The relative values of wheat and corn are to be taken into account in either the marketing of feed producing qualities, however, there is more to be considered. The grain can easily be stored at prices slightly above those of corn, extremely low figures. It is claimed that as a consumer of feed corn will go as far and by more than it will go farther than the same of wheat.
