### REPUBLICAN CAUCUS.

The republican voters of the city assembled in caucus last Friday night at the court house for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for city offices. Prof. Conn was elected chairman and Bert Brown secretary. J. P. Gaertner and E. P. Olmsted were placed in nomination for Mayor, resulting in favor of Mr. Gaertner by a vote of 48 to 13, who has declared the nominee. Everett Laughlin and Honier Skeen were nominated for City Clerk. Mr. Laughlin received 32 votes and Mr. Skeen 27. A. T. Witter and Lambrie Ros were nominated by acclamation for Police Judge and Treasurer, respectively. G. A. Benson and R. Q. Warnock were then nominated as members of the School Board, after which a committee to fill any vacancies occurring on the ticket was appointed.

### CITIZENS CAUCUS.

Never before in the history of the city has there been a caucus so largely attended as was the Citizens' caucus held at the court house Saturday night. The administration of the city the past year has given satisfaction and the general outpouring of people Saturday night was for the purpose of approving Mayor Ley's course. By eight o'clock the old court room was packed, with nearly 200 voters; when the caucus was called to order. Nels Grimley was elected Chairman and Elmer Lundburg Secretary. The chairman then stated the object of the meeting after which Henry Ley and J. P. Gaertner were placed in nomination for Mayor, the ballot resulting in favor of Mr. Ley by a vote of 156 to 38, and he was declared the nominee. Everett Laughlin and Will Rickabaugh were placed in nomination for Clerk. Mr. Laughlin received 117 votes and Mr. Rickabaugh 20. Fred Volpp was nominated for city treasurer by acclamation, likewise A. L. Howser for city engineer. James L. Britton, I. W. Alter, and A. T. Witter were placed in nomination for Police Judge. Britton received 77 votes, Witter 12, Alter 5. A. A. Welch and R. Q. Warnock were named for members of the School Board.

### WARD CAUCUSES.

The republican voters of the First ward met at the Herald office. E. Hunter was elected chairman and H. L. Kimball secretary. J. H. Goll, L. S. Winsor and E. Hunter were placed in nomination for councilman, the ballot resulting Goll 12, Hunter 7, Winsor 4; Mr. Goll was declared the nominee. J. P. Gaertner informed the caucus that he intended resigning as councilman and a motion was made and carried to recommend a nominee to be placed on the ticket. After a number of ballots L. S. Winsor was recommended for the place. W. H. McNeal, H. L. Kimball and Grant Meyers were selected as a committee to fill any vacancy occurring.

### SECOND WARD.

U. S. Conn and I. W. Alter were elected chairman and secretary. Three ballots were taken for councilman, the third one resulting in favor of Alex Holtz who was declared the nominee.

### THIRD WARD.

The Third ward republican caucus chose Nels Grimley as chairman and E. Cunningham sec'y. On the second ballot George Fortner was nominated for councilman, but has since declined the nomination.

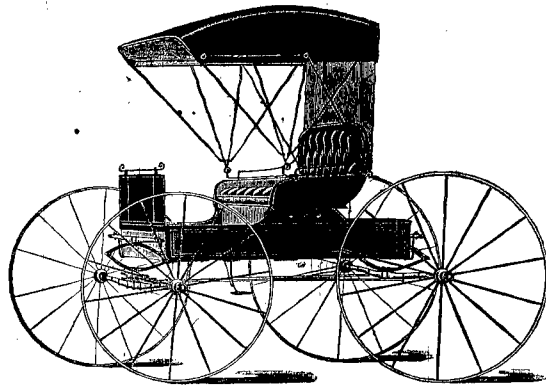

It is said that Hon. T. L. Matthews of Fremont will be appointed Senator M. L. Hayward's secretary. The selection would certainly be a fitting one and one which would greatly please Mr. Matthews' numerous friends in this part of the state.

The Islanders all over the globe are clamoring to get into Uncle Sam's band wagon. He is well supplied just now, however, but the decree of the Almighty that civilized Christianity must be preached all over the world before the judgment day, is being carried out rapidly under the banner of the United States.

A great many newspapers might do much more good for their party, their proprietors and the community where they are printed did they devote their columns more to interesting local news, bright and truthful editorials—and not so much to fault finding with; and vile abuse of other local papers. Such rot as the latter is very disgusting to intelligent readers.—Cedar County News.

Bearing the white man's burden seems to now be the principal avocation of the pops in Nebraska in advocating the sins of their officials. The last but not least, is the despicable plot that fifty-four of their members in the legislature entered into to elect Thompson, the most corrupt man that ever aspired in Nebraska to the exalted position of United States Senator.—Burt County Herald.

If Secretary of War Alger should resign the state of Nebraska stands an excellent chance of securing a cabinet officer in the person of Assistant Secretary of War George D. McKeljohn and the republicans of the state would feel proud to have just such a thing happen. Nebraska is all right as her volunteer soldiers have clearly demonstrated in the battles at Manila; and nothing is too good for her.

The Norfolk News takes the HERALD to task for having taken occasion to speak a few words in regard to Norfolk, and says:

"The editor of our esteemed contemporary should have learned one or two things of importance long before this. Abuse of others never can take the place of argument. Envy is always an admission of strength and power on the part of the envied."

Now, the News seems to be perfectly innocent of the misrepresentations that have been heaped upon the city of Wayne by persons representing the State Normal Interests at Norfolk, or else it pleads ignorance. However, that matters not. Neither do we envy Norfolk her good luck in securing an appropriation for a public building which is no doubt needed, but we do not believe that that city is entitled to every state institution that can be located in Northeastern Nebraska; though we do not question her right to ask consideration so far as regards the location of the school. But to locate a state normal at Norfolk the state would necessarily be obliged to contribute from Wayne thousands and thousands of dollars worth of property and the fruits of years of labor, for it is perfectly well known that no private normal could long exist so closely located to a state institution. If the people of Northeast Nebraska were given the privilege of voting on the question, there would be but one result, Wayne would get it by an overwhelming majority.

## Largely Sad and Slightly Comical. Cumulative Evidence

One of the saddest sights ever witnessed in New England is that of the fallen netter jaw of the Free-Trade as he reads or listens to the reports of a general raise of wages among the Eastern cotton mills, and especially when times under the Dingley Tariff are contrasted with the actual depression under that unalloyed swindle rightly called the Robber Wilson bill, because it robbed at least one million wage earners of their jobs. The comical side of the picture is when the fallen jaw begins to oscillate in the attempt to say that, while it is true Dingley Protection has brought back the prosperity which the Wilson bill drove away, we should kick out Protection which has accomplished this glorious work, and usher in the wage earner and business man's enemy, Free-Trade.

Again the Free-Trade's nether jaw sags pathetically when reminded of the fact that under the Wilson Tariff people lost faith in our Government's financial ability, and millions on millions of greenbacks were rushed in and gold demanded therefor, while under Protection people's confidence in Uncle Sam is complete, and instead of demanding gold business men and banks petition for greenbacks in lieu of gold.

But perhaps the most touching phase of Protection is the fact that under the Dingley Tariff those men and women of vast wealth who annually spend one hundred million dollars in Europe are compelled to pay duty on the costly fabrics they bring back from abroad just as we common people, including wage earners, are compelled to pay. And the howls and wails of Free-Traders attain great altitudes, ascending as a testimony against the injustice of treating millionaires precisely as we would wage earners. Tariffs, virtually pleads the Free-Trade, should be formulated to furnish duties, professors, and the fat-salaried with cheap foreign fabrics, regardless of how many mills are shut down or how many wage earners are deprived of jobs.

We are pained to state, however, that the unfortunate Free-Trade receives little sympathy among Americans in 1899. On the contrary, the people lack interest in the revival of the carcass of Free-Trade, preferring its speedy burial. And we fear that the mournful obsequies would generate few tears save from Anti-Americans who, like the managers of such papers as the New York "Evening Post," oppose American prosperity, which is out another name for work for everybody and everybody at work.—American Economist.

Edgar Howard, editor of the Papillon Times and chairman of the last Democratic state convention, has been everlastingly laying it to the fusion state officers who have in many ways broken solemn pledges to the people and who have also become famous for boodles. Editor Howard is one Democrat who believes in cleaning house, but the Blair Republican man is one who doesn't and in the last issue came out as follows at the Papillon editors: "The vicious stab at populist officials by Editor Howard and other fusion editors reminds us how easy it is for some folks to kick over a good pan of milk because there is a mote in it. Do they expect to promote reform by returning the old parties to power in this state? There seems to be a difference of opinion as to what constitutes a mote. In the eyes of the Republican man it takes the whole cheese.—Blair Republican.

By the withdrawal of all her armed forces from the Philippine Islands the German government has inspired a feeling of friendship in the minds of the American people such as could have been created in no other way. By so doing they have expressed a confidence in the willingness and ability of this government to look after and protect the interests of other countries in those islands which they were not generally supposed to have felt. No matter what individual sentiment there has been, and regardless of the criticisms of the German press, we now know that we have the friendship as well as the confidence of the German government. This condition, succeeding as it does, a season of doubt as to the future attitude of that country towards our own, is particularly gratifying.—Stanton Picket.

The Melbourne bill, appropriating \$50,000 for building of two state normal schools, the location to be designated by the State Board was passed by the House last Thursday. If the bill becomes a law the contest for one of the schools will be between Wayne and Norfolk. The former can certainly lay claim to the location in every particular, as Norfolk already has one state institution.

W. J. Bryan, by request of the democratic members of the legislature of Missouri, will address the members of that body. Senator Thurston, too, has been extended an invitation by the republican members. If both should accept the invitation, the Missourians will have an opportunity of listening to the wind and brains of Nebraska—and neither are so slow.

The legislature has been grinding out a bill of bills the past week. The bill appropriating funds for state institutions felt the prying knife more or less because it is the determination of the republican members to keep the state's expenses as low as possible without working any injustice to the state institutions.

In all probability the subscriptions for another free coinage of silver campaign will be very slim. Contributions for anything so dead would indeed be a calamity.

It is quite a drop from United States Senator to district judge but it beats dropping into the bottom of the sea all at once. A little pin is better than no pin at all. Just how the fusionists who were aspiring to succeed Robinson on the bench, will accept the bore is a matter for future determination.

Hon. Louis Smithberger's record in the legislature will redound with credit to himself and to his constituents. His Wayne county friends are proud of him and are pleased with the manner in which he has conducted himself in all the proceedings of the House.
