To FERRY GROWNS.—The State Horticultural Society has made arrangements for the display and arrangement of the displays and flowers at the coming state fair, September 11th. The building devoted exclusively to this display is 114 by 20 and a wing 80 by 20, well lighted from above. This will be the most important event held in the state fair, and will be paced from every fruit-growing county, especially the northern ones, that a company of fruit-growers from different states have what kinds are best adapted to soil locally. Black cherry will be sent out to send a list of their entries in advance, so that they may be ready for examination. The Lincoln Journal says the Great Western association is going to work promptly and energetically to renew the state for subscriptions. Mr. Geo. W. Pack has been engaged as assistant by Gen. J. C. McRae, secretary of the association. About 26,000 copies of the newspaper are to be issued weekly.

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There is a good deal of complaint regarding the trials held at Red Cloud and Hartington, and whose business it is to regulate such matters can make friendly by attending to it.

The Blair Republican says the first drive of cattle for the Frontier Land & Cattle Co. of Herman, 1,000 head, were started from Powder River last week. They will be driven to the end of the railroad at Chadron, Neb., and then shipped over the mountains to the stockyards at Denver.

Dr. Chambers has been authorized to act as inspector of live stock at the Union Stock Yards, Omaha, until further notice. The order emanates from State Veterinarian Girth.

The York Democrat says that Thomas Moore, a farmer living on the country line near John Bishop's in Blair township, was struck by lightning at 4 o'clock in the morning, and died before he could be reached. He left Schaffell, a woman who lives in the adjoining town of Franklin, about forty years ago, married and left him. She was arrested and locked up in the other room. During the night she attempted suicide by shooting. She first tore a strip from her dress skirt and tied it around her neck so tight that it shut her wind up. When discovered by the police she was still alive.

W. H. Wright, of North Platte, was shot with intent to kill, was arrested and placed under \$200 bonds. When time for examination came it was found that he had "whipped out," leaving his bondsman to look the bill.

Hastings' building operations are suspended, delayed for want of a supply of materials.

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



**Republican County Convention.**  
The Republicans, citizens of Wayne County, met in convention at the court house in Wayne, Monday, October 1st, 1886, for the purpose of choosing a delegation to the State Convention, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, County Superintendent of Public Instruction, County Judge, Sheriff, Coroner, County Surveyor and other Commissioners, and to perform such other business as may be presented to the convention.

The basis of representation will be one delegate for every precinct and one for every county, making a total of 100 delegates for the Republican Presidential election in 1888.

The several counties are allotted in representation as follows:

Douglas 2 Lincoln 2

Garfield 2 Spring Branch 2

Hancock 2 Wayne 14

Leavenworth 1

It is recommended that the Republican delegation of the several products meet in convention, Saturday, October 10th, 1886, to elect their delegates to the State Convention for the same purpose. Their choice for the delegates elected to the State Convention to represent the county, will be as follows:

For a member of the Legislature, representing the state at the State Convention, Tom Steele.

It is further recommended that the delegates be admitted to the convention except such as are held by persons residing in the precincts from which proxies are given.

For a member of the County Court:

Committee A. A. Wilson Chairman.

Wayne, Neb., Aug. 26th, 1886.

Tom Steele was re-nominated by the Ohio Democrats last Friday.

An error last week made the call for the county convention read 10 o'clock p. m. It should have read 1 o'clock.

William Doty, a prominent Iowa Greenbacker, denounces the sale of his party to the Democracy and announces himself as a straight out candidate for governor.

The Norfolk Journal has again charged hands and M. Waterman, who

was one of the former proprietors is in possession. Mr. Waterman is a thorough newspaper man and will keep the journal up to mark.

Charleston, S. C. Carolina, and vicinity were visited by a very de-

In the Lincoln Journal of the 23rd was given a statistical table of the population of the state, Wayne being

credited with a population of 68, only

750 out of the way. We had \$14 if you please, Mr. Journal. The same mistake is made in the pamphlet issued by the State Super-intendent.

We've been wondering for some time why the West Point Progress reached us so irregularly. The ex-

planation comes in the shape of an

announcement that O'Sullivan is the

father of a bouncing new boy. We shall expect to see the Progress regu-

larly thereafter.

The Iowa Democrats have declared

against the prohibitory liquor law,

and announce themselves in favor of

a license law that fixes a minimum

license at \$250, with the provision that

the amount of the license may be in-

creased to \$1,000 under locality desiring

it. No provision is made for a local

option feature that would permit any

community to refuse a license alto-

gether if they wished to. The pro-

posed law lacks much of being as

good as the one in force in Nebraska

and which many Iowa Democrats

have declared themselves in favor of.

A complete fusion was made with the

Greenbackers, E. H. Gillett, one of

the most strenuous supporters of the

prohibitory law being nominated for

lieutenant governor. Whether the

Democrats will be able to crowd the

license bill down the throats of the

Greenbackers, who are for the most

part extreme prohibitionists, remains

to be seen, but there does not seem to

be much chance for success.

Can any one tell what Tom, Jeffer-

Steels has ever done for the county

that we are under political obligations to him?—Gazette.

Well, yes, when the court house

burned last summer Tom worked like

a beaver to save every thing in his

office and got out a valuable safe at

the imminent risk of his life, not

withstanding the efforts of the crowd

to dislodge him from the dangerous

attempt. That saved the county

several hundred dollars. Afterwards when the arrangements were nearly completed for buying a safe for the treasurer's office to replace the one ruined by the fire, Tom again saved the county several hundred dollars by voluntarily offering to give up the safe in his office to the treasurer, so it was not necessary to buy a safe for which the county would have no possible use as soon as a court house is built.

When the treasurer's settlement was made with the commissioners last January there was a difference of opinion as to the amount due the treasurer, and he was compelled to sue for his money. He was successful during the year. It was of course simply a difference of opinion, but Tom's vigorous "kicking" in favor of the construction that placed the amount at the lower figure saved the county nearly three hundred dollars. Moreover Tom has made a capable, honest and industrious clerk, certainly as good as the county has ever had, and is still affable and obliging with all who do business in the office. He is thoroughly conversant with the business of the office and the books and papers in it are in first class condition. He is, by reason of his nature, fitness and his experience, the best man in the county for the position. He is worth more to the public than a forty acre field of hibernating snakes who call upon the public to help them get even in a private quarrel.

We do not believe much in the theory that in choosing its servants the public is under particular obligations to any person, but if it refuses to retain a competent official simply because a clique demands his removal it is not benefiting its business very well, and is offering much encouragement to its servants for a faithful discharge of duty.

Suppose the Gazette turns the light of its searching criticism into some other quarter and asks its questions with reference to some other candidate and then answer them, and see where it fetches up.

**RING**

In the last two years a change has come over the "ring." Its members do not regard each other with that warm and enthusiastic affection so beautiful to this sinful world. How the unfriendly feelings originated is a matter of conjecture. It is evident, however, that it is certain that the ring, as formerly constituted, is not taking any special part in politics this year. One faction however, composed of the men who were most thoroughly identified with the most objectionable features of the ring, is doing everything in its power to defeat the re-nomination of the present county clerk by means of all kinds of abuse and misrepresentation. They have the assurance to pretend that they are doing it only for the public good. Heaven save the mark! It is evident that the ring is not doing this through their own efforts, but through those of the present county officials but one is actively opposed to Mr. Steele. This I happen to know is not true, but it is on a par with many of their other misrepresentations. They have started out with claiming everything and profiting the greatest confidence that they will have things all their own way. It is evident to all that these men who do not represent their place of making the public believe Steele is beaten in advance.

They say they have Wayne precinct two to one. I don't know much about the feeling in the rest of the present, but in this part of it Steele will get five-sixths of the vote. Don't forget it. The editor of the Gazette is the special spokesman for the disgruntled fraction of the ring. A beautiful specimen he is to howl about a ring! He who ever since he has been in the county has been the most obnoxious tool and puppet of the ring, and has always danced when his superiors pulled the strings. His explanation of his grounds for personally opposing Mr. Steele is the simplest thing that has ever been heard. He says before the people of Wayne county as a master, when it is well known that whatever business troubles he had brought them by his own conduct and Mr. Steele had no more to do with them than the Emperor of China.

We do not believe that the people of Wayne county will permit themselves to be deceived by such a mass of bosh. They certainly will have enough judgment to decide whether they wish Mr. Steele to fill the office of clerk for a second term without the interference or dictation of a set of men who are working for their own advancement only.
