"Another such victory and we are undone."

Nebraska has given Republicans by at least from 15,000 to 20,000.

President Cleveland has issued a proclamation, designating Nov. 26 Thanksgiving day.

Ferdinand Ward, the Marine Bank controller was watered last Saturday for ten years in the penitentiary.

The Colfax Sentinel is continually getting to be a better local paper, so we are pleased to observe.

The President and cabinet went home to vote, the department heads did not dare indulge in that luxury.

The proposition to authorize the commissioners to dispose of the property at La Porte, pulled through successfully.

The Central City Courier was the first paper that reached this office containing full election returns from its counts.

An Omaha gentleman said to us this week that the Omaha Northern was absolutely certain to be beaten and that it would as certainly run across this country.

Gen. Gen. B. McMillan died and died at his residence in New Haven last Thursday night. For many years Gen. McMillan has been one of the most prominent men in the county, and his death is lamented by the whole country.

At the time we go to press the returns from the state elections are very meager.

New York has probably gone Democratic by from 12,000 to 15,000.

Lee, Democrat, has been elected governor of Virginia.

Massachusetts reports the Republicans can take in a large majority. Iowa elects the Republican ticket by about 20,000 majority.

Pennsylvania shows the Democrats under by 30,000 majority.

The elections in New Jersey, Connecticut, Illinois, Kansas, and Colorado have apparently given the Republicans majority. Maryland and Mississippi, as usual go Democratic.

Omaha has at last taken hold of the project building a rail road into the state of Wyoming, and seems to be well on the way to accomplish something.

A proposition has been made by Omaha capitalists that if the city will donate ground, labor, and material, and the legislature and Douglas county will vote bonds to the amount of \$100,000 that I am inclined to believe will be taken to construct at least a hundred miles of road.

The route that meets with the most favor, and upon which the road will probably be built, is from Omaha eastward to Denver, then westward through the Colorado mountains to Yankton, with the intention of extending it through western South Dakota and North Western Wyoming.

It is however a question whether the project will be successful.

There is much difference of opinion as to the effect a road would have on the traffic. The more business good would come from it, but there can be no other opinion as to the necessity of our getting the road into Wyoming.

It is possible that Wyo. will not even want to have the road, or that it will not want to pay for it.

Wyo. if no roads were built into the section for many years to come, but that can not be expected, and it is however well to keep a sharp eye on the projected road.

A Word to Republicans.

The Republican party in Wayne county has won a victory, but it is a victory that will be short lived. In a total vote of 872 the Republican state ticket has a majority of 274, certainly a handsome one. There are different opinions as to the cause that led to such a reduction of that majority as to defeat the Republican candidate for commissioner and make the vote for clerk and treasurer as unequal as possible. The reason is probably due to the influence of Mr. Dutcher, Mr. Miller and Mr. Mettler may have had much to do with the large vote they received and we have heard that reason assigned, but we do not believe it to be the correct one. Mr. Johnson, Mr. Briston, and Mr. Crane are popular and capable men and something more lay at the bottom of the matter. We propose to give what we consider the true reason, for the purpose of finding fault with anyone or of hurting the feelings of anyone, but solely for the good of the party and for the purpose of preventing any like occurrences in the future if possible. We believe the true reason for the defection that manifested itself in the Republican ranks to be this. The campaign was carried on for several months to such an extent personal

and abusive, so abounding in malice and unfounded attacks, not on the character of candidates and other persons not directly interested, that many Republicans became thoroughly disgusted, and believing the party and the community disgraced by such proceedings, determined to rebuke them; and they did. Whether their actions were justifiable or not we do not propose to discuss, but to those certain that the publication of Wayne county can not afford to pass through or sanction such another campaign as this has been. The personal feelings arising from it, and the desire to be revenged for any action taken by Republicans during the campaign must be laid aside at once and forever. We have in the country a large and able majority under any ordinary circumstances and after all, if it is possible, using the party to accomplish particular ends, a private personal malice must meet with hearty and emphatic condemnation by the party itself.
