The census of Wayne shows a population of 1,700,000 instead of 2,000,000 as first reported. There is a gain since 1880 of 129,000. Nebraska has gained in the same time 200,000.

It is quietly whispered that the Democrats too are having a high jinks of a time trying to decide what candidates they will put up to be beaten.

Our Democratic friends in Wayne county, or rather those of them who are busily setting the pins and fixing dates for their convention, are fondly hugging the delusive hope that they will be able to pull their ticket through on account of a disqualification they pretend to see in the Republicans ranks. The Republicans have a little family setto on hand—but that will be settled next Monday, and then all the Republicans will unite to give the Democrats a good political drubbing.

We would urge upon every Republican voter in the county the necessity of attending the primaries Saturday. They are expected to give the sentiment of the Republicans as to their choice for county officers, and only by a full vote can this be done. Don't stay at home and thus find fault with the result of the convention. Turn out yourselves and vote.

There is considerable talk that an attempt will be made to run Democratic votes into the primaries Saturday. No person has any right to vote in a primary unless he intends to support the nominees of the party holding the primary, and no self respecting Democrat will lend himself to such a scheme. Admit to the primary all persons who will agree to support the ticket nominated, and exclude all others. No one has any right to go into a primary or a convention and then bolt because his action is not what he wanted. If an attempt to put in Democratic votes is made there will be trouble.

We have no "final appeal" to make in behalf of any candidate who will be voted for in the primaries Saturday. In spite of all the abuse and malignant attacks that have been made during the campaign, it is an excellent set of men who are asking for support, and any ticket that may be selected from it will in the main meet with the warm approval of the Republicans of the county. We do wish however to see a full and impartial vote, and a fair open convention in which the expressed wish of the Republican voters of the county may be carried out.

Hon. J. C. Crawford, District Judge: Come into court! Judge Crawford, you had a great deal to say in the spring term of the district court in Wayne county about the carelessness manifested by the commissioners and clerks in Wayne and other counties in the conduct of their business, and the consequent unnecessary expense entailed on the different counties, although you are well aware that such expense might have been avoided by a single precautionary line from yourself. Was your reason sufficient to excuse your causing the loss of time and annoyance and expense to a large number of Wayne county people, and to attorney fees, district court fees, and the like? Common sense assigns a reason less trifling than inconsiderateness with the dignity of your official position, and the people of Wayne county will need a better one before they again concede to you the respect that is due and should be given to one occupying the honorable and responsible position you hold.
