

Norwegian Makes Return Visit



A former American Field Service student from Norway made a three-day return visit last week to the Merle Ring family of rural Wayne.

He is Thorbjorn Helgesen, 24, of Os, Norway, who met the Ring family about six years ago as part of a 17 day tour offered to AFS students before their return trip home.

Toby, as he was nicknamed during his stay with an Alliance family, was an AFS student during the 1969-70 school year.

Toby, his two brothers and mother are visiting parts of Nebraska, Colorado and other areas of the U.S. before they return to Norway earlier next month.

A fourth-year student at a teacher's college, Toby intends to take courses in music and physical education before taking his first teaching job on the elementary or junior high level.

Looking back on his days in Nebraska, Toby pointed out that the two basic differences between this state and Norway are the climate and topography. Norway overall has warmer and more even temperatures, and is more hilly.

Norway also has a higher amount of rainfall, usually averaging between 50 to 100 inches a year. One thing Toby misses about Nebraska is its corned beef. In Norway, he and members of their family only are able to have meat twice a week because of the shortage of cattle growers in that country.

The organization will also make plans for a booth at the Wayne County Fair, and will make a quilt to give away at the fair.

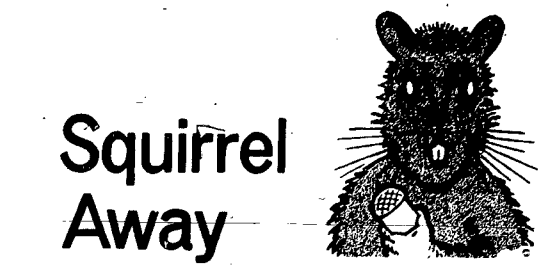
