DEATH OF A SWEEP

A Smashup with Loss of Life Near Syracuse.

A BIG FIRE AT SAN FRANCISCO.

The Grand and Burlington Hotels and Stores Adjoining Damaged Three Quarters of a Million—A Kansas City Blast—Other Casualties.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—Fire was discovered at 3 o'clock a. m. in Heber Brothers & Co.'s paint shop, under the Grand hotel. The fire spread rapidly and the hotels, was soon in flames. There was great excitement among the guests. All escaped safely. The flames spread rapidly throughout the basement of the block bounded by Market, now Montgomery, Stevenson and Second streets, and then spread to the first floor, occupied by the Hall, Safe and Lock company; Hill & Goldman, druggists' supplies; the Board of Trade rooms, the Pullman Palace Car company's office, the Great Northern railway ticket office, and the rooms of the Syndicate investment company. The smoke in the meantime had aroused the tenants of the Grand and Burlington hotels, and the frightened guests rushed to the sidewalk with what valuables they could carry. The fire soon shot up through the freight elevator in the rear of the Grand hotel and a dangerous conflagration was feared. The front of the Heber Bros. & Co.'s store blew out, with a loud explosion and a large volume of smoke poured out, almost obscuring the women. Jacob Underhill, a wine merchant, was overcome by the smoke in the Grand hotel, and was carried out unconscious. Cashier Weeks, of the Grand, was in peril, but was almost overcome when he was assisted out by the elevator boy. There were several other narrow escapes. By 6 o'clock the fire had spread along the eastern end of the block. The efforts of the firemen to confine the fire within the block occupied by the Burlington and Grand hotels were finally successful. At 6 o'clock the roof of the Burlington fell, carrying part of that of the Grand, and the fire spread to the rear of the Burlington and the front of the Grand on Market street. The western end of the Grand was saved. The first floor of the Burlington on Second street, was occupied by H. T. Dorr, millinery and novelties; C. P. Downing, medicine; E. P. Howell, window shades. The second floor were also Heber & Co., the board of trade rooms and the Burlington Hotel company's place of business on Market street; the Southern Pacific, the Central Pacific and other lines of railroads; the Grand hotel, together with Eap's saloon, Wares, (damaged) by fire. The fire is believed to be due to spontaneous combustion in Heber & Co.'s.

A Fatal Wreck Near Syracuse.

Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 4.—The express train that left New York on the D. L. & W. road at 9 o'clock a. m., while descending the steep grade near Bradford, three miles from this city, crashed into a coal train standing on a switch and waiting for the track to be cleared for its passage southward. Both locomotives were completely wrecked, and the baggage and mail cars were crushed to pieces. Of the four cars on the passenger train, four in number, three were thrown from the track, the portion of the collision-barling train into a position at right angles with the rails. The single Pullman car which was next to the mail car, kept its place. Michael Burke of this city, on the front passenger train; and J. W. Doyle of Grand Bend, Pa., engineer on the coal train, were killed outright with their firemen. Jerry Lee of this city, and Morton Fernan of Grand Bend. The four men were buried under the wreck. Doyle was dug out by the rails had been the only survivor of the passengers. The other three are still in the wreck, and there is no likelihood they will be got out before morning. As by a mischance some of the passengers were killed and only one of them, Mrs. Thomas Leonard, wife of Mr. Myrtle avenue, Buffalo, was seriously injured. Mrs. Leonard was on her way home from Cortland. She had two ribs broken and her right wrist was dislocated. She also sustained severe injuries to her spine and her left shoulder was badly bruised. She is now at St. Joseph's hospital in this city and her chances of recovery are very doubtful. The accident was caused by a misplaced switch. The switchman, it is said, had been in the employ of the company only since Oct. 23.

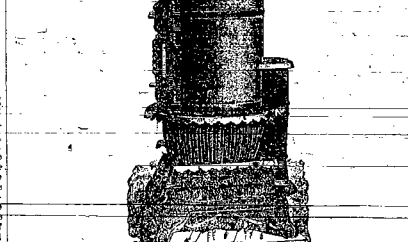
