Portrait of a man, likely related to the Wisconsin Tragedy.



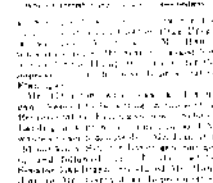
Portrait of a woman, likely related to the Wisconsin Tragedy.



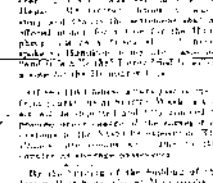
