WHY IS FREE GOLD?

A simple explanation of "free gold"
and "gold" is "free" appears in
the Burlington Hawkeye. It is as
follow:

"This is a pair of balances, and in one
place a silver dollar. In the other place
about one-half silver-dollar. In other
words, a silver dollar weighs about
sixty-three as much as a gold dol-

lar. When the ratio was established
for the standard of gold and silver, the
gold \$1 represented the weight of the
silver dollar. The value of the gold
was based upon its weight, and the
silver dollar was based upon its
value. Thus the gold was longer than
the "ratio" of the two dollars had
been. The value of silver was increased
until its value was equal to the value
of gold. Then the gold dollar was
made to weigh less than the silver
dollar. This is free coinage of gold.

The gold at present is worth 100
cents per ounce, and the silver dollar
is worth 66 cents per ounce.

Thus the gold is longer than the
silver dollar, and the silver dollar
is shorter than the gold dollar.

The "ratio" of the two dollars has
now been changed, so that the
value of silver shall be proportional
to the value of gold, and the silver
dollar has been reduced to the
value of the gold dollar.

The value of a dollar of gold
or silver, or a pound of lead or
tin, is not properly measured by the
number of grammes in the mass of the
metal, but by its purchasing power
of what it can buy.

The same is true of the wages of the workers.

When damages are inflicted to a
contractor in a price of the products
of the firm just mentioned, that will
cause him to pay more for labor.

the contractor a great deal of damage.

But the contractor does not
pay more for labor, but the
workmen do.

Thus the wages of the workers
have been increased because of the
increased cost of living.

That is the reason why the
cost of living has increased.

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
