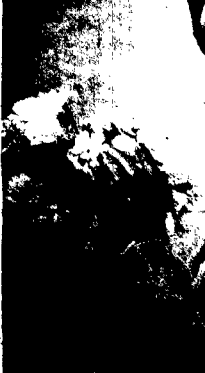

McGee Headlines List For North All-Stars

It may be an understatement, but North all-star basketball coach Bob Kremke of Arlington feels his team has a group of "awfully talented kids."

The 1977 all-star North squad may be the best collective group of individual talent that the Yankees have enjoyed since the game began in 1959. "There's a lot of good kids," Kremke said of both the North and the South. As a result, Kremke sees the possibilities for several good matchups in the all-star games where man-to-man defense is mandatory.

"You can truly use almost any kind of offense you want," he said of the North's possible strategy for the Aug. 4-5 doubleheader.

Kremke and assistant Joe Folds of Sidney will match their North squad against the South Aug. 4 at Mid-Plains community college in North Platte and Aug. 5 in Lincoln at the University of Nebraska Sports Center. Both facilities are air-conditioned.

Kremke and his star-studded North squad will invade Wayne State's Rice Auditorium where they will start practice in late July.

The North holds a 4-3 advantage including a sweep of last year's two games, the inaugural year for the summer doubleheader. Previously, a single game had been played in Lincoln.

The 1977 North squad contains five Class A athletes, four from Class B and three from Class C.

Although all the North all-stars are generally well-known throughout the state, the name that brings almost instant recognition is Mike McGee of Omaha North. With a 38.1 senior scoring average and 15 rebounds per game, the 6.5 North High product has been labeled one of the hottest collegiate prospects from Nebraska's high school ranks in recent years.

McGee holds 11 Metropolitan Conference records and, according to North coach Bob Murray, "will make any team go and is a constant threat offensively and defensively."

Teaming with McGee from the Metropolitan Conference is Omaha Benson's 6.7 Dan Clausen, a rugged center whose 17 rebound average last year is tops among the North all-stars. He also scored 23 points per game.

The three Class C competitors on the North should prove to be just as competitive. From Class C champion Howells is 6-6 center Dick Jakubowski. He broke into the Howells starting lineup in January of his sophomore year and stayed there for the remainder of his high school career. He averaged 17.2

"The cards are mailed about three months before the end of the school year to students getting social security checks," Branch said. "The information on the attendance report helps us decide if the student can continue to get monthly payment."

"Delay in returning the report card can mean a delay in future payments," he said.

Full-time students 18 and over who remain unmarried can get social security checks until they're 22 if a parent gets social security payments or has died after working long enough under social security.

More than 700,000 students in colleges, high schools and trade schools get monthly social security checks.

"Students who need help with the attendance report or information about social security benefits can call or write any social security office," Branch said.

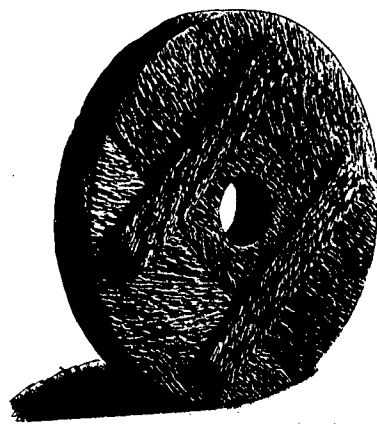

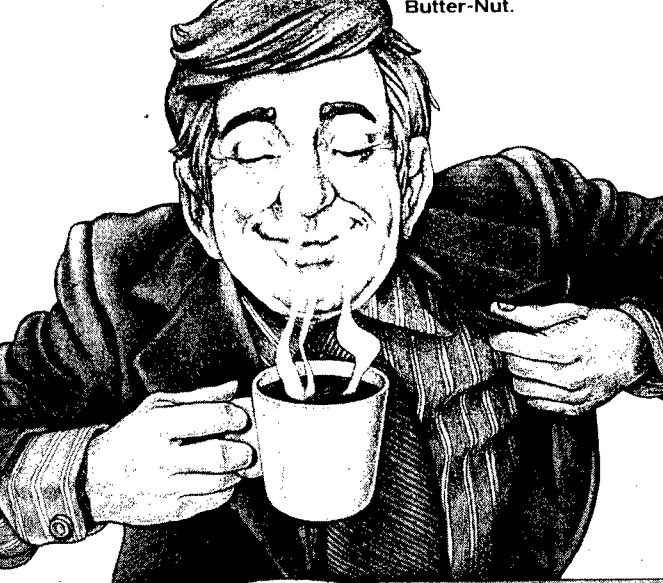

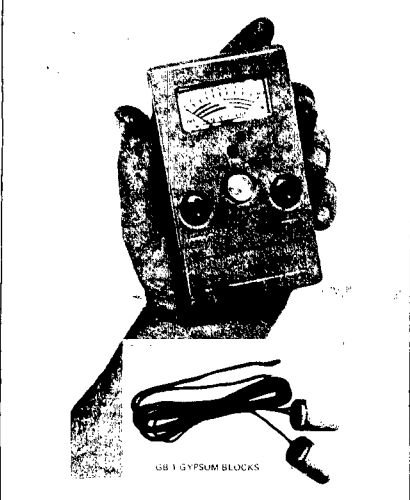

O'Donnell: Government Interfering with Family

America is what the family is. That's how Allen O'Donnell summed up his talk on the impact of government on family life during the Wayne Kiwanis Club meeting Monday, March 21.

Government is everywhere in the system where the family has the role of the family.

Today the government has set up health care centers for youngsters and grandparents. It even dictates the laws of marriage instead of making marriage a spiritual institution, O'Donnell noted.

Two hundred years ago, the United States basically was an agricultural society where farming was the mainstay of the economy. During that time families were the center of social activity and each member learned to depend upon the other and learned to live and work together.

At that time, O'Donnell went on the role of government was to offer protection and administer justice if needed.

Government began assuming more duties after the Civil War when industry and the railroads came along. Agriculture no longer was the mainstay of family income. Now it was industry where father would spend up to 16 hours a day, six days a week earning a living. As a result, the mother took over the role as the head of the house, he pointed out. Also during that time in history, schools began to play a more prominent role in the life of a child. Instead of a child attending school for three to four years, 200 years ago, he spent eight years in classes.

Today, a child is in school about 13 years, placing a lot of the burden of rearing a child on the school system, O'Donnell said.

Some of the biggest changes in the role of the family have been the working mother and the change in family size, he said. Over 50 per cent of the American workforce is comprised of women — 50 per cent of whom are married. As a result, family size has dwindled to possibly two children per couple.

O'Donnell said that the government has set up hot lunch programs in the schools, provided day care centers to care for preschool youngsters and offered homes for the retired. "I'm wondering what the government's role will be in the next 100 years?" he asked members.

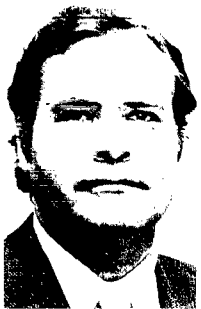

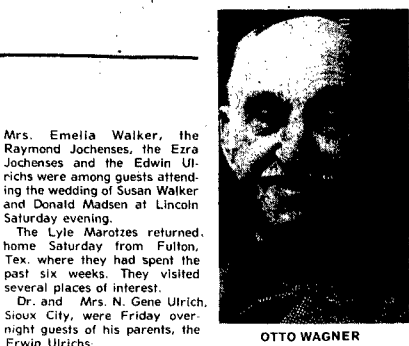

The proposal would have increased the speed limit to 45 miles per hour on the west and east ends of Highway 35 in Wayne - Wayne's Seventh St. including the zone adjacent to the Wayne High School property.

Brink said the proposal in his opinion amounts to extortion by the DOR and the plan didn't find much support among council members.

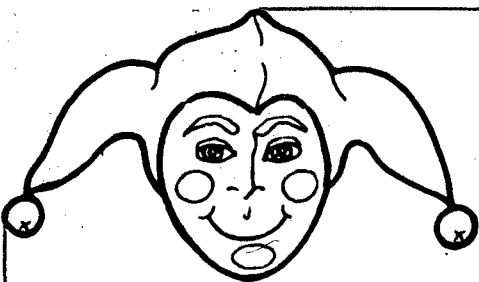

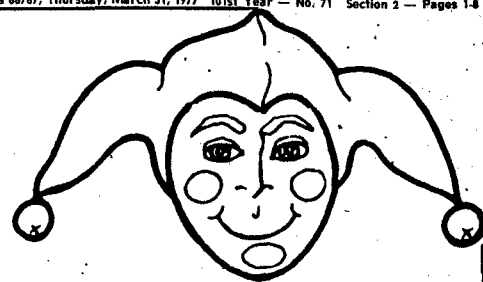

Bake in 375 degree oven for 35 minutes. Remove from oven. Sprinkle over remaining cheese. Return to oven, bake, uncovered for 15 minutes longer. Cool for 10 minutes before cutting. Serve plain or with a mushroom sauce. Makes 6 servings.



Sunshine Custard

- 1 Egg White
- 2 tablespoons Sugar
- 1 package (3-oz.) Egg Custard Mix
- 1 tablespoon Sugar
- 2 cups Milk
- 1 egg Yolk
- 1 teaspoon Orange Rind, grated

Beat egg white until foamy throughout. Gradually add 2 tablespoons sugar, beating thoroughly after each addition. Continue beating until meringue will form soft rounded peaks. Set aside.

Combine custard mix, 1 tablespoon sugar, the milk and egg yolk in saucepan. Bring quickly to a boil, stirring constantly. (Mixture will be thin.) Remove from heat. Stir in orange rind. Pour into a 1-quart baking dish or 4 custard cups. Spoon 4 dollops of meringue over large custard or spoon 1 dollop of meringue over each individual custard. Bake at 425 degrees for 5 minutes, or until meringue is lightly browned. Cool 2 hours, or until set. Makes about 2 1/4 cups or 4 servings.

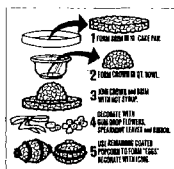


Popcorn Bonnet

- about 12 Gumdrops
- Icing or Icing Decorator
- 1 package (5-oz.) Popcorn
- 1 cup Sugar
- 1/2 cup Corn Syrup
- 1/2 cup Water
- 1/4 cup Butter or Margarine
- about 24 Spearmint Leaves

Roll out gumdrops with a rolling pin into 1" circles. Cut with scissors or knife or form petals of gumdrops flowers. Decorate center with icing or icing decorator.

Prepare popcorn according to package directions. Pour into large pan or kettle. Heat sugar, corn syrup and water in saucepan to 250-260 degrees or until a drop of syrup in cold water forms a hard ball. Remove from heat and stir in butter. Pour over popcorn and mix thoroughly with a large spoon. Save 2 or 3 tablespoons of syrup for attaching crown, gumdrops flowers and spearmint leaves. Coated popcorn is now ready to be formed into the bonnet. You will need a 10" cake pan or tray for the brim, a 1 quart bowl for the crown, plus icing or an icing decorator. Grease your hands and all containers well and follow easy diagram below.



Shrimp Toast

- 2 cans (4 1/2 ounces each) Shrimp
- One-Third cup finely chopped Water Chestnuts or Celery

- 1 tablespoon Cornstarch
- 2 Eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon Sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon Soy Sauce

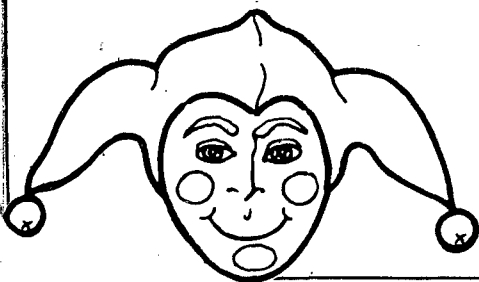
6 slices two-day old Bread, crusts removed
Drain shrimp and chop coarsely. Combine with water chestnuts or celery, cornstarch, eggs, sugar and soy sauce. Mix well and spread evenly over the bread all the way to the edges. Cut each slice into triangles. Fill a heavy skillet with cooking oil to a depth of one inch and heat oil to about 375 degrees or until, by test, it will quickly brown a small piece of stale bread. Lower the filled bread, shrimp side down, into the hot oil and fry about 15 seconds. Turn and fry on the other side a few seconds or until golden brown. Drain on absorbent paper. Serve hot. Makes 12 servings.



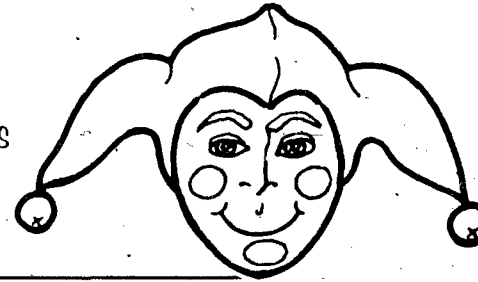

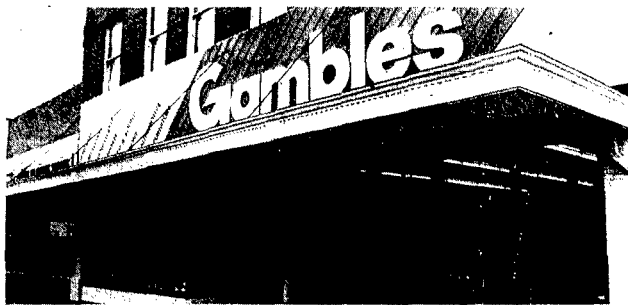

Founder Relates Store's History

Perhaps Bertin C. Gamble inherited some of his talent and ability from his merchant-banker father — attributes that have enabled Mr. Gamble to become one of the nation's foremost merchandisers and financiers.

Until Mr. Gamble was seven years old, his father was a partner in the general store of Gambles, Barker and Tubbs in the small town of Hunter, N.D. However in 1907 his father made the decision to embark on a new career. Family possessions were loaded on a hay rack and they moved to Arthur, N.D. where Mr. Gamble's father helped found the town's first bank.

It was at Arthur that Mr. Gamble met Phillip W. Skogmo, the son of the railroad station agent. A friendship developed between these two young men that eventually resulted in the formation and growth of one of

the nation's major retail, whole sale and catalog sales companies. This was a friendship that endured until Mr. Skogmo's death in 1949.

After attending high school, both young men went to Minneapols where they worked for a dairy supply firm and enrolled in business college.

On the first of March, 1920, Mr. Gamble's 22nd birthday, they moved to Ferris, Minn., pooled their small savings, made arrangements for additional capital and took over the Hudson Essex dealership.

Business thrived and other car dealerships were taken on. As time passed, the sale of automotive parts, tires, batteries and accessories grew to become a substantial business.

Therefore, the decision was made to operate a retail automotive accessory store in St. Cloud, Minnesota, and on March 14, 1925, their first store made its debut under the name of the Gamble Auto Supply Company.

Irrigation Energy Requirements Depend on Pressure, Depth

The energy required to pump irrigation water depends upon the depth of the water supply, below the land surface, the operating pressure of the distribution system and the efficiency of the pumping plant, according to district extension irrigation specialist George Morin.

For a well being pumped at 800 gallons per minute (gpm) about one horsepower (hp) must be added to the water for each five feet that the water supply is below the land surface. Thus, when ten inches of water are applied to a 130 acre field and the water supply is at a depth of 100 feet below land surface, about 20 hp must be added to the water for 735 hours just to lift it from the ground, Morin said.

With the same 800 gpm well approximately two and one-third hp must be added to the water for each five pounds per square inch (psi) of operating pressure required by the distribution

system. Thus, for a center pivot with an operating pressure of 75 psi, about 35 hp must be added to the water in order to pressurize the system. A typical gated pipe will have an operating pressure of eight or nine psi and will require about four hp.

Tests by the Agricultural Engineering Department have shown that a pumping system can reasonably expect to have an operating efficiency of 75 percent. Thus, the brake horsepower generated by the power source of the pumping plant is about one and one-third that actually added to the water. Additional tests by the department have shown that the average well in Nebraska uses one and one-third times the energy necessary to satisfy its brake horsepower requirements.

Thus, with a 800 gpm well operating in conjunction with a center pivot, about 55 hp is added to the water. This would require a motor or engine with a brake horsepower rating of about 75. Operating this system for 735 hours would require about 3700 gallons of diesel (45,700 kilowatt-hours (KW-HR) of electricity) to satisfy its brake horsepower needs. For the more typical system, using one and one-third the energy it needs, fuel use would be 4,850 gallons of diesel (60,900 KW-HR of electricity).

With gated pipe 24 hp is added to the water. The brake horsepower necessary would be 32, and about 1,600 gallons of diesel (19,900 KW-HR of electricity) should be used for 735 hours of operation. Actual energy use will be 2,100 gallons of diesel (26,700 KW-HR of electricity) for the more typical pumping plant.

This means that the energy requirements for the typical power plant (using one and one-third time to fuel required) are considerably greater than for a system operating at 75 percent efficiency. In addition, for this example the energy requirements of the center pivot are two and one-third times greater than for gated pipe. These factors, plus the increasing costs and decreasing availability of energy, mean irrigators should determine if your system is using more energy than it needs to and consider energy when deciding which irrigation system to purchase. Morin said.



Fire blight can be a real problem in apples, crab apples, mountain ash or cotoneaster.

You can do two things this spring to beat this disease. Prune diseased parts early this spring. Prune in March before trees start growing actively. Apple varieties with some resistance recommended for Nebraska are: Delicious, winesap, and Northwestern Greening.

When pruning, cut at least 10 inches below the edge of the infected areas. Sterilize the cutting tools after each cut to avoid spreading the disease by dipping the shears or knife in the disinfectant or pouring it over the cutting edge. Rubbing alcohol is a satisfactory disinfectant.

Other practices which help control fire blight are spraying in the blossom stage and avoiding excessive nitrogen. Fertilizer combined with heavy water irrigation will produce succulent growth. Fire blight is worse on such growth.

Tractor Test Summary Available

Farmers looking for a tractor make and model with peak fuel and operating efficiency to fit their particular situation can check alternatives by consulting the new University of Nebraska-Lincoln tractor testing summary.

According to Dr. Louis Levitt, engineer-in-charge of the UN-L Tractor Testing Laboratory, the tractor test season runs from mid-March to the end of June and from the end of August to the end of November.

An annual summary of all reports for a testing season is published in booklet form, with single copies, free to Nebraska residents. The cost to out-of-state residents is \$1 per copy. The report for the 1976 testing season is now available. This report includes only tractors on the market as of Jan. 1, 1977.

Orders should be sent to Department of Agricultural Communications, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, NE 68583, accompanied by the correct amount of money (\$1 plus 15 cents mailing charge per copy).

Copies of individual test reports can be obtained by writing Tractor Testing Laboratory, Department of Agricultural Engineering, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Neb. 68583. Specify

make and models on which reports are desired. The cost is 15 cents per report plus 15 cents mailing charge (for any number of reports).

During the 1976 test season 30 tractors, including several from Britain and Germany were tested. Thirty-five tractors are scheduled for testing during the 1977 season, with several produced in Europe but marketed under American brand names, Levitt said.

There is no official U.S. tractor test, but every make and model of tractor sold in Nebraska must be evaluated under state law. The testing began after a bill was introduced in 1919 by a legislator-farmer who had a bad experience with a tractor. The bill passed unanimously.

More than 1,200 tractors have been tested in Nebraska, with results recognized worldwide.

A test tractor must be a

production model which is equipped for normal use, Levitt noted. He said the tests are designed to:

- Encourage the manufacture of improved tractors.
- Regulate the manufacturer's claims.
- Maintain a stock of repairs in the state.
- Maintain an impartial testing laboratory.
- Make results always available to the public.
- Compare performance of each tractor under similar conditions.

New Runoff System Ends Pumping Chore

A new method of handling feedlot or dairy lot runoff eliminates the laborious chore of pumping, which often must be done at a critical time, according to a University of Nebraska-Lincoln agricultural engineer.

E. A. Olson, speaking on the new method of draining feedlots to comply with pollution standards at a meeting of the Mid-Central branch of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers (ASAE) in St. Louis Friday and Saturday.

The new system uses the "serpentine" or "switch-back" design with a grassed waterway to handle runoff from the open lots. Olson said the runoff is passed through two wire screen debris traps to collect solids. Mechanical scraping of the lots reduces the load on the system, he noted.

In dairy lot runoff systems now in use, approximately 800 gallons per day from the milking parlor alone will pass through a settling tank. From the tank, the liquids are taken by plastic pipe to a holding pond integral with the switchback system.

Liquid can be held for 120 days and drained through the switchback system at four-month intervals. This gives sufficient "dry" time to establish and maintain a grass cover in the switchback system and so it can be pastured or harvested, the UN-L agricultural engineer said.

Olson said the system promises to be less costly to construct and will require less labor to operate than systems which require pumping or hauling liquids to the fields.

CCC Will Assume Risks For Stored Commodities

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced that, effective July 1, the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) will assume the loss from fire, windstorm and other causes now covered by casualty insurance on commodities owned by the government and stored commingled in commercial storage elevators.

This action should result in a saving to the government, USDA officials said. USDA officials point out that CCC can absorb any losses that occur at a lower cost than the expense of continuing the insurance requirements in storage contracts, which cost is reflected in storage rates the government pays.

The wide distribution of commodity holdings by CCC accomplishes the same spreading of risk which individuals obtain from insurance. CCC assumption of casualty risks was approved by the CCC board of directors in December 1976 and is in line with the policy of the General Accounting Office, an agency of the Congress, with
