House investigating committee on the ground that Smyrnich owns stock in the re-organizer's enterprise, which plays so important a part in the investigation. At Mr. Smyrnich's request he was released from duty on the committee. The speaker said that he had no knowledge of Mr. Smyrnich's connection with the company. The house passed under the suspension of the rules the bill providing for government inspection of coal mines in territories; senate bill extending criminal jurisdiction of the United States to the great lakes; senate bill legalizing a bridge across the Mississippi river at Leavenworth to ratify agreements with the Sax and Fox Indians in Oklahoma. The senate passed a bill for granting right of way to the Hutchinson railroad through that territory. At 2:20 p. m. adjourned. In the senate Mr. Hoar and Senator Clark asked that labor bills be considered appropriate to the day, but objection was made. The tariff bill was discussed and the resolution on the schedule was passed substantially as reported from the finance committee.

An Income Tax Proposed.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Mr. Gibson introduced in the senate a bill to provide an income tax. The bill provides that there shall be collected for 1891, and annual thereafter, a tax of 2 per cent. on gains, profits and income of every resident citizen in the United States, citizens and temporary residents. This tax is to be upon all property, rents, interest, premium on gold and silver, gains and income of any employment or vocation, including salary of members of congress. It is provided that military or naval pensions and the sum of \$2,000 of the income of any member of congress. It is provided that the salaries of the president of the United States, the judges of the United States and officers any state are to be exempt. The tax is to be assessed and collected by the collector of the district of the territory in which the property is situated. The bill is reported by the committee on finance.

New Mexico, Arizona and Utah.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—The house committee on territories reported a favorable report on a resolution providing for the appointment of a select committee of six members, one from each of the territories of New Mexico, Arizona and Utah and gather statistics that will enable congress to decide whether these territories are entitled to statehood or not.

The Reported Hawaiian Revolution.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Acting Secretary Wharton received a telegram from the agent of the seal department at San Francisco saying that an official news was received in the Hawaiian islands which reached San Francisco on Saturday. The opinion prevalent at that department was that a story of a revolution on the islands was unfounded.

Bond Purchases.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—The treasury department purchased \$38,450 44 per cent. bonds under the terms of the circular of Aug. 31.

EX-CORONER BEATEN TO DEATH.

A Trip to Treasury Wipes Out a California Socialist—A Party of 10 Commits Suicide with a Pocket Knife—A Lynched Murderer's Funeral—The Crime Record.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 2.—Levi Meyer, a wealthy and influential citizen, has just been victimized out of \$3,000 in cash, two deeds of valuable property, and a gold watch worth \$250. Meyer, his wife and son, Henry, composed the family. Henry was wayward, and at the age of 17 mysteriously disappeared. Eighteen years rolled on, and no word was received from him, and he was given up for dead. A few days ago, however, a well-dressed man arrived here and inquired for Levi Meyer and family. An hour later he was in their arms, welcomed as their long lost son. The news of the prodigal's return penetrated every nook and corner of the village. He was lionized and made the center of attraction at a social gathering held at the home of his return. Henry stated that he came from California on a visit, and that, if possible, he would like to see Meyer and family. He stated that he held all the money of his wanderings, and how he accumulated wealth. His overjoyed father awaited with great anxiety the return of his son. His partner, whom Henry said would come shortly, had had to come east to look after some business of his partner's. They expected to realize a large sum. Several days later the partner, George, possibly arrived. His reception was not so cordial as Henry's. They finally induced the father to go into a public place, the partner's name could not be than made public. The father said he had \$200 in the house, but he was upon which he could raise a good sum, if he proposed a scheme was to be successful. Preparations were begun for the trio to start for California in two days. About a dozen of the family's friends gathered in the basement of a little one-story house on Main street, the rear end of the yard being itself. In a deep ditch, the family of Levi Meyer, including the wife and yet poorly furnished parlor, lay the body of Will Waters, who was lynched Friday morning in the prison at Mayview. At 9 o'clock Rev. J. N. Triplett read the funeral services were held in the procession of mourners moved on to the graveyard. It was a large funeral, and many of their number were freely expressed by those who followed the cortege to the cemetery. The negroes all over the county are mourning the death of a man who had been a trouble to quiet them. A race outbreak is liable to arise from the lynching of one who has been looked upon as a lawbreaker. Both were allowed to take up courage.

A Child Committed Murderer.

GOSSARD, N. Y., Sept. 2.—Two boys named David Smith and Peter Bennett, both 12 years of age, were taken to a hospital on Sunday afternoon and died. Smith had been ill for some time, and his death was not unexpected. Bennett was taken to the hospital after the trouble and unable to tell his story intelligibly. He was only 11 years of age, and his victim two years his senior. Smith has been arrested.

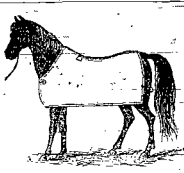

The unexpected has happened once more. Gen. Weaver was nominated for congress by the Democrats of the seventh Iowa district, though he was a resident of another district. To the great surprise of everybody he declined the nomination.

P. Schwewick, of Norfolk, was nominated for senator by the republican convention held at Norfolk yesterday. He is well known in the district, and has a great many warm friends, but it remains to be seen whether the nomination was a very judicious one just at this time.

As yet we have heard but of one name mentioned for the republican nomination for representative, Dr. R. B. Crawford. The Doctor is one of the oldest settlers in the county, and has expended more time and money in advertising land bringing about its settlement, than any other man in it. He certainly has earned the good will of the people of the county, and deserves the nomination if he wishes it. Senator Paulick's speech on the tariff bill Monday shows that he is in line with Nebraska republicans, and western republicans generally, on this matter. At the same time he demands that the tariff be reduced on duties in the favor of the west as against an extract he is consistent with the protective line. Senator Paulick's speech received careful and close attention during his delivery, and may be taken as fully expressing the sentiment of western republicans, who are going to demand with a force that can not be ignored any longer, that the interests of the great producing section shall be recognized in the framing of tariff bills hereafter.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE RANDOLPH AND NORTH PLATT RAILROAD COMPANY.

Aug. 21st, 1900.

Know all men by these Presents: That we, the undersigned, do hereby associate ourselves for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Nebraska, and for that purpose do hereby subscribe the money and Articles of Incorporation.
