A fire in Galveston, Texas, last Friday burned over a large portion of the residence part of the city causing a loss estimated at \$1,000,000. The wind blew a hurricane during the fire, at one time reaching a velocity of sixty miles an hour.

The governor of Kansas has issued an address to the senators and representatives of that state, urging them to secure the establishment of military posts for the protection of the settlers in the southern part of the state from the incursions of Indians.

Louis Riel, the Canadian half breed rebel leader was hanged on Monday. His execution caused great excitement among the people, who at many points, notably at Quebec, riots were prevented only by the most vigorous efforts on the part of the authorities.

Omaha's effort to get a road into Northern Nebraska has aroused the Fremont Elkton & Missouri Valley, and they are making preparations to take freight to that place of better term than heretofore if the project of invading this territory is abandoned.

The Omaha Republicans of the 14th told of the miraculous escape of a girl named from certain men in Lincoln who fell down an elevator shaft eight feet and was not hurt. There's nothing very remarkable about it that we can see. If she had been a fresh and blooded she would have been talking about.

A. L. Pound, the detective who shot one of the robbers who was engaged in an attempt to rob the state treasury last winter, was found guilty of murder in the second degree last week at Lincoln, and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. A strong effort to procure a pardon for him will be made, and will probably be successful.

And so Childs has resolved himself into a committee of the whole and disposed the HERALD-TRIBUNE from his position as "the leading Republican paper of the county" to stand up to his own bantling for the place. Well, he may do it, and he may not. It may be however that the dear, diligent old flopper has a larger mouthful than he can manage, or, as the boys say, has "bit off more than he can chew."

In the eight months the transfer boat was able to run during the season at Sioux City over 25,000 cars were carried over, and run by this means. That would indicate about 40,000 cars for the entire year, crossing the river at that point. Such a traffic would certainly justify the building of a bridge at once, and the traffic would be greatly increased by it. Sioux City ought to push the matter vigorously and get the bridge built.

Everything points to an unusual activity of railroad building in Nebraska next year. The companies are just beginning fully to realize that the trade at Nebraska is a prime worth striving for, and there will be considerable rivalry among them to secure it. The railway system of the state for many years to come will no doubt be determined next year, and the community that neglects a chance to secure a road now will probably have good reason to regret it.

Two things in the Gazette's article regarding us we wish to notice. One that we refused to advocate the Republican ticket except on a pledge of receiving substantially all the county printing.
