Awareness week

WAYNE - As part of Nebraska Severe Weather Awareness Week, March 31-April 6, the City of Wayne will take part in a "tornado warning drill."

The drill will consist of a mock tornado watch at 10:05 a.m., followed by a mock tornado warning at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, April 3. In the event of actual-severe weather risk at the time of the exercise, the drill will be cancelled.

As part of the exercise, tornado sirens will be activated for 60 seconds at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, April 3. The Cablevision Emergency Alert system will also be tested at this time.

Facility problems

Study shows schools may need money

Problems with present facility conditions, particularly at the middle school and high school, may force the Wayne Public Schools to either seek public approval of a bond issue within the next five years, or budget revisions to allow for capital improvement projects.

Facility conditions were the main concern addressed in an external visitation report the schools received recently. Superintendent of Schools Dr. Francis Haun said the report will facilitate some long-term planning.

"You have to deal with not only expensive capital outlays but bond issues as well and that will take some long-term planning," he said. "What might be modern day today will be outdated in five years. Such is the case with the high school."

The good news in the report is that the schools' curriculum and faculty received strong marks.

IN DISCUSSING high school facilities, Haun was referring to insufficient space for the weight room and inadequate locker room facilities. He said when the high school was built in 1967, athletics were not taken into account because the girls programs were limited and weightrooms were almost non-existent. Today, both the boys and girls locker rooms are outdated and the weightroom is dangerously small.

The primary concerns addressed in the visitation report revolved around the Wayne Middle School,

in particular, insufficient laboratory space for science and industrial education.

According to the report, the middle school laboratory for industrial education will not support the introduction of technology education and the science laboratory has insufficient storage space and improper ventilation.

Other areas of concern expressed in the report dealt with the need for a full-time visual arts instructor for grades K-8 and a full-time speech pathologist. Haun said the visual arts instructor probably won't pose a problem but finding a speech pathologist will be a trick.

"The good news is that they're not asking that we hire a bunch of people — that would be our highest cost," Haun said.

IN DEALING with the facility conditions, Haun said it may require some time. He said the earliest a bond issue can be put up to voters is a year. He said if it doesn't pass the first go-around, it will take another six months for another issue to be brought fourth. If the bond issue passes the first time, Haun said it will take a minimum of two years for construction projects to be complete.

While the external visitation report made strong recommendations for the middle school and high school, Haun said it overlooked decaying conditions in the middle school band room and gymnasium. He said he is certain that some time in the future, those two rooms will require some extensive repair.

The Wayne superintendent added that within the next three months, the schools will have a better idea what priorities need to be made. He said the next step will incorporate upcoming studies by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and the Nebraska Department of Education.

Joint venture proving successful

Bank displays students' works

Farmers and Merchants Bank President Tim Keller provided Wayne State College Professor Pearl Hansen with an opportunity she couldn't pass up.

Keller's idea was to have college artists' work displayed at Wayne's newest bank.

"It was the building that inspired me," Keller says. "The building is so unique and it lends itself to art. Since we have extra lobby space after taking down the prune tree that was in here, I thought it would be a nice opportunity for people to display their works."

THE TWO WSC students who have their works on display currently are Judith Berry, a graduate student, and Carol "Svend" Preston, a junior K-12 art education major.

Hansen says she was excited at the prospect of having art students display their work. She said it's a

unique opportunity that has never been tried before.

"Tim called me and asked us if we were interested in setting something up to encourage a cooperative environment between his business and the college," she says. "He said he was impressed with the current relationship between the college and the community and he wanted to expand on that."

Keller contacted Hansen since March is National Art Promotion month, but because of the success of the displays, he says the possibility remains that the college and the bank will continue to display works on a 30-day rotational basis.

FOR THE TWO students whose artwork is on display, the opportunity has been beneficial.

"I was excited to think that the state college is here in Wayne and we would be able to display our works in the community," says Preston. "It's good to have the public's eyes opened to the artwork that comes out of the college."

"People sometimes won't see artwork unless they go to the gallery," Berry adds. "This allows them to see artists' work without having to go to a gallery or museum."

Keller said that's the reason he asked the college to have students display their works. He says like most people, he probably wouldn't think about going to the college to see a show, so he probably wouldn't be exposed to artwork. He adds that this way, the artwork is readily available for the public to see.

Although the work is on display at Farmers and Merchants Bank, Keller says the bank is not selling it. He says the artists' names are positioned on or nearby the pieces, so if people are interested in purchasing the works, they are free to contact the student-artists.

SINCE BRINGING the artwork into the bank, Keller says the response is tremendous. He says one

WAYNE - The Wayne High School speech team ran away with first place honors at the district speech contest held Saturday, March 16 at West Point High School.

Wayne students compiled 96 team points to win the district trophy. Blair was second with 62 points and West Point placed third with 59. Other schools in the district include: Pierce, Schuyler, Tekamah-Herman, Logan View and Arlington.

Farm Bill prompts array of producers' questions

WAYNE - According to Wayne County Extension Agent Rod Patent, some changes made in the 1990 Farm Bill have resulted in a number of questions from ag producers.

Patent said the 1990 Farm Bill requires certified private pesticide applicators to maintain records of restricted use pesticides. Prior to the bill's passage, only certified commercial applicators had this recordkeeping requirement. Patent added that the 1990 bill also fine-tunes some of the specifics related to commercial applicators.

"It is yet to be determined precisely what records will be required by private applicators," he said. "The USDA has formed a committee of the key agencies involved in developing and implementing the pesticide recordkeeping requirement of the Farm Bill."

THE NATIONAL Agricultural Statistic Service has been given the lead in defining the information the applicators will be required to maintain, along with collecting the data for an annual report to Congress.

"It is estimated that the earliest that private applicators could be expected to start keeping records will be January, 1992," Patent said.

HE ADDED that there are eight provisions which applicators will have to abide in their recordkeeping procedures under the 1990 Farm Bill.

- Records of the application of restricted use pesticides must be maintained for two years.

- All certified applicators of restricted use pesticides, both agricultural and non-agricultural, will have to keep records.

- Commercial applicators will be required to provide application records to the person for whom an application was provided.

- Records by private certified applicators will contain information comparable to that maintained by commercial applicators in the state which the certified applicator resides.

- Records must be made available to any federal or state agency that deals with pesticide use or any

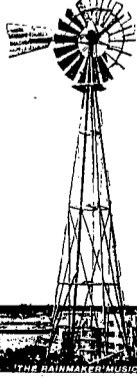

health or environmental issues related to the use of pesticides, upon request.

* In no case may a government agency release data, including the location from which the data was derived, that could directly or indirectly reveal the identity of individual producers.

* Persons who fail to comply

shall be subjected to a fine in an amount of up to \$500 for the first offense, and not less than \$1,000 for each subsequent offense, except in the case of a good faith effort to comply.

* The bill directs the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture and the administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency to survey records to develop and maintain a data base and publish annual reports.
