Here is additional evidence that the state needs the full four year teachers colleges, which would be endangeged under the program proposed by the planning board. Among the alumni are many who could serve their alma mater well by exerting every effort possible to prevent adoption of the plan. Their help should be obtained.

We are confident that if Nebraskans throughout the state are presented with the facts through the alumni, the teachers colleges will not be reduced to two year institutions. However, they must be informed before their support may be expected. Here is an opportunity for them to render a real service which will benefit not only their college but also the entire state.

Publicity Needed

It is natural to judge the size and importance of a town just as you do an individual by what you hear about him. The more you hear about John, the more important John becomes, unless, of a circus, a toothpaste or a town.

Wayne needs and deserves more favorable publicity in the state's metropolitan press. Neither the town nor the Wayne State Teachers college receives its share of the routine news stories, largely due to the fact that neither has a publicity agent nor an organization, such as a Chamber of Commerce, which has this task as one of its duities.

Some college students do act as correspondents for the metropolitan newspapers but confine their efforts largely to reports on
major athletic events here. Back in the days before Hoover prosperity came to an untimely end, the larger daily papers paid their
correspondents well enough for their labor. Publicity agents were
not needed, but all has been changed in recent years.

Wayne has its share of good news stories. Few are sensational,
but certainly they compare favorably in quality and guantity with
those of the average town of this size. Both the college and the city
need someone to shoulder this task and some joint arrangement
should be possible.

If President Roosevel consents to become a candidate for a third term, which is believed likely in view of the European war, he will be re-elected or all signs are wrong.

First, popularity poils—the accuracy of which admittedly must be questioned in many cases—have shown an overwhelming majority favors his program to preserve peace and that his personal popularity is again climbing skyward.

Second, the chief arg: mynt against his re-election is the two-term tradition, heavily outwelghed by the welfare of the nation, the importance of preserving its neutrality and continuing the recovery trend.

importance of preserving its neutrality and continuing the recovery trend.

Third, the concern with which mention of his possible candidacy is greeted by that wing of the republican party which has conducted a vigorous but futile campaign of hate against the New Deal and the democratic party. So fearful is this minority group that President, Roosevelt, will, consent to become the democratic candidate again that they are spreading volumes of propaganda describing an imaginary and permanent split among the democratic landstarly, democrats differ on many questions: few have approved all the policies of the New Deal just as few republicans favored the prosperity-is-just around the corner-so-well-just await-its-arrival policy of the Hoover regime. They will continue to disagree on some questions, but when their candidates are selected, they will be assured of not only the support of the vast majority of their own party members but also of that of the liberal wing of the republican party.

Broken treaties, violation of frontiers, lack of respect for the pledged word, despollation of human and property rights, are the eyils in Europe which have been responsible for many wars during the past one hundred years and have culminated finally in the first and second World Wars.

There is common agreement in our nation that if this hemisphere is to achieve a lasting peace, if the very foundations of civilization are to be preserved and if cultural and economic ties between the Americas are to be strengthened, that the mistakes of Europe must be avoided. Temporary measures taken at the Panama conference to meet the threat of disaster which might come as a result of the European catastrophe will not serve the interests of our society unless they are thoroughly grounded on fundamental principles of respect for these very things which. Europe has so lightly disregarded. The fact he generally admitted that we have permitted to arise on this continent the beginning of what, unless checked, may eventually develop into a situation similar to that over which Europe has been suffering for generations. Property and human rights have been violated by Mexico and Bolivia in contravention of international law and decent

ico and Bolivia in contravention of international law and decent of international law and decent practices among sovereign states. If we continue to stand idly by without making effective protest against the despoliations carried out by these governments against the lawfully acquired rights of citizens of the United States, it is inevitable that the fever will spread to other countries. spread to other countries

If the Panama conference leaves behind it a program that will bring about thorough and complete repudiation of the actions taken by Mexico and Bolivia, thus paving the way for a prompt and just solution of the problems created by those governments, a long step forward in the peace and solidarity of this continent will have been achieved. the peace and solidarity of this continent will have been achieved. 
