A DECREASE IN NET BALANCE.

Congress Again Assembles After the Holiday recess—Not Much Will Be Done in either Branch this week—Will Distribute the Cotton Indemnity.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The public debt statement for December, owing to the intervening of a Sunday and a holiday, was not issued from the treasury department until yesterday.

It shows that in the last month of the year there was a net increase of the debt of the United States to the amount of \$17,968,857. The increase, which this increase was made up as follows: Increase of interest bearing debt, \$1,000,000; decrease of debt bearing no interest, \$601,170.63; decrease of debt on which interest has ceased, \$2,827,700.00; increase of net cash in the treasury, \$1,236,894.30.

On the 31st ult. the totals of these items were: Interest bearing debt, \$98,038,667; debt on which interest has ceased, \$8,250,043.29; debt bearing no interest, \$27,110,627.97. The total gold in the treasury Dec. 31, was \$268,666,000.00. Silver increased from \$63,469,182.75 to \$69,029,893.88. These deposits there were outstanding \$141,247,589 gold certificates and \$39,428,384 silver certificates.

The net cash balances (surplus) in the treasury at the end of the year were \$3,277,919.29. Of this amount \$1,073,919.29 was in national bank deposits and \$2,203,999.99 in government silver coin. The net cash balance Nov. 30 was \$29,328,918.50. The receipts and expenditures for the government for December, 1892, as shown by the statement issued, were greater than in the same month of 1891. The receipts were \$33,242,914.19, including customs—\$18,336,354.25; internal revenue—\$14,847,588.27; national bank deposit fund \$1,647,561.66; miscellaneous \$1,911,792.33. The expenditures were \$37,073,283.08.

Of this amount pensions absorbed \$14,148,108.41; interest \$2,759,822.22; national bank redemption \$21,732.22; ordinary account of interest paid on loan \$2,930,491 to \$4,889.84. These are the most notable changes.

CONGRESS REASSEMBLING.

Hardly any business will be done here next week.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The senators and representatives who go home during the holiday recess rarely hasten their return to the capital, so there is usually a delay in both houses, and the session probably not be held before next week.

In the senate there are indications of a struggle for control between the republican and democratic majorities. The purchase of silver and the quarantine and immigration restriction bills.

In this attempt they will have the support of some senators who fear the cholera and other epidemics that may be imported by the quota bill.

The only business of importance likely to be transacted this week in the house is the passage of the fortification appropriation bill, which is in charge of Mr. Breckinridge of Kentucky. The appropriation committee expect that there will be little if any general debate upon it, and that it will pass during the day.

Chairman Martin of the private pension committee, will take the earliest opportunity to call for the presentment of unfinished business, but he will not do so until he has completed the report upon a program present to work upon them. Altogether, the remainder of the week probably will be uneventful in congress.

Will Distribute the Cotton Fund.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The secretary of the navy has appointed Captain W. S. Schley, Lieutenant Commandant of the ship and First Assistant Surgeon J. R. Smith, a board to consider and report a plan for the equitable distribution of the Cotton Indemnity fund of \$7,000,000.

Establishing a Boundary Line.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The United States supreme court rendered a decision in the case brought by the state of Iowa against the state of Illinois to settle the boundary line in the Mississippi river between the two states.

The decision is in favor of Illinois. The jurisdiction of each state extends to the middle of the navigable channel wherever that may be. In the opinion rendered by Justice Field the court holds that the river is a navigable matter, holding that the true boundary line is the middle of the main channel of the river, or of the principal channel if there be more than one channel of navigation.

At the same time, the court holds that the boundary line is to be established at places where bridges cross the river. The court ordered that a commission be appointed to ascertain and designate the line on each side and designate the same on the maps, the commission to be guided in fixing the line by the opinion of this court and make reports to it for further action.

A Money Making Scheme.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Chinese Immigration which reports to the treasury department that application to the Chinese exclusion act is being foisted with a view of getting money out of China, has filed a report on a New Orleans where a Chinaman, representing himself as the agent of the Chinese Companies, is collecting \$500 from Chinamen under the pretext that it was used to employ counsel to contest the law.

The Fire Record.

FR. WAYNE, Ind., Jan. 4.—At 6:30 loss evening fire broke out in the police station on the third floor of the Fr. Wayne Electric company, located on Broadway. The fire department responded but the water-pressure was insufficient to reach the fire. It was extinguished by the use of chemical engines got to work and by that time the entire third floor was gutted. After 10 minutes the fire was under control. Officials estimate the loss at \$25,000, fully covered by insurance. The water was so plentiful that the fire was extinguished.

Damage Awarded.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 4.—The Star's Topeka special says: The state board of railroad commissioners has made public a decision in the Union Terminal company case against the Union Pacific, Missouri Pacific and Rock Island. In this case the interested companies are unable to reach an agreement whereby the Union Terminal company should be allowed to cross the tracks of the other companies in Kansas City. In the decision the commissioners give the Union Terminal company the right of way on the tracks as requested, the latter company to pay the Union Pacific \$750 and the Missouri Pacific \$25 for the right of way. The Rock Island is awarded damages to the amount of \$1 for damage as a loss holder.

A Better Route with East Express.

MONTICELLO, Ind., Jan. 4.—The engine of the train going north from Monticello to Michigan City was wrecked at the crossing of two men and perhaps fatally scalding the third. The fireman, W. W. Williams, of Monticello, was thrown into the air and dropped dead on the track. The heat trainman, Harry Clark, had his legs broken. One of his legs was so severely scalded, and died in an hour. Con. Cavanaugh, the engineer, was fatally scalded, but may live. THE NEW GOLD FIELD. The excitement over the San Juan gold discoveries recalls other great mining strikes. The new placer mines are believed to be of vast extent, and will be of great richness in silver. Thousands of gold seekers are already in the field and tens of thousands are in motion towards it. The locations are in an entirely new region, but have been known to prospectors previously, or very likely.
