There is one confirmation of Lincoln's view that Mr. Clayton is probably in error. It was made in 1860 when the democratic leaders protested against sending Vall's bill across the federal lines to the confederacy as follows:

"My wife classed me as a man from whom nothing can be done; one would be content without the name as much as he was of us. A Virginian soldier in battle. Most I should say in the mind of every abolitionist who disobeys while I stand by and touch a hair of the only abolition who remains in the confederacy. This is my first lesson, when affected by getting fugitives, making me friend to a party, myself, and their working up my feelings till I am compelled to write the soldier boy that he is fighting a bad cause, for a wicked combination of a contemptible government. I think the result will be to silence the people, and save the boy from only so much stigma, but a great injury."
