AN EDITORIAL

The recommendation of the state planning board to place the university and the teachers' colleges under a single board of higher education and that the teachers' colleges specialize in training rural and elementary teachers undoubtedly has some merit. Under ideal circumstances one board, with a single chancellor, given control of both the university and the teachers colleges here and at Peru, Chadron and Kearney, could increase the efficiency of the state educational system.

It is logical, looking at the problem from a completely theoretical standpoint, to assume that certain efforts and methods could be coordinated for the mutual benefit of the institutions and the me

al standpoint, to assume that certain efforts and methods could be co-ordinated for the mutual benefit of the institutions and the improvement of the entire eyetem. The argument that such an arrangement would be more economical will undoubtedly be stressed, but, anyone familiar with the curtailed budgets under which the colleges have operated recently, has reason to be extremely dubious about that particular theory.

Granting that as a general rule there are too many boards, commissions and other agencies handling various phases of state and national questions, consolidation of which would in many cases increase efficiency and decrease costs, the danger which would result from the proposed consolidation far outweighs its possible benefits.

The educational opportunities which this nation offers both rich and poor have been one of the greatest blessings of our form of government. Far more important are they to the future of this country and its boys and girls than all the paved highways and other improvements which have contributed greatly to the country's progress. They have helped maintain and improve the democracy which gave them birth. They should be guarded with the greatest care and protected as much as humanly possible from the whins and fancies of politicians.

We know how the present two board system functions, one taking care of the university and the other guiding the teachers colleges. Admittedly, it is not a perfect system and the legislature, through controlling the purse strings, rules them in a general way. This was demonstrated when the teachers colleges were forced to

What would be the probable results of placing control in one board — 'preferably appointive', the recommendation states — and consolidating the budget for the five?

First, isn't it logical to suppose that this change, coming at a time when adverse economic conditions are making all moves tagged economy bargain political merchandise, will result in further curtailed budgets for the five institutions. Second, years of squabbling over the division of educational funds between the university and the teachers colleges, will not be erased but rather intensified by the change. The board, even though its members attempt to be impartial, will be forced into the position of favoring one or the other. The university bloc is particularly strong and will probably win the major portion of the financial cake and the teachers colleges, the educational institutions for the children of the comparatively poor families, must suffer.

We have no quarref with a generous budget for the university; undoubtedly, it is doing a great work and should keep its standards as high as similar institutions in other states. But we are greatly concerned about the fate of the teachers colleges under the simple board system, especially in view of the remaining recommendations by the planning board.

The proposal to reorganize these institutions so that they would specialize in training rural and elementary teachers while adding to the university's already extensive curriculum the exclusive privelege of training high school teachers has all the appearances of reducing the teachers colleges to two year institutions, virtually forcing those who would teach to complete their training at the costly university.

Rains And Cycles

Rains and dry weather are reputed to move in cycles, each of several years duration and gradually shifting from the high to the low point in total precipitation. If past history is correct, Nebraska's rainfall should have reached its low point in 1936 and be gradually increasing since then.

Those who contend that these charts are reliable admit, of course, that there are frequent exceptions in both years and in various sections of the state. This year is evidently one of those exceptions in northeastern Nebraska. Figures compiled by Charles W. Long of Wakefield, official weather observer, reveal there has been 9.64 inches less rainfall from Jan. 1 to Oct. 1, 1939, than for the same period last year.

As dry as it has been this summer, every bit of evidence which points to more rainfall in the future should be assembled and hauled out of the closet, drawer or wherever such data is kept, to bolster the spirits of the discouraged. So, take it from the chart followers, rains are coming in ever increasing numbers during the next few years and then trust that the charts are correct.

CCC Progressing

With a score of farms in the vicinity of the Winside conservation camp already mapped and signed for a complete soil and water conservation program, farmers in this region are going to have ample opportunity to see both the benefits and disadvantages of the CCC program. If only these score benefited from the work, it would not be worth the cost, but if it proves sufficiently benefitial to influence scores of others to adopt similar measures, its benefits will far outweigh its costs.

The co-operation which the camp has received from the farmers in that district since they learned the details of the program is encouraging. It shows a willingness to build for the future just as construction of new buildings, homes and factories demonstrate confidence in a town's future. Surely, the soil upon which rests the prosperity of both the farmer and the town which serves him, is equally important.

Present plans are to have 40 farms signed, completely laid out a large share of the work established by the time planting rations start in the spring. Results of the work on these 40 ms will be watched throughout this section of the state and its ects may continue for years to come.




