

## WSC Sets Dates for Summer Music Camp

The 31st annual Summer Music Camp at Wayne State College will be held July 27-Aug. 3, according to Dr. Cornell Runestad, chairman of the WSC Fine Arts Department and director of the music camp.

Music camp enables high school musicians to spend a week with other top high school musicians, under the direction of top Nebraska music instructors. Campers are housed in college dormitories under the supervision of college staff and visiting instructors.

Camp actively chooses include band, orchestra, choir, advanced stage band, intermediate stage band, advanced swing choir, intermediate swing choir, piano workshop, music fundamentals review class, private lessons in brass, woodwind or strings, vocal solo coaching, jazz, pop and rock music.

Campers will also participate in a concert, a student recital and Camp Capers.

The enrollment fee of \$55 includes tuition, registration and board and room for seven days. Commuting students pay \$30. Any students who received 1 ratings as soloists in high school music contests during 1975 are granted full tuition scholarships of \$25.

The Music Camp is open to high school students, including fall freshmen and 1975 graduates. Eighth graders who are string players are also admitted.

## Wayne State Plans Courses on 1st Aid, Advanced Swimming

Tuesday is the deadline for registering in either of two short courses to be taught at Wayne State College by Bernice Fulton. Standard First Aid, to meet from 1 to 4 p.m. each Monday and Wednesday, will begin April 28 and run through May 28. This is a non-credit course. Tuition is \$15.

The workshop will cover wounds, specific injuries, shock, respiratory emergencies, poisoning, drugs, heat and cold exposure, sudden illness, dressings and emergency rescue.

Advanced Swimming and Life Saving, which also gets under way Monday, April 28, will meet from 4 to 6 p.m. each Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday through June 2. Tuition is \$20 (non credit) or \$31 (two hours credit).

This course will focus on personal safety. Specific topics of instruction will include safety and rescue, non-swimming rescues, water rescues, defenses, releases and escapes, searching and raising a submerged victim, life guarding, craft safety and American Red Cross First Aid. Certificates will be issued to those completing the course.

Mrs. Fulton has taught water safety, swimming and first aid at WSC several years and has taught first aid in Wayne County the past 11 years. She has worked with civil defense, mock disasters, and has been chairman of the Wayne County Red Cross first aid and water safety programs.

Individuals interested in enrolling in either of the courses should mail tuition checks to Dr. C. Don Keck, director of continuing education at Wayne State. These checks have never taken classes through Wayne State before should include a \$10 matriculation fee.

## Allen May Drop Club's Tree Sale

Allen's Community Development Club will decide tonight (Monday) if it will drop its tree sale project to replenish trees destroyed by Dutch elm disease.

No one has indicated he wants to buy a tree, said club member Ken Linafelter. As a result, the club may postpone the tree sale until next year.

Allen residents have a chance to purchase a variety of trees with prices ranging from \$1 to \$25 for two to three-foot tall trees, Linafelter noted.

## Kissinger, Dulles Focus of Course Planned at WSC

The role of the Secretary of State in foreign policy will be studied at Wayne State College during the spring term.

Allen O'Donnell, associate professor of political science, will offer a course titled "The Secretary of State in Foreign Policy" which will emphasize the study of the present Secretary of State, Henry Kissinger, and President Eisenhower's Secretary, John Foster Dulles.

"Dulles was a chief architect of present foreign policy, and Kissinger has, in these past years, played a very important part in an attempt to change policy," O'Donnell said. The study of these two principals will be the heart of the course, he noted.

The course will meet every day Monday through Friday beginning Monday, April 28, in room 105 of Connell Hall. The class will run for one hour beginning at 1:40 p.m.

## Art Buffs Offered Trip Backwoods

Primitive II, a Wayne State College art workshop scheduled for Aug. 8-17, will enable students to draw inspiration from nature and to locate and use available materials.

The workshop will be located at Camp Lake, a 30 acre tract of Northern Minnesota backwoods land about 10 miles southwest of Ely, Minn.

Students will make their own decisions regarding the course of study and types of projects. Possibilities might include sculpture, ceramics, pottery, drawing and crafts.

Eligibility is limited to juniors, seniors and graduate students with art background. Because of the rugged physical nature of the workshop the course is not recommended for those in extremely poor physical condition.

## Krause to Face Trial on Charge of Embezzling

A former Wayne man, John Krause, has been bound over to district court for trial on a charge of embezzling more than \$28,000 from a Wayne business.

Krause, now reportedly living in Sioux Falls, was bound over following his preliminary hearing in Wayne County court Thursday before district county judge Eugene McFadden of Norfolk.

No trial date has been set in district court.

Krause is accused of embezzling \$28,390 from Feeders Elevator, Inc. sometime between Feb. 8 and April 8 of last year when he was employed there as manager, according to the complaint charged against him in January by county attorney Budd Bornhoff of Wayne.

Krause has been free on \$20,000 bond since Feb. 14 following his arraignment in county court on the embezzling charge. He returned to Wayne on his own following his arrest on the charge in Sioux Falls earlier.

His bond was continued Thursday.

## Deadline Extended for TV Cycle Course

The registration deadline for the statewide educational television motorcycle course has been extended through Saturday, April 26, according to the state department of education.

The course actually begins on television today (Monday), but students will be able to enroll in person on Saturday morning at any of the 14 locations through out the state where on the bike instruction will take place, department officials said.

Wayne State College is one of those 14 locations.

However, students who do not plan on enrolling in the course until Saturday morning have to

notify the state education department by Wednesday of their intention to register.

Department officials noted that those who intend to register in this manner must watch the first five television programs on the Nebraska Educational Television Network today through Friday and must complete corresponding exercises in the student workbook. Those who do not meet these requirements will not be permitted to participate in the behind the handlebars session on Saturday at Wayne State, officials said.

Free copies of the workbooks and the necessary registration

materials are still available from high school driver education departments and Kawasaki motorcycle dealers throughout the state.

Two Wayne State driver education teachers, Anton Netherd and Randall Shaw, have completed a motorcycle instructor workshop in Kearney in preparation for the course.

The course, which offers two senior or post graduate credits, features on the bike instruction and a series of televised lessons. Included will be emphasis on personal operating competence, routine care and maintenance of motorcycles, and

basic and advanced techniques of motorcycle operation.

The one-hour lessons will be televised Monday through Friday, April 21 through May 2. On-campus sessions are scheduled for 4:30 to 10 p.m. this Friday, April 18, and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, April 26 and 27. Saturday or Sunday, May 3 or 4, and Saturday, May 17.

Tuition is \$31 plus a \$10 matriculation fee for anyone who has never before taken a course through Wayne State. Registration is being handled by Dr. C. Don Keck, director of continuing education at WSC.

## WSC Librarians Don Grubbies for Gigantic Task

The Wayne State College library has closed for a complete inventory, according to Charles Stelling, director of information services at WSC.

Library doors will remain locked a total of 10 days, but staff members find this will not be ample time to complete the job, many evening hours will be put in too.

The procedure for library inventory is considerably more complicated than simply going

down the stacks and counting the books.

First, all materials must be replaced on the regular stacks. This includes countless volumes which had been placed on reserve and articles which are being returned daily.

With all materials back on the shelves, the next step is itself reading, where all shelves are checked to make sure the items

are in their proper places numerically.

It is at this point that a book on car engine tune-ups, misplaced months or years ago in the section devoted to East Indian Crafts, will find its way back to its own division in the Dewey Decimal System.

After careful reading comes the job of checking shelved books against the cards, making sure

## 'Unicameral in Action'

## 'Helluva Fight' Awaits Tech College Financing

LINCOLN — A battle between the appropriations and education committees will be fought April 27 when legislators debate the financing of technical community colleges.

According to several senators, that day "will bring a helluva floor debate."

The appropriations committee has voted 5-4 to give full state financing to the community technical colleges and place them under the state college board of trustees.

The committee has recommended more than \$19 million in state tax support with state control and no local property tax.

But the education committee has sent LB 344 to the floor, a bill which calls for the technical schools to remain separate and under local control.

Under this proposal up to 2.5 mills of property tax can be levied in the six technical school areas. That would be added about \$11 million in state aid.

Killed by the education committee was Senator Robert Clark's proposal to merge the technical and state college systems. He said senators were "stupid for killing his bill." Clark said the education com-

mittee "has an insatiable appetite for money."

Clark, of Sidney, said taxpayers don't know what they would be getting into with LB 344, introduced by Senator Maurice Kraemer of Aurora.

Senator John Murphy of South Sioux City said he supports Kraemer's bill to fund financing at the local level.

Murphy said the pressure he has received from the Wayne-Norfolk area has been in favor of LB 344. He said he plans to vote in favor of the bill when it comes up for debate.

Murphy added the major reason he is against state financing is that taxpayers in the northeast area would be paying more than their share for technical colleges in Omaha or other places which are not already as advanced as Norfolk.

The chairman of the education committee, Senator Frank Lewis of Bellevue, agrees with Murphy that local control is a better way to operate the schools.

"They should be geared to the local needs of each community college area," Lewis said.

State control might not only ignore

local needs, he said, but "there's a real serious question as to how a single state senator governing board would treat each area."

Senator Shirley Marsh of Lincoln and a member of the appropriations committee lost an attempt for a one-year delay in consolidating the two college systems. She argued for an interim study on higher education so that the decisions "could be made on more thorough investigation."

Senator Kraemer said he thinks LB 344 will be approved.

"I know several senators are against it," he said, "but I think I have enough votes. Of course, I have been wrong before. I haven't counted noses, but I'm pretty sure it will go."

Lewis said he is angry that the appropriations committee is acting on higher education through budgeting before the senators have had a chance to decide on LB 344.

Lewis said the committee is intruding in territory which is out of its jurisdiction.

Governor J. J. Exon also has proposed a combination of state assistance and local tax support.

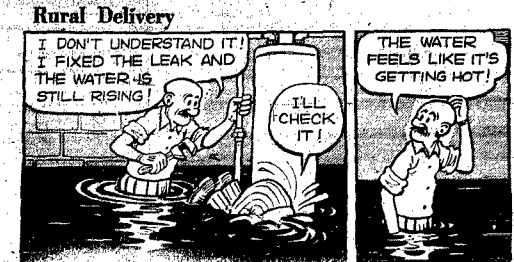

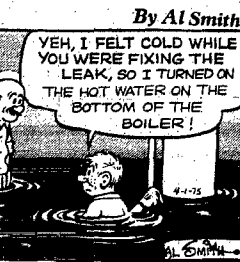

YOU AND YOUR CAR

By the Automotive Information Council Key Factor in Auto Repair One of the keys to obtaining satisfactory auto repair service is proper communication between car owner and service technician. While most of us feel we communicate effectively, statistics show that frustration with auto service can be traced directly to poor communication in many cases. Communication begins by describing the problem. The service technician diagnoses the trouble largely on the information or symptoms given him. The more accurate the description, the better equipped the technician is to solve the problem, and the more the motorist knows about the operation of his car the better equipped he is to accurately describe the malfunction. But communication doesn't end there. A mutual understanding has to be reached on how the technician is to proceed with the repairs. For example, the motorist may authorize only certain repairs, then request the technician to contact him if the repairs needed are more extensive. Putting this type of agreement in writing and making sure the technician knows how to contact the motorist can help prevent a possible misunderstanding. Another type of communication problem arises when the same term has different meanings to the service technician and the car owner. For example, a man takes his car to a service shop and says he's going on a long trip and wants a complete tune-up. In his mind, a complete tune up may mean replacing the points, plugs and condenser and adjusting the carburetor. To a top-notch service technician, a complete tune up may include everything under the hood related to normal engine operation, and might require — if necessary — replacing the distributor cap and rotor, spark plug wires, adjusting valves, etc. The car may run better than ever, but the motorist is unhappy because the bill is higher than he expected. Mutual understanding at the beginning would have helped to create a satisfied instead of a dissatisfied customer.

### Free Check for Blood Pressure

Persons residing in Wayne, Dixon, Cedar, Dakota and Thurston counties can have their blood pressure checked free of charge next month.

Mrs. Sarah Heineman of Pender has been selected as coordinator for the high blood pressure screenings.

Mrs. Heineman, who is working closely with the Nebraska Heart Association and the State Health Department, will be organizing the free clinics in May. The program has been endorsed by the Nebraska Medical Association.

Purpose of the program, which is being conducted statewide, is to screen 100,000 Nebraskans in an effort to seek out and find the disease. Uncontrolled, high blood pressure can lead to strokes, heart failure and kidney damage.

According to Jim Klein of the Nebraska Heart Association, some 148,000 Nebraskans (10 percent of the state's population) have high blood pressure. Of this figure, nearly half have high blood pressure and don't know it and an estimated 129,500 persons, or 87 percent, are not receiving adequate treatment.

It was decided to clean church May 13.

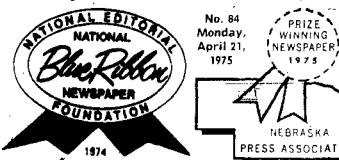

Mrs. Harvey Echtenkamp and Mrs. Daie Lessmann will be hostesses for the next aid meeting, May 15.

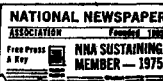

**Can You Afford the  
Great Ripoff?**

Drop a penny and you may not even hunt for it; but drop a quarter, — well, that is another story.

At the price of chemicals for today's farming methods, you may be in the same boat. Four-hundred dollars a ton fertilizer plus herbicide costs at 4 to 12 dollars per acre plus pesticide bills may make soil losses very expensive.

The Agronomy and Ag Engineering Departments at the University of Illinois checked to see just how expensive it was. Check the graph below for an indication on a 5 per cent slope.



Soil losses ranged from 8 tons per acre on fall plowed land down to one on land that was planted in chopped stalks. Now, what is that worth? Analysis showed that 34.5 pounds of nitrogen were washed away. At 20 cents per pound — that is \$6.90 per acre.

The loss of herbicide and pesticide treatments can add another 10-15 dollars loss to the nitrogen loss.

**Do You Have Your Trees?**

The 1975 Tree Planting Season is getting underway with shipments beginning about April 18. If you have trees ordered, you may or may not have received your shipment as of yet.

When your trees do arrive, be sure to store them in the box in a dark cool area, such as a basement or a cellar. Many also use ice cubes to provide moisture to the packing material and to help keep the trees cool.

Tandem disking in the spring before planting trees generally produces as good or better seedbed than plowing, especially in sandy conditions.

The Lower Elkhorn NRD tree crew will be calling one to two days before they arrive to indicate the time they will be coming to plant. It is a good idea to be on hand when the crew arrives to answer any questions they may have and to give any last minute directions.

**Get Away From It All!**

The coming of spring brings the urge to "get out and get away from it all" spots — Skyview Lake and the Pilger Recreation Area.

Skyview Lake is a 50-acre lake behind a flood control structure on Corporation Gulch. The dam, built in 1971, has now been sealed through the cooperation of the City of Norfolk and the Lower Elkhorn NRD.

The Pilger Recreation Area is also a large (45 acre) lake in conjunction with the flood control dam on a 118 acre rustic setting.

Two picnic shelters, wells and grills are about the only creature comforts. Everything else is left to nature's better judgment. Grass has been seeded plus restrooms and shelters to make the area ready for the outdoorsman.

Skyview Lake is on North 25th Street in Norfolk and the Pilger Recreation Area is one mile east and 1/2 mile north of the 275-15 junction at Pilger. See you there!!

Details on specific practices will be announced later by the County ASCS Boards.



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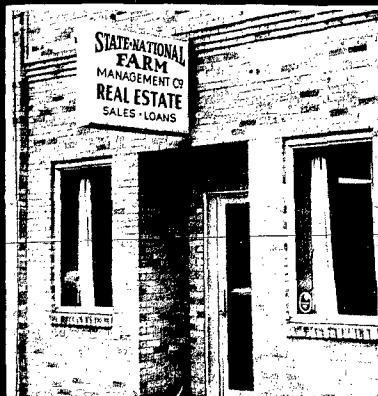
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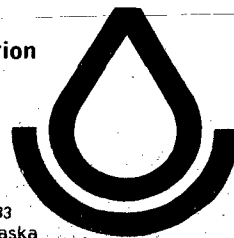

every book has a card and every card has a book. Finally, books which have been missing a long period of time will be officially withdrawn, or in some cases replaced, and an inventory list of the library's complete holding will be compiled.

Although the figures will undoubtedly be more accurate by the time the inventory is complete, the library's estimated holdings are about 120,000 volumes.

Add to that an estimated 12,000 bound volumes of various periodicals, 8,000 films, video tapes, etc., from the instructional materials center, about 5,000 government documents, plus projectors, phonographs, tape recorders and other such equipment.

By Sunday evening, April 27, the whole thing will be over, and the library will be open from 6 to 9 p.m. as usual. Staff members will be ready for the new term.

Well, perhaps not quite ready. If a librarian appears just a tiny bit reluctant to check out materials to you or watches extra critically to make sure you replace a magazine or newspaper precisely where you found it on the rack, just bear with him awhile and keep in mind that everything is in its rightful place in its first (and maybe the last) time in ages.
