

Wildcats Lose Close Game to Omaha on Fumble Punt 18 to 13

Omaha Grabs Lead With Six Minutes to Go—Wayne Uses 24 Players

Trailing 13 to 12 in the closing minutes of the game, an out-fought and desperate Omaha University team fell heir to one of those breaks which decide football games. Fox took a chance on a high twisting punt which slipped from his hands and was recovered close to the Wildcat goal by an Omaha player. A short pass and three line plays brought the North Central 11 the winning touchdown. With three minutes of play remaining they made a nice runback of a goal line kickoff but a Wildcat passing attack failed as the game ended 18 to 13. Earlier in the second half and trailing 12 to 7 it was halfback Fox who took a pass from Bradford which netted 55 yards and a touchdown to place Wayne State ahead 13 to 7. It was this one point lead which the Wildcats had admirably nursed along for 17 minutes against a harassed Cardinal 11 that went glimmering as result of the fumble.

Omaha won the toss and Fox returned Kulper's kickoff 25 yards, Bradford punted and the ball was touched down by Raaz on Omaha's 5-yard line. The Cardinals got out of this tough spot with a plunging attack but fumbled later on the 25. On the first down Bradford passed to Lindahl who ran 10 yards to score. Bradford place kicked the point and Wayne took a 7 point lead. Wayne stopped Omaha's rushing attack but were noticeably tiring as the second quarter started. At this point Coach Morrison sent in eight fresh men but Omaha tallied two touchdowns by passes before the quarter ended to give them a 12 to 7 lead at the half.

Having used a punt formation throughout the first half Wayne employed a single wing back and unbalanced line at the start of the third period following a nice return of the kickoff. After an exchange of punts Bradford hurled a long pass to Fox which netted 55 yards and a touchdown. The kick was missed. Wayne held a 13 to 12 lead until a fumbled punt paved the way for the winning Cardinal score with six minutes to go in the fourth quarter.

High lights of the game were: Stopping Omaha's veteran 200 pound fullback, Bradford's passing and kicking, and the hard fighting spirit which characterized the play of every Wayne player throughout the game. Time after time the initial tackler had the help of several other Wayne tacklers to bring down Omaha backs. Playing against a line easily 10 to 15 pounds heavier Wayne linemen consistently outcharged the Omahans.

Anxious to get a lineup on all of his capable men Coach Morrison used his entire squad of 24 players. Eleven of these men were playing their first game for Wayne and turned in a fine game. All of Wayne's veterans showed marked improvement over last year as evidenced by the closeness of the score over a vastly improved Omaha team.

Raaz and Lindahl played a great game offensively and defensively, their understudies Smith and Newman did well and Johns played a whale of a game at guard and finally at end. Mitchel and Farmer took good care of their tackle territory. Johnson at center passed the ball faultlessly and was a beacon on the defense. Hungerford, Gatewood, Fox and Bradford played great ball. Murray took up the punting where Bradford left off and Wayne punts averaged 49 yards which was 18 yards more than Omaha's punts averaged. Smith, Newman, Baker, Farmer, Spilce, Storm, Span, Kilian played their first game as live men for Wayne while new backfield players were Truby, Travets and Cisar. All of the Wayne players performed in a creditable manner and played an aggressive bang up game. Omaha displayed its characteristic rough game drawing 65 yards in penalties to 15 for Wayne. On the third play of the third quarter Kritzer of

Omaha, tackler, was ejected from the game for slugging Lindahl.
Morrison's boys came out of the game without serious injuries and learned a lot of football which apparently was the major objective of the Wildcat mentor.

30-Year-Old School Structure to Receive Major Improvements

Awaiting federal approval and allotment of WPA funds to match Wayne's school bond issue receiving the approval of the majority of Wayne voters at the special election Friday, the Board of Education are completing preliminary work before plans and bids can be submitted.

Progressive Wayne citizens cast their ballots at the polls Friday to successfully pass the proposed school improvement bond issue with a majority of 88 votes. Results of the three wards balloting were 379 in favor and 293 against the issue. Ward results were as follows: First ward, 114 for, 68 against; Second ward, 102 for, 105 against; and Third ward, 163 for and 120 against.

The proposed school improvement plan found its staunchest defenders in the Wayne Young Business Men's club who at their first meeting of the club year unanimously endorsed the project and appointed a committee to make a house-to-house canvass in the interest of the plan. Representatives of the club shouldered the major responsibilities of conveying facts concerning the inadequacy of the present school building to the voting public.

When the result of the bond election was announced at the firemen's entertainment held at the city auditorium Friday night, the crowd of more than 700 people loudly clapped and shouted their approval.

urged municipal and other governmental subdivisions contemplating seeking federal aid in constructing public works to act promptly.

Undoubtedly most of Wayne's Citizens would like to believe Hendrickson's appeal for forgiveness for tactics used in his effort to defeat the bond issue but he apparently does not take much stock in his own word. His futile attempt to discredit the Wayne News by falsely and maliciously stating the News was not an official paper is ridiculous, and we doubt if it will in any way hurt our business. The fact that we do not accept any legal publications from Hendrickson does not interfere with the legal qualifications of the News. Leading lawyers of Wayne have in the past and no doubt in the future will give us a reasonable proportion of their legal publications. They know as most everyone does that the publishers of the News sign a sworn statement each time a legal notice appears in the News and that we are not so foolish as to lay ourselves liable.

We believe the changes we have made in the business have made for better service to the community. In the face of difficult times and newness in the community we have evidenced our faith that Wayne desires competition in the printing and newspaper business the same as in other lines of business enterprise. In giving Wayne a Tuesday Newspaper opportunity is given to merchants to advertise in a newspaper going into Wayne and surrounding trade territory without competition. Two newspapers published on different dates each week doubles merchants' advertising messages without duplication which existed heretofore. It not only gives the territory double news service but brings Wayne goodwill into the homes of the trade territory twice a week throughout the year instead of once a week. The News circulation is on a sound foundation and the institution has never in its 54 years been in a better position to serve for best interests of Wayne.

Truck Business Manufactures Its Own Trouble

Apparently not harassed enough by railroad competition and legislative measures, operators of the trucking industry in this area are at logger heads over hours and wage scales. While the customary wrangling is going on, truck freight business which was built up through years of hard struggle is slipping back to the railroads. The railroad of today is not the railroad of unbending regulations of yesterday. Service improvements among all railroads are in a better condition to compete with the network of truck transportation. It would not be surprising to see a large portion of truck freight permanently in the hands of the railroads when truck employees and employers decide to agree on terms. In fact according to comments among businessmen within the trade territory of truck centers the ultimate result of this tomfoolery will be some idle trucks, drivers and probably a few "out of business" signs hanging over truck firms' doors. After all it matters little to the average businessman who carries the freight as long as the service is satisfactory.

You Can Educate a Fool But You Can't Make Him Think!

It has been and always will be Mr. Hendrickson's policy to smear and cast insinuations at anyone that doesn't agree with him. In the question of the News being a legal paper he has again proven himself a fool. No one but a fool would issue such a statement unless they had access to a newspaper's books.

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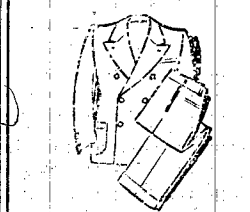
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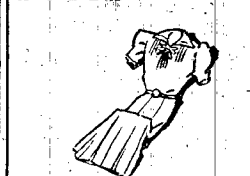

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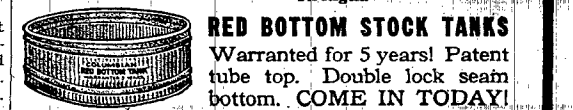
