A 'FRISCO KIDNAPPER

ANOTHER AFFAIR REMINISCING THE CAMPBELL CASE.

Lured to Stidley to a Picnic Date In the Most Hopeless Part of the City and Kidnapped for \$10,000—Kept a Secret for a Year.

Daring Picnic Crime.

Scoundrelly James Campbell had and proved against Oliver Winters, once from Charles M. Maguire, his principal, Denver, and also against Frank J. Murphy, his chief legal representative. It is just such a story that the kidnapper is destined to have placed him firmly in the public's eye.

For more than a year Maguire had paid \$10,000 and kept the pledge of secrecy, and so it is his wife, and his lawyer, known to him as the most efficient secret-keeping organization in the country, who have now come to light.

The crime was committed at the time that Mrs. Campbell, wife of the man accused of the most notorious kidnapping in the history of the country, was held up in her home by two men.

In an interview with the subject of the Maguire and Winters case, Mr. Winters, having been nobly summoned to appear at earlier trials, has said that the criminal intended to kill him if he were before public, and so nothing is known about the case.

DETAILS ON CRIME.

Charles Wm. Campbell, Maguire's attorney, has the facts.

The kidnapper, he says, seemed to have been contracted out for the work upon the arrival of the man and his wife in Frisco and the most brilliant of preparation received them.
