

Senator Lee Raps Willkie, GOP Record

Contrast In Promises And Action Stressed

Answering the campaign charges hurled by republicans at President Roosevelt with facts and statistics and pointing to the danger of risking this nation's future to Wendell Willkie as the candidate of Big Business, Senator Lee of Oklahoma delivered the outstanding political address of the present campaign in Wayne Friday night.

At least one candidate should receive virtually the united support of Wayne county voters. We refer to William Crossland, a member of a Wayne county pioneer family.

It's a bit early, perhaps, for predictions of the outcome of next week's election since a lot of campaigning remains and may change today's picture somewhat.

Fall Weather Accompanies Downpour Here

Wayne received .82 of an inch of rain Monday, the first downpour sufficient to register here since October 6, when .97 of an inch of moisture was recorded here.

The rain, which started falling about 1:30 Monday morning, continued at intervals throughout the day. It was welcomed here and was accompanied by the return of fall weather, following a long period of unusually high temperature for this time of year.

Only change in the weather Sunday was a strong wind; the mercury climbing nearly to the high marks which it reached almost every day last week.

Pioneer residents expressed the belief that the rain and cool weather which accompanied it would permanently end the summer-like temperatures this season and indicated that residents, who have not made necessary preparations for freezing temperatures, should do so in the near future.

The drop in the mercury was expected to stimulate sale of fall and winter merchandise which has lagged due to the unseasonably warm weather.

Homecoming Tilt Ends In 7 To 7 Tie

Betty Ellis Crowned Queen; Parade Outstanding

Alumni and former students of Wayne State Teachers College returned home by the hundreds Saturday to participate in a most successful Homecoming program, renew college day friendships and witness a thrilling football battle in which Wayne State and the undefeated Peru Bobcats battled to a 7 to 7 tie.

Coach Jim Morrison's Wildcats dominated the play for the first three quarters of the game, scoring a touchdown in the third quarter on a 30 yard pass from Best to Lindahl.

It looked like an upset victory for Wayne until Peru launched a 92 yard sustained drive in the final quarter which evened the count. One of the outstanding plays of the game was a pass from Henderson in his own end zone to Mathers, who ran to the 50-yard line before being downed.

Although the Wildcats ended Peru's unbeaten, untied football record, the deadlock clinched the 1940 NIAA title for the defending champions since there will be no Chadron-Peru game this year.

Betty Ellis was crowned Homecoming Queen at appropriate ceremonies at the dance which concluded the day's program. She was presented by James Ahern, president of the "W" club.

Predominance of patriotic floats was the highlight of one of the most colorful and outstanding Homecoming parades ever staged here. The college band led the parade which featured four bands, the Wayne, Ponca and Wausa high bands.

Many of the floats were outstanding and worthy of praise. File Hall won first prize with its Ship Of Peace; the junior class placed second with its "Wildcats" float and the WAA was third with its sports float depicting a game of croquet.

Warehouse Is Damaged; Farm Field Blaze

At about 11 a. m. Wayne firemen were called to put out a fire in the warehouse behind the Farmers and Merchants Oil company filling station. There, having put his oil truck in the warehouse, locking the warehouse door and misplacing the key, R. G. Puelberth found himself in quite a predicament when he discovered his warehouse blazing.

The second alarm was sounded early Saturday afternoon when a fire in a field on the Nels Granquist farm about 5 miles south-west of Wayne got out of control and firemen were called to extinguish it.

Firemen quickly extinguished the blaze before the truck was damaged. The damage to the warehouse was not great although the south wall was blackened and partly burned. The fire resulted from a trash fire which spread through the dry grass to the warehouse.

Fund To Buy Presidency For Willkie Is Seen

James C. Quigley of Valentine, democratic national committee man, charged an eleven hour campaign on foot among wealthy men in Nebraska and other states to raise funds to buy the presidency for Wendell Willkie and at the same time made public details of a meeting in Omaha at which approximately \$23,000 was raised among men of wealth in that community.

Mr. Quigley charged that early in October, W. E. McFarland of Chicago, a successful bond broker, arrived in Omaha and arranged two meetings with the wealthiest men of the state, the first at the Omaha Club with 15 present and the second, a luncheon, Oct. 15, at the Paxton hotel to which each of those present at the first was to bring five associates.

Mr. McFarland, Mr. Quigley added, painted such a tormenting picture to the effect that in the event of President Roosevelt's reelection this country would become socialized and communized and that the very considerable means of every individual present would be worthless that "he left Omaha with approximately \$23,000. of Nebraska money to be thrown into the closing hours of this battle to buy the American presidency for Wendell Willkie".

Rites For Dr. Hess Are Held Sunday

Prominent Physician Suffers Sudden Fatal Attack

Dr. George J. Hess, prominent Wayne physician, was taken by death Friday morning at 1:15 in a Norfolk hospital which he entered Tuesday morning after being taken suddenly ill with cerebral hemorrhage.

Funeral services were conducted at the home Sunday by Rev. John Paddock. Burial services were conducted at O'Neill by the Wayne and O'Neill Masonic Lodges, with O. R. Bowen in charge of services. Burial was at Prospect Hill cemetery, O'Neill, with the Beckenhauer service in charge.

Attack Sudden

Dr. Hess, who had been in excellent health, took care of his patients on the Monday preceding his death and on Monday evening worked late at the office. He retired that night seemingly in the best of health. At about 5:30 Tuesday morning, Mrs. Hess was awakened by Mr. Hess who complained he was restless and unable to sleep. Shortly after, he became seriously ill and Mrs. Hess called a local physician.

Dr. George J. Hess was born at Blake, Ontario, June 9, 1888. When he was twelve, he moved with his parents to Sebewing, Mich. On Sept. 4, 1901, he was married to Carrie E. Benson of O'Neill, Neb. To this union was born one child, Bonnie, now Mrs. Hugh Drake.

The deceased was graduated from Detroit Medical college after becoming a registered pharmacist and later took a post graduate course at Tulane University. He came to Nebraska in 1908, locating at Chambers and also practiced for about two years in Battle Creek, Neb. He came to Wayne first in 1909, returning here three years later and residing here since that year.

City Physician 25 Years

He was a member of the Wayne Masonic Lodge and a 32nd Degree Mason. He served as city physician for 25 years, which position he held at the time of his death. He was also president of the Five County Medical Association at the time of his death.

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Peru Player Seriously Hurt In Game Here

Don Dean, quarterback on the Peru team, received an injury which resulted in concussion of the brain in the Peru-Wayne game at the college Saturday. He was in serious condition for some time Saturday night and under the care of a local physician.

He was taken home Sunday and his condition was reported satisfactory Monday.

It was erroneously reported in several state papers Sunday that a Wayne player, Bud Best, received a broken collar bone in the Peru-Wayne game. He was injured but his injuries consist of torn ligaments and no broken bones, according to Coach Jim Morrison and a local physician.

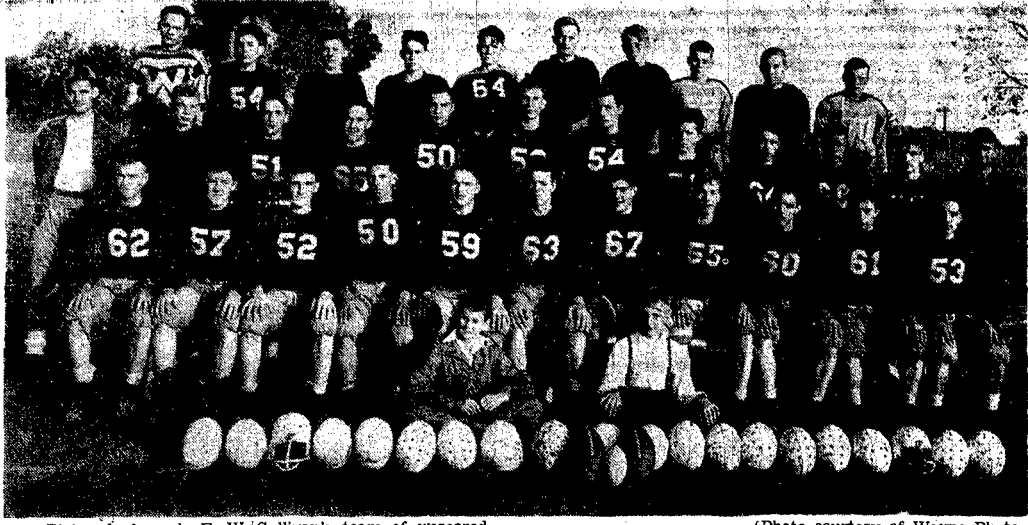

Farmers Are Warned

Must Elect FDR, Wallace To Keep Program

A warning against propaganda that "We'll have a farm program no matter who is elected" was sounded for Nebraska farm men and women today by L. M. Thompson, chairman of the Nebraska division of the National Committee for Agriculture. "If we're going to keep the farm program, which farmers of Nebraska and other states have created through the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, we must keep men in our national headquarters whose record indicates their will to continue it. "These men are Franklin D. Roosevelt and Henry Wallace", Thompson, a Franklin county farmer, declared. The National Committee for Agriculture is an action group composed entirely of farmers. We are totally independent, non-political and non-partisan in principle. The political background of the members of the National

Committee is divided almost evenly between the two major parties. Our interest in political campaigns is confined entirely to clarifying campaign issues so as to enable farm men and women to locate candidates for national office whose record indicates

their interest in equality for agriculture, and who, for that reason stand to be most eligible to ask us for our vote.

"It seems strange to me that a party headed by Mr. Willkie should spend seven years attacking every phase of our national farm program, and then come out in an election year with indorsements of it", Thompson continued. "But maybe the fact the Nebraska farm cash income has increased 51 per cent since 1932, has had something to do with that. Maybe the fact that more than ten thousand farm families have already obtained electric service through REA and thirteen thousand more are scheduled to receive it, has had something to do with it, too.

Thompson contended that, "Speaking for the farmer and voting against him seems to be an old republican habit". He explained that only a few months ago, three fourths of the republicans in congress, under the leadership of the chairman of the republican national committee, voted against appropriations for continuing the AAA Commodity Loan program.

"What they voted against", he said, "Was the ten million dollars that has come into the hand of Nebraska farmers and business men since the 1940 wheat harvest

was completed, through the wheat loan program".

"We farmers have plenty of people to talk for us, what we need, is people to vote for us, because that is where the pay-off is in maintaining an effective farm program, and if we're going to keep yorging ahead, we need the understanding, the sympathy, the honesty, of Roosevelt and Wallace. Their service record in our behalf speaks for itself. It is a record that has never been equaled any time, anywhere".
