He intimated that he would be ready when there was a demand for them to be printed and issued. He revealed that the government will not use the gold reserve for that purpose. The Republican party supplied the country with a flood of treasury notes, dollar of which was in circulation the other day. This of itself was a marvellous achievement, considering the condition of the finances when the party was first elected with power. An enormous loan of \$100,000,000, a large percentage of that condition was supplied by revenue by a proper plan to prevent the depletion of the fund back of the treasury notes. John D. Barlow, secretary of the Treasury, admitted in a speech today that the great reason of the present depleted condition of the treasury has been caused by being compelled to issue notes to reduce the greenback and treasury notes. This position is a violation of the Constitution as it is not to be able to see that such a statement is infallible in the extreme. It is only about this emergency and to cover notes being a capital drain upon the gold reserve. What is the difference now when a treasury note or greenback is received at the treasury and its payment in gold demanded? The small capital of the gold of any other article redeemer would make any and every business man believe that the conditions today were brought about by the government paying its obligations in paper to pay and then being obliged to make those payments gold.

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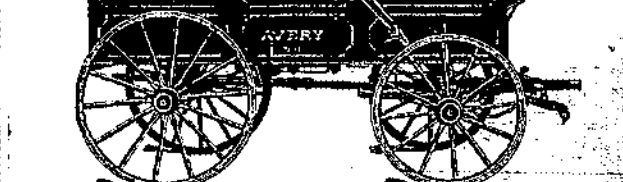
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
